16 Year Old Revealed As Oldest Living Cat In Eastland Vicinity

Tommy Toy, Jr., who will be 16 years old in July and belongs to Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Carpenter, operators of the Pleasant Place Motel here, has been declared winner of a recent search to determine the oldest living cat in Eastland and vicinity.

The search was conducted by the "Going Forward With Eastland" column written by Bob Moore, editor of the Eastland Daily Telegram.

Tommy Toy, at an age which would compare with 80 years in the human life span, has never been seriously ill and remains very active. His hearing and vision seems unimpaired by old age. The only concession he has made to the passing years is streaks of gray in his once solid yellow coating of fur.

Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter purchased the feline when he was six weeks old, from Bobby Robertson of Big Spring. Mr. Carpenter was production superintendent for Continental Oil Co., at that time and Robertson was employed in his department. Tommy Toy was born after Robertson had sent a female cat to New York to be bred to Tommy Toy Sr., member of a famed registered cat family. The Carpenters moved here with Tommy Toy, four years ago to operate the Pleasant Place Motel, after having lived in Big Spring 17 years.

A large cat, Tommy Toy, has weighed up to 16 pounds and

weighs about 12 pounds at present. His favorite food is raw liver and kidneys. Although occasionally, he has a little milk or the fat part of the ham. The owners state, that very uncatlike, he is afraid of mice and rats, but was found playing with a snake in the backyard recently. His favorite companion is a young dog, which the Carpenters have, with the cat and dog sleeping each night in a garage together. While the pair never fight, when another cat or dog comes on the place Tommy Toy and the dog "tie in to" the intruder.

While 9 to 10 years is the average life span of a cat or dog, Tommy Toy appears good for many more years. The owners feel that much of the credit for the cat's good health and present old age should go to Dr. Otto Wolfe, Big Spring veterinarian, who has been the family doctor for Tommy. Dr. Wolfe had a special crate for the cat and when Tommy becomes ill, he is shipped by rail to Big Spring for treatment.

Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter say they have never pampered the cat, but allowed him to run loose and be "on his own." Another possible reason for the fact that Tommy Toy has lived so long is that he's a bachelor, an operation being performed at an early age to prevent a love life.

Stockmen Warned To Mark Cattle

A warning to small stockmen of Eastland County has been made by the Sheriff's office to take some precaution against rustlers by branding or marking cattle whereby they can be identified by parties other than the owner.

If a stockman has a certain brand it should be registered with the County Clerk's office. The Sheriff's office has received a number of reports regarding one or two head of cattle being stolen from a herd without having identification markings.

The city has completed dusting the city with DDT and a special preparation. In about a week, the city will be dusted again and the regular dusting will be continued throughout the summer.

The sanitation campaign is being conducted to prevent a polio outbreak here, and the public's cooperation is requested.

American Legion Square Dance To Be Given Tonight

A square and old-time folk dance will be held tonight at 9 o'clock at the Legion Hall in City Park, under sponsorship of the Dulin-Daniel Post of the Eastland American Legion, it was announced by Henry Pullman, of the committee in charge.

Music for the dance will be furnished by a five-piece string orchestra. The dance is for the public and not limited to only members of the Legion.

The square dances are being sponsored the second Thursday of each month by the Legion, because of the increased popularity of that form of dancing. Pullman stated a large crowd was expected.

Production Being Doubled By Local Factory Branch

Production in the Eastland branch of the Hollywood Corset Co., manufacturers of ladies' brassieres, is being doubled with the addition of 15 new employees and additional machinery, Mrs. Stella Grigsby, manager stated today.

Under the new production schedule, the company will turn out between 1,800 and 2,400 brassieres daily, with a personnel total of 75.

Mrs. Grigsby stated the production was being stepped up because two of the 12 plants producing brassieres as the Hollywood Corset Co., were closed down recently.

Six new machines have been added to the local plant and several machines, which have been idle, are being placed back into action.

The meeting broke up in a stalemate and no date was set for a further meeting. This development was believed responsible for Secretary of State Dean Acheson's decision to take the blockade before the Big Four conference.

The ministers will discuss the inability of the Four Powers to lift all transport and trade communications as agreed upon in New York by Russia's Jacob Malik and America's Dr. Phillip Jessup.

This agreement to lift the Soviet blockade was the basis of calling the Big Four Conference in the first place. Initial success in lifting the blockade broke down when Western Berlin rail workers struck for payment in western marks. Russia has refused to settle with the workers, thereby stifling rail travel.

Few western observers here were optimistic over chances of success in settling the blockade question.

THREE DIE IN ST. PAUL PAPER COMPANY FIRE

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 9 (UP)—A collapsing wall today killed St. Paul's fire chief, an assistant chief, and a division chief during a fire in a paper company warehouse.

Another fireman was injured by flying bricks when the heavy masonry firewall buckled at

the huge Waldorf Paper Company storage building.

Fire Chief Ed Novak, 64, and his assistant, Frank McMahon, 52, died instantly as the falling wall buried them under a shower of bricks and then released thousands of tons of water-logged paper down upon them.

District Chief Harold Barck, 55 was caught in the falling debris also but was alive when a crew of 18 firemen freed him. He died on the way to Midway Hospital.

The fire broke out about a half hour before midnight in the Waldorf Company's main warehouse. The building, a block long and 75 feet high, contained thousands of bales of refuse paper in fire-walled compartments that divided the building into 30 foot sections.

Three engine companies, commanded by Barck, answered the first alarm. One minute later, a special alarm was sounded that brought five more engine companies, an emergency squad, and the city's top fire department officials.

The flames were smoldering through the paper bales in the second compartment from the east end of the building. Towering billows of smoke rolled over the neighborhood as streams of water shot through the windows.

More than an hour later Novak came out and told reporters: "It looks like she's under control. The damage probably will run to \$25,000 or even \$50,000. Then he, McMahon, and Reid re-entered the flaming building. Superintendent of fire alarm Arthur Brissman, said "they were just inside when there was a snap and a rumble and the wall began coming down."

Bids Asked For Paving Road In Eastland County

Bids have been asked by the State Highway Department at Austin for paving of a farm-to-market road in Eastland County. The road, known as FM 1027, will include 4,282 miles of grading, structures, flexible base and single asphalt surface treatment from intersection of State 36 to Okra.

JUST GOT TOO HUNGRY

El Paso Army Deserter, Escapee Gives Himself Up At County Jail

Guards from an El Paso Army installation are expected to arrive in Eastland this afternoon by train to return Pvt. John E. Baldrige, of Kentucky, deserter and escapee from the El Paso brig, who gave himself up at the Eastland County Jail Monday, according to the Sheriff's office.

Pvt. Baldrige showed up at the County Jail about supper time and asked the jailer to lock him up as he was a military deserter. He told the jailer he escaped Saturday from the El Paso brig and had started hitch hiking

to Kentucky. He became so hungry by the time he reached Eastland, he gave himself up.

A check by the Sheriff's office with El Paso authorities verified the prisoner's story, and he is being held in custody for the military officers.

Pvt. Baldrige is described by the Sheriff's office as being a young man, "who talks about how tough he is." Information was unavailable as to why he had been confined to the El Paso brig, or how the escape was made.

Dallas Youths Plead Guilty In Rape Case

DALLAS, June 9 (UP)—District Attorney Will Wilson was to submit guilty pleas to Judge Robert Hall today in the cases of five Dallas youths charged with raping a 15-year-old girl at a party they crashed in exclusive Highland Park.

They were permitted to plead guilty and accept five-year suspended sentences after the girl's parents conferred with Wilson and said they wanted to spare her the ordeal of testifying in five trials.

Each of the youths would have been tried separately on the charge. Hall's announcement that guilty pleas would be entered came after a ninth juror had been selected in the first trial, involving David Bowen, 19.

The defendants were charged with crashing a 'teen-age party, forcing the invited guests to join them in a beer-drinking bout and finally assaulting the girl in a second-story bedroom.

In addition to Bowen, the defendants were Bobby Young, 18; Dean Butler, 18; Lewis Campbell, 20 and Millard Gaskill. Similar charges against Webb Stagner, Jr., 20, were dropped Monday. Stagner and Butler, who also had been indicted for purportedly raping a 14-year-old theater candy counter girl on White Rock Lake last July 4, were put on probation for one year on this count.

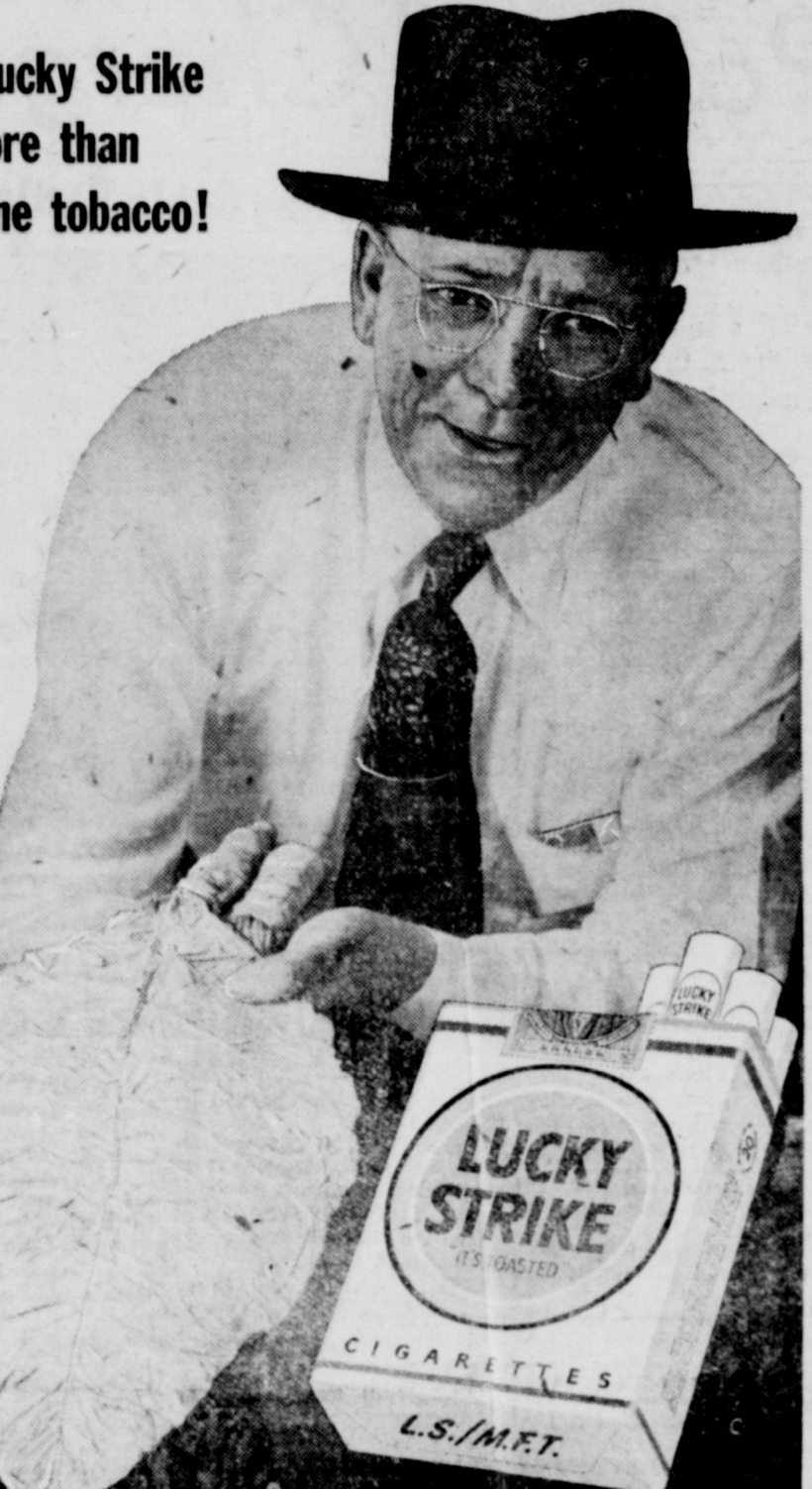

Ohioan Awaits Extradition

BOERNE, Tex., June 9 (UP)—Andrew C. Straley, 42-year-old Ohio undertaker, waited in jail today for a Columbus, O., deputy sheriff to return him to face charges of embezzling \$89,000.

Straley, portly and partially bald, said he was ready to go home and "face the music." He waived extradition.

He is accused of embezzling the funds from money held in trust for Martin Licking, 53-year-old invalid Veteran of World



War I. Straley is Licking's guardian. Licking's late mother left a \$102,000 trust fund for her son. Only \$13,000 has been accounted for, Ohio authorities said. Straley was arrested Tuesday

night at a tourist hotel near here. He had registered as "A. which the driver of the car had taken with her to dispose of.

A Franklin County, O., grand jury indicted Straley for embezzlement four days ago, after he had been missing about a month.

Deputy Sheriff John L. Krauter, who arrested Straley said the undertaker "verbally admitted" taking some money but did not specify how much. Krauter said Straley declined any further statement until he talked to his lawyer at Columbus.

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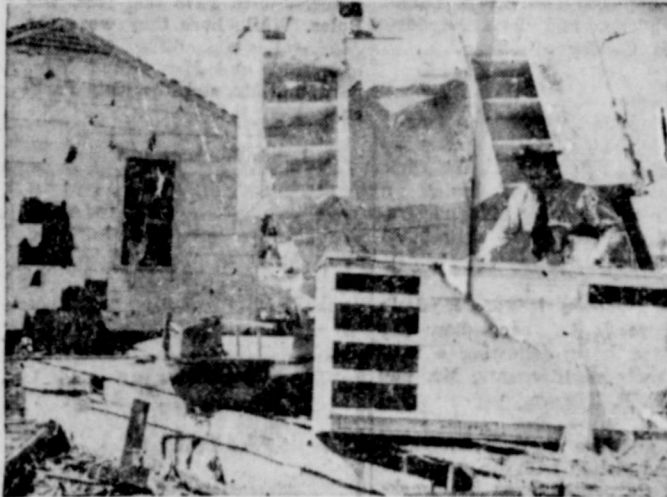

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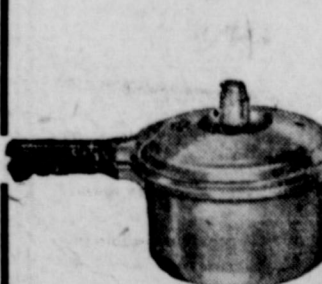

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West China Defense Plans Shown U. S.

WASHINGTON, June 9 (UP) — A secret plan for Nationalist defense of western China—with or without American help—was laid before the State Department today by a personal representative of Chinese President Li Tsung-Jen.

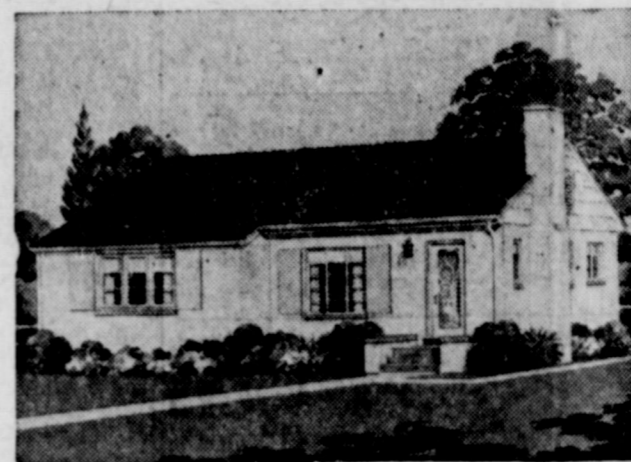
SHERMAN, June 9 (UP)—Sherman's city council will petition the governor for rent decontrol.

HOLLYWOOD STARS REFUTE CHARGES OF ASSOCIATIONS WITH REDS

HOLLYWOOD, June 9 (UP) — A group of top Hollywood personalities struck back today with indignant denials of charges that they were "within the Stalinist orbit."

The California un-American Activities Committee, headed by State Sen. Jack B. Tenney, R., Los Angeles, made the charges yesterday in a report which called New York and California the two "principal centers" of Communist activity.

Those named in the report included bandleader Artie Shaw, Director John Huston, Actress Katharine Hepburn, Florence Eldridge, Lena Horne, and Karen Morley, actors Orson Welles, Frank Sinatra, Danny Kaye, Kraderie March, Gene Kelly, Charlie Chaplin, Gregory Peck, John Garfield, Albert Dekker, Larry Adler, and Vincent Price.

Also listed were former California Attorney General Robert

W. Kenny, former Lieutenant Governor and Congressman, Ellis E. Patterson, former vice-president, Henry A. Wallace, Rep. Helen Gabagan Douglas, D. Cal., Dr. Harlow Shapley, and Writers Thomas Mann, Pearl S. Buck, Dorothy Parker, Clifford Odets and Lillian Hellman.

The report accused them of attacking the Tenney Committee "without once directly challenging a single finding of the committee."

Crooner Sinatra countered that "this unfair and unjustified attack gives every American good reason to be 'critical of the Tenney Committee. And if they don't cut it out I'll show them how much an American can fight back, even against the state if the American happens to be right."

And I'm right — not left, Mr. Tenney.

Other Comments: Gregory Peck: "I have been denying these allegations for several years and will do so once more. I am not now and never have been associated with any Communist organization or supporters of Communism."

Dorothy Parker: "I'm completely apolitical. I am not a political woman."

Robert W. Kenny: "Apparently Mr. Tenney thinks it is un-American for anyone to run a-

gainst him. . . I am going to try to unseat him at the next election."

Fredric March: ". . . An unmitigated lie. My record and conscience as an American and as a man are clear."

Ellis E. Patterson: "I am against all this witch-hunting and hysteria and I have done nothing politically that I am ashamed of: I need no defense."

Gene Kelly: "I don't know what Mr. Tenney's talking about. I am not a Communist, never was, and have no sympathy with Communist activities. The only line I know how to follow is the American line."

Director John Huston, winner of two academy awards this year, challenged Tenney to make any statement connecting him with Stalinism outside the protection of senatorial privilege.

Vincent Price: "If being a 13th generation American and lifelong Democrat makes one eligible to be classified in this orbit then there are 25,000,000 other voting Americans facing the same accusation."

Katharine Hepburn "refused to dignify Mr. Tenney's un-American accusation with a reply," said a studio spokesman.

Albert Dekker: "He (Tenney) simply lies and I know a very good psychiatrist I could recommend him to. That is an outright lie and if there were means of legal referees I would seek it. I rather resent his using my name to get himself some personality.
