Thorton Denies Theft Of Cattle Near Eastland

Thorton of Bangs, facing theft charges in Eastland in the theft of two cows, Bernard Hanna of Eastland and a half ago, was held in county Jail Thursday in lieu of \$500 bond.

Thorton was arrested in San Angelo Friday of last week after he was found attempting to sell the cows in an auction ring. The cattle were identified by brands, description of which had been broadcast by Eastland County Sheriff J. B. Williams. Hanna reported theft of the cows Sunday, April 9.

Thorton admitted possession of the cows at San Angelo, Sheriff Hanna said, but claimed he had taken them from another man. Hanna had the cows in a pasture about one and a half miles north of Eastland when they were taken and other tracks indicated a thief or thieves had driven the pasture through a gate and used a corral to hold the cows for loading.

Williams said this type of theft is becoming more and more common in the county as cattle prices drop while money gets tighter. He asked anyone seeing any suspicious activity along highways to notify his office at Eastland immediately.

Street Lights To Be Installed Here

Mercury vapor street lights in the downtown section of Eastland will be installed soon by Texas Electric Service Company under an agreement voted by members of the Eastland City Commission.

Forty-five of them, will cost \$15,000 for installation, will cost considerably more than the current consumed, said Manager I. C. Heck.

Commissioners Herman Rushford and Jack Muirhead were appointed to spot the lamps, which will be on Main, Commerce, and Lamar Streets.

It was considered possible that the lights on Main Street, along with the 80, will be put on a separate circuit so they can be left on at night. Others probably will be turned off at midnight.

Mumps Epidemic Makes Eastland

Mumps were running more rampant in Eastland this week with numerous absences from school laid to the disease.

School Board Member Bill Russell was reported at home with mumps.

Parents were not alarmed by the epidemic. They said that no mumps has been found in Eastland cases usually are not serious and are more painful and dangerous than dangerous.

Prizes To Be Given In Dairy Show Judging Contests

Judging contests at the annual Eastland County Dairy Show to be held at Firemen's Field in Eastland Friday, April 28, will be open to any 4-H Club or FFA boy or adult farmer in the county, officials have announced.

Cash prizes will be awarded to the first 10 winners in each division, said A. Z. Myrick, president of the Eastland County Dairy Association, which sponsors the affair annually.

The two judging contests should not be confused with the judging of the animals entered in the show, Myrick emphasized. R. E. Burleson, dairy specialist of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service, will judge the animals.

M. D. Fox, Eastland High School vocational agriculture teacher, is to be in charge of the junior and senior judging contests. In the contests, the only object will be to pit the skill of the contestants against each other in judging good type dairy animals.

On the other hand, Burleson is to place the cows in the show on a classification basis, after the two judging contests are over. In this type of show, the animals compete against the ideal dairy type instead of against each other, so there is no direct competition.

Animals scoring 85 to 90 points will receive blue ribbons; from 80 to 85 points a red ribbon, and from 75 to 80 points a white ribbon.

About \$300 will be given as prizes to owners of animals in the show, but Myrick pointed out that the amount to be received by any owner of a prize winner will depend on the type of ribbon awarded to the animal.

Travis Wheat of Eastland, farm representative of the Texas Electric Service Company, is general chairman for the show.

LeRoy Fry of the Abilene Christian College Agricultural department will speak at 10 a. m. at the show grounds on "Feeding Roughage to Dairy Cattle."

There will be separate classes for Jerseys, Holsteins and Guernseys. Anyone with a good dairy female animal was urged to show her.

There will be no bull classes in the show.

The identification ended days of telephoning and of inquiries by persons who thought the dead woman might be a relative or friend.

Any doctor knows smoking is bad for people, Moore said, but most lay off lecturing about it because doctors are human and like to smoke too, and because doctors know they will lose patients by lecturing on the evils of tobacco.

Been Missed By Census Takers? Call Tanner At Chamber Of Commerce

Any Eastland resident who has not been contacted by a census enumerator would be doing the town a favor by calling the Eastland Chamber of Commerce office at 192. Manager H. J. Tanner said Thursday.

Census enumerators were supposed to have completed their work this week, although the census taking will not end officially until the end of April, Tanner said.

Tanner asked for a call to his office from anyone who knows of a household not reached by the census taker in Eastland.

He pointed out that many of the vital statistics affecting Eastland during the next 10 years will be taken from the census now under way, and said that for the sake of the town it is vitally important that every resident be counted by the enumerators.

Results of the nose count are not likely to be revealed before some time in May.

And census statisticians in Washington will be drawing up figures from the census for a long time to come.
