City Accepts \$2000 For Lake Oil Lease

Edge Of Property Is Two Miles From Briggs Owen Field

Lease of about 250 acres of City of Eastland land near Lake Eastland for \$2,000 cash consideration to the British-American Oil Company was agreed on Saturday at a meeting of the Eastland City Commission.

The lease is for a three-year period, with the oil firm to pay \$1 per year per acre for the last two years if option is taken up for those years, and no oil is being produced.

The lease agreement does not require drilling any wells, it was said. Three other parties submitted lease agreements under which it was proposed to drill wells within a stated period, but none of them would have paid the city at once nearly as much as British-American's offer.

The western edge of the lease is only a little over two miles from the eastern edge of the newly discovered and as yet undefined Briggs Owen field, members of the City Commission were told by Frank Day, who acted on behalf of British-American in the transaction.

The land around the lake was leased on a drilling contract two years ago or so by the Tex Harvey Oil Company, and a well was drilled into the Lake Sand, but no commercial production was found.

However, development of the hydrofrac process since then has made it much more likely that paying wells can be drilled now in the area. The Briggs Owen wells all are producing from the Lake Sand, and some that seemed to be poor producers when first tested showed great production increases after receiving the hydrofrac treatment.

In the Briggs Owen area, Bankline Oil Company's No. 7 Briggs Owen was being completed Thursday, a spokesman for the company said. The test is expected to make a commercial well, he added.

The No. 5 Briggs Owen, which was completed the latter part of last week, was reported to have flowed 100 barrels of oil in five hours through a 20-64 inch choke.

Gilchrist Drilling Company was reported ready to resume drilling after cleaning up a fishing job on the north offset to the Ayres well, which is an offset to the No. 7 Briggs Owen.

W. W. Bradley Thursday spudded the No. 1 Courtney in Sec. 41, Block 4, H&T C Survey. This location is about a mile and a half northeast of the Clark lease in the Briggs Owen field.

Another Kiln Added To Haydite Plant; Workmen Needed

A third kiln will be added at once to the two now being operated at the Eastland plant of the Texas Lightweight Aggregate Company, Charles L. Morruzi of Dallas, president of the company, said in Eastland this week.

Morruzi said the plant now is operating at top capacity, on a 24-hour basis, and still cannot meet the demand for Haydite, lightweight building aggregate produced at the plant from Eastland County clays.

There now are 23 men employed at the plant, and more laborers are needed, Morruzi said.

The plant especially is in need of the services of a good mechanic, he said.

The Haydite plant is located on the Lake Eastland road near the Lakeview Country Club golf course.

Coffee Shop And Bakery To Open

Free doughnuts and coffee will be served to the public all day Saturday to mark the opening of the Eastland Bakery and Coffee Shop at 110 North Seaman Street in Eastland, it was announced this week.

A complete inspection of the newly remodeled and redecorated building was invited by the owners of the establishment, Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Overstreet and Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Elrod, both formerly of Ranger.

Coffee shop fixtures, all new, arrived and were installed this week in the front end of the building.

The coffee shop will feature hamburgers and steaks, it was said. Bakery specialties will be baked to order cakes for weddings, birthdays and parties, and special breads and pastries of all kinds, as well as fancy doughnuts.

The operators of the new Eastland business said they always will welcome inspection of their premises by anyone.

Hours of operation will be 6 a. m. to 10 p. m. daily, it was said.

Desdemona School Robbed Of \$4.35

Burglars entered the school building at Desdemona Monday night and took \$4.35 in cash, Sheriff J. B. Williams said after an investigation.

Sheriff Williams said the burglars, apparently amateurs, did considerable damage, wrecking two doors and ruining a soft drink box door. They also knocked the knob off the safe, but did not get the door open.

School Supt. R. D. Wright told the sheriff that the burglary was discovered Tuesday morning by the janitor.

Dust-Proofing Of Streets Tried

Eastland has begun an experiment with emulsified asphalt unpaved streets to reduce rain and wind erosion and the dust nuisance, City Manager I. C. Heck said this week.

Three strips of city streets have been treated so far, Green Street between Commerce and Plummer, Hill between Mulberry and Daugherty, and Gilmer Street.

All have received one coat and will receive another, Heck said.

The treatment consists of 50 gallons of the emulsion mixed with 900 gallons of water per block.

The emulsion costs only about 12 and a half cents a gallon, and treatment with two coats costs only \$10 to \$12 a block, Heck estimated.

The treatments are supposed to be good for two years, he said, and during that time will save the city maintenance work, including blading, and hauling off dirt washed by rains.

Heck said that it may be possible to process almost all of Eastland's unpaved streets with the treatment, but that many of them will have to have gravel put on first, since the gravel is gone from many.

Barring the unexpected, the city will start gravelling unpaved streets next month, Heck said.

12,000-Volt Shock Kills Marvin Lee

Funeral services for Marvin Lee, 20, of Morton Valley, who was killed Saturday morning in a road construction accident near his residence, were held Sunday afternoon in the Ranger Church of Christ, with burial in the cemetery at Alameda, the former family home.

Young Lee, an employee of the construction firm re-building the highway from Morton Valley to Ranger, was holding a cable on a dragline when the machine hit a 12,000-volt electric line. He was knocked down and apparently killed at one. A passer-by carried him to a Ranger hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

The accident happened almost in front of the Lee residence.

Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Lee, five brothers, Carlton, Jackie, Donald Ray, Virle and Tommie Joe, two sisters, Bobbie Jean and Willene Lee, and his grandparents, Mrs. D. M. Lee and Ike Lee, both of Ranger.

Young Lee was born at Staff and had lived in the county all of his life.

There also will be a display of hand made aluminum trays, the handiwork of home demonstration club members of the county.

All members of federated clubs in the county were invited to attend.

Building Owners Balk, City Calls Off Rat-Proofing Drive

Because owners of only about half the necessary property agreed to pay for the work, Eastland's rat eradication drive has been dropped at this time, it was announced after the City Commission considered the program at a meeting Saturday.

In a statement telling of the history of the program, City Manager I. C. Heck said only 27 owners of Eastland property signed or agreed to sign up to pay for the program. Each property owned was to pay for having his own property rat-proofed.

Heck said the cost to these 27 would have been \$596.25, or about one-fourth of the total estimated cost of the program.

It was estimated the cost would be \$2,189.25 in Eastland.

Another five property owners agreed to do the work themselves, with the estimated cost set at \$582.40, or about one-fourth more of the total.

That left 16 property owners who refused to sign up or did not sign up for the program, and their share of the estimated cost would have been \$1,010.60, or about half of the total estimated cost.

It had been announced when the program first was proposed that all business property owners in Eastland would have to join in before the program could have been put into effect, and two surveys were made to test sentiment.

No opposition was found then, early last spring, Heck said.

However, when the showing of the actual sign-up campaign was reported to the City Commission Saturday, the commissioners voted unanimously to drop the rat eradication program at this time.

"We are sorry it was not possible to carry this program through to completion at this time, as we feel the health of our city should come first on our improvement program," said the statement from the commission.

Under the program, all business buildings in and near downtown Eastland would have been rat-proofed by adding rat-proofing to the existing structures.

Then rats would have been killed out with poison, and a man would have been kept on duty to see that no further rat infestation took place.

Buyer Seeking Blackeyed Peas

Boyd Hilley, operator of a feed business at Gorman, is buying blackeyed peas and other varieties of dried peas on behalf of the L. R. Barron Company of Athens, County Agent J. M. Cooper said this week.

Barron was in Eastland County last spring and told farmers of Eastland County that he would buy dried peas if enough were planted.

Hilley told Cooper that present price is six cents a pound for the blackeyed, cream and purple hull peas, and less for others. Almost all he has bought so far have been of the blackeyed variety, he said.

The dried pea crop is a new one for Eastland County, and how well farmers do will be reflected in future plantings. So far, most farmers report big yields, possibly because of the wet year.

Most of the pea acreage was planted in the sandy land areas near Gorman and between there and Ranger.
