Gorman Girl Wins Queen For A Day Contest In County

Miss Adele Fairbetter of Gorman will be "Queen for a Day" on Horned Toad Derby Day in Eastland, Saturday, Aug. 12, it was announced this week.

Miss Ethel Woodard, county home demonstration agent, said Miss Fairbetter won over three other contestants in a contest sponsored by the Eastland County Home Demonstration Council.

In second place was Miss Lydia Faye Houston of Morton Valley, and third was Miss Virginia Weiser of Cisco. Fourth was Miss Sally Hicks of the Sabanno Club.

An elaborate ceremony is planned for the coronation of the queen on the Courthouse steps at 6:30 p. m. Aug. 12, Derby Day.

Miss Woodard said this week that Gorman club women will have charge of the ceremony. Who will crown the queen had not been decided yet.

Votes in the contest were a penny apiece, and the council netted a little over \$350 on the contest, it was announced at a Derby meeting Tuesday night. Proceeds were to go toward council projects.

Work On Installing New Lights Begun

Work is under way on the new mercury vapor light "white way" in downtown Eastland, and City Manager I. C. Heck said it is expected the work will be completed within a week or 10 days.

The lights are being installed on tall steel poles around the square and on streets leading off the square. The work is being done by Texas Electric Service Company.

The power company is bearing the cost of installing the lights, but the city will have to pay for the increased current consumption, under an agreement.

The new lights will give a much brighter light than the old type globes, Heck said, and fewer of the lights are required for proper night lighting.

The mercury vapor lamps give off a blue-green glow. Many of the towns in this area have installed them for street lighting, among them Ranger and De Leon.

Data Is Given On Wettest July Yet

Eastland's wettest July in the memory of old residents bowed out this week to make way for August, which also came in on a wet note.

Weatherman J. A. Beard reported that a half inch of rain fell Tuesday, Aug. 2.

Beard said the rainfall total in July was 5.50 inches. He broke down the total as follows:

On July 5, the total was .15 of an inch; on the seventh, more rain fell, measuring .25, and .10 fell on July 8. On the thirteenth, 1.10 inches fell, and on the fourteenth, 1.15 inches was recorded. On July 15, .75 of an inch fell, and on July 17 another inch fell. On July 27, .80 of an inch was recorded by Beard, and on July 28 an additional .20 of an inch was measured.

13-Month Sentence Given Cisco Man

A sentence of 13 months in federal prison was assessed Charles Earl Owens of Cisco in Federal District Court in Dallas Monday after Owens entered a plea of guilty to taking \$2,000 from a mail pouch in Cisco last July 7.

Owens told the court he slit open a pouch and took the \$2,000 in \$5 bills at the railroad station in Cisco. He left \$1,000 in \$1 bills. The money was part of a shipment from the Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas to the First National Bank at Throckmorton.

The money was spent for a truck, furniture, a load of watermelons and two tricycles for his children, Owens said.

Owens had worked for the Texas & Pacific Railway for about six weeks at the time of the theft. He was arrested by U. S. Postal inspectors a week after the money disappeared.

County Democrats Endorse Truman's Stand On Korea

Eastland County Democrats Saturday endorsed the Truman administration for its stand on the Korean situation, the United Nations for its stand on the same affair, and the Allen Shivers state administration.

The endorsements were made in a resolution adopted by the county Democratic convention held Saturday in the Courthouse in Eastland.

The convention instructed its delegates to the state convention of the party in Mineral Wells Sept. 12 to abide by the unit rule in voting. A resolution calling for a survey of county voting precincts with a view to eliminating some of them was tabled after Earl Conner, Sr., Eastland attorney, pointed out that redistribution of the precincts would come under the duties of the county court.

Cyrus B. Frost, Jr., was elected chairman of the convention, and Mrs. H. M. Lyle of Cisco was named secretary.

L. R. Pearson of Ranger reported for the credentials committee, and moved that all present be seated as delegates from their precincts. Members of the committee were Pearson, Mrs. L. H. McCrea of Cisco, F. S. Perry of Gorman and L. A. Clark of Desdemona.

Virgil Seaberry, Jr., reported for the resolutions committee, which was composed also of Mrs. John Love of Alameda, J. C. Allison of Eastland, T. J. Poe of Long Branch and J. J. Kelly of Ranger.

First 425 Horned Toads Worth Dime

Hey, kids! Bring in your horned toads!

That was the word this week from Eastland Chamber of Commerce Manager H. J. Tanner, who wants 425 horned toads for Eastland's annual Old Rip Horned Toad Derby.

Tanner will pay 10 cents per horned toad, but he does not want any horned toads at all until 9 o'clock Monday morning, he stressed.

At that time he will buy all the large horned toads that are brought in, until he gets 425, and then he will stop buying for another year.

Tanner emphasized that the horned toads must be large ones—"No babies," he said—and must be in good condition.

325 Entries Are In For Horned Toad Derby August 12

Entries in the Eastland Horned Toad Derby to be held Saturday, Aug. 12, totalled 325 Thursday, and Chairman L. E. McGraw of the general derby committee said it now looked as if the total entries might reach a total of 400.

At \$5 an entry, that would mean \$2,000 in the till for the committee. Prizes in the derby will total about \$800.

McGraw appealed for more local entries, saying that while a year ago more than 100 of the 148 paid entries came from local people, this year less than 60 of the entries so far have originated locally.

Final committee plans for the derby were discussed at a session Tuesday night at which McGraw said the whole future success of the affair depends on how this year's derby goes.

It was reported that about 14 local organizations have asked for concession space at the derby, to be held at Firemen's Field, the Eastland softball park.

McGraw said he would not be surprised to see 5,500 to 6,500 people here for the derby. If they come, Eastland must be ready to show them a good time, he warned.

Harts To Teach Swimming Classes

Eddie and Walker Hart again will offer Red Cross swimming and lifesaving courses at the Eastland City Pool this summer if enough people want to take the courses, Eddie Hart said Thursday.

He said that courses are proposed in beginning and intermediate swimming, and in beginning and advanced lifesaving.

Anyone interested in any of the courses was urged to be at the City pool at 7 p. m. Monday to meet the Harts and plan the courses.

Hart stressed that enough people must be interested and willing to attend before any of the courses will be offered.

The classes are to be held in the late afternoon as they were last summer, he said. There will be no charge for the courses, but those studying will pay the regular admittance price to the pool.

Big Well Comes In Nearer Eastland In Briggs Owen Field

The Briggs Owen pool northwest of Eastland moved a step nearer the city Thursday as the Bankline Oil Co. No. 1 Clark came in with strong natural production that was estimated by oil men at from 2,000 to 3,000 barrels of oil per day.

The well is two and three-quarters miles northwest of Eastland, and is an offset to Bankline's production on the Briggs Owen lease. The well is the first brought in by Bankline on the Clark.

The big flow came in naturally in the Lake Sand, and was reported as being a good well without the application of hydrafrac treatment. However, hydrafrac was applied, and the well was to be opened up for a test about 11 a. m. Friday.

Frank Day, who worked up the lease block for Bankline, said the well undoubtedly is the best yet brought in in the new field. He also said that natural flow of the well was so strong that it made the hydrafrac treatment difficult.

The well is located 1,866 feet from the west line and 333 feet from the south line of Sec. 49 in the H&T Survey.

The Clark No. 3 has been started and was drilling around 700 feet Thursday. It is located 1,320 feet from the southeast corner and 330 feet north of the southwest corner of Sec. 49. Location for the No. 2 Clark has been made, but the test has not been spudded.

Trimble Rites Held In Carbon Sunday

Funeral services for Carbon Postmaster W. E. Trimble, 61, who died in a Gorman hospital Thursday of last week after a heart attack, were held Sunday afternoon in the Carbon Methodist Church with Rev. Lively Brown, the pastor, and Rev. Bascom Morton of Coleman, former pastor, officiating.

Burial was in the Carbon Cemetery with Hanner Funeral Home in charge. Masonic rites were held at the graveside.

Mr. Trimble was born in Iredell Oct. 20, 1888, and moved to Carbon with his parents in 1899. In 1907 he was married to Miss Ella Foster. He had been a member of the Methodist Church since his youth, and had held many posts in the church, including that of choir director and superintendent of the Sunday School for 15 years. He was active in civic affairs, and was director of the Carbon band at one time.

Survivors are Mrs. Trimble, a son, John Edward Trimble of Indianapolis, Ind., a brother, Elbert Trimble of Carbon and two sisters, Mrs. Lydia Thurman of Gorman and Mrs. Cora Boyett of Austin.

Boone Begins Work In County As Dairy Herd Inspector

Forrest Boone of Rising Star, dairy herd owner and newly qualified supervisor for the Dairy Herd Improvement Association, has begun testing work on eight dairy herds of the county, he advised County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Boone spent the week of July 10-17 at a D.I.H.A. supervisor's school at Texas A. & M. College, and began the testing work this week at A. Z. Myrick's dairy near Cisco. Others who have enrolled herds for the testing include L. R. Higginbottom of Kokomo, Moseley Bros. of Oiden, L. O. Swindle of Cisco, Raymond Sprawls of Belton, J. C. Caraway of Kokomo, Leo Baum of Cross Plains and Boone.

Once a month, Boone will visit each dairyman enrolled for a night and succeeding morning testing. Each cow's milk will be weighed, and a butterfat sample tested. The feed per cow also will be weighed, and cost records made of the feed. All cows in lactation in the herd will be tested.

The fee for the testing service is nominal, said A. Z. Myrick of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Dairy Association which is sponsoring the service.

"Cows that are not making a profit above feed costs can be detected by this bookkeeping system on individual cows, and they can be culled and replaced," Myrick said.

Library Use Urged By Thursday Club

Members of the Thursday Afternoon Club announced this week that as is the annual custom, August has been named "free reading month" at the Eastland Public Library, and the public was urged to take advantage of this opportunity.

Anyone is privileged to take books from the library without charge, and members of the club pointed out that there are books in the library for all ages and tastes.

There are over 3,000 western volumes, and the children's section has been considerably enlarged.

The best current fiction, as well as books of lasting interest, are to be found in the library, it was pointed out. The building is air conditioned, and well lighted for reading. Tables for reading are provided for adults and children.

The library is open each Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday afternoon from 2 to 5:30 o'clock.

Houghton Brothers Are Taken To Prison

James and Earnest Houghton, Ranger brothers who were sentenced to prison several weeks ago on burglary charges, were taken from the Eastland County Jail to the state prison at Huntsville Monday.

James was sentenced in Eastland County to five years and Earnest was sentenced in Jones County to 10 years.

Sheriff J. B. Williams said that other cases pending against the men in other counties likely will come up in October.

Additional Call Is Received Here For Thirty Men

An additional call for 30 men on Aug. 15 has been made to the Eastland and Stephens Counties Draft Board, Mrs. Jewel Reaves, secretary, said this week.

The board already had been notified to send 20 men for physical examinations on Aug. 8, making a total of 50 men to be called in the two counties.

The men will report to Dallas for physical examinations and then will await call to active duty. Men from 19 to 25 years of age are in the current bracket for calls, but 25-year-olds are scheduled for call first, with the board working down toward the 19-year age group.

Mrs. Reeves said that any men who are registered with the board and have had any change in status, such as getting married, should report such changes to the board in writing. Any change of address should also be reported to the board in writing at once.

Mrs. Reaves explained that it is necessary to have reports in writing in such cases so they can be filed with the men's records in the draft board office in Eastland.

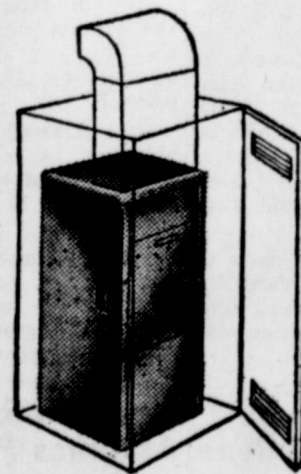

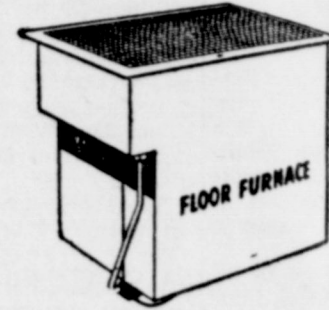

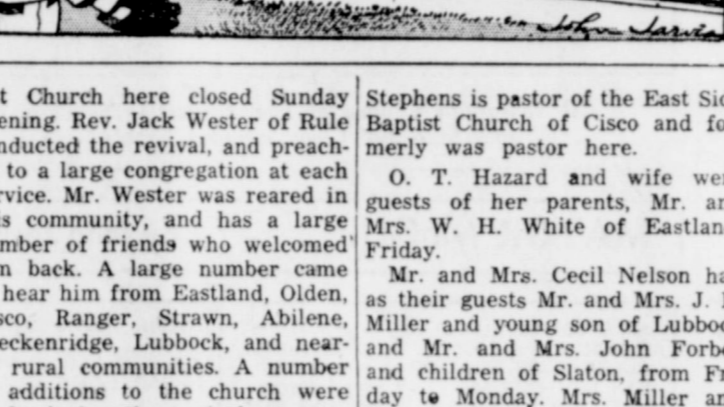

"EASY DOES IT"

WHEN MAKING JELLY or jam, it's best to work with about two quarts of fruit or juice at one time. Working with more will prolong cooking time and cause darkened jellies which often lack flavor.

Use a broad bottomed kettle which gives plenty of room for boiling when making jelly. Once the juice has reached the boiling point, let it boil rapidly until the "jelling" stage is reached, that is, when two drops of syrup run together at the edge of the spoon and sheet off.

Jelly glasses should not be poured too full or it is impossible to seal them perfectly.

Always use fresh paraffin since old paraffin may have foreign matter in it, or may have a musty odor for being used and stored.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Currant-Rhubarb Jelly
1 quart currants
1 quart cut rhubarb
1 cup sugar for each cup juice

Crush currants as they heat. When juice flows freely, pour into a jelly bag to drain. Add 1/4 cup water to the rhubarb, heat until soft, and then place in jelly bag to drain. Combine the juices and bring to a boil with an equal amount of sugar. Boil rapidly until two drops of syrup sheet from the edge of a spoon. Pour, and seal.

Jelly bags may be made of flannel or several thicknesses of cheese cloth. Let the juice drip without squeezing the pulp and you'll have nice, clear jelly.

Wash the jelly bag as soon as you've finished with it. Pouring hot water through it will remove much of the fruit stain. Launder and store carefully for use another time.

Second extractions of juice for jelly making may be made from fruits rich in pectin such as apples, grapes, currants and quinces. Return fruit to kettle, barely cover with water and heat gradually. After the juice simmers for 30 minutes, return to jelly bag.

Second extractions of juice will make cloudy jelly unless the juice is strained several times through several thicknesses of cloth.

Some jellies set slowly, requiring as long as a week to become firm.

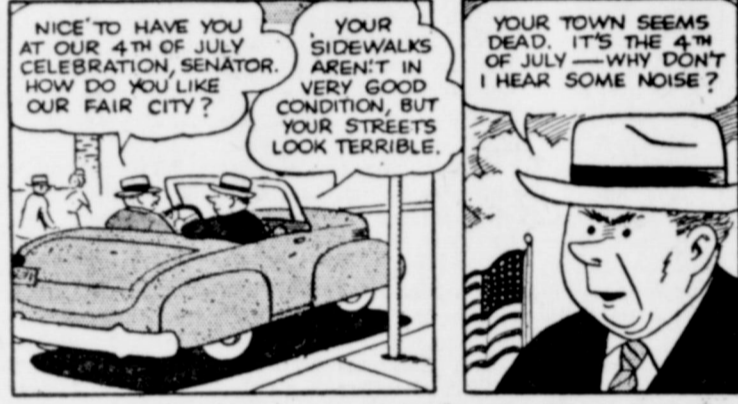

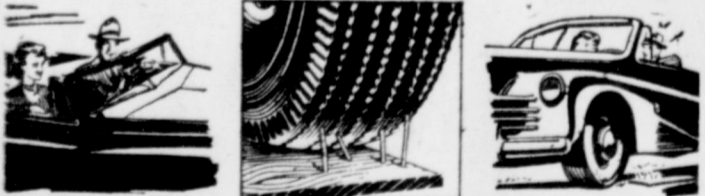
