Joint Eastland-Ranger Lake Is Proposed

LAKE WOULD SERVE LONG RANGE DEMANDS OF EASTLAND COUNTY

Method of procedure and financing of a new lake at the confluence of Colony Creek and the Leon River to serve the long-range water needs of Eastland and Ranger were discussed by civic leaders of the two communities Tuesday with M. E. Daniel, chairman of the Small Dams Committee of the Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation District in Breckenridge.

H. J. Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, who headed the local delegation, stated that Daniel and the Breckenridge City Commission pledged support and will assist in the engineering and preliminary steps necessary to determine the advisability of such an undertaking.

Others attending the meeting from Eastland were: L. E. McGraw, Lewis Crossley and Grady Pipkin. The Ranger delegation included: R. V. Galloway, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, David D. Pickrell, and Lester Crossley.

The delegations proposed a lake about 145 square miles that would cover 20,000 acre feet, and furnish water for the area in any emergency.

Tanner stated this morning that tentative plans call for the proposed lake to pay for itself from sale of water to possibly Gorman and De Leon. Such a lake would take care of the long-range water needs of the area and be of vital importance in industrialization, irrigation, soil erosion and flood control and recreation needs.

The Breckenridge conference with Daniel followed weeks of preliminary work by the Dam committees of the Eastland and Ranger Chambers of Commerce. Serving on the local Dam committee are: H. L. King, Lewis Crossley, L. E. McGraw, John Turner, Pearson Grimes and Jack Muirhead.

The chronology of the work included securing the passage of legislation at Austin of a bill to make creation of a water district at Ranger legal. The bill was signed last week by Gov. Beauford Jester.

A committee was also sent about six weeks ago by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce to confer with Col. E. V. Spence, chairman of the State Board of Water Engineers, who strongly recommended erection of a dam below the junction of Colony Creek and the Leon River. Making the trip were: Tanner, Crossley and McGraw.

Suggestion was made at the conference with Spence that possibly preliminary engineering services could be secured from the Brazos River Conservation District upon the written request from both the Eastland and Ranger City Commissions. Joint letters were secured from both commissions and presented to Daniel at the Breckenridge meeting Tuesday.

Following engineering work, an election would be necessary in Eastland to determine if the joint Eastland-Ranger Water District would be created for the purpose of building a dam to form the lake.

A full American Legion military funeral service was given by the Ishan A. Smith Post No. 199 of Brownwood, assisted by the Dulin Daniel Post No. 70 of Eastland, at the Eastland Cemetery Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock for Dan Tankersley, 35, of Brownwood.

The local burial service followed a military funeral in Brownwood at 2 o'clock. Approximately 150 persons were in the procession from Brownwood to Eastland.

Tankersley was a veteran of World War II and spent most of his time in overseas service. Following an injury in action, he had been hospitalized for a considerable time, prior to his death. Details concerning Tankersley's death, survivors and other information were not available as this was written.

Earl Tate, commander of the Brownwood post, was in charge of both the funeral and burial service. In the Brownwood service, Rev. L. D. Cochran was chaplain. The firing squad was headed by Frank Scales. Jack Trawick was bugler, and Louis D. Lane presented the flag.

Pallbearers were: late, Ralph Laswell, Lewis A. Griffin, Charles Kyle, Ray Morgan, J. W. Matlock, and Charles Butler.

Scales and Black McCulley commanded the 21 gun salute by the firing squad.

Robert Leslie Receives Degree From Texas U.

Robert Leslie received his LLD degree from Texas University May 30th and with his mother, Mrs. W. P. Leslie, who has been in Austin, returned to their home, 507 Hillcrest Street, Tuesday.

Robert, who also passed his bar examinations and was admitted to practice law in the courts of Texas, was sworn in by Judge J. E. Hickman, of Austin. Judge Hickman, Judge of the Supreme Court of Texas, was one of the judges of the Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, as was Robert's father, the late Judge W. B. Leslie. The two men were close friends.

Robert graduated as valedictorian of the class of 1939 of Eastland High School, received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Yale University in 1943. He served in the Navy in World War II, part of the time overseas, and was discharged with the rank of First Lieutenant.

He received a degree in business administration at Harvard University in 1946. He has accepted a position in Houston with the Texas Gulf Sulphur, and will assume his duties July 1. Meanwhile he will remain here with his mother.

He is a brother of William A. Leslie also of Eastland, and of Miss Rosalie Leslie, assistant Dean of Women at the University of Maryland.

Stephenville Plane Missing; Search Started

DALLAS, June 2 (UP) —The Civil Air Patrol will begin a methodical search today for T. C. Elkins, prominent Stephenville, Tex., industrialist whose plane has been missing since Sunday on a flight from Hot Springs, Ark., to Dallas.

Aboard the missing plane with Elkins, about 50, was Pilot Ben Ferguson, 25, Navy Air Force veteran of World War II.

Elkins and Ferguson left Hot Springs Sunday at 6:15 A. M. in a dark maroon-colored Stinson single-engine plane belonging to the City Flying Service of Stephenville.

They took off under adverse weather conditions, and shortly thereafter all fields in the area were shut-in because of a storm. The cap said the search began south and southwest of Hot Springs. Air rescue units from Giggis Field, El Paso, will cooperate in the search.

The license number of the plane was NC97642. Elkins owns a manufacturing plant in Stephenville. He is a big marketer of spark plugs and automobile parts in the Southwest.

Cap said it had not been advised the plane was overdue and unreported until yesterday.

Asks Aid In Strike Trouble

BEAUMONT, Tex., June 2 (UP) —Brown and Root Construction Co., asked Beauford Jester and the Department of Public Safety today to provide safeguards for non-union employees, after a brief skirmish with union members Tuesday forced work stoppage at a construction project here.

Hermann Brown, president of the construction firm, said he would call on Gov. Jester in Austin. Brown said city police and the Jefferson county sheriff's department both had declined to offer protection to the men, all Houston carpenters.

The trouble started when a bus-load of the carpenters was stopped by some 150 union men as it left the grounds of the Texas-Eastern Transmission Corp., late Tuesday A car allegedly forced the bus to the curb, and trade union members hurled bottles through the open windows.

TOM TYSON, STATE DEMOCRATIC LEADER DIES IN CORSICANA

CORSICANA, Tex., June 2 (UP) —Tom Tyson, secretary of the Democratic State Executive Committee, died today after a three-week illness.

The 48-year-old Tyson had succeeded Vann M. Kennedy in the high party post last November shortly after the state convention at Fort Worth.

Matt R. Dawson, a law partner of Tyson, said he died at 7:45 A. M. at the family home. A neighbor summoned Dawson at 7:30 and he arrived within five minutes. Tyson was dead before a physician arrived.

Tyson was stricken with a heart attack about a month ago. He spent three weeks in a hospital, then was brought home and appeared to be recovering satisfactorily.

A native of Calvert, Texas, Tyson was a graduate of the University of Texas. He received his law degree from Baylor and was

district attorney at Calvert soon after his graduation. He came to Corsicana in 1937 and was a member of the law firm of Davis, Jester and Tyson.

Later, he joined the law firm of Tyson, Dawson & Dawson.

Immediate survivors include his widow, Mrs. Faye Tyson; a son, Luther, 16; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. K. Tyson of Calvert; a brother, Arthur Tyson, Marshall, a professor at East Texas Baptist College, and a sister, Mrs. Vernon Miles, Mindan, La.

Funeral services have been tentatively for 10 A. M. Friday in the First Baptist Church here with burial at Calvert.

Tyson was chairman of the board of deacons of the First Baptist Church and teacher of the largest Sunday School class in Corsicana. He was a trustee of the Buckner Orphans' Home, Dallas, and the Mary Hardin Baylor College, Belton.

Says Smoke Seen Before Ship Blew Up At Texas City

GALVESTON, Tex., June 2 (UP) — A "Kind of a sulphur fume" came from the hole of the steamship High Flyer before it blew up at Texas City April 17, 1947, a Houston police sergeant testified yesterday in the \$200,000,000 damage suit against the federal government.

Sgt. J. E. Kent was one of several witnesses summoned here in the lengthy litigation, an aftermath of the costly disaster. Kent said that due to darkness, he was unable to identify the color of the smoke.

Earlier, a warehouse worker, E. J. Kinser of Texas City, testified he had seen deep orange smoke, the same color as the ammonium nitrate fertilizer blamed by plaintiffs for setting off the blasts, coming from the freighter Grandcamp.

Kinser said he had noticed that the bags of fertilizer were often so hot as to be uncomfortable to handle. In handling the paper bags, he said they often broke open because they became brittle with heat.

Harley Brown, foreman at the Texas City Terminal Railway at the time of the disaster, testified that two blasts came when the Grandcamp blew up. He said they were only seconds apart. Brown explained that he was only about 25 feet from the

GEORGETOWN, June 2 (UP) — Completion of a jury in the trial of Clifton Okra, Dallas Negro charged with criminal assault was expected here today with testimony possibly opening tomorrow.

Three more jurors were chosen from a group of 50 talesmen yesterday, making a total of nine so far. Earlier attorneys exhausted a special venire of 144 men.

Henry Wade, Dallas county assistant district attorney, said he expected the jury to be rounded out today.

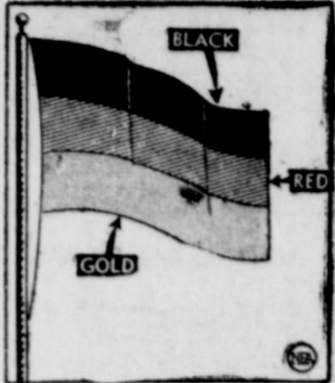

BOSTON, June 2 (UP)—Some 2,200 AFL employees of the Eastern Massachusetts Street Railway Co. struck today, cutting off bus service to about 500,000 commuters in 78 Massachusetts communities.
