1.10 Inches Of Moisture Falls Here Wednesday

Eastland Lake, from which the city derives its water, lacks only 12 1/2 inches of being full as result of 1.10 inches moisture falling during the past twenty-four hours, C. H. O'Brien, city manager, stated this morning.

Water level of the lake rose 17 inches during the twenty-four hour period, with at least a year's supply now available for the city, O'Brien stated. "Of course, we hope to receive some additional moisture in the months to come, but even if it doesn't rain anymore the city is in fine shape for water."

J. A. Beard, local weather observer, reports .80 of an inch precipitation fell Wednesday afternoon and an additional .30 of an inch Wednesday night, for a total of 1.10 inches.

The heavy downpour Wednesday was accompanied by a light hail, lightning and thunder storm. Oscar Lyerla stated that .22 of an inch of moisture was recorded at Flat Wood Wednesday and .33 Thursday, for a total precipitation of .55 of an inch.

Predicts More Thundershowers

A heavy layer of warm, moist air over the southwest will continue to bring widely scattered thundershowers to Texas the Weather Bureau predicted today.

Rains measuring from a trace to 1.25 inches at San Angelo drenched the state yesterday and last night and many streams over the state were bankful or overflowing.

Temperatures continued mild with the mercury ranging from a 63 at Amarillo and Lubbock yesterday to 99 at Presidio. Lows this morning included 51 at Clarendon and Guadalupe Pass to 73 at Brownsville.

At least four lives have been lost within the past few days as an indirect result of floods in South Texas.

Some of the rainfall reports included 1.14 inches at Temple; 1.10 at Eastland; 1.03 at Port Arthur and San Marcos; .95 at Brady; .86 at Plainview; .87 at Brownwood; .70 at Waco and .72 at Taylor. Numerous points reported lesser amounts.

Sunday, May 1, will be Straw Hat Day in Eastland, it was announced by local merchants.

On that day, it will be official for men to don the straw derbies traditional for spring.

Communists In Texas Protest Bullitt Speech

HOUSTON, Tex. April 28 (UP)—The Communist Party in Texas urged the UN today to chastise Former Ambassador W. C. Bullitt for a speech he made this week before a joint session of the Texas Legislature.

James J. Green of Houston, state secretary of the party, sent a telegram to UN General Secretary Trygve Lie in Lake Success, appraising him of certain "provocations" allegedly uttered by Bullitt.

"Bullitt urged armed action by American forces against Russian forces at Berlin and armed intervention against the people of China, as well as other provocations," Green's message said.

Green explained he was asking United Nations action "since war can not be prevented without halting its incendiaries."

He did not suggest just what steps the UN should take against Bullitt.

Senate Approves Fish License Bill

AUSTIN, Tex. April 28 (UP)—A new system of fish licensing for Lake Texoma was approved today by the Senate.

License fees will be divided between the states of Oklahoma and Texas under terms of the measure which goes to the House.

The bill, sponsored by Sen. Charles Jones of Bonham, is identical with a measure recently passed by the Oklahoma legislature.

Under terms of the proposal, Oklahoma will receive 70 per cent of the license fees, while Texas will receive 30 per cent. The allocation was based on the geographical division of the lake between the two states.

However, the act does not repeal the present \$1.10 state license which covers "bank fishing" on the Texas side of the lake.

Yearly lake-wide licenses will sell for \$5. A 10-day license would be \$1.25.

President Of Lions International To Attend Mineral Wells Meeting

MINERAL WELLS, April 28—The president of Lions International, Dr. Eugene S. Briggs, head of Phillips University of Enid, Okla., will speak and there will be a band contest, a colorful parade and many other features when the Lions of Texas District 2-E meet in Mineral Wells for their convention on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, May 8, 9 and 10.

The convention is expected to attract close to a thousand visitors to this city.

Vesper service Sunday will be conducted by the Rev. Hayden Edwards of Fort Worth. Afterward, the traditional district governor's reception will be held, with District Governor Dave Hudson of Weatherford and Dr. Briggs present. Monday, there will be a breakfast for key Lions, a key Lion being one who has brought in two or more members. E. E. Faires of Jacksboro, who will be in charge, has 150 members to his credit and District Governor Hudson, approximately 100.

The Brownwood and Olney clubs, backing rival candidates as next district governor, will hold model luncheons Monday. Brownwood's entry is George Odom. Olney is boosting Sam Furr.

President John Honts of the Fort Worth Downtown Lions Club will give the memorial address and the district governor's report will be made at the Monday afternoon session, with the parade starting at 4 o'clock. The district governor's banquet Monday night; a breakfast Tuesday morning for presidents and incoming presidents and a breakfast for secretaries and incoming secretaries; selection of the next meeting place and election of the

new district governor at the final Tuesday morning session—these are among the scheduled events. A highlight will be a program by the Vernon A. Cappella choir. Having a part on the program will be three past district governors: Joe Childers, Abilene; Frank Crippliver, Wichita Falls; and Charles Williams, Fort Worth.

Pat Cagle, Comanche, and O. G. Carlson, Fort Worth, will take part. The song leader will be George Thompson Sweetwater; pianist, Charles Keiker, Breckenridge; chief tail-twister, "Sandy" King, Brownwood.

The district, consisting of 55 clubs, extends from Arlington to Roscoe and from Knox City to Stephenville. Fort Worth, with nine clubs, is expected to have at least 100 Lions and their wives present. A number of events are planned for the ladies, including a luncheon and a style show.

Damage Suit Enters 4th Day Of Testimony

Witnesses for the plaintiff were still being examined as trial entered the fourth day today in 91st District Court of a \$100,000 damage suit filed by Patsy Nance and others against Wesley Isenhour, both of Cisco.

The suit resulted in an automobile accident in Cisco in November, 1947. A previous trial of the case in October, 1948, ended with a "hung jury."

Don't Believe In Sign
WORCESTER, Mass. (UP)—Thieves who broke into the Fallon clinic found a sign left for their benefit to be almost accurate. The sign said: "Notice to burglars. There are no morphine or narcotic drugs or cash anywhere in the building." The thieves ransacked the place, nevertheless, and left with 51 cents.

Hopes Brighten For Big Four Talks, Lifting Of Blockade

Jack Holmes Injured In Car Accident

Jack Holmes, who resides five miles north of Eastland, was admitted to the Ranger General Hospital Wednesday night, following injuries sustained at 2:30 o'clock, when a pick-up he was driving over-turned on the Breckenridge Highway.

Hospital attendants stated this morning that Holmes suffered a mild cerebral concussion, severe bruises and contusions. He will be hospitalized several days for observation, attendants stated.

The accident occurred, according to the Sheriff's office, while Holmes was enroute to his home during a heavy downpour of rain. The vehicle started "slipping and sliding" and turned bottom side up in a ditch. Another man who was occupying the vehicle with Holmes, name not available, broke the glass out of the window and climbed out. He then extracted Holmes from the wrecked vehicle.

A passing motorist brought the pair to Eastland, where Holmes received emergency treatment in a local clinic before being transferred to the Ranger medical institution.

Holmes is employed as a brick and rock mason.

Calder Decision On Job Awaited

WASHINGTON, April 28 (UP)—President Truman said today he still hopes Curtis Calder will take the job of Army secretary.

The New York utilities magnet said last night he hadn't accepted. Some hours before, Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson had said he was "in" — in 60 days.

At a news conference today Mr. Truman said he wants Calder to be Army secretary, succeeding the resigned Kenneth C. Royall. He said he had talked with him personally about taking the job. He said he hopes Calder will take it because he considers Calder a very capable man.

The Calder case was not the only confusing one. Two high officials yesterday scotched reports that Jonathan Paniel, North Carolina publisher, would succeed John L. Sullivan who resigned in anger because Johnson scuttled the Navy's 65,000-ton super aircraft carrier.

A few hours later Daniels came here for a talk with the President and the reports were revived. Today Mr. Truman said that Daniels is one of several persons being considered as successor.

UNIDENTIFIED SPOKESMAN SAYS CONFERENCE DUE WITHIN WEEK

FLUSHING, N. Y. April 28 (UP)—A top-ranking western diplomat forecast today that Big Four talks would be held soon in New York to make final arrangements for lifting the Berlin blockade and arranging a meeting of the council of foreign ministers.

The diplomat expected that representatives of the United States, Britain, France, and Russia would confer within a week. He predicted that the foreign ministers talk on Germany would be arranged for the final week in May, probably in Paris.

It was confirmed that Jacob A. Malik, chief Soviet participant in the informal talks, gave U. S. Ambassador-at-large Philip C. Jessup oral assurances that the blockade would be lifted if the western powers lifted their counter-blockade simultaneously and agreed to set a date for the Council of Foreign Ministers' meeting. But Malik was said to have asked for time to get official confirmation from Russian Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky.

The informant doubted that the Berlin blockade would be lifted within "three or four days." He said that if that were true, "then the Russians would have to do it unilaterally since final details have to be worked out during joint informal talks with American, British, French and Soviet representatives."

The forecast of four-power preliminary talks marked the first official information that British and French officials would join the informal negotiations. Thus far they have been conducted by Malik and Jessup.

Malik side-stepped direct questions on the Berlin talks as he arrived at the morning meeting of the UN assembly. But asked if he was "optimistic," Malik said with a broad grin:

"We Russians are always optimistic."

The changed Russian attitude on the blockade was linked by informed sources to reports that Arkady A. Sobolev, Soviet diplomat, soon would resign as UN assistant secretary general in charge of political and security affairs.

Diplomats said Sobolev was one of the best posted Soviet officials on American affairs as well as an authority on Berlin, where he once served as political adviser to Marshall Georgi Konstantinovich Zoukov, former Soviet military commander in Germany.

Sobolev returned to Russia three months ago because of a son's illness. His arrival in Moscow coincided with the softening of the Russian attitude and the beginning of the American-Soviet informal talks on Berlin at Lake Success.

Sobolev recently asked for an extension of his leave of absence from the United Nations reporting that his son was worse.

Meanwhile, there were no assurances that Australia's proposal to postpone action on Franco Spain at this session would succeed. Poland served notice it would urge immediate action to tighten UN measures against Spain, and Brazil was equally determined to have them eased as soon as possible.

British Balk Red Attempt To Control Canals

Reinforced British military police seized canal control locks in western Berlin today from Russian troops who had halted barges loaded with supplies brought in the rest of today.

Soon afterward, Maj. Gen. P. A. Kvashnin, Soviet transport commander, sent out orders to permit all water traffic in the western sectors to move during the rest of today.

Kvashnin said a conference would be held on a "higher level" to determine the status of the locks. The Soviets long ago were given administrative control of Berlin's transportation system under a four-power agreement.

All had gone smoothly, even after the Berlin blockade, until yesterday. Then the Russians began halting barges at the Spandau, Ploetzensee and Charlottenburg locks in the British sector of the city.

The British sent a force of armed military police to the locks today and ordered the Russians to get out or be put out. British officers told the Russians they would not submit to Russian control of the canals in their zone. The Russians gave way and the British took over the locks.

The flareup came as reliable reports circulated in Berlin that rail food and canal traffic between Western Germany and Berlin could be resumed within a matter of hours if the western powers and the Soviets can reach agreement on lifting the Berlin blockade.

Other business of the meeting included the appointment of Carl Johnson of Eastland, to audit the Board's records, prior to election of a new secretary to replace Curtis Hertig, deceased.

Next regular meeting of the Board will be Monday night, May 2.

Rural Overseas Program Expands

The executive committee of the Christian Rural Overseas Program for Texas has outlined comprehensive state-wide organizational plans.

Outlined for organizing the state for CROP on a county basis with representation of all church communities in the country as presented by Elmore R. Torn, state director, was approved.

Dr. Daniel C. Russell, state chairman of the Texas committee, reported that the church sponsored world relief program seemed certain of receiving the support and cooperation of all churches denominations and farmer organizations of the state.

CROP gives farmers, rural communities, and all other folks an opportunity to give of farm commodities to be used by the established church relief agencies to alleviate suffering wherever overseas it may be found to be more acute.

Sponsoring parent agencies are Church World Service; Lutheran World Relief, and Catholic Rural Life of War Relief Service, National Catholic Welfare Conference.

The program has the approval of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service and all other agricultural agencies.

State field headquarters have been set up at Taylor.

Uranium Peddlers Nabbed In Berlin

FRANKFURT, April 28 (UP)—The Army reported today that American agents had smashed a ring which was trying to peddle \$3,000,000 worth of uranium from prewar German stockpiles on the black market.

Nine Germans were arrested at Darmstadt last Friday while trying to sell the uranium, Army officials said.

Maj. H. S. Hart, public relations officer for local Army headquarters, said the uranium was believed to have been hidden from stockpiles used by Germany for atom bomb research.

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KNOW YOUR SCHOOLS SUCCESS OF EASTLAND S. WARD SCHOOL DUE TO SPLENDID COOPERATION

(Editor's note: This is the first in a series of articles written by Mrs. James Horton, member of the Eastland Independent School Board, to inform the public of the progress and activities in the local school system.)

Mrs. Harold Durham, principal of South Ward School, holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Abilene Christian College, and a Master's degree from Hardin-Simmons University. In addition, last summer Mrs. Durham attended a course in Library Science Workshop study at Texas State College for Women, Denton; and later attended a reading seminar at Hardin-Simmons. She is now taking a course in "Teacher Personal" and "Health and Physical Education" now being conducted in our High School each Tuesday night by Hardin-Simmons University.

In addition to her principalship at South Ward, Mrs. Durham is past-treasurer of Eastland County Teachers Association, member of Texas Elementary Principals and Supervisors Association, member of Texas State Teachers Association, co-chairman and secretary of writing section of Texas State Teachers Association (1949-1950), advisor to Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins, State Board of Education (1945-1947), member Texas State Textbook committee (appointed by Mrs. Perkins 1947-50), appointed by Dr. R. A. Collins, dean of Hardin-Simmons, to instruct two workshops in Hardin-Simmons University for the first term of summer school at the University this year.

Mrs. Durham is teacher of all Fifth grade work in South Ward. As principal she planned and carried through an I.Q. examina-

tion for the entire school known as the California Mental Ability Test. She is also using the Metropolitan Achievement tests which are recorded each spring. This gives an evaluation program not only of the pupil, but also of each teacher, and the progress of the entire school program. Mrs. Durham plans her work with her entire staff. During the summer of 1948 she, Mrs. Layton, Mrs. Hart and Mrs. Hood, attended the reading seminar at Hardin-Simmons (5 days); then went to a group to Abilene to hear Dr. Prescott on "Child Development", also as a group they went to T.S.C.W., Denton, to hear Dr. Pierce on Library Science. At another time during the summer of 1948 they visited Fort Worth school buildings and studied their plant systems. These same teachers are attending the weekly Har-

per person.

Mrs. Layton is attending classes each Tuesday night in our high school by Hardin-Simmons.

Mrs. Marvin Hood, teacher of Second grade, holds her Bachelor's degree, plus 15 hours. Mrs. Hood has attended all of the lectures and meetings suggested by Mrs. Durham and is at present attending Tuesday night classes in the high school.

Mrs. Hood has read the following professional books this year: "Student Teaching", "Prevention and Correction of Reading Difficulties", "Teaching Arithmetic", "Building Vocabulary", and "How to make Arithmetic Meaningful".

Mrs. Johnnie Hart, teacher of Third grade, has her Bachelor of Science degree and some extra hours. Mrs. Hart attended all lectures, seminars and school meetings with Mrs. Durham during the summer of 1948. In addition she traveled through Old Mexico, giving special attention to their educational systems. This year, Mrs. Hart has read the following professional books: "Health in Schools", "Teaching Arithmetic", "Health Instruction Guide", "Personal Hygiene Applied", "Psychology in Life", "Elementary School Teaching". She is also attending classes each Tuesday night in our high school as given by Hardin-Simmons.

Mrs. Homer Smith, teacher of Fourth grade, holds her Bachelor of Science degree with nine extra hours. Mrs. Smith was elected after school started in the fall and was not a part of the staff during the summer of 1948.

She has just finished reading the professional book, "These

Are Your Children". Mrs. Smith plans to visit Abilene schools next week in the interest of Fourth grade work. She is also planning some study courses for this coming summer.

The physical needs of South Ward school have been greatly improved during the past year. The local school board has no funds for improvements and equipment. The P.T.A. with Mrs. Jack Carothers as President, has raised near \$400 from cook books, carnival, bridge tournaments, etc. The school activity fund is replenished from time to time by the sale of pop-sicles, class-room programs and also the sale of cook books. Through these means of income, the following has been accomplished:

About 12 rows of seats in the rear of the long narrow auditorium were raised, for the benefit of spectators at school programs.

A liquid duplicator was purchased for class room work.

An opaque glass slide projector, which is an addition to the visual education program. The school already owns a projector and each class has its own film strips.

About \$125 has been spent this year on library books, and a central reading room with tables and chairs is available to the children, in addition to each room's book shelves.

In the lunch room, an electro-lux ice box was purchased, and one low table with low chairs was purchased for the very small children. Also in connection with the noon meals, the school has an educational program for the children on diet and manners. Each day the blessing is said in unison by the entire school, and quiet prevails throughout the meal. The staff of South Ward is preparing a program of adequate physical education which will be presented in its entirety next year, with special emphasis on the playground.

The success of South Ward school is due to the splendid cooperation of Principal, faculty and patrons.

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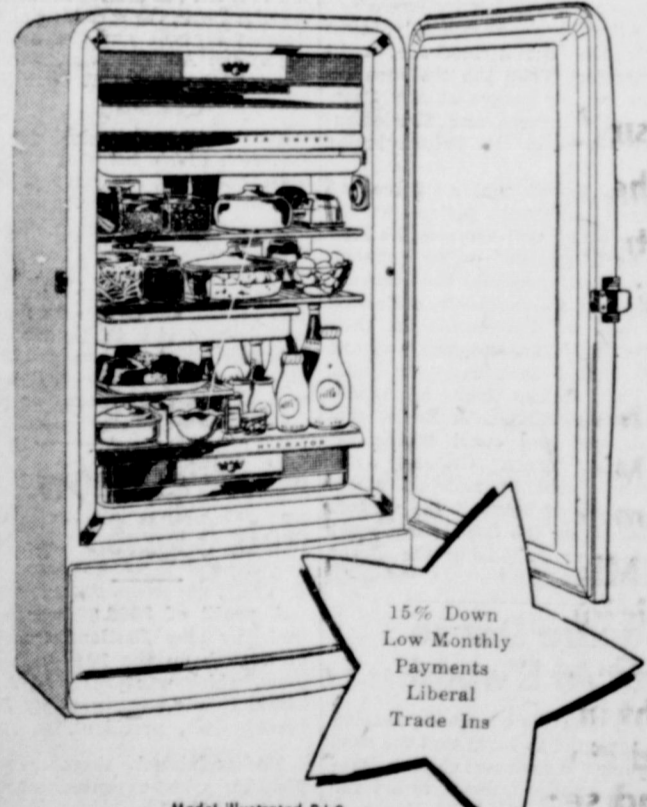

22 Businesses Close In March

AUSTIN, Tex. April 28 (UP)—The number of businesses closing down in Texas totaled 22 last month, as compared with only 12 the previous month and six for the same period a year ago, the University of Texas Business Research reported today.

Other statistical summaries for the state, the bureau said, showed increases in charters issued, dairy production and consumption of cotton and electric power.

Texas charters were granted to 343 firms with a total capitalization of \$5,989,000 during March. This total compared with 401 charters for \$11,174,000 for the same period a year ago.

Manufacture of dairy products it said, were up 26 per cent over February and 10 per cent over March of last year. Electric power consumption was up 12 per cent a year ago, while cotton consumption was up six per cent from the previous month.

However, the bureau said that cotton consumption was 13 per cent below a year earlier.

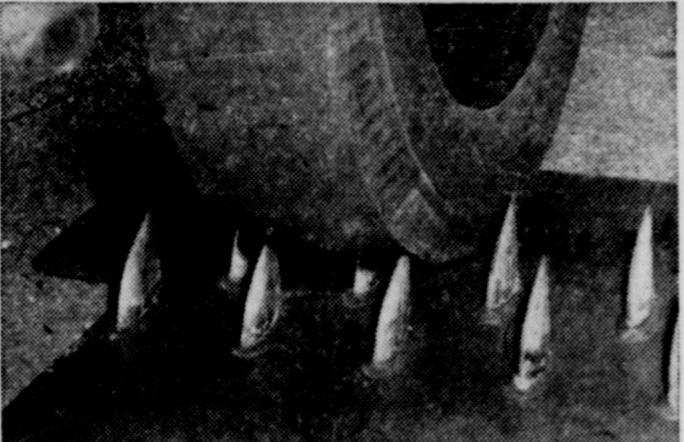
