## Results Of Warfarin In Killing Rats Are Called Good

Warfarin, a new rat killer developed by the University of Wisconsin Research Foundation, appears to be one of the most effective poisons available for the control of rats and mice.

The active ingredient of the new

poison is coumarin, a compound found in sweet clover which affects the clotting of blood, according to County Agent J. M. Cooper. Rats that have eaten Warfarin baits for several days become less active, develop internal hemorrhages and slowly bleed to death.

Cooper said that one advantage of Warfarin over many of the other rat poisons is that it is odorless and tasteless. Rats will continue to eat the bait until they die without detecting the presence of the poison. Warfarin is poisonous to all warm blooded animals, but the amount recommended for controlling rats and mice is so small that the danger is lessened for other farm animals unless they eat it several times.

It is necessary for the rodents to eat the baits three or more times within a period of a week. It is not a quick killing poison, as usually over a week is elapsed before any noticeable decrease in the rat population is observed.

The new bait is now available in Eastland at the Perkins Tractor and Implement Co. at a very nominal cost. The material was prepared by the Rodent Control Service of the Federal Government at San Antonio. Those who have used it and followed instructions have been well pleased with the results, Cooper said.

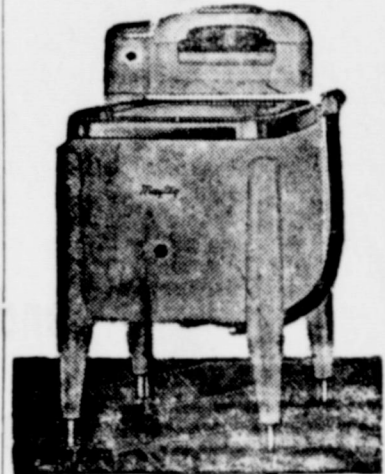
