City Signs Contract To Install Parking Meters

404 METERS DUE TO BE INSTALLED IN 30 DAYS

A contract was signed by the Eastland City Commission July 11 with the Magee-Hale Park-O-Meter Company of Oklahoma City, Okla., for installation of 404 Park-O-Meters in the City of Eastland, it was announced today by City Manager I. C. Heck.

A representative of the company is expected to be in the city within the next several days to make a survey determining where the meters will be placed in the business district. Meter officials plan to have the machines erected and in operation within 30 days.

Installation of these meters will not cost the City of Eastland one cent, and at the expiration of six months, if citizens do not desire to keep the machines, they will be removed by the company at no expense to the city, Heck stated. The company will also repair the sidewalks, where the meters were installed, at no expense to the city, if it is deemed advisable to do away with the parking meters, following the trial period, only two cities or towns in the state of Texas had the meters removed, and one of these towns later had the meters re-installed.

Rites Held For Mrs. Bishop Of Cross Plains

Funeral services for Mrs. John B. (Nora) Bishop of Cross Plains were conducted Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the First Baptist Church in Ranger with the Rev. J. W. Chapman of Eastland officiating. Interment was in the Eastland Cemetery with Killingsworth's of Ranger in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Bishop who had been a resident of Eastland County for a number of years, died in Big Spring Tuesday, July 12, 1949. She was born in Wood County, Texas February 14, 1882. She was a member of the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains and prior to moving to Cross Plains had been a member of the Baptist Church in Ranger. She was married to Mr. Bishop in Ranger in January 1889. They were married by the Rev. C. H. Ray, early pastor in Ranger.

Survivors are her husband of Cross Plains, one son, Lee Bishop of Cross Plains; two daughters, Mrs. Otis Lee of Lamesa and Mrs. J. E. Ray of Odessa. Eight grandchildren and seven great grandchildren, three nieces, Mrs. Nannie Allmon, Mrs. C. J. Langfritz and Mrs. J. L. Dick of Olden, also survive.

Funeral services were held at Cross Plains, Cal. Fans may be assured of a pleasing and competent performance from one of the youngest and best high school bands in West Texas, when the Eastland High School Maverick Band plays a concert Saturday afternoon at 6 o'clock on the courthouse lawn as one of the features of the Eastland Horned Toad Derby.

Under the direction of T. R. Atwood, the 53-piece band will be attired in snappy cadet-style uniforms purchased by the Eastland Band Booster Club, Feb. 1, 1949. These uniforms place the band among the best-suited organizations within the state. On all out-of-town appearances, the Eastland band will receive because of its musical form and attire.

Top honors were received by the band this year at the University Interscholastic Music Festival. The Eastland group rated Division I in concert playing and in sight reading. This rating is listed as a grade comparable to 95 to 100, or the best conceivable performance for a group representing this level in high school. These students have consistently won first place in contests in which they have entered. Maurice McAdow of the North Texas State Teachers Col-

leged, principal judge of high school bands at the San Angelo contests this year, has written in his comments to the school that this band should be one of the top organizations in the state within a couple of years.

The band has been active through the summer months attending classes, sectional and full band rehearsals. Marching drills are about to commence for the students to ready the group for the football show that must come the first week of school. Interest is high due to the fact that only 52 will be selected for the football band and there will be about 70 to 75 trying to make the first band. It is hoped that additional uniforms can be purchased in the near future to keep so many students from becoming discouraged.

In addition to concerts in the Eastland Park this summer, the band has received invitations to appear at numerous out-of-town functions. The band will go to the Ranger Rodeo to represent Eastland in the parade to open the event. Invitations to Fort Worth, Gorman, and Brady for various functions have been declined due to the working schedule of the band during the summer months.

In the only celebration of its type in the Southwest, Eastland's first Annual Old Rip Horned Toad Derby will be held Saturday, July 16, with 150 toads from all over Texas to compete for \$350.00 cash prizes.

Under sponsorship of the Chamber of Commerce, idea for the Derby stemmed from the fact that Eastland is world-famed as the home of Old Rip, the horned toad who lived after being entombed in the cornerstone of the old Eastland County Courthouse for 11 years. On the twentieth anniversary of Old Rip's death, the first annual Derby is being held to perpetuate the memory of this venerable horned toad, whose preserved body now lies in a plush-lined casket in the lobby of the new courthouse.

With fun thrills, and prizes planned for the entire family, a variety of activities are planned in connection with the one-day Derby.

A special Kid's Derby will be held on the courthouse square at 2:00 P. M., with prizes totaling \$25.00 to be awarded the three fastest toads. There is no requirement for entering a toad in the Derby.

Carnival Plans 'Shaping Up'

Kids from six to sixty like a carnival and plans are shaping up for one of the largest home-talent carnivals ever held in Eastland, for the first annual Horned Toad Derby at Firemen's Park Saturday night.

With practically every club and organization in the city sponsoring one or more concessions, the "bottom" of the barrel has been scraped for ideas to provide a full round of entertainment and valuable prizes.

A few of the concessions planned include bingo, ducking stool, Calvacade of Lafts, games of skill and side shows.

A request had been made by Eastland Derby officials that persons who have entered toads without names advise the Eastland Chamber of Commerce by Friday of the toad's names, or one will be supplied for each entry by the C. of C.

If you have a special name in mind for the toad, the C. of C. must be advised by Friday in order to have the racing form printed. For this reason, if a toad has not been named by the deadline, one will be supplied.

Square Dance Beauty, Pageantry To Highlight Horned Toad Derby

One of the highlights of the first annual Eastland Old Rip Horned Toad Derby Saturday night will be the beauty and pageantry of 40 West Texas square dance teams in action.

Sponsored by the Zeta Pi Chapter of the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority of Eastland, the street will be roped at Firemen's Field for the old-time square dance that will feature famed callers from all over Texas.

Music for the dance will be provided by the Rancho Boys of Cisco Junior College.

Seating facilities are to be available to add to the enjoyment and comfort of the spectators.

M. H. Perry of Eastland will serve as master of ceremonies for the dance.

Vatican Not To Withdraw From Red Countries

VATICAN CITY, July 14 (UP) — High Vatican sources said today that the Vatican will continue to maintain diplomatic relations with Communist governments despite its mass excommunication of Catholic Communists and fellow-travellers.

"The decree is purely doctrinal and not political," an authoritative Vatican informant said. "It affects members of the Catholic Church who violate the canons of the church. Therefore, diplomatic relations are not affected."

At present Vatican maintains diplomatic relations with Romania, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia in Eastern Europe. Poland has sought to resume diplomatic ties, but the Vatican has rejected Polish terms for such an accord.

The Vatican radio began broadcasting the text of the excommunication decree today. Vatican informants said the decree will force millions of Catholics around the world to choose between the church and the Kremlin.

Man Held In Kentucky Murder

EL PASO, Tex., July 14 (UP) — Donald L. Horn, 21, is held here for the murder of a Prestonburg, Ky., high school cheer leader, Muriel Baldiege, 17, who was slain near her home on June 17.

Horn, 21, gave himself up Saturday. He was held on a vagrancy charge. He said he understood he was wanted for questioning in the killing.

Horn said he came to El Paso to open a furniture store and that he left Prestonburg before the slaying. He said he read of the murder in a Fort Worth paper while hiking here.

He said he thought about opening the furniture store when he was stationed in the army here in 1946.

He said he saw the girl last on the morning she was killed.

Horn said she was with another fellow now held in jail at Prestonburg Tex. He said he knew Muriel and went on picnics with her but did not kill her.

Dallas Favored For New Texas Medical School

AUSTIN, Tex., July 14 (UP) — Dallas held the edge today as members of the University of Texas Board of Regents convened in a special meeting to conduct a hearing on a proposed site for a new state medical school.

The State Medical Association's House of Delegates recommended Dallas yesterday as their choice for the school.

The action was praised by Dudley K. Woodward, Jr., Chairman of the Board of Regents, who told the house of delegates that "you have made our decision immeasurably easier to make. I hope that my colleagues... will adopt your report."

The North Texas city took the nod over San Antonio and Temple.

The recommendation was not binding on the regents but they were expected to follow through on the selection.

An appropriation of \$1,000,000 (M) was made by the 51st Legislature to cover maintenance and operation for the new medical school, supplementing the main medical branch at Galveston.

Dormitory rooms are available in the college building and meals will be served cafeteria style.

Hearing Set For Ford Employees

AUSTIN, Tex., July 14 (UP) — A hearing into unemployment compensation claims of Dallas Ford Company employees who were off their jobs during a recent automobile strike in Detroit will be held July 28, the Texas Employment Commission announced today.

Col. Dwight Horton, commission member, said the claims amounted to a "test case" since a ruling has never been made on a situation such as that presented by the Dallas employees' claims.

The question, Horton said, was whether the Dallas employees were actually participants in the Detroit strike.

Payments of claims sought by the employees has been contested by the Ford Motor Company.

Newsman Will Announce Derby

Weldon Owens, Fort Worth newspaperman and radio commentator, has been secured as announcer for the first annual Eastland Old Rip Horned Toad Derby Saturday, it was announced by H. J. Tanner of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

A loud speaker system will be available Saturday night to facilitate the announcing and to keep spectators advised of the activities.

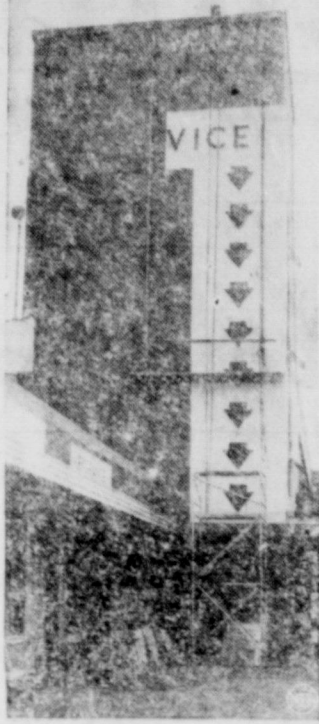

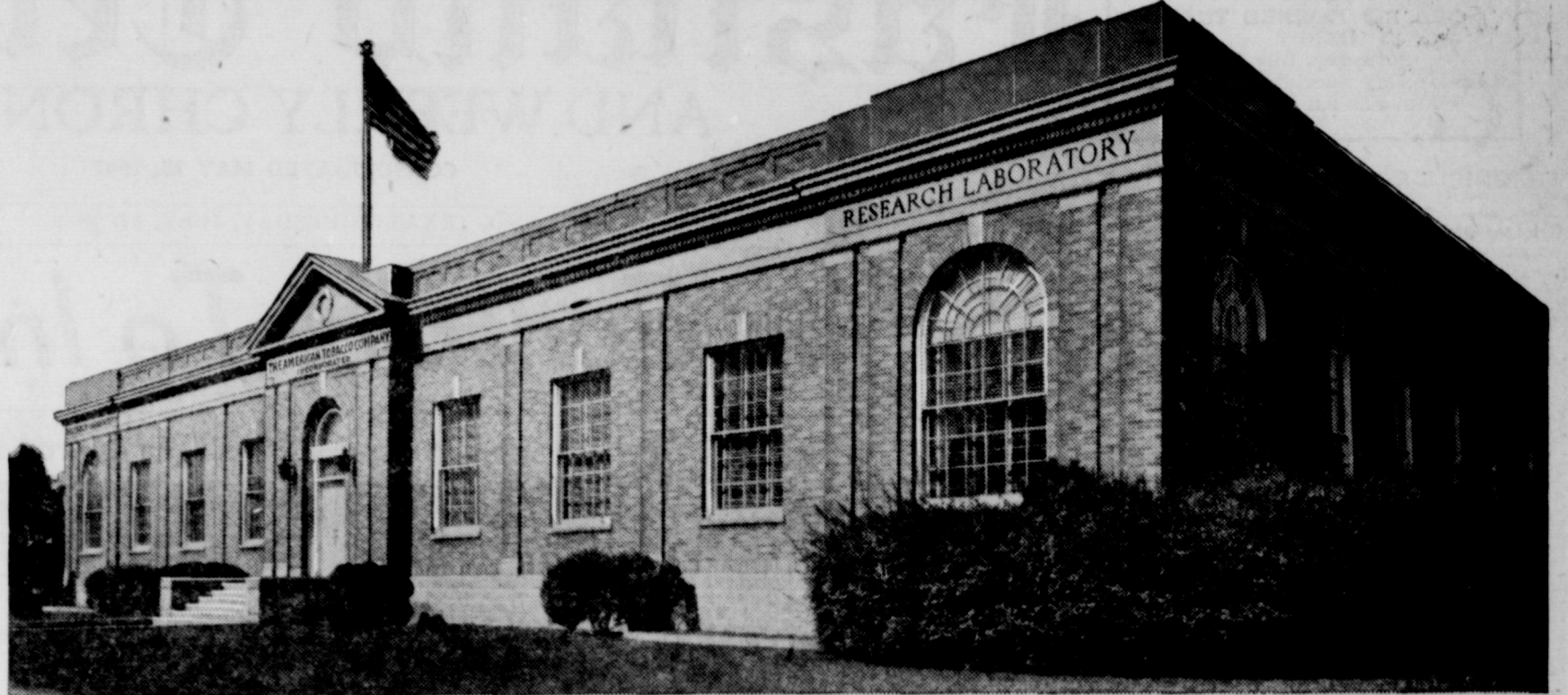

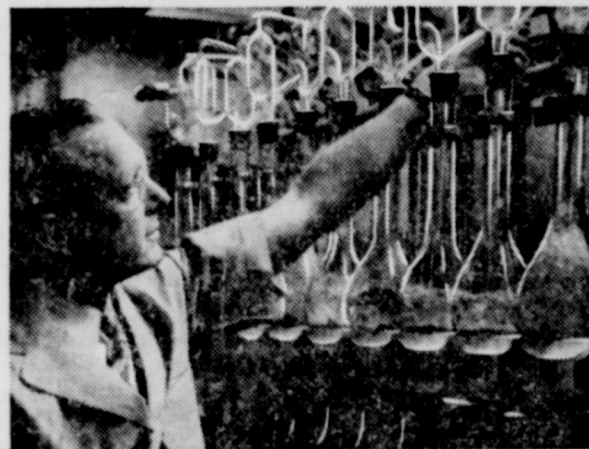

failure to pay the medical bills
of a woman he struck with his
automobile.

James Horton, 32, of Tyler, was
in the hospital here today with
injuries received in an accident
which took the life of another
truck driver.

A truck driven by W. A. Scar-
brough, 19, of Vidor, struck the
rear end of Horton's milk truck
yesterday. Scarbrough was killed
in the pile-up, on the Sabine
River Bridge South of here.

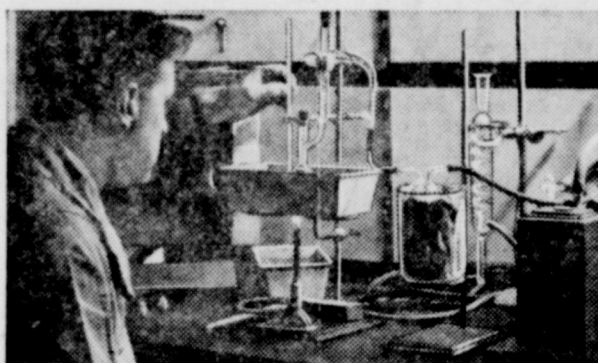

Harlem Prison Farm guard.

A jury deliberated only 10 min-
utes yesterday before finding Jose
Juarez guilty of the crime. The 57-
year-old woman, partially blind,
was found dead on the floor of her
home here. Juarez had been work-

ing in a vegetable shack at the
rear of the Stovall home.

Cabbie Sues Oil
Man For \$10,000

HOUSTON, Tex., July 14 (UP)—
A 50-year-old cab driver today
asked \$10,000 damages from Oil-
man George H. Echols as a result
of a midnight fist-fight last Jan-
uary on the lawn of Echols' Pala-

tial home.
San Leon Barwick took his com-
plaint to district court after losing
the first round in corporation court
a few days after the incident,
when Echols was acquitted of sim-
ple assault charges.

Barwick's petition, filed yester-
day, alleged that the oilman "mal-
iciously and entirely without pro-
vocation" beat the taxi driver, in-
flicting injuries that included a
brain concussion, a black eye, cuts
and bruises.

In the first court action last
January, Echols testified Bar-
wick became angry when Echols
told him he had no change to pay
for the \$1.80 ride from a down-
town hotel.

"The driver wanted to take my
\$4,000 ring as security," Echols
said. "Then he hit me in the stom-
ach, and kicked my knee when I
tried to pay him with some money
I had in the house."

Barwick had a different version.
He told police that Echols said he
could not pay the fare, and then
"when I offered to collect later,
he knocked me down and bloodied
my nose."

Strikers Close El Paso Plant

EL PASO, Tex., July 14 (UP)—El Paso smelter of the American Smelting and Refining Co. was closed Wednesday after more than 700 members of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (CIO) walked off the job at 3 P. M.

The work stoppage occurred after union officials called a demonstration in the company offices at 2:30 P. E. MCL. Tittman, manager of the smelter, said the company offered to reinstate the men if the union agreed not to call for further work stoppages such as the earlier demonstration. But the union said it had "no authority" to enter such an agreement. Silverio Alva, president of the local, said the men would not return to work until the firings are rescinded.

THREE QUESTIONED IN DEATH OF TEX THORNTON

AMARILLO, Tex. July 14 (UP)—Sheriff Paul Gaither planned to go to Wichita Falls, Tex., today to question a young man and his wife about the June 23 motel slaying of oilman W. A. (Tex) Thornton.

A 23-year old parolee from Louisiana State Penitentiary held by federal authorities at Wharton for Nevada officers also was under questioning.

The 25-year old woman and the 27-year old man were picked up at Iowa Park by Wichita County Sheriff Hammett Vance following a Wichita Falls drive-in cafe shooting Sunday night.

District Attorney Clyde Fillmore of Wichita County said the woman admitted she and her husband were in the Amarillo area the night that Thornton, famed oil-field trouble shooter, was shot to death and garroted.

The parolee was Mark James Donnelly, charged in the June 17 death of Walter Hempel, 73-year old realtor.

Hempel's body was found on the shores of Crystal Bay, near Lake Tahoe, the morning of June 18. He had been shot once in the face with a small caliber pistol. Donnelly reportedly was the last person seen with him.

Amarillo officers became interested in questioning Donnelly after they learned that a tie, knotted around Hempel's neck when his body was found, was tied in the same peculiar manner as a towel used to throttle Thornton.

Thornton's body was found in a downtown Amarillo tourist court the morning after he entered the place with a young couple who have been the quarry in a search in several states.

Gaither said he would ask Wharton officers for a picture of Donnelly. The picture would be shown to witnesses who saw the young man and his woman companion with Thornton shortly before his death.

Nevada authorities yesterday said they had mailed a request for Donnelly's extradition to Texas, but the request apparently was lost in the stack of mail which had accumulated in the Governor's office since the death of Gov. Beauford Jester last Monday.

Donnelly had made known his intentions of fighting extradition. He was arrested by FBI agents in Houston Monday on a federal charge of fleeing to avoid prosecution. His bond was set at \$50,000.

He denied any connection with Hempel's death.

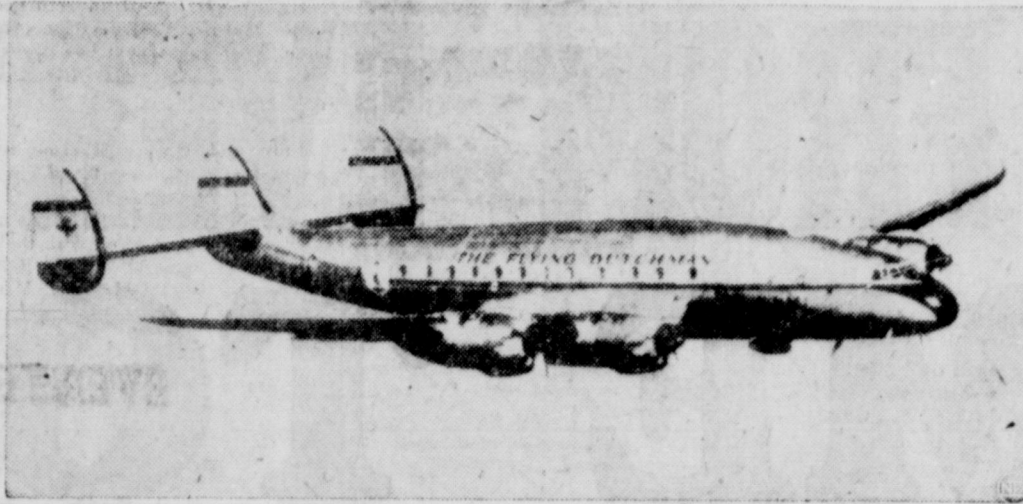
