Texas University Budget Boosted

AUSTIN, July 15 (UP)—The University of Texas board of regents has approved a budget of \$8,963,242 for the 1949-50 fiscal year, an increase of 6.7 per cent over the budget originally adopted for the current fiscal year.

The total includes \$7,996,610 for the University's main branch and \$966,632 for extramural divisions.

However, the figure for the next fiscal year does not include self-supporting activities such as intercollegiate athletics and restricted funds.

Basic salary schedules for teachers and other employees will be continued next year at the present scales, it was announced.

In addition to the regular budget, the regents approved an estimated expenditure for the Dental Branch at Houston of \$1,094,580 for the coming year.

Additional expenditures included: M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, Houston, \$905,934, and the Galveston Medical Branch, \$4,800,000.

CZECHS PLAN TO TAKE OVER CATHOLIC CHURCH

P A R G U E, Czechoslovakia, July 15 (UP)—The Czech government served notice today that it was preparing to take over full control of the Roman Catholic Church throughout the country.

The official news agency reported that a bill had been drafted for the next session of parliament which would give the government control of church operations in Czechoslovakia.

The move followed by two days a Vatican decree excommunicating Catholic Communists and Communist sympathizers. Although Prague newspapers still ignored the church decree, the Communist Organ Rue Pravo said Vatican propaganda against Eastern Europe is "full of lies."

Medical School Name Selected

AUSTIN, July 15. (UP)—The new medical branch of the University of Texas to be established at Dallas has been named "Southwestern Medical School of the University of Texas."

The new school will use the facilities of the present Southwestern Medical Foundation, which will be transferred to the state.

The board named a special committee, headed by University President T. S. Painter, to represent the University in carrying out the property transfer.

The regents voted to retain the school's present staff for a period of one year from next Sept. 1. Admission requirements beginning in 1950 will be the same as at the main Medical at Galveston.

DENTON, Tex. July 15—Robert Clinton, son of Robert Clinton Sr., of Eastland, has been selected to sing with the Summer Great Chorus of North Texas State College.

First appearance of the Great Chorus will be an open air performance of Brahms' "Requiem" at NTSC on July 14.

Clinton, a graduate student, is a member of Phi Mu Alpha, national music fraternity, and Alpha Chi, national honor society.

The chorus under the direction of Frank McKinley, School of Music faculty member, replaces the A-Cappella Choir for the summer.

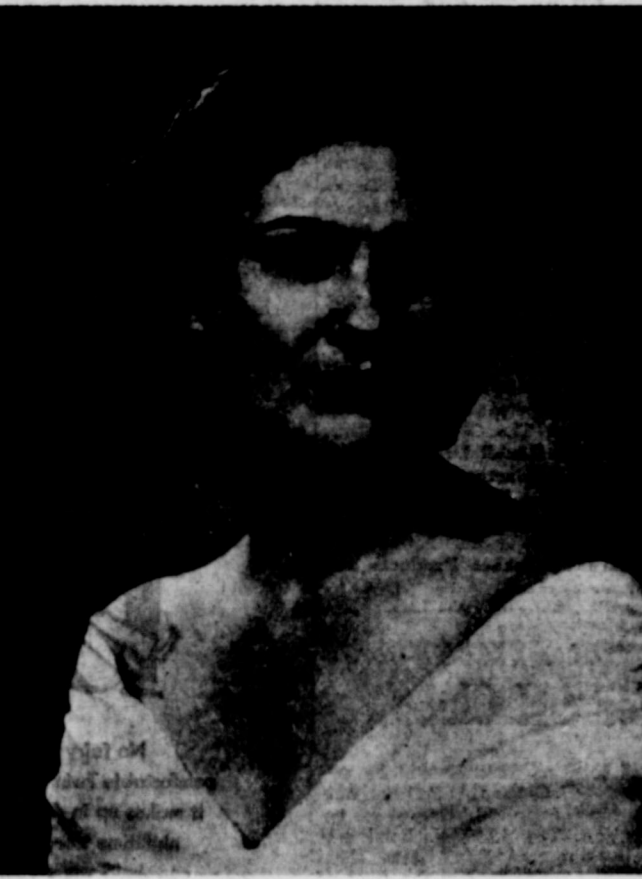
50-50 Proposition O. K.'d

Figure '30 Is Unusual In Webb Case

An unusual twist to the felony forgery case made by Arthur C. Webb and his wife in Texas cities, including Eastland and Ranger, is that all of the checks were in the amount of \$30.

While it is not known what "30" represents in the money world, "30" stands for "the end" in journalism, which is appropriate for the pair's alleged forgery activities.

Arthur G. Webb, famed concert violinist known professionally as Todd Webb, and his wife of Abilene, were arrested by the Eastland County Sheriff's office Thursday night at 7:30 o'clock in the lobby of a Cisco hotel on forgery complaints at Seymour.

The Eastland Sheriff's office made the arrest following a telephone call from Sheriff Lott Keefer of Seymour, stating that the pair were believed to be in the vicinity of Eastland. One of the victims had taken the license number of the pair's car, leading to their apprehension.

Mrs. and Mrs. Webb were in the lobby of the Cisco Hotel awaiting a long distance telephone call when Sheriff J. B. Williams and deputies apprehended them. They were brought to the Eastland County Jail and retained in custody for several hours, when they were released to Sheriff Keefer of Seymour and an unidentified Texas Ranger, who took them to the Seymour County Jail where they will be tried on charges there.

The arrest followed months of detective work by Texas Sheriffs and the State Department of Public Safety in apprehending the pair, who are wanted in at least 15 towns and cities on 30 felony forgery charges, with each of the checks being in the amount of \$30, making total of approximately \$1,000.

The pair used different names in passing the checks.

Four felony forgery charges were filed this morning in Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood's court. They allegedly passed checks in the amount of \$30 each on A. & P. Grocery, Eastland; Pipkins' Super Market, Eastland; H. & C. Piggy Market, Ranger, and A. & P. Grocery, Ranger. It is claimed the checks were passed April 9, 1948.

Other felony forgery complaints are being prepared and sent to the Seymour Sheriff's office by Brownwood, Coleman, Waxachie, Big Spring, San Angelo, Lufkin, Russ, San Antonio, Nacogdoches, Bogert, Corpus Christi, Plainview and Haskell.

Webb presented a concert in the Eastland High School auditorium April 27, 1949, under sponsorship of the Eastland Music Study Club, before a large audience. For a dozen years he was with outstanding symphony, radio and theater orchestras. Beginning the study of music at the age of eight, he studied under Dr. Charles Hildenbrandt and in academies in Europe and the United States. He was formerly with the St. Louis Symphony, W. G. N. Symphony, and at one time was concert master on the Pennsylvania program broadcast by the National Broadcasting Company.

In recent years, he has been doing concert work. His violin is a valuable Stradivarius, that his mother brought from France and gave to him at an early age. Miss Lois Jenke of Abilene accompanied him at the piano in his concert appearances.

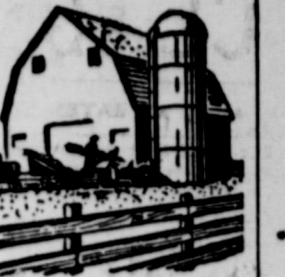

Demand for edible peanuts about equaled last week's slow pace. Occasional sales of shelled No. 1 Spanish peanuts held about steady with last week at 17 1/8 cents a pound. Compared to a month earlier, prices were unchanged to an eighth of a cent lower.

Only scattered offerings of peanut meal were available in the southwest. Mills priced meal of 41 per cent protein content at \$62 a ton, or \$5 to \$6 higher than last week. Some mills asked as high as \$65 a ton.

No peanut oil was available in the southwest this week.

Calf Scramble Plans Complete

R. B. Thomas Jr. Vocational Agriculture teacher announced today that final plans for the boys calf scramble have been completed. Ten registered Jersey heifers have been purchased from Mr. James Y. Reid of Dallas and Mr. Mel Thurmond of Abilene; these heifers will be the prize for which the Future Farmers and 4-H boys will be scrambling next Thursday and Friday July 21 & 22 in connection with the Jaycees annual rodeo at Ranger.

The Jaycees hope that these animals will be the foundation stock of the future dairy industry in Eastland County. For this reason, each boy who wins a calf is required to return his first female offspring for future scrambles. Though this program it is mathematically possible to develop 6,000 Jersey heifers by 1960.

Cash Prizes For 4-H Clubs

A total of \$25,280 will be awarded 4-H Clubs this fall for outstanding accomplishments in recreation. The 1949 National 4-H Recreation and Rural Arts program—a new comer in the field of sponsored 4-H activities—is well under way in Texas, according to the State Extension office, at the A. & M. College of Texas.

Introduced only last year, the program has already chalked up an unusually good record which includes training 7,150 junior and 4,390 adult 4-H Club leaders in recreation. In addition, 1,005 clubs in 44 states were awarded blue ribbons for outstanding performance; 350 counties won \$25 each in cash toward buying recreational equipment; 21 states received \$50 each for crafts premiums, while five boys and three girls were sent to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago—all expenses paid.

Awards are based on well-rounded recreation activities developed and carried out by local 4-H clubs. The eight trips are provided for 4-Hers who have excelled in recreational leadership. All awards will again be made by United States Rubber company, sponsors of the program.

DEMONSTRATION OF BRUSH SAW TO BE HELD NEAR EASTLAND

A new type of brush saw demonstration will be held in thick brush between Eastland and Carbon, on Highway 6, Thursday morning July 21 at 9:30 o'clock, by L. N. Haynes of the J. P. Manufacturing Co. Inc. of Livingstone.

The place is on the San Herring land on the east side of the Highway, about two miles north of Carbon.

There will also be a demonstration of a rake in raking brush into windrows. County Agent J. M. Cooper, in a letter of invitation to the demonstration sent out to interested citizens of the county, states "my methods have been tried in attempting to eliminate some of our brushland. I have never seen the J. P. Manufacturing Co. saw work. I hope you can come out to see this demonstration and decide for yourself if the saw is practical or not."

In a circular distributed by the company, the saw is described as the "new 1949 Brush-Master," featuring a 12 horsepower Wisconsin twin cylinder engine. A description of the Brush-Master follows:

"The cushion mounting and and belt drive of Hp. Brush-Master saws absorb shock when hit by large stumps or trees, thus easily maneuvered. The two tractor at walking speed. It is mounted on small tractor, and is thus easily maneuvered. The two 30 inch saws cut the full width of tractor and the dozer. Ask Authority For Pipe Line

WASHINGTON, July 15 (UP)—The Federal Power Commission has been asked by the United Gas Pipe Line Co. to authorize a 26-mile pipe line project to connect four gas fields in Southwestern Louisiana with the company's system in East Texas.

The project would have a capacity of 112,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas per day. The additional gas would be made available to the Beaumont-Port Arthur Area which the company now serves Texas.

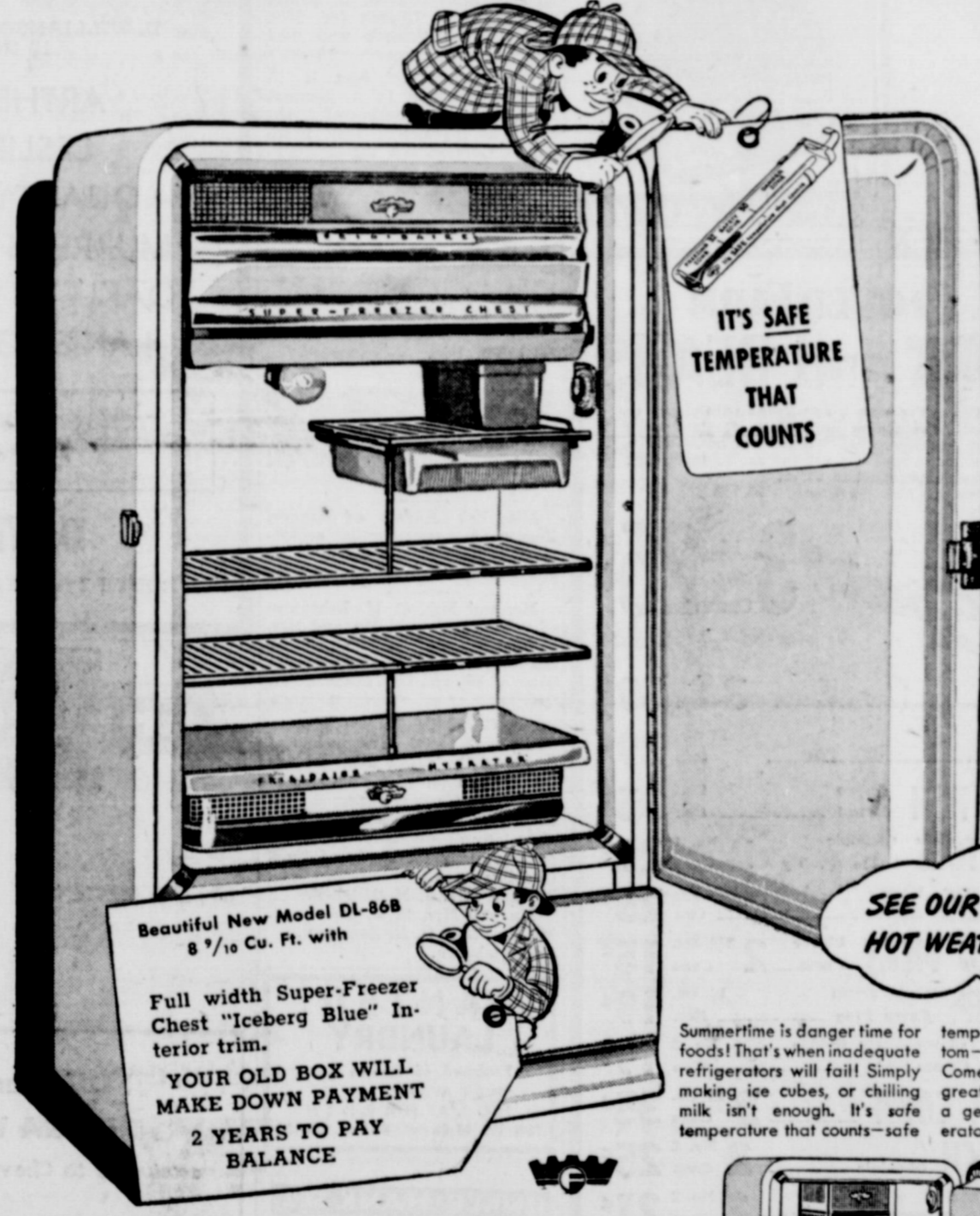

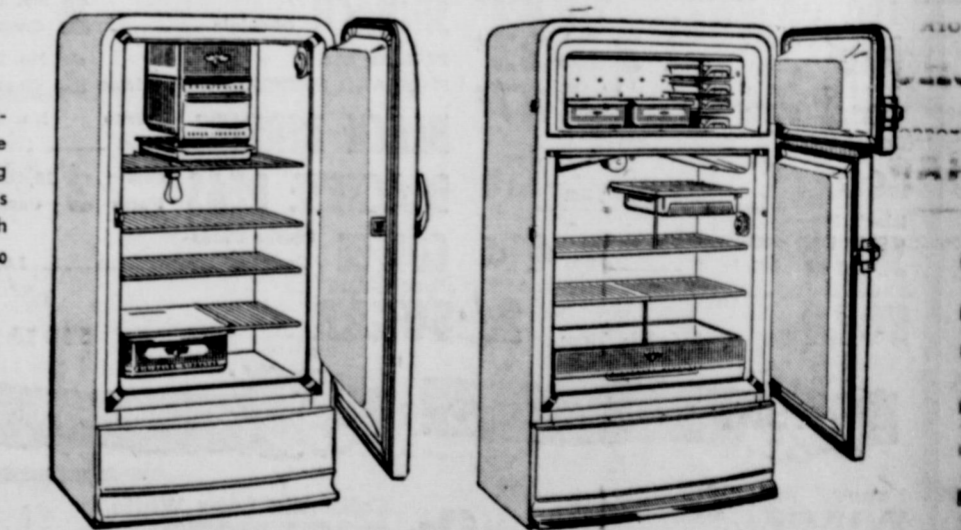
