Good Pasture Management Pays Off, Cisco Rancher Finds In Four-Year Test

Good range management pays off in increased yields, according to Jesse Reynolds, who operates a ranch near Cisco.

With the help of Soil Conservation Service technicians, Reynolds has made clippings and kept records of grass growth on two adjacent plots for the last four years. One plot is located in an excellent pasture, while the other is just across the fence in an overgrazed pasture.

Examinations Set For Carbon Postmaster

Carbon residents are eligible for open competitive examinations to fill the positions of postmaster at Carbon, the test to be given in Eastland, it was announced by the Post Office Department.

Applications to take the examination must be mailed to the United States Civil Service Commission, and must reach that agency by Dec. 14.

The Carbon third class post office rating gives the postmaster there a salary of \$3070 a year.

W. M. Coppock III After Heart Attack

W. M. Coppock, City of Eastland streets, water and park superintendent and a veteran city employee, was under treatment Tuesday in West Texas Hospital in Ranger for a serious heart condition.

He was taken to the hospital after a heart attack early Sunday. Doctors said he likely will be in the hospital for some time because of the seriousness of his condition, and because of complicating factors.

Second Suit Filed In Kendrick Case

Eastland County Tuesday filed a second condemnation suit against J. A. Kendrick in an effort to secure right of way for the State of Texas for the widening of Highway 80 between Eastland and Cisco.

The suit was filed on behalf of the state after an earlier suit had been dismissed and an effort to settle the matter out of court had failed.

Kendrick was offered \$544.15 for the right of way in front of his rock home, after a commission had arrived at that figure, but in answer to the condemnation suit, Kendrick asked \$25,000 in damages. He charged the highway right of way would come within a few feet of his front porch.

Both suits were filed in County Court. No date has been set yet for hearing the new suit.

Another Producer Added To Total In Lake Sand Field

Another producer has been added to the Briggs Owen field northwest of Eastland as the No. 3 Fairbairn was reported Tuesday to be making about 11 barrels of oil an hour.

The well was treated in the Lake Sand with Hydrafrac and opened up Monday. After cleaning out, the estimated flow was logged.

Activity in the area is picking up steadily, as more locations are spotted and tests started. Bankline Oil Co. Tuesday started drilling on its No. 1 Mize in the southwest quarter of Section 48.

Drilling also has started on the Douglas No. 1 Harlow in Section 63, and on the Feldman No. 1 in Section 47, H&TC Survey. All are Lake Sand tests.

Bankline plans to Hydrafrac the No. 1 Jesse Reynolds Wednesday and the Bradley No. 12 was being perforated and prepared for the Hydrafrac treatment Tuesday.

Evans and others have started their Davenport No. 1, and surface pipe was set Monday night.

The Bradley No. 13 was drilling around 500 feet Tuesday.

Walker Is Served With Suit Papers

Eastland County Delinquent Tax Collector Horace Walker has been served notice of the suit brought against him for \$101,229.24 in Eastland County by the State of Texas, and has until Dec. 11 to file an answer to the suit.

Eastland County Sheriff J. B. Williams said papers were returned to his office from the Dallas County sheriff's office showing that Walker had been served in that county.

The suit, which names Walker and his bonding company, accuses Walker of withholding the sum in question from payment to the state and county after he had collected it in delinquent taxes. The suit named numerous instances of alleged practices of this sort.

Walker, in a statement to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, said the practices charged in the suit were those that were commonly accepted, and that no fraud or other untoward practices were involved.

Five Are Seniors, Eight Juniors, One Soph, One Fresh

Fifteen lettermen for the 1950 football season were announced Tuesday by Eastland High School Coaches Wendell Siebert and Ed Hooker.

Of the 15, five saw their last service in football in the game with Cisco Friday. They are Doug King, Gerald Davis, Bob Womack, James Freeman and John Burleson.

Eight of the lettermen are juniors, including Rodney Stephen, Eddie Hair, Edwin Aston, Dick Evatt, Morris Lee Riggan, Derrell Black, Larry Miller and Harold Justice.

There is one sophomore letterman, Norman Watson, and one freshman, Hill Gaeta.

This is the first time in a number of years that a freshman has lettered at Eastland High in football.

Three freshmen, Laverne Meroney, Jamie Jessop, and Alan Vermillion, came close to having enough playing time for letters.

Under Interscholastic League rules, seniors may be given jackets valued at not more than \$15, and other players at not more than \$10.

For Eastland football fans, it is interesting to note that of the 12 lettermen who had the most playing time, eight will be back next year, barring incidents of various kinds.

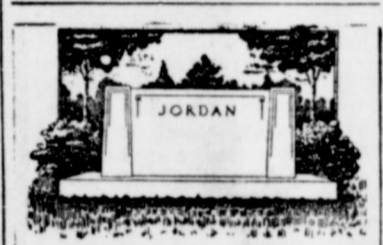
