Mesquite Tree Gets Death Knell

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. Feb. 17 (UP)—The undesirable mesquite tree that is robbing the nation of many thousands of acres of crop or cattle raising land is facing a deadly blow from science.

The tree is being "pulled" from the face of the earth by a new device developed at the Southwest Research Institute here and already hundreds of acres have been cleared, opening up new fields for crops and lands for cattle.

The invention commonly is known as a "tree-upper." Attached to a tractor, it pulls up trees in two yanks. The roots and all come out and the necessity of dynamiting stumps is eliminated.

The invention was primarily designed to attack the mesquite tree a "weed" tree that grows throughout the southwest and takes nourishment out of the earth. It will work, however, on most any type of tree up to 11 inches in diameter.

The "puller" uses hydraulic jacks with the compressed air being furnished by the tractor motor. Scientists here explained that most standard tractors are equipped to produce compressed air, and that the "puller" which weighs about 3000 pounds, can be attached quickly.

Czech Spy Found Guilty, Sentenced

MUNICH, Feb. 17 (UP)—A U. S. Military commission today found Frantisek Klecka guilty of espionage for Czechoslovakia after a two-day trial which was cloaked in unprecedented secrecy during the opening phase.

Klecka was convicted by an eight-man commission in the first of five spy trials, and was sentenced to 20 years at hard labor.

The commission voted by a two-thirds majority to find Klecka guilty of acts "prejudicial to the security of U. S. forces in Europe." The verdict was announced by Brig. Gen. John L. McKee, chairman of the military court.

TEXAS CITY, Tex., Feb. 17 (UP)—A junior college on the "mainland of Galveston County" had the endorsement today of the Texas City Junior Chamber of Commerce and Dr. C. C. Colvert of the University of Texas.

Dr. Colvert spoke here last night, at the invitation of the Jaycees, and suggested that the Texas City and La Marque school district join to raise \$500,000 through a bond issue.

Dr. Colvert observed that the courses in the proposed school should fit the needs of the industry in this area, thereby enabling students to enter the industrial field immediately after graduation.
