## Improved Electric Starting Gate Works Fine On Horned Toads

The "starting gate" for next week's Eastland Horned Toad Derby was devised Thursday by the derby engineers, said L. McGraw, general chairman of the event. McGraw's assistant, Ocie Hunt, went to Electric Service Company, for advice on electricity, and devised a way to shock the toads into life. He found, it is estimated, 110 volts to the

little creatures for a short period of time. However, since the skin of the toads is not damp, it is necessary to dampen them to get the method of electroshock to work. Hunt originally had designed a tumbled-out gate, whereby the horned toads were dumped unceremoniously to the floor from a height of several inches to shock them, supposedly, into a running mood. ## County Cotton Quota Upped 500 Acres

### Counted In Census? If Not, Then Act!

If you haven't been counted in this year's federal census, or know anyone who hasn't, please get in touch with the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, was the request this week of Manager H. J. Tanner. Tanner said a similar plea carried by The Record two weeks ago brought in 13 uncounted Eastland people within a space of two days. It is important from the standpoint of the town that every possible citizen be counted, Tanner pointed out, since statistics to be drawn up on the basis of this year's census will determine many things that will happen to Eastland during the coming ten years.

### Siebert Is Acting Principal of EHS

Eastland High School Coach Wendell Siebert Wednesday morning took over as acting principal of Eastland High School as Prentiss Jones, principal for three years, left earlier than expected to take a position with a chemical concern in Austin. Jones earlier had resigned to take the position effective at the end of the school year. School Supt. W. G. Womack said Siebert's coaching schedule for the school year will be largely ended after this week end, and he will have time to take care of the principal's duties for a few weeks. Womack said he has received a "few" applications for the principal's post. He said, however, he does not anticipate any official action on filling the vacant job for some while, possibly not until after the end of school.

### Eastland Scouts To Be In Circus

Numbers of Eastland Boy Scouts will be among the more than 1000 expected to take part in the 8-county Boy Scout Circus to be held in Memorial Hall in Brownwood at 7:30 p. m. Saturday. Scoutmaster J. F. Collins of Troop 103 will have his boys take part in the "Indian Scene and Dances" act and others, and Scoutmaster Bill Brown of Troop 6 will exhibit some of his boys in a tumbling act to be incorporated in the "Scouting Games" act. The circus will be the second in the history of the Comanche Trail Council, and Scout Executive G. N. Quirl of Brownwood said he believed nearly all of the Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts in the council area will take part in the circus. Cub Scouts will have a special act on the program. One stunt by Boy Scouts will be the destruction of a cardboard village by a "tornado," and then the rescue of the victims, and administering of first aid, by the Scouts. Tickets to the circus are being sold by local Cubs and Scouts for 50 cents apiece. Children under 12 accompanied by their parents will be admitted free.

### C. D. Simmons Has Champion Animal Of Dairy Show

C. D. Simmons of Gorman showed the grand champion female at the third annual Eastland County Dairy Show held in Eastland Friday of last week. Sixty-one animals were shown, and R. E. Burleson, dairy specialist of Texas A. & M. College, said the animals shown were far superior in quality to those shown two years ago. Burleson was a judge in both shows. Burleson was assisted in the judging by LeRoy Fry, head of the agriculture department of Abilene Christian College, who opened the show with a talk on the importance of roughage in the dairy animal's diet. In the show, blue ribbon winners were owned by Clyde Herling, Rt. 1, Eastland; Joe Buckley, Rt. 1, Desdemona; Jimmy Webb, Rt. 4, Cisco; George Chandler, Rt. 2, Rising Star; Billy Earl Simpson, Gorman; Dan Jobe, Rt. 4, Cisco; Ronald Jackson, Gorman; Mack McCleskey, Rt. 1, Eastland; C. He must have been pulling his hook out of the water at a fairly good rate and caught the little fish on the fly, a feat he probably couldn't duplicate in a thousand years of trying. Anyway, it's refreshing to get a small fish story after all these big ones over the years. Erwin Shultz, the photographer who runs those baby photo ads in The Record (adv.) says his biggest asset in taking baby photographs is his two-year-old, red-headed son Gary. Other young children naturally are fascinated when Gary wanders into view, and a fascinated baby obviously is a far better photographic subject than a bored one. Gary also seems to have a good time amusing the other children, so everyone is happy with the possible exception of Mrs. Shultz, and I didn't ask her. Eastland High School Band Director T. R. Atwood was not the happiest of men this week after he was castigated, ridiculed, and all but flogged in an editorial in the San Angelo Star-Times. The editorial was based on the story first printed in The Record that the Eastland High band, on the decision of Atwood but on the request of a number of parents of band members, would not go to San Angelo to take part in a band contest. The band went instead last Saturday to Denton, where they had an unofficial part in a contest outside their region, and where they had a bang-up good time. The San Angelo editorial said that Atwood was not taking his band to the contest there because of his fear of a polio epidemic, and went on "Mr. Atwood probably is afraid also of his shadow because it follows him all the time the sun shines. . . ." The editorial then went on to state that San Angelo's polio epidemic had boiled down to only four cases in the hospitals there, and "That's a record that attests the efficacy of control methods adopted here last year." Then, in a masterpiece of inuendo and misleading statements, the writer of the editorial went on to say, "Where there's sunshine there will always be shadows, and there are some who will be ruled by the shadows instead of the vision of success. There are some who build bridges of worry which they would never have to cross if they didn't have such vivid imagination. There are some who run from their problems instead (Continued on page 8)

### Farmers To Get Acreage Allotment Totals From PMA

Eastland County cotton farmers will gain about 500 acres of cotton in acreage control allotments to be mailed in the "next day or two," County PMA Administrator Emmett Powell said Thursday. About 125 to 130 farmers will get the revised allotments made possible under the recent Congressional act, and some of these still may obtain more acreage by appeal, Powell said. The acreage increases were based on past cotton plantings, and farmers that can prove they planted more cotton in the past than was credited to them may appeal and obtain a larger quota, Powell said. However, he urged haste. Two such appeals were heard earlier this week by a panel from Comanche and San Saba Counties, and both farmers were granted an increase, Powell said. Peanut acreage allotments all have been mailed to farmers, the PMA administrator said. After revisions caused by the same congressional act that altered the cotton setup, farmers of the county are being permitted to plant 78.64 percent as many acres in peanuts under the control program as were allotted them last year, Powell said. Originally, the cut had been set at about 30 percent.

### Work On Pecan Grove Produces Results

A 50-acre pecan orchard owned by B. B. Freeman of the Cheaney community produced only 165 pounds of pecans in 1946, but the figure was increased to 3,500 pounds in 1949, Freeman told County Agent J. M. Cooper. Freeman, a farm unit demonstrator of TVA superphosphate fertilizer, attributed fertilization, cover crops, cultivation and spraying as being responsible for the marked increase in yield. Freeman first planted 12 acres of the orchard in vetch and rye in 1946, and in 1947 seeded 40 acres to the cover crop. In 1948, 45 acres was planted, and in 1949, 50 acres. Phosphate fertilizer was applied at planting time, and the crop was turned under in the spring. In 1947, Freeman harvested 800 pounds of pecans, and in 1948, in spite of a dry season, 2,000 pounds of nuts were harvested. Freeman bought a sprayer in the early spring of 1949 to combat the nut case borer. ### Ex-Eastland Man Says 'Goof-balls' Are Menace To American Society

"Goof balls" or sleeping pills were pictured as a menace to American society in a talk in Boston recently by Dr. Harris Isbell, son of Mrs. F. T. Isbell and brother of Mrs. Bob Vaught of Eastland. Dr. Isbell, of the U. S. Public Health Service Hospital of Lexington, Ky., reported at a session of the American College of Physicians that addiction to barbiturates was far more dangerous than addiction to morphine, and that deaths from "goof-ball" poisoning had climbed 300 percent in ten years. Reports of Dr. Isbell's talk were carried on the front pages of Boston newspapers. He said that more than 300 tons of the barbiturate drugs were manufactured last year in this country, and that acute barbiturate intoxication accounted for 25 percent of all cases of poisoning admitted to general hospitals, and that more deaths are caused by barbiturates than by any other poison. Dr. Isbell placed the blame on the growth of "goof ball" addiction on physicians and public health officials who permit addicts to buy phenobarbital, secobarbital and amylal as easily as though they were quite harmless. Dr. Isbell, son of a veteran Eastland doctor who died only recently, was reared in Eastland and attended the schools here. His speech in Boston was described as "startling" by the Boston Herald in a signed front-page article by W. E. Playfair. Dr. Isbell said the symptoms of "goof ball" addiction are a good deal like those of alcoholism, and the treatment also is somewhat similar.

The affair will be held at the Doss Alexander orchard about a mile east of the Pioneer School. 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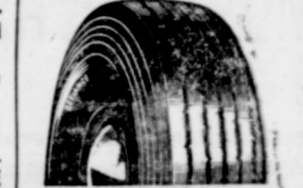

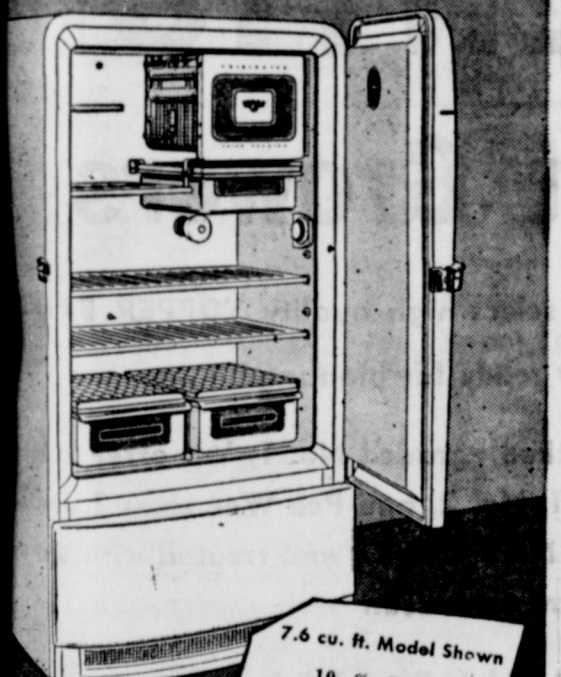

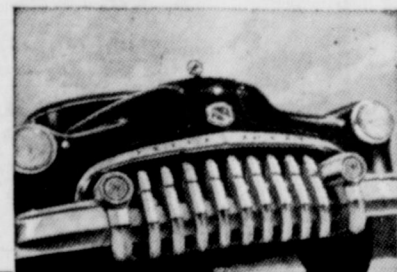

of attacking them. There are some who believe Eastland apparently is in the happy twilight zone where nothing can happen to them save good. But they will never get honorable mention in the contests of mankind if they don't get out and participate in the competition. We believe it is quite all right for the Eastland band to stay at home, but we think they ought to be treated with a chemical solution every morning to keep themselves unspotted from the sins that beset other people. . . .

If San Angelo's polio epidemic was a sin besetting other people, which I refuse to believe, the above is very well and good.

Otherwise, a lot of it seems to lose its point. Atwood didn't take the band to San Angelo, you may recall, because Tom Green County had a very severe polio epidemic last year, and this spring early Atwood saw a newspaper article saying the county had reported 68 cases of polio this year.

Atwood said that regardless of other factors, he would have his band miss anything and everything rather than take a chance on one child getting polio.

And there were other factors involved in the band situation in the district. But you can be your own judge. If you had been Atwood, would you have taken the band to San Angelo?

Well, it's getting around to peanut planting time, and the seasons roll on. A few more weeks and all the seed will be in the ground, and a few more rains like we've been getting, properly spaced, and a crop will be just about assured.

But that's counting the peanuts before they sprout, and maybe we'd better talk about it later.
