## Prentiss Jones Quits As Principal Of Eastland High

Prentiss Jones, principal of Eastland High School for three years and before that assistant Eastland County school superintendent, resigned Monday and said he will take a position with the Acock Laboratories, Austin chemical concern.

Jones said he will serve out the remainder of the school term in Eastland, and will go to Austin to take up his work there as soon as practical thereafter.

Jones handed his resignation to School Supt. W. G. Womack Monday.

School Board President Norris Wilson said the board had received Jones' resignation, but had not met since it was turned in.

No action has been taken on a successor, Wilson said.

Mrs. Jones also is a teacher in the Eastland schools. She taught at Morton Valley until the Morton Valley students came into Eastland to school at the beginning of the current school year, and then came into the Eastland system with other Morton Valley teachers.

## City's Bonded Debt Reduced By \$20,000

The City of Eastland this week reduced its general fund debt by \$20,000 by calling bonds to that amount.

The bonds were obtained from Dunne & Co. of Wichita, Kans., and were purchased at 90 percent of par, costing a total of \$18,010 including \$10 interest, said City Manager I. C. Heck.

The bond retirement leaves the city owing \$332,857.59 on the general indebtedness, which is scheduled to pay off in 1971. However, the bonds are callable at any time, Heck said.

The city also owes nearly as much indebtedness against water and sewer income.

## Graduates To Receive New Wrist Watches

A new wrist watch will go to one girl and one boy in the graduating classes of Eastland, Carbon, Gorman and Olden High Schools under a novel plan sponsored by Wilkins Jewelry of Eastland.

A huge clock will be started in the show window of Wilkins next week, with the names of the boys seniors in an outside circle on the dial and names of girls in an inside circle.

When the clock runs down before graduation, the girl and boy whose names are indicated by the stopped hands will be given new wrist watches by the jewelry concern.

### Veterans Protest Post Office Move For Economizing

Pointing out that most of the men laid off through the recent post office economy move are veterans of World War II, Eastland posts of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars this week sent to Texas senators and Congressmen and Postmaster General Donaldson a resolution deploring the move.

In Eastland as well as other cities and towns over the nation the economy move was felt in cutting home mail delivery to one time a day.

Postmaster E. E. Layton said the chief economy felt here was the laying off of an auxiliary mail carrier, leaving two full time carriers.

The carrier laid off handled an auxiliary route established over a year ago, Layton said. The route was absorbed by the other two routes under the new setup.

Layton said about 40 percent of the homes will get mail only in the afternoons as long as the present schedule is in effect.

As a further measure of economy, he said, the post office lobby will be closed and locked at 8 p. m. instead of at 8:30 p. m. as in the past.

Window service will remain the same, he said.

### Annual Ranch Day To Be Held May 20

Eastland's second annual Ranch Day, sponsored by the Band Boosters Club, will be held Saturday, May 20, with a considerably more elaborate program than last year's event had. It was decided at a meeting Monday night.

Events planned include rodeo events the Friday night before, to be put on by the Eastland Roping Club at the club arena, a parade featuring horsemen and bands, Saturday afternoon; a costume contest for western getups, the jail on the square that netted the club so many "fines" last year, and carnival events at night, supplemented by a street square dance.

Chairmen of the various events are T. R. Atwood, H. J. Tanner, Hubert Westfall, Johnnie Aaron, Neil Day, Jack Chamberlain and Wayne Jackson.

They came out and all watched the plate-like object until it disappeared in the northern sky.

The body of Mrs. Mary Jane Haag, killed two weeks ago in an Olden crash, still was unclaimed Thursday at Hamner Funeral Home.

Eastland County officials were somewhat puzzled as to what to do in the case. Mrs. Haag's mother had been notified in Mississippi but had sent no word on what to do with the body.

Mrs. Haag was unidentified for a week after the accident.

### \$177,602 Damages Asked Of T. & P. In George Death

Suit for \$177,602 damages against the Texas & Pacific Railway Company in the death of Edwin George of Ranger was filed in 91st District Court Tuesday on behalf of his widow and children.

The suit was filed by Attorneys Joe Nuessle of Ranger and Frank Sparks of Eastland on behalf of Mrs. Myrtle C. George, Morris B. George and Dorothy K. George Bonner, joined by her husband, Jimmy R. Bonner.

George, oil firm consignee in Ranger, was fatally injured Feb. 6 when his pickup truck was hit by a train at the T. & P. crossing in downtown Ranger.

The damage suit alleged that the railroad company was negligent in failing to keep a strong enough warning bell at the crossing, that the bell failed to ring, and that the approaching train was going too fast and made no warning by whistle or bell.

Damages asked included \$150,000 to Mrs. George for losses allegedly suffered because of anguish and sorrow and through loss of her husband's earning capacity, set at \$12,000 a year in the suit.

Also asked was payment of \$1902.08 allegedly paid for medical care for George after he was injured and before he died six days later, and \$700 for damages to the truck in which he was riding.

Another \$25,000 was asked for suffering endured by George between the time he was injured and his death.

### Big Crowds See Both Minstrel Showings

Near-capacity crowds at both of last week's performances of the annual Quarterback Club Minstrel show helped boost the total "take" to slightly over a thousand dollars, officials of the club said.

This year's performances, the fifth in a row, brought net proceeds of nearly \$750 to make the production one of the most successful in recent years.

Profits are to be used for the club projects. These include possibly new tennis courts for Eastland, and a track for Eastland High School athletes.

### Judging By Youths And Adults To Be First On Program

Animals in the annual Eastland County Dairy Show to be held at Firemen's Field in Eastland (the softball park) will be in place at 10 a. m. Friday, and the judging contests will get under way immediately.

In the contests, both adult farmers and youths who are members of 4-H and FFA clubs will get a chance to compete in dairy animal judging against others, and at the same time compete for about \$300 in prizes.

The judging contests are under the chairmanship of M. D. Fox, vocational agriculture teacher at Eastland High School.

Classification of the animals on display will come after the judging contests are over. R. E. Burleson, Texas A. & M. College dairy specialist, will classify the animals by types. About \$200 in prize money will go to owners of animals exhibited.

The animals will not compete against each other, but against an ideal type.

Entries may be of any known dairy breed, but do not have to be pure-bred or registered.

A feature of this show will be the first showing of animals bred under the Eastland County Dairy Association's artificial breeding program.

Also to be on display are the heifers awarded club boys of the county last fall under the association's calf donation program.

The dairy association, which has as its object building and improving the dairy industry of the county, is sponsoring the show in Eastland.

### Eastland Roping Club To Have First Events

First roping events of the current season for the Eastland Roping Club will be held Friday evening in the club's arena near the Faircloth Auction Barn, Johnnie Aaron, club president, said this week.

Members of the club last week end spread a thick layer of sand over the ground surface in the arena so as almost to eliminate the dust nuisance for spectators, Aaron said.

Through the warm months the club will have roping events at night each Wednesday and Friday evening, he said.

Thirty-two head of fresh and "salty" Brahma calves have been bought by the club for roping purposes.

No admission is charged for the events.

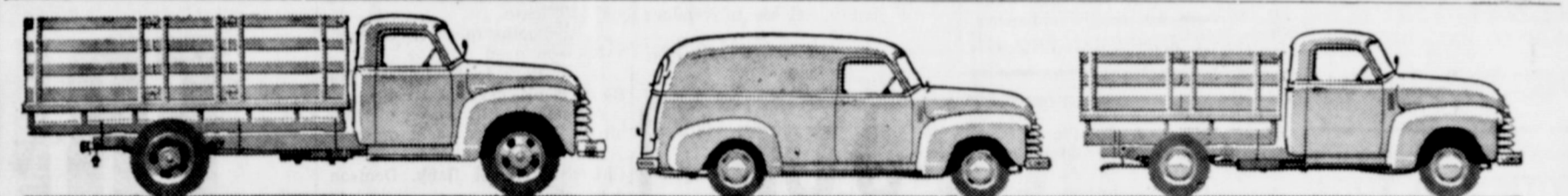

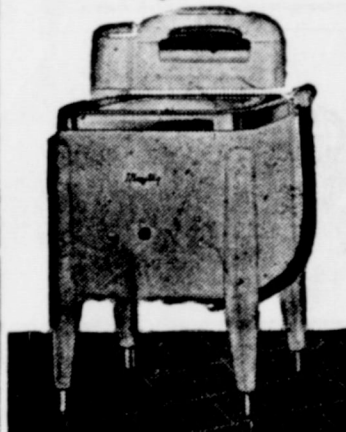

Feather-bedding scheme of Firemen's Union to put an additional fireman on diesel locomotives has been

After a careful study of the first demands of this union, a Presidential Fact Finding Board on May 21, 1943, reported to President Roosevelt that there was no need for an extra fireman on diesel locomotives.

Again, on September 19, 1949, after a second hearing on the union leaders' demands, a second Board reported to President Truman that: "there presently exists no need for an additional fireman . . . upon either the ground of safety or that of efficiency and economy of operation."

Safety Record of Diesels is Outstandingly Good

Although the railroads accepted the Board findings, the union leaders have brazenly rejected them. They represent that an

extra fireman is needed for "safety" reasons. Here's what the Board had to say on that point:

"The safety and on-time performance of diesel electric locomotives operated under current rules have been notably good . . .

"Upon careful analysis of the data submitted on safety, we have concluded that no valid reasons have been shown as a support for the Brotherhood proposal under which a fireman would be required to be at all times continuously in the cab of road diesels. The proposal must be rejected."

The real reason behind these demands is that the union leaders are trying to make jobs where there is no work. In other words, a plain case of "feather-bedding."

The railroads have no intention of yielding to these wasteful make-work demands.

"The Safety Record of Diesels is Outstandingly Good . . ."

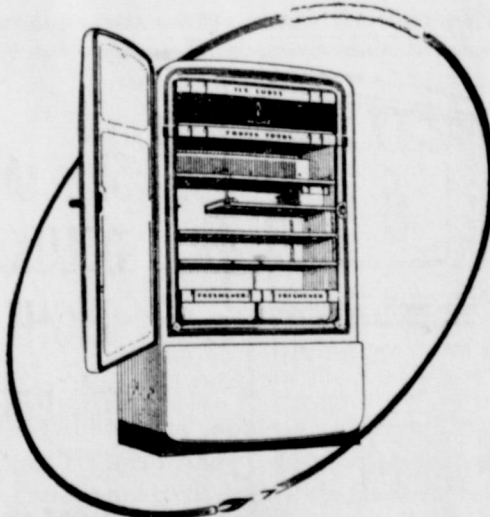

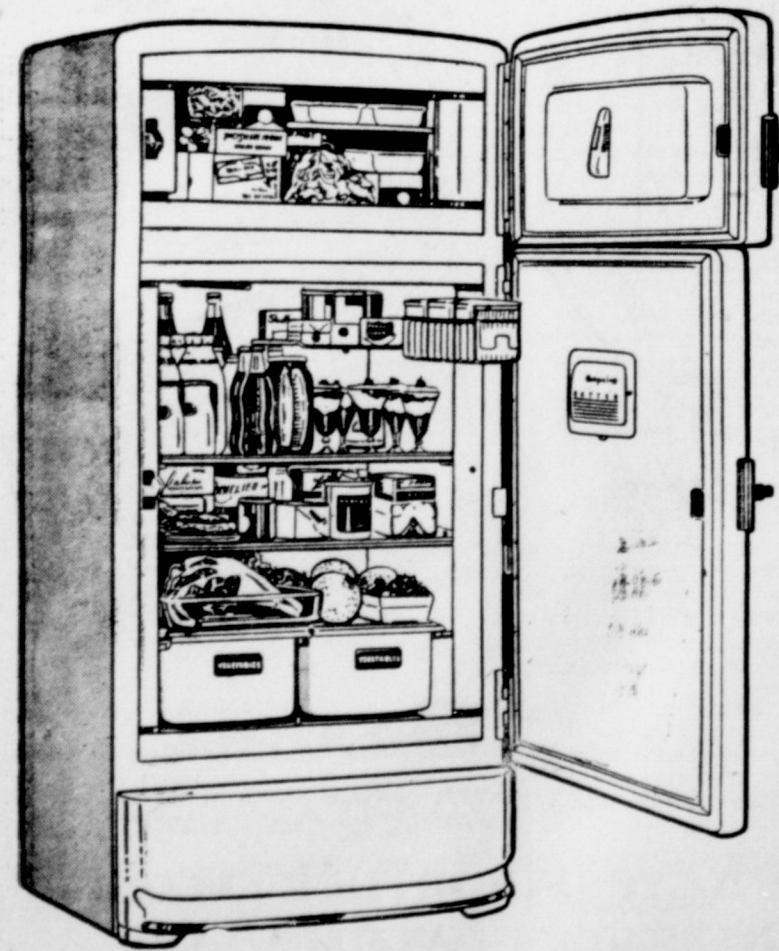
