County's Rural Population Down Slightly, Is Report

The general trend in the rural population of Eastland County has dropped sharply in the last 10 years, according to the 1950 census reports released last week.

Figures show the present population of the county to be 17,541, a decrease of 6,591 from the 1940 population of 24,132.

For Eastland, Ranger, Carbon and Carbon for the county already had been announced.

This week's release from Supervisor Donald Pulver that the population of Eastland is 12,821, an increase of 1,282 from the 1940 population of 11,539.

The 1950 figures are tentative and subject to revision, but it is said that none are apt to be greatly revised.

Of Eastland, Ranger, Carbon, Rising Star and population of the county is 7,951, or about one-third of the total population in the county.

Of these residents live outside the city limits of Eastland.

Others have noted a similar population figures all over the Southwest, and attribute it to increased mechanization of farms, and ownership of tracts, that has dispensed with farmers, and in many cases with tenants and with hired hands.

Of families in rural areas, it has been growing smaller, it is noted.

Farmers Working On Planting, With Rain Finally Over

Farmers of Eastland County were working from "can to can't" and sometimes later—with the aid of tractor headlights—this week as fair, warm weather permitted them to get belated planting done.

There also was quite a lot of haying being done as the sunshine permitted mowing, raking and baling.

After the rainy spring weather, some extra large cuttings of alfalfa were reported, by Leon Bourland and Johnny Aaron of Eastland among others.

But it was the peanut fields that were getting the biggest attention as seed went into the ground as fast as tractor-borne planters could put them there.

There was no way to gather any figures, but one farmer said he would estimate that twice as many acres of peanuts have been planted in the last seven days as in the entire previous planting season.

Pastures were the lushest in modern times, and in many cases resembled the stories told by the pioneers about the stirrup-high grasses that once covered this part of Texas.

Farmers and stockmen were in the market for cattle to fatten on the lush growth, and this factor was believed partly responsible for the spirited bidding for stock that kept prices at near-record highs in cattle auctions in this area this week.

Saturday Deadline For County Filing

The chips will be down and the die cast Saturday in this year's Democratic primary lineup, Oscar Lyerla, county Democratic chairman, said in not exactly those words this week.

For Saturday will be the deadline for filing for county and precinct offices.

Then on Monday, the candidates will get the bad news, when the Eastland County Democratic Executive Committee will meet at 2 p. m. in the Courthouse. Lyerla urged precinct chairmen to be present.

One of the purposes of the session will be to set the amount of assessments candidates must pay to get places on the Democratic primary ballot.

Lyerla said that Saturday, June 24 will be the last day for paying the fees which will be set by the committee Monday.

Lyerla also reminded candidates that they must file their party loyalty affidavit with him before he can place their name on the ballot.

New Wheat Growers Must Sign Up Soon

Farmers of Eastland County who grew no wheat in 1948, 1949 or 1950 and who wish to grow wheat in 1951 have only until June 26 to file applications for new grower allotments, Eastland County PMA Administrator Emmitt Powell said this week.

Applications should be made at the county PMA office in the Courthouse, he said.

Powell said anyone can grow wheat if they like, but new growers, to come under the federal price benefits plan, must file the applications.

Save Half Your Grass, Stockmen Advised

Stock farmers and ranchers in the past thought they had to use all the grass on their pastures, but now they are beginning to realize that if they want to keep the grass they must leave about half of it, to re-seed and to form a mulch on the ground, Henry Turney of the Soil Conservation Service told members of the Eastland County Farm Bureau at a meeting Thursday night of last week.

Turney said that during the last 50 years many a pasture in this area has been ruined because of a lack of respect for grass.

L. R. Higginbottom of Kokomo presided and introduced Turney, and after his talk, gave a number of slight of hand tricks.

On the request of Higginbottom a program committee of Mrs. Ben Freeman and Mrs. Howard Ingram was appointed for next month by

County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Those present voted unanimously in favor of a motion that the farm bureau go on record as endorsing the rural telephone cooperative movement.

R. L. Palmer of Desdemona, a farm bureau director, urged that all members be on hand at the next meeting to help make preparations for the big membership drive.

99 Entries So Far In Old Rip Derby

Ninety-nine entries had been received Thursday night in the Eastland Old Rip Horned Toad Derby, and those whistles and sirens Friday morning undoubtedly were to mark the receipt of the 100th.

Out of the 99 official entries at \$5 each Thursday, 86 were from out of Eastland, almost all from persons to whom Eastland business people had addressed letters of solicitation.

General Chairman L. E. McGraw of the derby committee and H. J. Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, said that when the 100th entry arrived the Eastland time signal whistle at Modern Cleaners will be blown and the fire siren at the City Hall will be sounded.

The two did not say so, but more such noise-making tactics may be expected when the 200th and 300th entries are received.

There were 149 entries in the first big horned toad derby in Eastland a year ago, and the goal this year was set for 300.

Plans for the derby, which will be held Aug. 12 at Firemen's Field, are progressing smoothly, McGraw said.

"We sort of know what to expect this year, and how to prepare for it," he said. "Last year we were shooting in the dark, and didn't really know what we were shooting at."

One of the entries Thursday was from W. G. Vollmer, president of the Texas & Pacific Railway, whose horned toad will be entered under the name of "The Eagle" after the T. & P. crack train that runs through Eastland.

Kuykendall Asks Eastland-Ranger Water Accord

Ranger and Eastland have mutual water problems and should solve them mutually through construction of a dam on the Leon River at the Colony Creek site, Dr. P. M. Kuykendall, chairman of the board of the Eastland County Water District of Ranger, said Monday in a talk before Eastland Rotarians.

Dr. Kuykendall told of efforts to get the dam built with federal financing, and of the survey made by Freese and Nichols of Fort Worth.

He said the water district has given much thought and effort to solving the water problem, but that Eastland must be included in any ultimate plans for the dam—that Ranger cannot do it alone.

The Ranger man pointed out that both Eastland and Ranger will be unable to expand industry, or attract new industry, without more water for industrial purposes.

And the Colony Creek site is not only feasible and economical to build, but would impound sufficient water for 100,000 people, he said.

Injured Ball Player Gets \$71 In Benefit

A total of \$71 cash was made for Truett Norris, Carbon softball catcher who broke his leg and nose last week in a collision on the field, in a double-header benefit game at Firemen's Field in Eastland Wednesday night.

Norris was treated in the Gorman hospital, and returned home Monday to recuperate.

In the games Wednesday, the Willy-Willys Rockettes nosed out the Breckenridge Belles, 5 to 3, and Kilgore's beat Carbon 12 to 5.

It was in a game with Kilgore's that Norris ran under a fly ball and collided with another player on his own team to receive his injuries.

Johnston Well Has Big Showing Of Gas And Oil

Oil outlook for the general area between Eastland and Cisco was brightened a great deal more this week when the E. C. Johnston No. 1 Mahan-Edwards test about a mile east of Cisco blew in in the Ranger section with large quantities of oil and gas.

Oil potential was estimated at 500 barrels a day or over by experienced operators, but the great amount of gas kept anyone from making an accurate check.

The new well is right across the highway from a Lake Sand producer and is not far southwest of a small Lake Sand well brought in a few weeks ago by B. F. Gilchrist of Eastland. Gilchrist indicated this week he would deepen to try the Ranger in his well.

Meanwhile, closer to Eastland, test was awaited on the No. 1 Samuel B. Mize, which had a big showing of gas and good oil show in the Lake Sand. The well was drilled by Bankline Oil Co. of California.

Frank Day of Eastland, who assembled the block for Bankline, said the well will easily make its allowable production of 80 barrels per day.

The Bankline No. 2 Briggs-Owen was drilling ahead at 2710 feet at noon Thursday, and expected to enter the critical zone some time next week.

The well, an offset to the highly successful No. 1, which is a producer from the Lake Sand, is being watched with a great deal of interest because it should indicate potentialities for the new pool.

Leasing and royalty buying was active in the entire area between Eastland and Cisco, although most of the land already was under lease and had been for years.
