Toad Derby Day Saturday In Eastland

Host Of Thoroughbreds Ready To Run

TOADS STRAINING AT BITS; IMPATIENT TO RACE

SATURDAY—Today is Derby Day in Eastland. Approximately 150 toads are straining at the bits and ready to "burn-up" the track, when the starting bell is sounded at 8 o'clock tonight at Firemen's Softball Field.

For weeks, trainers all over West Texas have been getting their toads in shape for the first annual Eastland Old Rip Horned Toad Derby in which the sponsors, Eastland Chamber of Commerce, are offering \$350 in cash prizes. Diets have been carefully considered with trainees feeding their thoroughbreds on the choicest ants available.

Some of the trainers, in their eagerness and enthusiasm to cop one of the sweepstakes prizes, have been talking of using stimulants on their prized reptiles shortly before the race.

H. J. Tanner, Chamber manager issued an appeal to all trainers this morning to remember the code of true sportsmen and refrain from "dosing" their frogs, and declared that any frogs showing evidence of having been "dosed" will not be eligible to participate.

Eastland was acquiring a festival appearance this morning with colorful flags and bunting adorning business buildings. Citizens were busy getting everything in top shape for the Derby activities. A Kid's Derby was scheduled for 2 o'clock, with \$25 in prizes offered. An old fiddlers contest, with \$50 prizes, was set for 4 o'clock to be followed by the Eastland High School Maverick Band in a concert appearance. All of the afternoon activities are to be held on the courthouse lawn.

Evening festivities at Firemen's Field will include a carnival of 15 concessions, the Derby, and a square dance.

Featured in the carnival will be the Rotary sponsored "Cavalcade of Lafts"—a magical, dancing musical and comedy revue. Entertainers of the "Cavalcade" include Leon Baldwin, Republic and Movietone picture star; Louis Sharris, radio, television and night club star; Meryl and Barry, beautiful twin dancers; and Baldwin's mother, a Zeigfeld Folies star. Other concessions will have bingo, ducking stool, side shows, games of skill.

A first aid tent will be maintained on the carnival grounds by the Zeta Pi chapter of the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority. Hamner's Funeral Home will have an ambulance by the tent, in the event of an emergency.

A brief memorial service will be held for Old Rip, Eastland's famed horned toad which lived after being entombed for 31 years, just prior to the Derby. He will be carried in his plush-lined casket from his glass-enclosed tomb in the lobby of the Eastland County Courthouse, to Firemen's Field, where a Boy Scout honor guard will fire a salute and the flag will be lowered to half mast. Weldon Owens, regional editor of the Fort Worth Press, who will serve as Derby announcer, will give the tribute.

Following the derby, the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority will stage a square dance on a roped-off street near Firemen's Field. The Rancho Boys of Cisco Junior College will play, callers from all over Texas will be on hand, and 40 squares will be on exhibition.

OUTCOME IS DOUBTFUL; NO FAVORITE

With a host of thoroughbreds entered for the first annual Eastland Old Rip Horned Toad Derby Saturday night, fans may expect to see a thrilling contest and the probable outcome is anybody's guess.

UP to Friday afternoon, a total of 119 toads had been officially entered in ten heats. Winners of each heat will participate in a sweepstakes race for the \$350 prizes.

Entries Saturday was expected to swell the total to at least 150, with additional heats to be added as needed.

Cpl. Nash was a son of Mrs. Fannie Nash of Eastland. He was born March 29, 1920 in Glen Rose and attended schools there. Moving to Eastland, he was employed by Western Union and Modern Dry Cleaners, prior to entering the Army Air Corps in 1943. He trained at Minerals Wells, Amarillo, Sioux Falls, S. D., Yuma, Ariz., and Tonopah, going overseas Dec. 24, 1944, with an assignment at New Guinea. Later he was transferred to Montal Island, where he was killed Feb. 24, 1945. He was awarded the Asiatic Pacific Theater of War ribbon with one battle star, the purple Heart and a Citation of Honor.

Survivors include his wife and one son, Billy Ed Nash of 113 North Dixie Street; his mother, Mrs. Fannie Nash of Eastland; one sister, Mrs. Ott Green, Cisco; one sister, Marvin Nash of Eastland; and a half brother Milton Nash Eastland.

By the way, Old Rip VI is rarin' to go tonight.

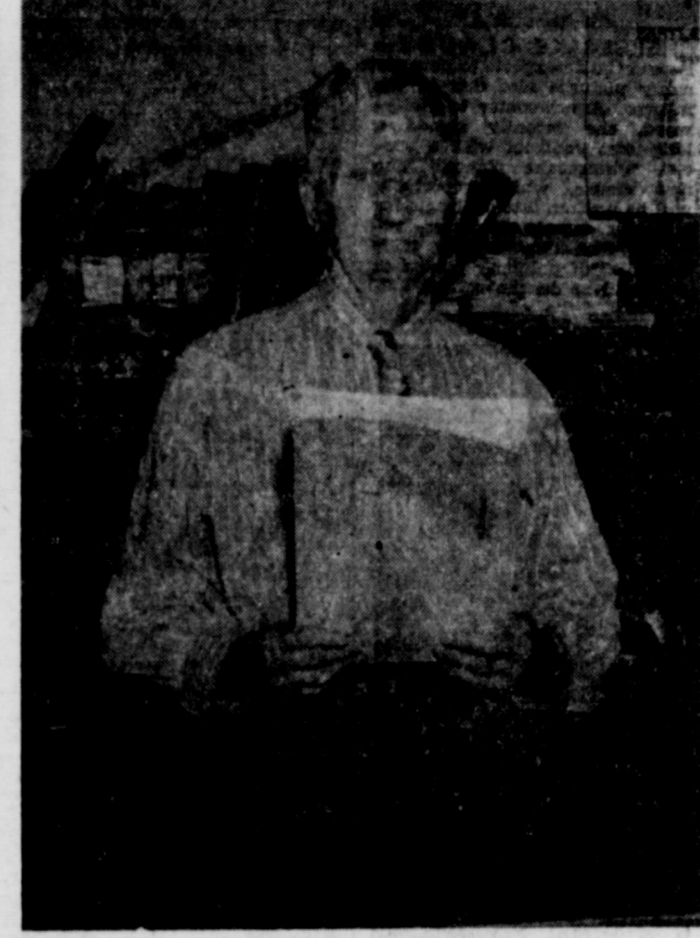
Desdemona Boy On Cruise Now

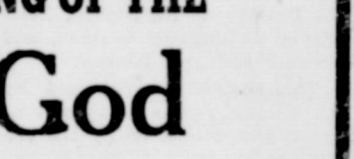

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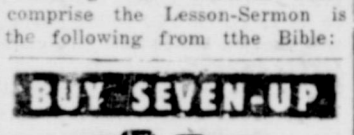

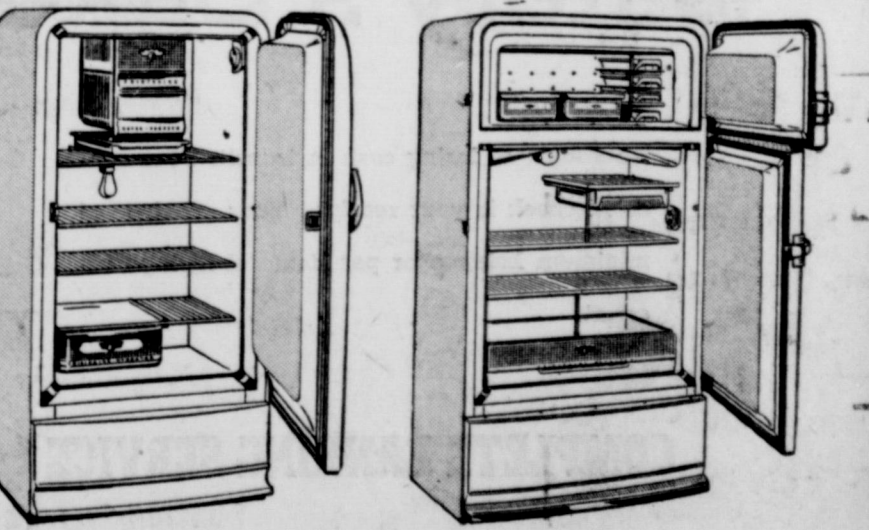

Curiosity Over Gun Kills Man

SAN FRANCISCO July 16 (UP) —A seven-year-old boy admitted today that he killed an elderly grocer with a gun he found under the counter in the man's modest neighborhood store.

The boy, Teddy Moreno, confessed after his four-year-old sister, Annella, piped up:

"Teddy pulled the trigger." The victim was Fred Throckmorton, 67, who operated the small store with his wife Tomma. He died with a bullet wound in his chest last night.

Teddy told police that he and his sister went to the store with a note from their mother for "\$1 nice hamburger." He said he found the .32 caliber gun under the counter "beside the chewing gum" while the grocer was getting the meat.


