Prior to the concert, a short address of welcome will be made by W. W. Linkenhogger, chairman of the Eastland City Commission.

The program is being sponsored by the city in an effort to stimulate interest in the park. Officials stated it was planned to have some type of program each Sunday during the summer months.

Cancer Program Given At Welfare Board Meeting

Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, member of the State Board of Education, gave an educational talk on cancer control at a regular monthly meeting of Area 48 of the Texas State Welfare Department in Eastland Friday, May 27, in the Sinclair-Prairie Building.

Mrs. Perkins presented a sound film on diagnosis and prevention of the disease. She included in her remarks information relating to the M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston, and gave a thumb nail sketch of the entire cancer program set up in Texas. She urged that the public donate as much as possible in the present drive for funds for cancer research.

W. E. Moore, of Eastland, supervisor of Area 48 of the Texas State Welfare Department, presided for the meeting. He was assisted by Dee Burleson of Eastland, field worker. Others present were: Lola C. Black, Mrs. Jantha Elliott, Miss Elsie Glenn, field workers, all of Eastland; Mrs. Maurine Long, field worker, Albany; Miss Mary Hall, field worker, Anson; L. B. McFarland, field worker, Anson; Mrs. Olga Banks, field worker, Baird. Attending for the showing of the film were: Mrs. Jean Boyd, Mrs. Marleece Kendrick, Miss Jean Butler and Miss Murie Steen, stenographers in the Eastland office.

The program was presented as part of the State Welfare workers' cooperation with other agencies and groups in support of possible cancer control in Texas.

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

COMMUNISTS FINISH COUP IN SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, May 28 (UP) — The Chinese Communists formerly took over the administration of Shanghai today, outlawed Nationalist currency, seized the Central Bank and reportedly suspended all afternoon newspapers. Communist Gen. Shen Yi assumed administrative control of this city of 6,000,000 and announced that the Military Control Commission will be the supreme governmental organ. The Commission immediately outlawed the Nationalist gold Yuan currency, effective June 5. Communist jennin piao currency, henceforth will be the only legal tender in the city.

The use of gold bars, Chinese silver dollars and foreign currencies was prohibited. Communist political commissars began taking over the Nationalist Central Bank of China yesterday. Reliable sources said the Communist People's Bank of China will open Monday.

Other government corporations suspended business awaiting their turn to be taken over. Two of the three largest Chinese vernacular newspapers, Shun Pao and Sin Wan Pao, were closed yesterday on grounds they had been too closely identified with the Nationalist government. The Nationalist Government's Central News Agency also was taken over by the Communists yesterday.

CANNES, France, May 28 (UP)—Two Moslem Imams arrived at this Riviera town today to unite film star Rita Hayworth and Prince Aly Khan in a second wedding ceremony, this time in accordance with the laws of Mohammed.

Prince Aly, who will some day succeed his father, the Aga Khan, as spiritual leader of some 12,000,000 Ismail Moslems, telegraphed his thanks to the Paris

Mosque for dispatching the two priests.

S. I. Kaddour Ben Ghabrit, head of the Moslem Church in France, regards the marriage as "the most important of the century for the Moslem Church in France."

Prince Aly will wear special robes for the occasion. The Aga Khan will attend in the ceremonial costume of the Imam Ismail sect. Miss Hayworth is expected to wear western dress if she attends. However it is not necessary for a bride to be present at a Moslem ceremony.

Friends said that Miss Hayworth, as a Catholic, recognizes the penalties of marrying outside her faith but that she was very happy despite the religious complications.

Vatican sources said Rita incurred an automatic excommunication without formal announcement by the Catholic Church and without specific proceedings when she married outside the church without permission.

The excommunication is minor and the Bishop of her Diocese can remove it providing she returns to the church, these sources said.

The Moslem rites will be in two parts. In the first, non-religious part the couple or their representatives will sign marriage contracts stipulating a dowry for the bride. It probably will be a nominal sum.

In the religious rites, the Priest will read from the Koran and give advice to the bridegroom on how to live a happy life.

Last night there was a small family dinner at the Chateau De L'Horizon and the new princess retired comparatively early. Today she began opening dozens of wedding gifts from friends and fans.
