**EDINBURG, May 26 (UP)—**Two new polio cases boosted the patient count at the lower Rio Grande Valley clinic to 60 today. Nine new cases were recorded for the last seven days, making a total of 18 new cases reported for the area since Jan. 1.

**KINGSVILLE, May 26 (UP)—**Residents along the San Fernando Creek were feeling a little better today about the "hundreds of dead fish and an odor of rotting onions" they reported in the water. Complainants of the suffering creek homesteaders brought about a hearing yesterday in which two celanese corporation officials were fined \$150 each for polluting the creek with waste from the plant. Manager Kenneth Bowen and utilities supervisor A. G. Florence pleaded guilty to the charge.

**BELTON, May 26 (UP)—**Charles Polk, 34, Bell County farmer, died here yesterday from

The blast which injured the oil field worker caused oil to catch fire. The ensuing blaze destroyed two trucks belonging to the Universal Treating Co., on a Magnolia lease.

**HOUSTON, Tex., May 26 (UP)—**Sigmund Weil, 44, who robbed the Alameda State Bank here of \$4500 April 4, was sentenced to a 15-year prison sentence yesterday in Federal District Court.

Weil pleaded guilty before Judge Allen B. Hannay. He received consecutive sentences of 10 years on a robbery count and five years on a charge of possessing and concealing the stolen money. Weil still faces 14 state charges of theft, which have not been set for trial.

## Corpus Christi University To Have First Graduating Class This Year

While two Texas schools observe commencement for the 104th time this week, their sister institution will be celebrating with the first graduating class in her history.

After more than a century, commencement is another tradition to Baylor University, Waco, and Mary Hardin-Baylor college, Belton. But it's new to the University of Corpus Christi, which awarded diplomas to 29 seniors May 24. All three are owned by the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Dr. E. N. Jones, vice-president of Texas Technological College, Lubbock, delivered the commencement address at UCC and Mary Hardin-Baylor college. Speaking for the baccalaureate service was Dr. Carlisle Marney, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Austin.

Baylor university's graduates will hear the Rev. R. O. Cawker, Shreveport, La., and Dr. Thomas Taylor, Brownwood, at their baccalaureate and commencement exercises respectively. Rev. Cawker is pastor of the Highland Baptist Church, Shreveport; Dr. Taylor is president of Howard Payne College. Graduation will be May 30.

Commencement May 23 at Mary Hardin-Baylor featured Dr. Wallace Bassett, Dallas, speaker. Dr. Bassett, who is dean of Texas pastors in length of service to one church, recently celebrated his 31st anniversary as pastor of Cliff Temple Baptist Church, Dallas. He is also president of the First Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Located on the site formerly occupied by the Naval Air Technical Training Command, the University of Corpus Christi first opened its doors in September, 1947. The two Bayers were founded in 1845 at Old Independence in Washington County. The women's college moved to Belton and the men's school (later co-educational) to Waco in 1886.

Baylor University is the oldest school in Texas still operating under the same name with which it was chartered by the Republic of Texas; MH-B is the oldest institution of higher learning in the state which has never merged with any other institution.

## 'Souped-Up' Mustang To Attempt Breaking World's Speed Record

HOUSTON, May 27—A \$10,000 airplane, converted at a cost of approximately \$95,000 until it has only its original shell and wings, is being rapidly shaped up for an attempt to break a world speed record.

Work on the "Beguine," a souped-up Mustang fighter which will be flown by Doc Lemon in her attempt to set a new three-kilometer record at the Houston International Airspeed Run on July 4, has been virtually completed except for painting. The present record is 469 miles an hour.

Owned by J.D. Reed of Houston, the "Beguine" has been completely redesigned since he bought it a year ago for \$10,000. North American Aviation, its original builder, spent about \$45,000 in changing its entire cooling system. The bottom air scoop has been replaced by trim wing-tip darts.

Included in the estimated \$55,000 which Mr. Reed has spent is a new 2,250-horsepower Rolls Royce engine, the only engine designed for full use of water injection. Water injection increases the power. In ordinary engines it is used for short burst of emergency speed.

The 12-cylinder engine will be sparked by hand-made British plugs with platinum points, made especially for racing planes. The "Beguine" is also fitted with one of two special propellers developed by the Hamilton Standard Propeller company for a twin-Mustang Army fighter which was abandoned at the end of the war. According to the propeller company, it cost \$300,000 for development work.

"Everything in the cockpit is automatic," H. C. Danaher, crew chief of the plane said. "This will make it easy to fly as it is to drive an automobile. All Mrs. Lemon will have to do is keep one hand on the throttle and one hand on the stick."

Mrs. Lemon will pay Mr. Reed \$10,000 for the privilege of flying the ship in the record attempt. The hazardous flight must be made within 300 feet of the ground.

"I cannot afford to blink an eye when I am whipping it over the LaPorte airport on the speed run," Mrs. Lemon declared.

She will make her first test flight in the Mustang about June 15. It has not been opened up since it made a forced landing in Kansas last year while being flown to the Cleveland air races. At that time it had made a speed of 565 miles an hour at 14,000 feet.

The plane, which is being painted dark green, has already been entered in the Thompson Trophy race, the top aviation event of the year.

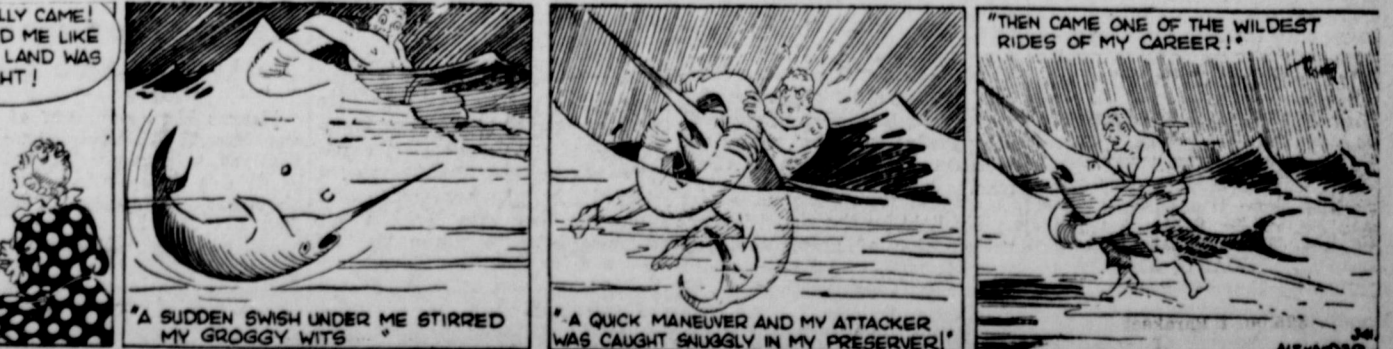

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### Attorney General Urges Firm Stand In Federal State Tidelands Fight

Attorney General Price Daniel today urged Texans to continue their firm stand against the Federal attempt to take the tidelands away from the State Public School Fund. "Our case is not lost. The fight has just begun, and we are going to win in the Court or in Congress, if Texans themselves do not weaken or give up the fight," Daniel said. A prepared statement by the Attorney General said:

"True, it is a hard fight, but with honest and righteous claims, a fighting chance is all most Texans ever ask for. The odds were ten to one against Texas at San Jacinto, but they won. Had they

become weak-kneed and afraid to fight because of great odds, this area would still be a part of Mexico.

"This has been my position on this subject constantly for two years, and I hope the people and especially the newspapers will not at this late date attribute future political significance to my actions. I had rather win the tidelands case than to hold any public office that exists, and if it becomes necessary for me to remove myself from unsolicited speculation on the political scene in order to maintain united support on this case, I shall do so without hesitation.

"Of course, Federal officers would like to compromise because even with a court decision such as they have in California, they cannot take over the lands without an Act of Congress authorizing them to do so. It will take both a court decision and an Act of Congress to enable Federal agencies to enter upon the lands which Texas has held in trust for its people for the past one hundred years. Even in California, that State still operates its land and leases two years after an adverse court decision. Therefore, there is no reason to rush into a settlement on account of fear as to what the Court will do in the Texas case. Expressions of fear only serve to weaken our chances in the Court and the Congress," Daniel said.

"I believe those few who have said we cannot win in Court have

"Beginning at the Mouth of the Sabine River, and running west along the Gulf of Mexico three leagues (10 1/2 miles from land, to the Mouth of the Rio Grande, . . ."

The boundaries were specifically recognized by the United States in the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo in 1848 and by the Gadsden treaty in 1853, he said. "The United States has on many occasions recognized Texas' ownership of the submerged lands three leagues from shore. For instance, when the government wanted land for the Galveston jetty running two miles out in the Gulf from Galveston Island, it obtained a deed from the State of Texas."

"Texas had offered both its lands and minerals to the United States in 1844 in exchange for assumption of Texas' \$13,000,000 debt. But this was defeated in the United States Senate. One Senator said the land was worthless, consisting only of 'marshes, tadpoles, and terrapins'. Another said 'Let Texas keep her lands and pay her own debts'. We did this over one hundred years ago and it is too late now for the Federal government to renege on its own deal," Daniel said.

heard only the Federal side of the case. Anyone who has made a study of Texas' special claim under the annexation agreement knows these lands belong to Texas under the same chain of title by which the people of this state hold their own homes, farms, ranches, and factories. Principles are involved which apply to every foot of land in the State and these principles cannot be sacrificed," he continued.

Daniel said the Federal claims would destroy the solemn annexation agreement approved by the United States Congress in 1845, which contained the following words: ". . . said State, when admitted to the Union . . . shall also retain all the vacant and unappropriated lands lying within its limits . . ."

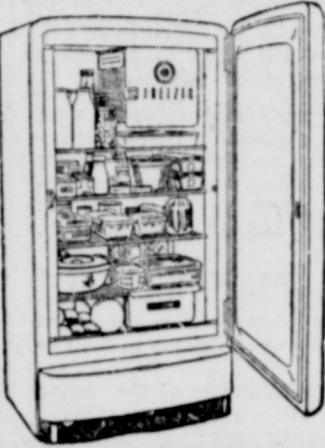
Daniel said the boundary limits, established by the First Congress of the Republic of Texas, were read to the United Congress before it adopted the above agreement, as follows:

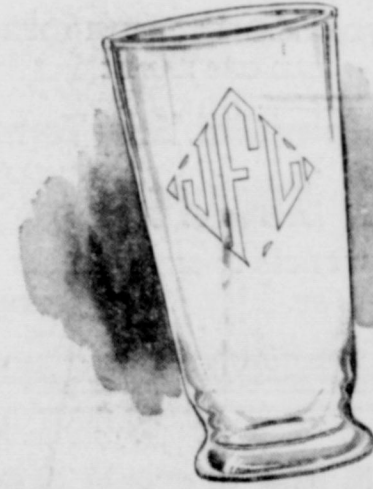

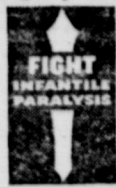
### New Faces at Big Four Paris Parley

### FIVE POLIO PRECAUTIONS ARE LISTED FOR PARENTS

Warning that the 1949 polio season is "just around the corner," the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis today issued a list of precautionary measures to be observed by those in charge of children during the epidemic danger period which usually runs from May through October, reaching its peak during the hot, mid-summer months. The five easy-to-follow health rules for children are:



1. Avoid crowds and places where close contact with other persons is likely.
2. Avoid over-fatigue caused by too active play or exercise, or irregular hours.
3. Avoid swimming in polluted water. Use only beaches or public pools declared safe by local health authorities.
4. Avoid sudden chilling. Remove wet shoes and clothing at once and keep extra blankets and heavier clothing handy for sudden weather changes.
5. Observe the golden rule of personal cleanliness. Keep food

tightly covered and safe from flies or other insects. Garbage should be tightly covered and, if other disposal facilities are lacking, it should be buried or burned.

The National Foundation also listed the following symptoms of infantile paralysis: headache, nausea or upset stomach, muscle soreness or stiffness, and unexplained fever. Should polio strike in your family, call a doctor immediately. Early diagnosis and prompt treatment by qualified medical personnel often prevent serious crippling, the National Foundation pointed out.

The organization emphasized that fear and anxiety should be held to a minimum. A calm, confident attitude is conducive to health and recovery. Parents, it said, should remember that of all those stricken, 50 per cent or more recover completely, while another 25 per cent are left with only slight after effects.

If polio is actually diagnosed, contact the chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis serving your community. The chapter will pay that part of the cost of care and treatment which patient or family cannot meet.

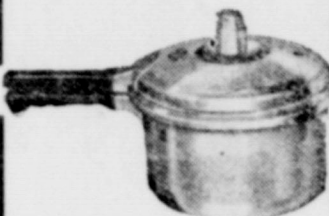

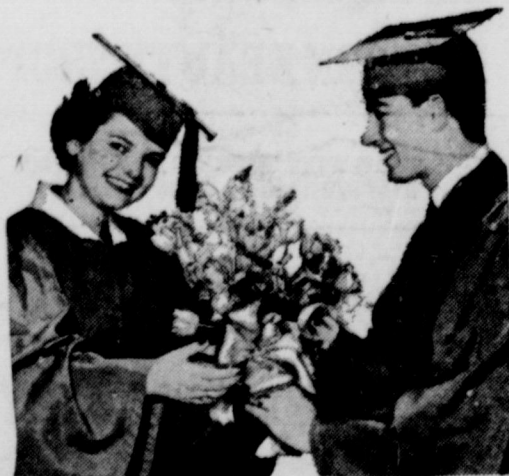

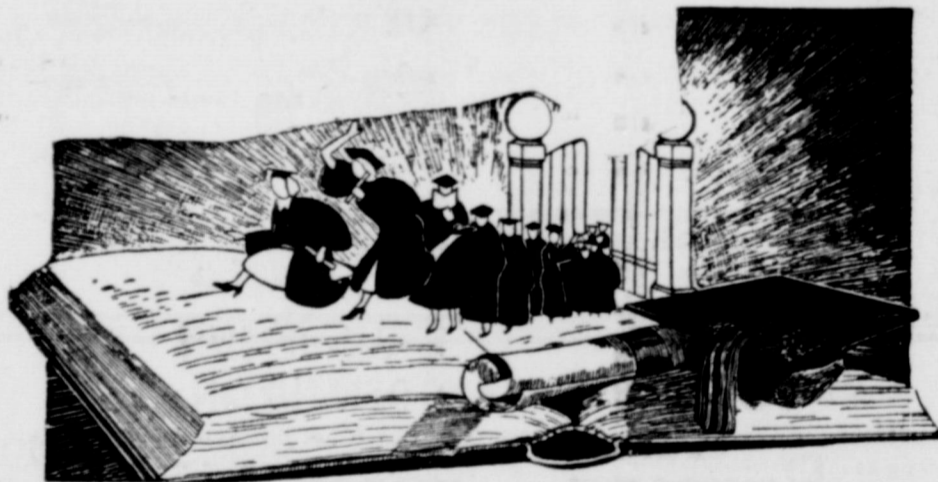
