### HAIL ONLY DANGER

## Prospects Good For Bumper Peach Crop This Year In Eastland County

"About the only thing now to prevent us from producing a bumper peach crop this year would be hail," J. M. Cooper, Eastland County Agricultural agent reported after a swing through the orchard area in late May.

Orchardists are being encouraged by Cooper to thin their peaches to produce quality fruit of good size and to prevent the trees from breaking and ruining. The peaches should be thinned to six or seven inches apart, he said.

With as much rain falling in the latter part of May as was received during all of 1948, a lot of brown rot was expected to show up and the leading orchardists were expecting to put on one or more sulphur sprays for it.

Peach trees in the better managed orchards are loaded as are pears. Many apple trees were showing sign of fire blight and many of the apples will be lost, it was said. Plums are also expected to be plentiful.

## GRASSHOPPERS MENACE CROPS IN VARIOUS AREAS OF COUNTY

Heavy infestation of small grasshoppers in grassland over different areas of Eastland County are being reported almost daily to the County Agent's office here it was stated this week.

Farmers reports are coming in only from the tight soils of the county and none have been reported as yet from the sandy areas according to J. M. Cooper, Eastland County Farm Agent.

Cooper is recommending that action be taken immediately by farmers and ranchers while the hoppers are still small and before they scatter and go into cultivated fields. The little hoppers only lack size and wings before they leave their 'beds' or groups and heavy infestations of the larger hoppers can do much damage to crops as well as to orchards in the infested areas.

Many new insecticides are now on the market for 'hopper' control. One that has proven successful is the product called Chlor-dane. This material has now been stocked by at least one firm in Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Carbon, Gorman and Rising Star according to Cooper. The material not only acts as a stomach poison but kills by contact and also acts as a fumigant. Within a short time af-
