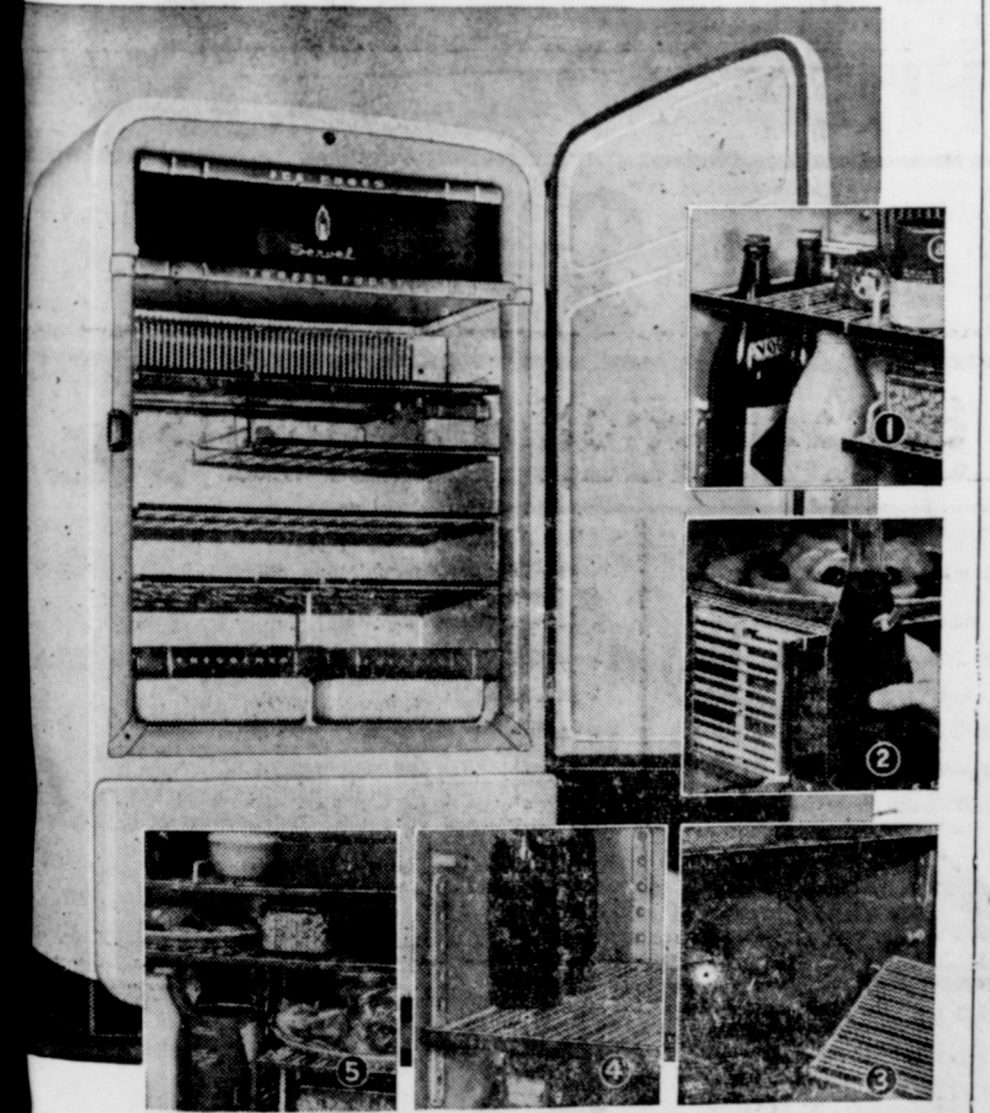

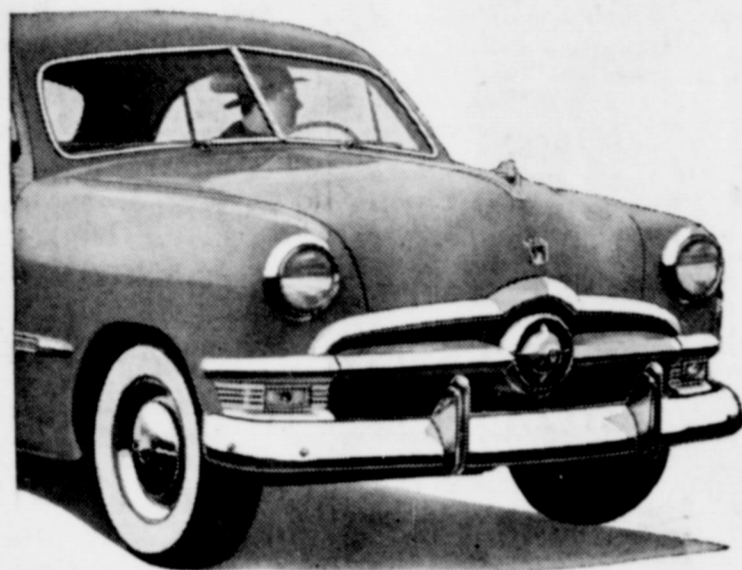

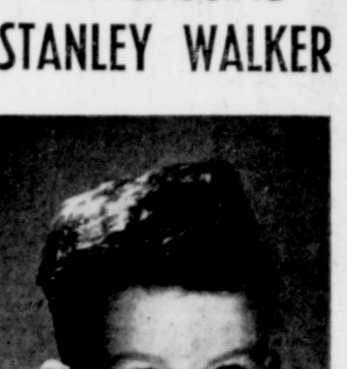

ELECTRICAL WIRING DEMONSTRATION GIVEN F. H. A.

The Eastland Chapter of the Future Farmers of America were given a demonstration on electrical wiring by Texas Electric Service Company representatives.

Mr. Wheat demonstrated how electricity may be lost when the wires are not large enough, not properly insulated, or a circuit overloaded. A demonstration was given on how not to overload a circuit. Then he used a separate circuit for a lighting system, and still a third circuit for the wall outlets. The reason for so many circuits, Mr. Wheat explained, is not to overload a circuit and cause the wires to heat, because that is dangerous and will use

electricity that you have to pay for but do not get. He warned against trying to make a circuit breaker work against its will, for it only kicks off when there is a short circuit somewhere. Mr. Collins explained fluorescent lamps to the F. F. A. boys. The boys appreciated the demonstration very much.
