GAINES VS. NATIONAL GUARD CHARGE AND COUNTER-CHARGE

It raged this week over the head of Milton J. Gaines, Eastland Auto Parts in Eastland, over whether he had an employee, Gene R. Gaeta, that Gaeta would have the National Guard or lose his job.

Gaeta was academic, now, because as Gaines pointed out, he was in the Air Force, stationed at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas. Eastland Recruiting Sgt. Charles Brannon's records show Gaeta went into service July 27.

Whose opinion of the National Guard at this stage is very important, he did sign a letter saying Gaeta would have to get out of the National Guard or lose his job, but that the letter was just a part of a plan to get Gaeta out of the Guard so he could enlist.

On the other hand, Capt. Bruce Harris, who is in command of the 648th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, with headquarters at Ranger, said that Gaeta had told him he would have to get out of the unit or lose his job.

The letter came to light Tuesday when a statement was issued by Adjutant General K. L. Berry citing Gaeta's case and saying employers continue to present this alternative (losing their employees who are members of the Guard, I shall feel free to ask for the assistance of public opinion.")

Statement made by Capt. Bruce Harris, 648th Armored Field Artillery, Ranger, Texas, in reply to a letter from Milton J. Gaines, Eastland, Texas, regarding the National Guard and counter-charge.

For anyone in checking the records, "Rainbow Division" of the National Guard was organized August 1917 from National Guards of 26 states and the District of Columbia.

Gene R. Gaeta enlisted in the 648th Armored Field Artillery, Ranger, Texas, February 1, 1948.

From that time until May, 1949, he missed two drills. On May 11, 1949, he was sent to the C. O. that was in charge of the National Guard. He was told to obtain his release from his employer and he would be necessary.

A letter was received from Gaeta's release from the National Guard. The Unit C. O. called by phone and advised this effect, and asked for his letter. Gaines sent his letter, and the Adjutant General in Ranger.

The contents of the letter by Gaines and on the part of the Adjutant General in Ranger.

To advise that I desire the release of Gene R. Gaeta, one of my employees, from the National Guard. I have informed him of his release from the Guard or his job.

Consideration will be given to this matter.

Big Vote Forecast In Run-off If Signs Mean Anything

Hot run-off races for Eastland County judge, sheriff, and Precinct 1 commissioner have stirred such voter interest that the vote total in Saturday's run-off Democratic primary may be larger than in the first primary in July, if absentee ballot totals are to be trusted as indexes.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. Saturday in the 26 county voting boxes, and will close at 7 p. m.

County Clerk Virgil Love said this week that a total of 245 absentee ballots were cast in the second primary, compared with 201 in the first primary.

Love said that Eastland and Ranger voters cast most of the second primary absentee ballots, possibly indicating interest in the commissioners' run-off race between T. E. (Ed) Castleberry of Rt. 2, Eastland, the incumbent, and Henry Davenport of Ranger, former commissioner.

Other top run-off races in the county are between County Judge P. L. Crossley and John Hart, who is seeking to displace him, and between Sheriff J. B. Williams and Frank Tucker for the sheriff's office.

Only other run-off race in the county is between Porter Woods and C. C. Street for the constable's post in Justice of the Peace Precinct 1, which takes in the City of Eastland.

On the state level, chief interest has been centered on the run-off for the lieutenant governor's post between Pierce Brooks of Dallas and Ben Ramsey of San Augustine. The men have been very active in hurling charges and counter-charges. Run-off races also include those for two Supreme Court places and for the commissioner of agriculture post.

Bankline No. 6 Ready For Hydracac Attempt

Bankline Oil Company's No. 6 Briggs Owen well in the new field northwest of Eastland will receive hydracac treatment Friday or Saturday, it was reported Thursday. Pipe has been cemented and was to be perforated in preparation for the treatment.

Briggs Owen No. 5, which was passed by to drill No. 6, was spudded Thursday. Bankline also has permits for drilling Briggs Owen Nos. 7, 8 and 9.

Gilchrist Drilling Company's No. 6 Tom Choate east of Cisco has been plugged and abandoned after neither oil nor gas shows were encountered in the Ranger sand.

The well first was drilled to the Lake Sand, and then was deepened when a commercial producer could not be developed at that level.

Gorman Man Fined, Jailed On Charges

Billy Joe Dolberry of Gorman was fined \$500 and sentenced to 12 months in jail on aggravated assault charges in County Court Saturday.

Dolberry, 24, pleaded guilty to the charges, which grew out of an alleged attack on his mother, Mrs. Nell Dolberry, the previous Thursday. He will serve the sentence in County Jail.

Soil Cooperators To Make All-day Tour

Cooperators of the northeast portion of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District will gather next Thursday morning, Aug. 31, to spend the day observing conservation plans and practices, according to Supervisor L. R. Higginbottom of Kokomo.

The tour will begin at the Kokomo church arbor at 9:30 a. m., and will be broken in morning and afternoon portions, with free lunch to be served in between at Kokomo, said Higginbottom.

Several conservation plans are to be observed, he said, along with conservation practices such as contour strip crops, cover crops, trashy tillage, plow-burn terraces, waterways, and pasture development.

During the afternoon, the group will see a large brush cutter in operation. The cutter is similar to a stalk cutter, but weighs about 23,000 pounds.

Higginbottom said all farmers and ranchers are invited to make the tours.

The broken arm was Lowell Herring's, received when he tackled tough little Rodney Stephen, 117-pound quarterback, Monday, in the first scrimmage session of the season. Herring, who was out for the center post previously held by several of his brothers, will be out for several weeks at least.

Stephen, despite his size or lack of it, was rapidly winning a place at quarterback. Others who were looking like starters, so far anyway, were Edie Haines, Gerald Davis, Derrell Black, Bob Womack at center, Dickie Evett, and perhaps two or three more.

Freshman Jamie Jessop has been sidelined with an ankle injury received in softball, and Edwin Aaron, who ought to make a first stringer this season, still was out of the picture after a gland infection, which he found out wasn't the mumps after all.

Coach Wendell Siebert said he didn't expect too much of his team at the start of the season because most of the squad is so green, but that later season play may be improved, if there are no serious injuries to key players.

Right now he still has a lot of fundamentals to teach, such as how to block, how to get into the proper stance, how to tackle and how to hold on to a football, the Maverick coach said.

About 800 Expected When School Opens In Eastland Sept. 5

About 800 students are expected in the Eastland schools for the fall term which will begin Tuesday, Sept. 5, School Supt. W. G. Womack said this week.

Eastland High School probably will have a larger than usual enrollment because of the unusually large class of 75 that graduated from Eastland Junior High in the spring.

Registration for high school juniors and seniors will be at the high school at 9 a. m. Friday, Sept. 1, and freshmen and sophomores at the school will register at 1 p. m. the same day, Womack said.

All students in other schools are to register at their schools at 8:40 a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 5.

Womack said school buses are to begin their runs Sept. 5, and that high school students living on bus routes may register on that day if they cannot do so Friday. All buses will run at about the same time they did during the first semester last year, Womack said.

As in the past, pupils in grade school living east of Daugherty Street will attend South Ward School and those west of Daugherty will go to West Ward.

Cafeterias will open Sept. 5, and prices on meals will be the same as last spring, Womack said.

He said that a plan is under consideration to establish a Negro high school in Eastland to serve Eastland, Ranger and Cisco, and is awaiting a final decision in Austin. Such a move would put two Negro teachers in the local colored school instead of one as in the past, Womack said.

Three Animals Die As Deadly Ailment Hits Two Ranches

An outbreak of anthrax, deadly disease of cattle and sheep, in Eastland County apparently is fairly well under control after the deaths of three animals from the disease, authorities said Thursday.

E. V. Slower of Eastland, cattle inspector for the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission, said that a quarantine on movement of livestock in an area of 12,000 to 15,000 acres in Eastland and Stephens Counties has been imposed, and will stay on until danger is past.

The outbreak here apparently has no relation to a much larger anthrax epidemic in northeast Texas, he said.

Slower said the first cattle death in Eastland County was of an animal owned by Pete Kienerd, whose place is about a mile northeast of Ranger. Kienerd's animal died of anthrax about 10 days ago.

Then Monday of this week, two cows owned by G. W. Thorpe died of the disease. Thorpe's ranch is north of Eastland near the Stephens County line.

Slower said that all ranchers who have livestock in pastures adjoining the infected pastures were asked to vaccinate their stock, and that practically all the vaccination work had been completed.

Dr. A. J. Lewis of Lubbock, veterinarian for the livestock commission who came here to help Slower with the disease outbreak, left for home Thursday.

Anthrax is described as a disease deadly to cattle, sheep and goats, in fact almost 100 percent fatal. A vaccine is almost perfect protection, Slower said, but takes from four to six days to take effect.

"With the price of cattle what it is today, vaccination is awfully cheap insurance," he said.

Slower said he and Dr. Lewis could find no connection with the outbreak in northeast Texas, and came to the conclusion that the cases in Eastland County came from old infection of the ground.

The anthrax germ will live in the ground in the form of spores for as long as 30 years, he said.

Thorpe had some sheep die of anthrax about eight or nine years ago, Slower said.

Two From Eastland Ordered To Duty

Travis Harrell, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. O. Harrell of Eastland, has been notified to report Sept. 11 for active duty with the Air Force.

Harrell, who served in the Air Force as a corporal in World War II, and was in the reserve, first was ordered to report Wednesday of this week. He asked for a 20-day deferment and it was granted on the basis of his civil service status as an employee of the Eastland Post Office.

He will report to Brooks Air Force Base in San Antonio for induction, and then will go to Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio for assignment.

Winston Boles of Eastland, who was a staff sergeant in the Air Reserve, already has reported to Brooks Air Force Base for re-induction. He is a veteran of Air Force service in World War II and is the son of C. W. Boles of Eastland. His wife is the former Ima Louise Little of Rt. 1, Eastland.

Accused Man Seized In Cheaney Area

A man wanted on charges of car theft in another state was picked up by FBI agents in the Cheaney community this week and taken to Fort Worth for further investigation.

Sheriff J. B. Williams said the FBI contacted him in search of the man, and inquiry revealed he was visiting in the Cheaney community.
