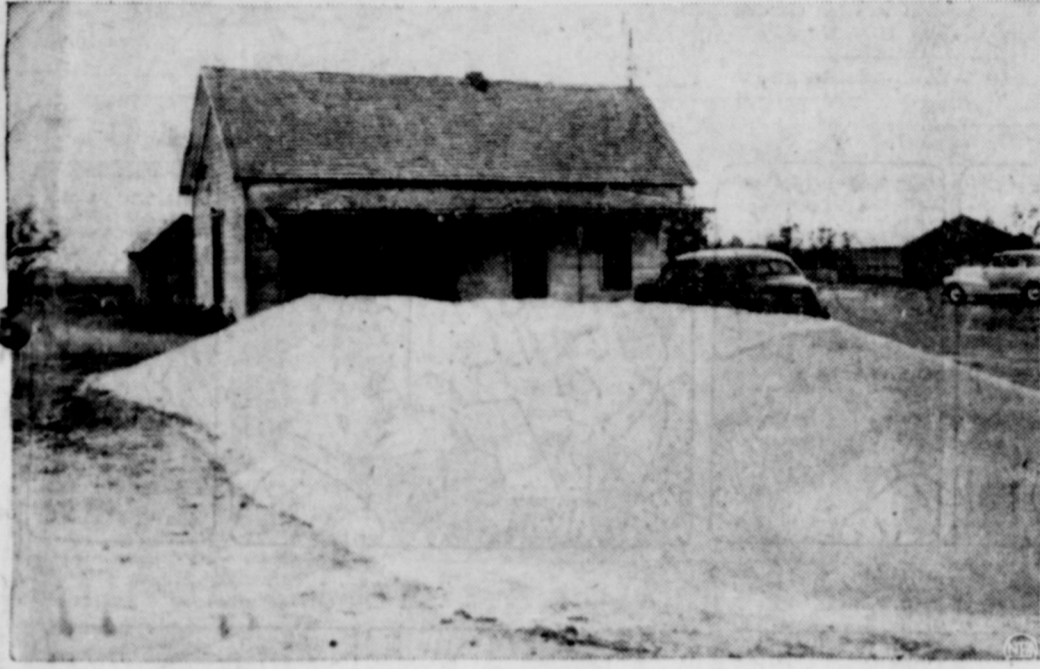

HOPES BRIGHTEN FOR SETTLEMENT OF BERLIN BLOCKADE DISPUTE

Hopes for a final settlement of the Berlin blockade dispute brightened today.

The Big Four foreign ministers sent letters to their Berlin commanders instructing them to settle all their differences immediately and complete the lifting of the blockade.

They urged the commanders to reach agreement and have all lines of communication functioning by Monday. U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson, British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky agreed at their session yesterday to send the letters to their Berlin commanders.

Whether the letters will produce the desired result was an open question, however, complete lifting of the blockade is complicated by a strike of West Berlin railway workers for recognition of their non-communist union and for 100 per

cent of their pay in western marks.

Strikers attacked a Soviet Zone policeman today outside the headquarters of the Soviet-banned Berlin Railways. West sector police rescued him and escorted him into the building, which is in the American sector but under Soviet jurisdiction.

German press reports, meantime, said Russia is reinforcing its garrison in Germany and massing troops north and south of Berlin for maneuvers later this month.

Other foreign news included: Belgrade—Yugoslavia was reported trying to liquidate an air transport company and a navigation company which it had formed jointly with Russia.

Prague—Reliable sources said the Czech Communist government will form today a "Catholic action" group in an attempt to settle the state's dispute with the Catholic Church. The political organization would recognize the archbishops and bishops in spirit-

ual matters, but would insist the church keep out of secular affairs.

Vienna—Austrian reports said a top secret police official in Communist Hungary was shot dead Thursday while trying to escape into Austria with complete files on the Hungarian espionage service. The files have disappeared, these reports said, and Hungary is hunting desperately for them.

Tokyo—Vice Admiral Oscar C. Badger, U. S. Navy commander in the West Pacific, warned American shipping that Nationalist warships have mined the Yangtze river estuary, making passage to Shanghai and Nanking hazardous.

In an attempt to drain Lake Mattamuskeet in North Carolina, a pumping station capable of pumping 1,250,000 gallons of water a minute was especially built.

Heart Diseases Lead In Cause Of Texas Deaths

AUSTIN, Tex., June 10—Deaths of the heart outnumbered all other causes of death in Texas during 1948 more than 2-1, the State Department of Health reported today.

A departmental report, listing the 10 leading causes, attributed 16,638 deaths last year to heart disease.

Cancer was second with 6,913 deaths.

The eight others were: apoplexy, 5,406; accidents, 5,164; nephritis, 3,071; pneumonia, 2,814; premature birth, 2,698; tuberculosis, 2,693; diarrhea and enteritis, 1,797; diabetes mellitus, 1,090 totaling 48,184.

The total of deaths from all causes in Texas last year was 64,034.

Names Of Crash Victims Revealed

BARKSDALE Field, La. June 10 (UP)—The Air Force today released the names of two officers who were killed and one who was critically injured in the crash of a B-45 jet bomber near here yesterday.

The dead were identified as Capt. Ralph L. Smith, 27 of (315 Ratcliffe St.) Shreveport, La. and Capt. Milton O. Costello, 31, Chicago.

The injured man, in critical condition, is Capt. James L. Loudon, 28, Pittsburgh, Pa.

Airplanes Spray DDT Over City Of San Angelo

Airplanes sprayed DDT over San Angelo today as the city continued its fight against polio.

But theaters, swimming pools and churches were open for the first time in a week.

The ban on public meetings was lifted yesterday, and although seven new cases were reported by midnight Wednesday, there was no evident feeling of hysteria.

Two of the new cases were admitted to isolation wards in San Angelo hospitals.

Thus far the epidemic has stricken more than 80 persons in San Angelo and surrounding territory.

The city administration ordered all theaters, swimming pools and churches closed a week ago. But yesterday managers of natatoriums and movie houses reported thriving business.

At Fort Worth, the first polio fatality of the year was marked down with the death of Mrs. Cynthia Mae Thurmond, 28, in an iron lung.

Gen. John W. Naylor, National Guard Commander at Fort Worth, announced that a city-wide aerial DDT spraying campaign would be started.

Shanghai Back In War Status

SHANGHAI, June 10 (UP)—Communist-occupied Shanghai returned to the status of a war zone today with an air raid scare and the closing of the harbor to shipping because of reports that the Nationalists had mined the Yangtze estuary.

A single high flying plane was seen by many Shanghai residents over the southwestern outskirts this afternoon. The plane was of unknown nationality, but presumed to be Nationalist. It was believed to have dropped two bombs near the Lungwa International Airport.

Watchers at Lungwa saw the plane circling and heard two explosions and small arms fire. The plane made no attempt to attack the field, and disappeared after a few minutes. There were no reports of damage or casualties.

Reports circulated that the Nationalists had laid mines near the mouth of the Yangtze in a possible attempt to blockade Shanghai. Communist authorities investigated the mysterious operations of two vessels in the Yangtze.

Ohio Claims Man On Embezzlement

BOERNE, Tex., June 10 (UP)—Andrew C. Straley, 42-year-old Ohio funeral director whose Texas hill country interlude was interrupted Tuesday night by his arrest, will start home today to face charges of embezzlement of \$89,000 from a trust fund.

Straley waived extradition and prepared to accompany Chief Deputy Sheriff Dale V. Thibault of Franklin County, Ohio, to nearby San Antonio late in the day.

Thibault, who brought along a copy of the indictment returned at Columbus, O., said he hadn't decided whether he and Straley would make the return trip by train or plane.

Straley, who was informally attired in a bright yellow T-shirt and slacks, would not talk to reporters this morning other than to say that he had been on the road since May 7.

Sigrid Undset Dies

OLSO, June 10 (UP)—Sigrid undset, Norwegian novelist and Nobel Prize Winner in literature died today at her home in Lillehammer near Oslo.

Miss Undset was 67. She was born in Kallundborg, Denmark. Married in 1912 to A. C. Svarstad, a painter, the marriage was annulled in 1925.

The Nobel Prize for literature for 1928 was awarded to Miss Undset for her novel "Kristin Lavransdatter," a trilogy which dealt with life in the 14th century.

Claims Find Of Rare Mineral

COSTA MESA, Cal., June 10 (UP)—A contractor who already has found gold and uranium around the hole he dug for a swimming pool announced today he had dug up a metal so rare it is worth more than \$3,000 an ounce.

The metal is Gallium, and Wesley R. Collins says he already has about \$5,000 worth. It is so scarce, Collins said, that only four pounds of it was mined in the world last year.

Collins, a plumbing contractor, started finding mineral treasures last October when he began digging out a swimming pool at his ranch home in this Orange-growing community.

He noticed particles of what he thought was gold and took them to a chemist friend, Fred B. Greusel, for analysis. Greusel said he had Uranium ore, the stuff used for atomic bombs.

Next time Collins picked up something that looked like gold, it turned out to be gold.

He noticed unusual hunks of earth while he was digging this week and sent them for analysis to a friend, Ray Moury, of Bellflower, Cal., an expert on the group of chemical elements known as the rare earths.

Collins said the rare metal Gallium is used as cooling agent in the metal jackets of jet engines and rockets. It freezes at 36 degrees Fahrenheit, melts at 87 degrees and remains liquid at temperatures up to 3,200 to 3,700 degrees.

EASTLAND BOARD MEET TONIGHT TO CONSIDER DEVELOPMENTS

Eastland Independent School District was increased by 43 scholastics and the district was enlarged to more than twice what it was formerly, with the consolidation of two dormant districts with the Eastland District at a call meeting of the Eastland County School Board Thursday, it was announced by Carl Elliott, county superintendent of schools.

The dormant school districts consolidated with the Eastland District were Bedford and Grapevine. A dormant district is one which has not maintained a school within the district for two consecutive years.

Prior to the consolidation, the Eastland District had an area of 16 square miles, with the two dormant districts having an area of 27 square miles, making the present area of the Eastland District being 43 square miles.

The consolidation action was made possible by the signing of the Gilmer-Aiken bill by Gov. Beauford Jester.

The board also voted to consolidate the dormant Central district with the Cisco Independent School District.

A call meeting of the Eastland School Board will be held tonight to consider future plans and development made possible by the Gilmer-Aiken Bill and the consolidation of the two dormant districts with the Eastland District.

A member of the Board stated they were very pleased with the consolidation action. The school allowed one teacher for every 25 new pupils, and it is hoped and planned that at least two additional teachers can be hired by the Board for the next school term.

The consolidation action will make it necessary for the Board to buy a school bus to transport the rural students, the spokesman stated. This will mark the first time in history that Eastland Public Schools has operated a school bus.

WASHINGTON, June 10 (UP)—Chairman Kenneth McKellar, D. Tenn., of the Senate Antiprostitution Committee told Antiprostitution Recovery Boss Paul Hoffman today that it would be "a very good thing" if Hoffman resigned.

McKellar said a statement by Hoffman yesterday that he would step out whenever he became convinced that Congress had not granted enough money to do the recovery job was an "effort to threaten this committee."

"The sooner you do resign, the better for the American people... the people of the United States and Europe would rejoice," McKellar said.

Sen. Homer Ferguson, R., Mich., came to Hoffman's defense. He said the former automotive executive's resignation would be "a great calamity for the whole program."

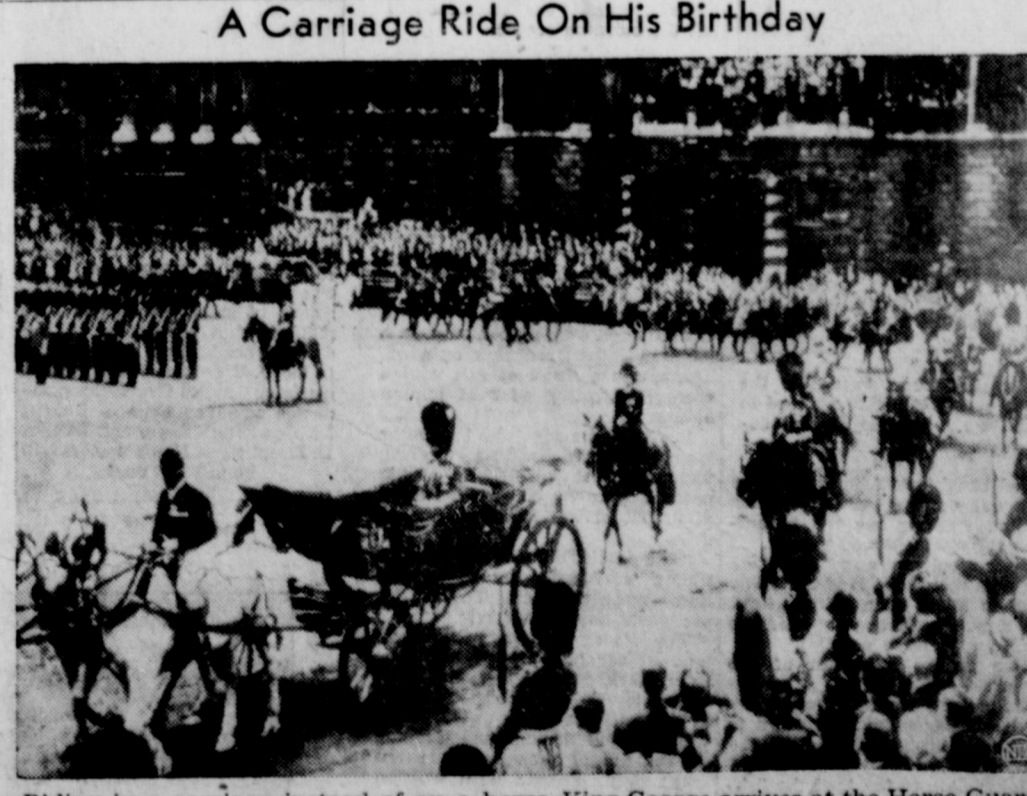

Ernie Vossler of Fort Worth trailed the medalist with a 68, while Jack Williams of Plainview shot 69, Bob Watson of Wichita Falls had a 70 and James Dixon of Abilene a 72.

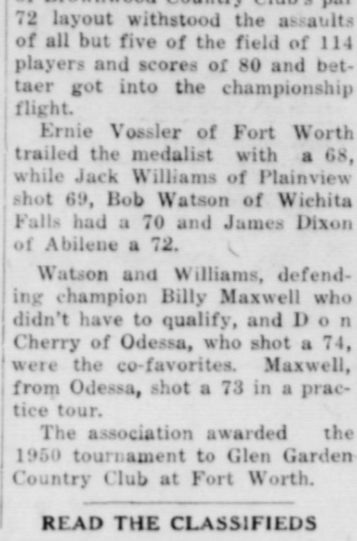

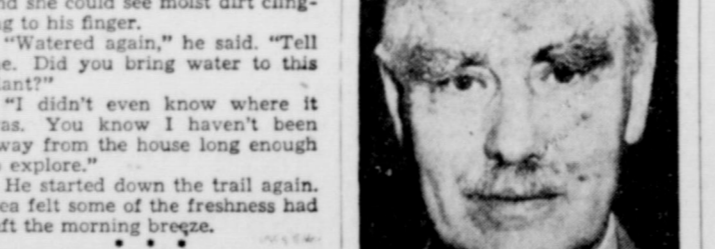

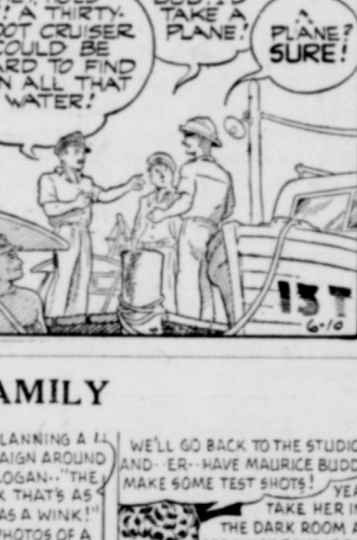

Farm Bureau Head Commends Brannan For Solving Storage Needs

TEXAS FARM 24 On uN1
WACO, Tex., June 10 —J. Walter Hammond president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, today sent a telegram to Secretary of Agriculture Brannan commending him for his action in meeting the critical storage problem by making price support loans available on grain piled on the ground or placed in temporary storage. "Under the Secretary's three-point program, all producers may take advantage of the government loan," Hammond said. Full text of the telegram to the Secretary follows:

"I want to commend you for your courageous action in offering storage requirements which will enable farmers to secure government loan on grain. Circumstances justify such action, but will probably bring a storm of protest charging government waste from those who were all set to steal the grain crop. The saving to producers of millions of dollars will far outweigh any chances of loss incurred because of the action." Announcement of the Secretary's program immediately after President Truman signed the Commodity Credit Bill authorizing the Secretary to provide storage, climaxed the fight started by Hammond in April when he began contacting officials in Washington apprising them of the storage problem in Texas and urging that action be taken to remedy the situation, thereby sparing producers a loss of millions of

dollars on the 1949 crop. After appeals to all other sources, Hammond last week dispatched a telegram to President Truman in which he told the President that "gravity of the situation and urgency for immediate action would justify unusual procedures and this appeal for consideration by the President."

Gorman Farm And Ranch News

L. C. Underwood has started harvesting his 96 acres of wheat on which he estimates that he will make about 2,000 bushels of wheat. This acreage is in the Indian Mountain Community where Mr. Underwood also has 35 acres of vetch and barley. He thinks he will attempt to harvest the vetch seed and have them for sale, since it is a known fact that no stock will eat the vetch seed. The stalk and stubble of the vetch and the nurse crop barley will probably be turned back to the soil. Mr. Underwood is really trying this practice on all the farms in which he has any interest this year, trying to build up his soil. He has 75 acres in vetch and oats on the place just out of Gorman on the Eastland Highway, known as the old Leighton place. This, he is undecided as to whether to turn under, to harvest the oats which are really good this year, or to try to harvest the vetch seed by themselves. There have been a few bugs and fleas noticed in these patches, but they did not last long enough to do any considerable damage and are almost entirely disappeared now.

W. C. Reynolds, nine miles northwest of Gorman and west of Kokomo in the Bear Springs Community, is rebuilding his combine getting ready to thrash his 20 acres of rye which, by the way, he tells us, is his first experience at raising rye. He says he has a good prospect and thinks he will get a good yield. When he finishes with his crop his machinery will be available for

hire to help his neighbors in the Bear Springs Community and nearby territory.

L. C. Clayton with a small farm and some pasture land near Desdemona is a farmer who is really trying diversifying a modern methods in a practical way on his 65 acres of farm land and 100 acres of pasture. He planted his acreage in 20 acres of peanuts, which he already has up, and some corn which he has already laid by, and about 20 acres of cotton which he will plant sometime before the first of July. They raise enough chickens and hogs for family use, only. Their pasture land is about 100 acres and sometime he intends to try the permanent pasture program on that to see if he can make it really care for more of the Brahma cattle which he and his son W. S. Clayton are going in for in a small way just now, but they want to expand their program as they can carry more. W. S. Clayton has recently acquired a registered Brahma bull from a South Texas Herd and is waiting to secure the papers on the animal before offering him for service. This male is a 2-year old and is really in good condition. This should lead to a marked improvement in the beef cattle of that area in the next few years.

Mr. Clayton tells us that there is more small grain around Desdemona than usual, the bulk of the crops being in wheat, oats, barley and rye. All their plowing on the 65 acres was done with an M-Farmall using the Graham Hanev Subsoiler and setting it as deep as it will go. This not only prepares the seed bed for the roots but also furnishes a sort of pan to capture and hold all the rainfall. Most of the grain farmers in this area are using this type of breaking arrangement of the land, and they are seeing results in the yields.

Several combines are being purchased in the Desdemona and Gorman area, to be used in harvesting the crops, indicating that the local people will be able to take care of their own harvesting largely. Recently, Murray Foote and Rudolf Lewis purchased combines.

NEWS FROM CARBON

The farmers around Carbon are busy on their farms. Some have their peanuts planted and feed is up and looking good. Some farmers are not through planting their peanuts, because of having to plant over.

D. D. Sandlin, who lives a mile and a half south of Carbon, has harvested 16 acres of oats and reports he made between 5 and 600 bushels of oats. He has more oats to harvest but they are not ready. His feed is fine and peanuts are up in a perfect stand.

Elmer McDaniel, who lives one mile south of Carbon, has purchased a new combine.

The farmers say they are needing rain.

There is no soil on the moon.

4-H Meat Animal Program Underway

Today meat provides one-third can diet and latest U.S. Department of Agriculture figures show that almost one-third of the farmer's total cash income in 1948 came from the sale of meat animals. Aware of the vital contribution livestock makes to the nation's health and economy, Texas boys and girls enrolled in the 1949 National 4-H Meat Animal program learn to select, feed and show their beef cattle, sheep or pigs. More than 300,000 4-H Club members throughout the country are taking part in the project, according to the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club work.

Some of the highlights of the program are keeping records of feeding and weight gains and learning the value of balanced rations. Many of the young stockmen grow their own feed. Members practice livestock judging at club meetings, and then try out for county and state judging teams. They take great pride, too, in showing their animals. The Cooperative Extension Service directs the activity.

In addition to being educational and profitable, the program offers awards for outstanding accomplishments. Mr. Thos E. Wilson, chairman of the National Committee, and a veteran Chicago meat packer, has provided awards for the last 20 years. There are medals for county winners; a 17-jewel gold watch for state champion; trips to the National 4-H Club Congress for eight sectional winners, and four \$300 national scholarships.

Harry Schneider of Seguin won Guadalupe county and state honors in 1948. County medals were also presented to 173 other winners. Harry Schneider, Seguin, was one of the national scholarship winners.

IRKED BAKERS START SNOWBALL ROLLING TO ENFORCE BLUE LAWS

PINE BLUFF, Ark., June 10—(UP)—If this thing keeps up, citizens said today, this town of 45,000 may be deserted Sunday. Everybody will be in jail.

Baseball players, spectators, bus drivers, church organists and choir singers, little boys playing marbles—maybe even any two people who get together to talk things over—are apt to be law violators here come Sunday.

And all because the Pine Bluff Retail Grocers Association forced two bakeries to close under a 1904 city ordinance which prohibits the operation of retail concerns on Sunday.

That made the bakery operators mad. They set two lawyers to work digging up other ancient "Blue Laws."

What those lawyers found was a caution. Especially an 1872 law which prohibits the gathering of two or more persons on Sunday for the purpose of entertainment.

As attorneys Robert Zebold and Hendrix Rowell see it, they could catch almost anybody in town un-

der that one. It might even apply to a husband and wife just sitting at home and talking—if you call conversation entertainment.

The attorneys, hired by the disgruntled bakery operators, admitted that they have started a snowballing campaign to make the blue laws so unpopular that the city council will repeal them.

Sunday newspapers were the first victims selected by the bakers. Pine Bluffers got a preview of possible austere Sundays when the distributors of four Sunday newspapers were hauled into court on warrants charging violation of the 1872 law.

One of the vendors was fined \$10 and the other three face court hearings next Wednesday.

Next a warrant was sworn out against the proprietor of one of Pine Bluff's largest retail grocery stores.

Then the attorneys moved in on organized baseball. Zebold said next Sunday's game scheduled here between the Pine Bluff Cardinals and the Helena Seaporters of the Cotton States League would be the next battleground.

Warrants will be served on the managers of the teams, he said, and on the spectators as well.

Others warrants have been issued against K. C. Parsons, Sr., manager of the Oakland Park Swimming Pool and Zoo, a favorite Sunday spot, and Paul A. Scrim-

mage, manager of park concessions.

One reformer said it might even be necessary to bring action against "choir singers and organists in the church."

L. J. Leath, one of the bakery operators who was fined \$25 for staying open on Sunday, explained it this way:

"Where I work, I'm not allowed to work on Sunday to make a decent living, and I don't see why anyone else should."

Wheat Production May Be Placed Under Controls

WASHINGTON, June 10(UP)—Farmers may be asked to accept rigid government production controls on wheat on the basis of a new 1949-crop forecast to be released today by the Agriculture Department.

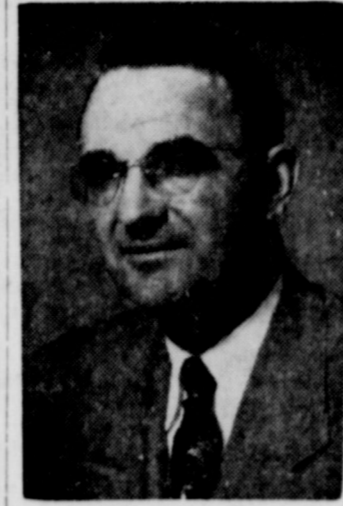
The department's crop reporting board at 1 P. M. CST will release a new production forecast for this year's near-record crop.

Based on last month's forecast, a total of more than 1,300,000,000 (B) bushels is anticipated. That would be the second largest crop in history. It would boost total stocks to record levels.

Harvesting of the bumper winter crop is under way now in the Southwest. Today's record will contain the first official forecast of spring wheat production in the north.

Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan said last week that if production prospects continue favorable he may be required, by law, to proclaim marketing quota on the 1950 wheat crop. He said it would be impossible to make a final decision until after today's production

Briefly, the five features are: 1) Entrance to both living and work rooms convenient to the main driveway, which also should be convenient to the farm buildings.

2) A well-located kitchen, with a view of the drive and farm buildings. "This feature has a number of advantages," Mrs. Thyne says. "The housewife can see any visitor arriving, keep in touch with the children outdoors and have a watchful eye on the farmstead when the men are in the fields."

3) Good traffic lanes, so that

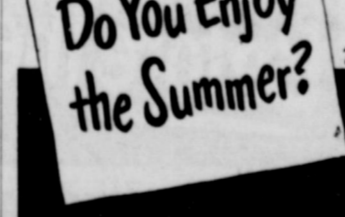

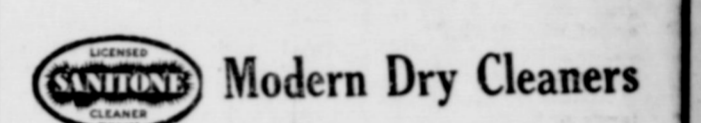

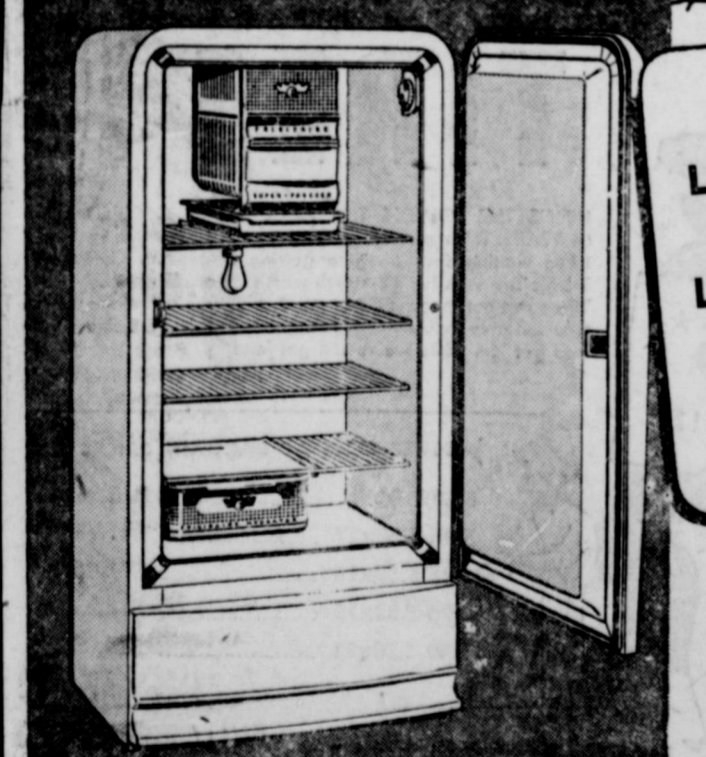
