Nancy Freyschlag And Stanley Stephen, Valedictorians From First, Top EHS Seniors

Nancy Freyschlag has been named valedictorian of the Eastland High School graduating class of 1950, and Stanley Stephen, salutatorian, it was announced this week by school officials.

Freyschlag, daughter of Mrs. E. E. Freyschlag, graduated with a four-year average of 94.34, and Stephen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Stephen, has a four-year average of 94.34.

Annual feature of the two named the top honor students is the fact that Miss Freyschlag and Stanley Stephen have been in the same classes together since first enrolled in the first in South Ward School.

Freyschlag has won many in her high school career. She is in the band, band sweetheart, is in the chair in the band clarinet, and is student director of the band.

In her sophomore year, she was in a play which won first in the district, and she has been in the junior and seniors. She is editor-in-chief of the Round-up, high school paper, and was a delegate to the State in Austin.

She belongs to these school organizations: Socialite, Dramatic, Photography, Journalism, and Library. She is a student of piano and organ at the Clinton Studio, and an Eastland High representative in the recent interscholastic typing contests.

She has played basketball for two years, is on the library staff, and won medals for highest

grade averages in her sophomore and junior years.

Stephen was valedictorian of his Eastland Junior High School class, and had the highest average in his freshman year in high school.

Last year, he won first place in typing, and also the D. A. R. history essay award.

He occupies first chair as cornetist in the Maverick Band, and has been band drum major for three years, since the band was reorganized. He is a piano student under Robert Clinton, and won first place in piano in the Interscholastic League contests.

He was editor-in-chief of the high school annual this year. He is a member of the Methodist Church choir and the M. Y. F. He plans to study law at the University of Texas.

Eastland High School almost lost its head coach recently when Howard Junior College of Big Spring came a-wooing Wendell Siebert.

Siebert naturally was tempted by the salary offered, which was perhaps \$1500 more than his pay per year in Eastland, and also was told that he could rent a home at a very low monthly rental.

But in Eastland, the coach already owns a home. The main reason he turned down the Big Spring offer, he said, is because he doesn't want to move further west, into the sandstorm area.

He also realizes that most coaches consider most junior college coaching positions as "graveyards" in that they very rarely are stepping stones to bigger and better things.

As to high school coaching jobs—well, look at Rusty Russell of SMU and Blair Cherry of Texas—they both started as high school coaches.

Anyway, Siebert will be with us for a while longer, it appears, and if that is true I am delighted. I've known a lot of coaches in high schools and colleges, and I can't recall any I'd rather have coaching my sons than Wendell Siebert. win, lose or draw.

50 Pecan Growers Attend Field Day

About 50 pecan growers of Eastland and adjoining counties attended the annual Eastland County Pecan Field Day Tuesday on the Doss Alexander place near Pioneer.

County Agent J. M. Cooper said almost everyone present was actively interested in growing pecans, and that the day was one of the best held yet.

Farmers Urged To Hurry And Plant Blackeyed Peas

Eastland County farmers planning to plant black-eyed peas for the dry pea market were urged this week to plant them just as soon as possible.

The L. R. Barron Company of Athens will buy peas of the black-eye variety and also cream, clay, crowder, Chinese red and purple hull varieties.

It has been suggested that at least 25 pounds of seed per acre be planted and the seed be inoculated with the E type of inoculate just prior to planting. The crop should also be fertilized with 4-12-4 fertilizer.

Farmers may purchase seed of the above variety from any seed house or store that they desire. There is no written contract between the grower and purchaser. The Barron Company recently brought a truck-load of seed of the above varieties into the county. They can be purchased at the Golden Oak Feed Store in Gorman.

Peas planted now will be ready for harvest by combine in July and will bring a cash price when cleaned. The Barron Company agreed to set up a cleaning plant and buy the dry peas if as many as 1,000 acres were planted. It was not known just where the cleaning plant would be located. There will not be any charge for cleaning the combine run peas.

Due to the possibility of many farmers planting peanuts for oil stock in the peanut and pea growing areas, there was a definite chance for the price of the dry peas to be higher than at first anticipated.

It is hoped that all farmers who plan to grow peas for the market plant them immediately so as to have all of the acreage in the county mature about the same time.

Taking Of Census Data In County 95 Percent Done

Census taking in Eastland County is 95 percent complete, but the final rounding up of names still has to be done, and the final figures likely will not be released until late in May or early in June, O. O. Odom of Cisco, supervisor for the Eastland-Ranger district of the county, said Thursday.

Odom said there still are four enumerator's districts in his area that are not complete and probably will not be until next week. A like number of districts are incomplete in Esen A. Fields' territory, he said.

Odom said that anyone in the Eastland area who has not been counted in the census should get in touch with H. J. Tanner at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

Elsewhere in the county, a count can be assured by dropping a card to Odom or Fields in Cisco.

Odom said he does not know where any census figures, such as have been rumored around Eastland, could have been obtained.

"I'm the only one who has even a very good idea about the census totals, and I'm sworn not to tell," he said.

Figures will be released from the Regional office in Abilene, he said.

Wingless Chickens To Be Displayed Wednesday In Carl Johnson's Store

Wednesday, May 17, Carl Johnson's Dry Goods will have a free show that will doubtless draw many interested persons who will have an opportunity to see the famous \$500 wingless chickens that lay \$10 eggs. This innovation in the poultry business has received a great deal of recent publicity through Life magazine and newspapers throughout the country.

Peter Baumann, an ex-GI, spent twelve of his thirty-two years experimenting with short-winged chickens until he succeeded in developing a real wingless chicken. Baumann was still in college when it occurred to him that since no one really cared about eating chicken wings, it would be best to get rid of them. There followed the twelve years of cross-breeding freak chickens with stubby wings to culminate in a new breed of chicken that doesn't roam about and grow thin, one easily kept penned, and one that has white meat where the wings used to be.

The chickens can not be bought for any price at present nor can a hundred dollar setting of 12 eggs be purchased at any price, until they are more plentiful and are fully developed into heavier, bigger birds.

Mitchell Ailee and associates think they have a gold mine in wingless chickens. Known for their popular "Alee Work Clothes" for men, their fame is spreading with their interest in this new phase of the poultry business. It will be two years before the wingless chickens appear on the market, but in the meantime, they are multiplying like rabbits on the five acre farm of C. E. Overton north of Grand Prairie, where the original Iowa flock of 174 birds, plus 205 wingless chicks hatched last week, demonstrate that 95 percent of the eggs hatch out wingless chicks.

District Offices Filing Deadline To Be Monday

Anyone wishing to file for a district political office in the Democratic primary had better hurry, because the time is getting short, County Democratic Chairman Oscar Lyerla said this week.

So far, the only contest that has developed for a district office is in that for state representative from the 107th Flatorial District, comprising Eastland and Callahan Counties. L. R. Pearson of Ranger, former holder of the office, and Charles H. Dawson of Cross Plains are opposing each other in that race. Both ran two years ago, and were defeated by Billie Mac Jobe of Putnam, who is not seeking re-election.

State Rep. Turner Collie of Eastland is seeking re-election as member of the Legislature from the 106th District. E. J. Woodward of Sweetwater, member of the State Board of Education, has filed for re-election.

Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, former member of the education board, was out of town Thursday, but Miss Betty Harkrider, her secretary, said she believed Mrs. Perkins still was debating on whether to announce for the board post or not.

Omar Burleson of Anson so far is unopposed for re-election to the U. S. House, and Judge Milburn Long of Abilene, member of the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, also is unopposed so far for re-election.

Outlook Helped For Agriculture By Moisture

Eastland got two inches of rain in the heavy downpour Wednesday night, according to Weatherman J. A. Beard, and the Leon Plant rain gauge measured 1.65 inches after the storm.

The rain rode in on the wings of a norther that drove temperatures down sharply.

Although the rain was somewhat spotty over the county, as usual, farmers and ranchers were happy over all that came. The moisture will delay some peanut and black-eyed pea plantings, but will be a boon to fields already planted, and will help make good stands in fields to be planted.

Stock and dairy farmers now are assured of good pastures well up into the summer.

The moisture also revived home gardens that were beginning to get dry, and assured plenty of lawn mowing for city dwellers.

Among the bigger beneficiaries of the downpour were farmers with vetch fields from which they plan to harvest seed. The rain will make plenty of growth for the vetch between now and harvest time in early June, it was reported.

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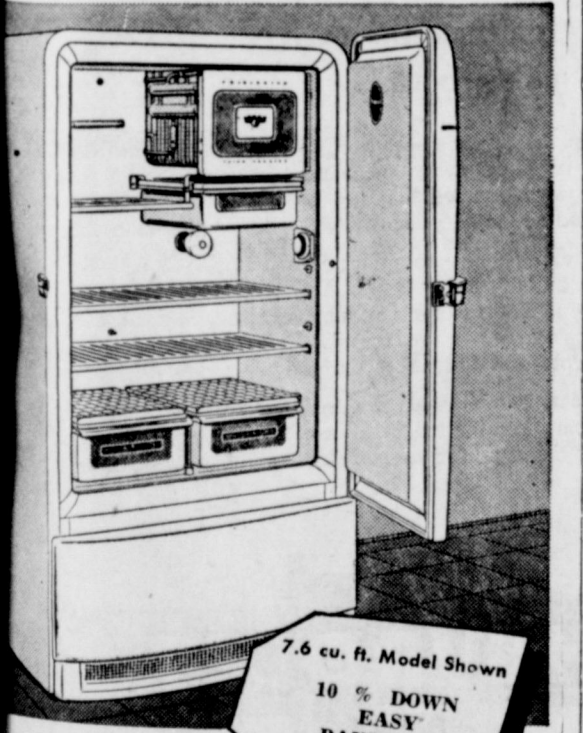

School Census Total Down Again

Eastland's school population continues on the downward path it has been following for quite a few years, School Supt. W. G. Womack revealed this week.

Womack said revised census figures give the Eastland district a school age population of 761, or about 25 less than a year ago.

This figure includes the Grapevine and Bedford districts which were joined to Eastland last year, but does not include Morton Valley, which has signed a contract to send students to school in Eastland again next school year, but still has its own district.

Womack said there are about another hundred scholastics in the Morton Valley district, which will give the combined districts a school population of about 875, compared with about 900 last year.

Womack said that since school financial apportionments from the state no longer are based as much on the school census as they are on average daily attendance, the school census totals no longer have the overwhelming importance to the local districts that they once had.

However, they do reflect an important population trend that may be well to note, he said.

The extra ground would be required if a regulation quarter mile track is to be built. The present school land, Coach Wendell Siebert has said, would be suitable for a track, but is not large enough for a regulation track.

Siebert said the shorter oval would be far preferable to none at all, which is what the school has now, but would not be nearly as good as the regulation length track.

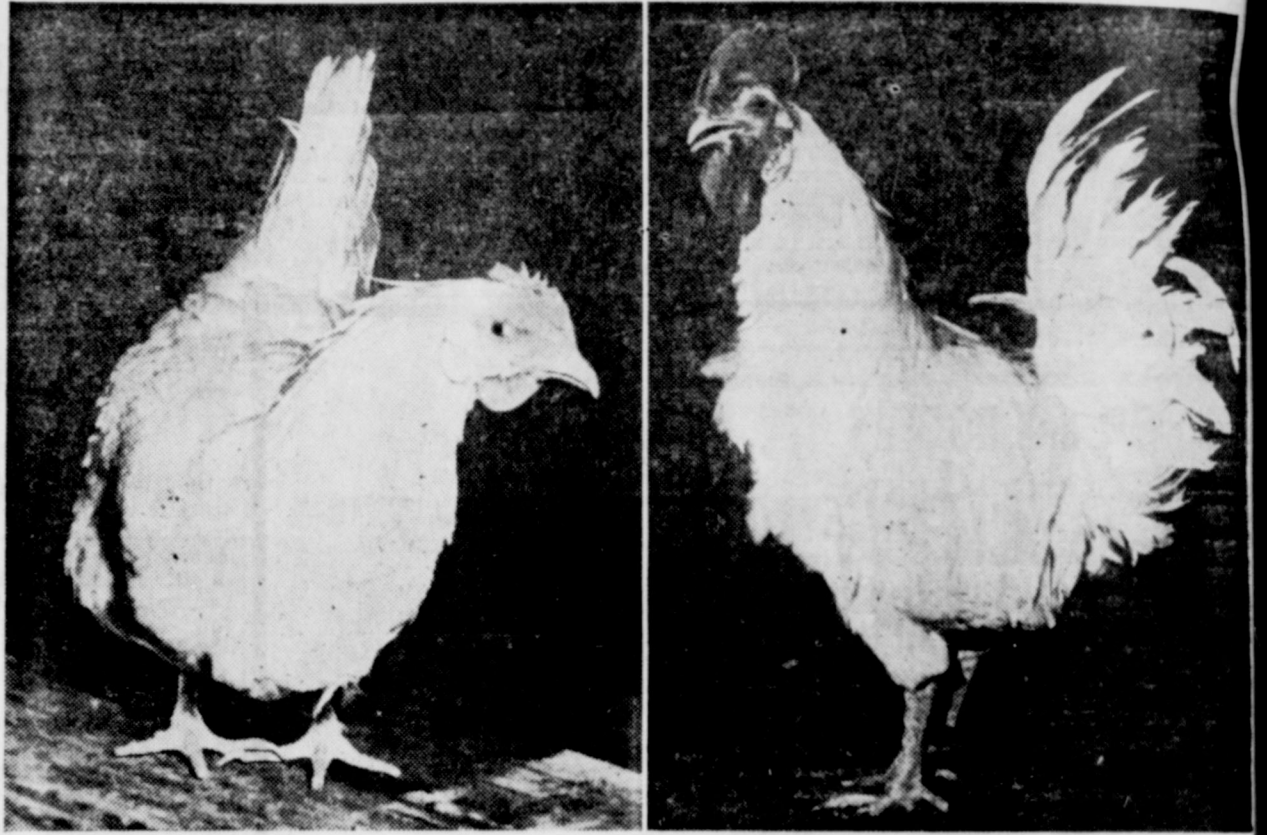
The tennis courts likely will be built of cement, near the two

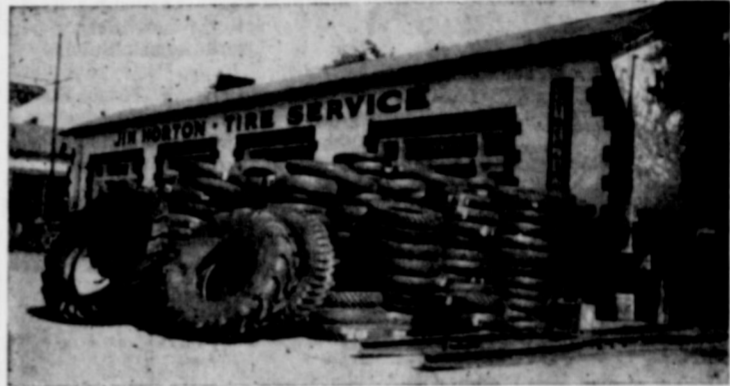

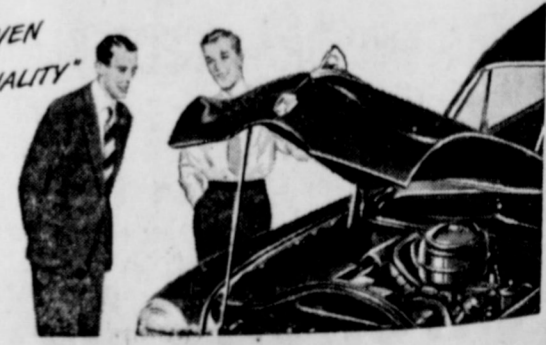

AVOID SPEEDY SUN TAN HEALTH OFFICER WARNS

Summer weather is just around the corner and many Texans will try to acquire a sun tan as quickly as possible. Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, today released a statement concerning the danger of over exposure to the sun.

"Sun stroke is not thought to be due to the heat of the sun, but to certain direct effects of the sun on the human brain. It is likely to occur after the sun has shone excessively on the back of the head and neck," Dr. Cox explained. "This can be prevented by protecting the head and back of the neck from the sunshine," he added.

Dr. Cox asserted that exposure of the skin to the sun has some virtue since the action of the sunshine tends to kill the germs on the skin. Further sunshine produces vitamin D from the fats in the skin and this product is absorbed by the body.

"In general the good effects of sunshine are not due to the heat rays but ultraviolet rays," Dr. Cox stated. "It must be remembered, however, that it is these same rays which burn the skin and extensive application of direct sunshine to the skin may produce painful and severe burns which actually may endanger life."

The state health officer advises those who wish to obtain an extensive suntan to get it by slow degrees. Expose small portions of the skin to the sun for a short period of time. When tanning is established, exposing a greater area for a longer period of time should prove safe and comfortable.
