Funeral services for Mrs. Tobe Morton, 65, who died suddenly at her home in Morton Valley Thursday morning, are to be at 3:30 p. m. Friday in the Hamner Funeral Chapel, with burial in the Eastland Cemetery.

Mrs. Morton's death came, apparently of a heart attack, shortly after 6 a. m. Thursday. Members of her family said she had attended a picture show Wednesday evening, and had just finished her breakfast when she was stricken. She was a native of Eastland County, born Jan. 2, 1885, just two miles from the home where she died. She had lived in the Morton Valley community all her life, and her husband is a member of the family for whom the community was named. She was married to Mr. Morton May 14, 1905. Survivors are her husband, two sons, Raleigh Morton of Eastland and A. C. Morton of Wink, three daughters, Mrs. Gladys Hensley of Wink, Mrs. Folia Mae Jarrett of Corsicana, and Mrs. Celia Rae Beck of Eastland. Two sisters, Mrs. Celia J. Cornelius and Mrs. Florence Roper of Eastland, and a brother, Mervin Perkins of Ranger, also survive.

Eastland To Waco Mail Service Set

Mail service on a new highway mail route from Eastland to Waco will begin Dec. 9, according to a letter to Eastland Postmaster E. E. Layton this week from Congressman Omar Burleson.

Three large mail trucks, with interior facilities for handling mail similar to railway mail cars, will be stationed in Waco to make two routes, one southeast to La Grange and one northwest to Eastland.

The Eastland-Waco route will be by way of Carbon, Gorman, De Leon, Dublin, Hico, Hamilton, Gatesville and McGregor.

The Highway Post Office, as Burleson referred to the project recently, is a new development for this part of the country, and is designed to give better mail service to sections of the country that are in need of it.

Now, for example, mail routed to Waco from De Leon and Dublin must go far out of its way, to Fort Worth, before turning back to Waco.

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Kendrick Suit Hearing Delayed For Week

A hearing on the suit filed by the state against J. A. Kendrick et al, which had been scheduled for trial Monday in Eastland County Court, was postponed and now is scheduled for next Monday.

Prior engagement of some of the attorneys in the case was given as a cause for postponement.

The state had condemned some of Kendrick's property near his home on the Eastland-Cisco highway for widening the highway, and Kendrick is asking damages of \$25,000 as a result.

Miss Jane Huestis of Cisco will be the organist. A processional by the choir will open the service and the processional hymn will be "The Church's One Foundation."

Steffan fell and broke his right arm several weeks ago. The arm was further injured in a couple more falls, and surgery was necessary.

Test On Carlisle Property Looking Good To Operators

A mile northwest extension to the Briggs Owen pool of Eastland County was believed assured Thursday when Cooper and Hemphill started drilling the plug in their No. 1 Carlisle after encountering a good show of oil in the Lake Sand.

Pipe had been set and the test started, and operators believed the well would make a good producer without treatment.

The Carlisle is located about a mile northwest of the Briggs Owen discovery well, and is in Sec. 58, Block 4 of the H&TC Ry. Survey.

Particularly heartening to those who have interests in the field was the fact that the well is in line with but considerably further out than the Gilchrist Drilling Co. No. 1 test, which had been abandoned as a failure.

The field thus was establishing itself as eccentric in outline and potentialities, and thus was living up to an old tradition of Eastland County oil pools.

J. J. Lynn's No. 3 Keyes was completed this week for a producer in the Lake Sand, and produced 168 barrels in 24 hours on 16-64 inch choke with 420 pounds of pressure on the casing and 210 pounds on tubing. This well is located 1810 feet from the west line and 2300 feet from the north line of Sec. 48, Block 4.

Bankline Oil was drilling Thursday on their No. 6 Clark and No. 7 was in the process of being completed for a producer in the Lake Sand after encountering only a slight showing of oil in the Duffer pay. The well was plugged back to the Lake and will be completed at that level for a producer.

The W. W. Bradley No. 5 Courtney was reported Thursday to be making 70 barrels through 3-4 inch choke, with 150 pounds of casing pressure and 87 pounds on tubing. This is a Strawn sand producer. The pay level is 1644 to 1650 feet. The well is in Sec. 41, Block 4.

Pipe has been set for a test in the Ranger sand in the Phillips et al No. 1 Smith in Section 60, Block 4 of the survey.

Joe Ben Koonce Again Wins Honor

Joe Ben Koonce repeated at the Texas State Fair last week when his 735-pound Shorthorn beef steer White Flash won the reserve championship of Shorthorn classes at the State Fair of Texas.

Young Koonce had won the same honors at the show a year ago with his "Butch."

White Flash first took first place in the light weight Shorthorn division in the show, reported Assistant County Agent Ed Steele, Jr., and then went on to the reserve championship.

Joe Ben received \$25 for his blue ribbon and \$40 for the reserve champion honor, for a total of \$65 in prize money.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. B. O. Koonce of Desdemona, who have an outstanding herd of registered Shorthorn cattle.

Joe Ben plans to exhibit White Flash and a smaller red Shorthorn in the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth in January. He has been feeding steers for several years.

Junior High Dogies To Wind Up Season

The Eastland Junior High School Dogies will wind up their 1950 football season next week with two games, after meeting Carbon Thursday night.

A game with Cisco is scheduled Tuesday night, but it was indicated the game probably will be moved up to Monday night. Then Thursday night of next week the Dogies will play a return contest with Carbon at Carbon.

The team, after a disastrous beginning, has rounded into a well-coached and cohesive unit and has been putting up good opposition recently, although most of the team members are only in the sixth grade.

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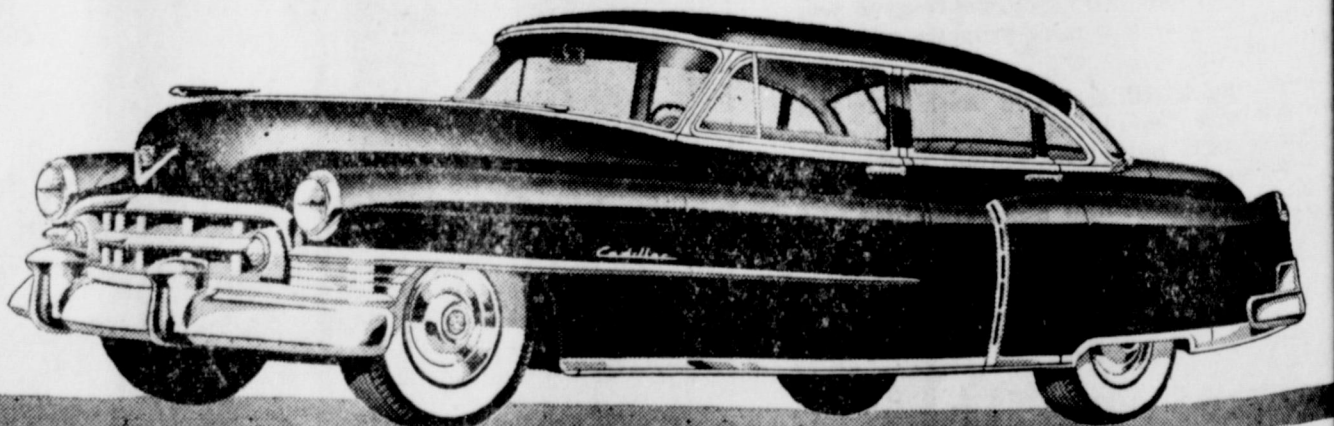
