

Spillway Runs Over To Assure 11-Year Supply Of Water

The south spillway at Lake Eastland was running water Monday, and Eastland was assured of enough municipal water for a nother year and a half or two years, come what may.

The amount of water running over the spillway was not enough to be very impressive as a spectacle, but it was impressive enough to those who remembered a little over a year ago when all of Eastland was wondering where its summer water was coming from.

Of course that worry was end ed when 1949's spring rains filled the lake to overflowing and sent water over the spillway with a roar, just about a year ago.

Weatherman J. A. Beard reported that the five days of intermittent rains that ended Monlay gave Eastland a total rainfall of 3.15 inches.

This included a half inch Wednesday of last week, three-quar ters of an inch on Thursday and a ike amount Friday, 1.10 inches Saturday, and .05 Sunday

Farmers and ranchmen were just about unanimous in saying thay had plenty of rain for the time being, and farmers were hoping for a few days of sunshine se they could work their fields

Eastland County seemed to get nore rain out of the wet spell than almost any section of the state. For once, more rain fell here than in Dallas or Fort Worth although the differential was wip
