FBI WORKING ON PHOENIX BANK ROBBERY

PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 9 (UP)—Federal Agents marshalled an all-out search of the Phoenix area today for two daring bandits who stole \$116,250 from the Bank of Douglas.

Local Federal Bureau of Investigation Chief William Murphy said the manhunt centered in the Mexican and Negro districts of South Phoenix.

"We're working on the theory they're hidden out in this area," he said.

The robbers were a negro, about 30, and a Mexican, between 25 and 30.

But police and sheriff's deputies still manned roadblocks on all highways leading out of Phoenix.

The barriers were set up only 15 minutes after bank officials sounded the alarm early yesterday, and officers still were stopping all suspicious-looking cars, especially those with California license plates.

It was an auto with California plates that the holdup used to escape in after they casually walked from the bang carrying a garbage can crammed full of bills ranging in size from \$1 to \$100.

Inside the bank they left seven employes bound and locked in a closet. Other members of the staff gave the alarm when they arrived for work at 8 A.M.

JOHN BEN SHEPPERD NEW SECRETARY OF STATE

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 9 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers today announced appointment of John Ben Shepperd of Gladewater as Secretary of State.

He succeeds Ben Ramsey who resigned last Sunday to enter the race for Lieutenant Governor. Shepperd's appointment, effective tomorrow, is subject to Senate confirmation. However, swift approval was expected in the Upper Chamber.

The appointment came as no surprise. Earlier in the week, the governor signed out the young Gladewater attorney and former National President of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce as a man "admirably fitted" for the job.

Shivers said he based his appointment on Shepperd's wide acquaintance in business circles and his interest in state government reorganization.

Traditionally, the Secretary of State is the top official closest politically to the governor.

Dallas Negro's Home Bombed

DALLAS, Tex., Feb. 9 (UP)—Police today kept a 24-hour watch over a restricted neighborhood where a negro's house was damaged by a bomb blast.

Horace Boelner, occupant of the house, said the windows on one side were shattered by the blast while he was sleeping last night.

Police said damage to the building amounted to about \$100 and that the crudely-fashioned bomb had little power.

Noener said he had not had any trouble with white residents of the neighborhood. He told police he bought the house recently for \$6,000.

The neighborhood was restricted to white residents until last Jan. 1. At that time the restriction was lifted automatically and several white residents sold their homes to negroes and moved to other neighborhoods.

CHECK FORGER AT WORK AGAIN IN RANGER

At least three Ranger merchants were holding forged checks this morning and another would have been had not the manager recognized an attempt to cash a check as a forgery.

The man who passed checks at three Ranger firms attempted to cash a check at the J. C. Penney Company. The check was signed with the name of a man whom Joe N. Graham, Penney manager, knew and who has moved to South Texas. The man offering the check stated that it was for labor for the man whose name was on the check. Graham said that he knew that this could not be true as the man was no longer here and besides, Graham was familiar with the correct signature of the former resident.

He comforted the check forger with that information and the man was "ready to leave", Graham said. While Graham was attempting to get in touch with police the man made his getaway. Graham said that in his haste he had not secured a very clear description of the man.

At one of the other stores where the check was presented the manager called the bank to determine if there was any such account. There was an account in the name of the signature on the check. But when the check went to the bank, the forgery was discovered and the merchant notified.

Chief W. G. Pound stated that a thorough search was made for the man but no trace of him was found. In connection with this most recent flurry of forgery, Chief Pounds again issued a warning to merchants to beware of cashing checks for strangers.

Ranger, Dallas Men Indicted For Burglary

James A. Houghton of Ranger and Thomas Bruner of Dallas have each been indicted on counts of burglar of the Van Gardenhire home in Cisco.

Bond for the two has been set at \$2,000.

The charges of burglary followed the arrest of the two in Eastland Saturday. The arrest was made on suspicion but investigating officers found loot taken from the Gardenhire home and two pistols and a blackjack in the car.

The two are being held in the Eastland County Jail.

Unidentified Man Found In Bayou

HOUSTON, Tex., Feb. 9 (UP)—The body of an unidentified white man was found floating in Buffalo Bayou here early today.

Police said the only identifying mark was the name, "B. H. Weeks," printed inside the waistband of the trousers. All other means of identification had vanished.

The middle-aged man was neatly dressed, officers said. There were no marks of violence except slightly skinned surfaces on the backs of the hands.

Rose Jewelry Robbery Solved

NEW YORK, Feb. 9 (UP)—The \$100,000 Billy Rose jewel robbery has been solved, a high police official disclosed today.

The official, who refused to let his name be used, said two men had been arrested in New York and a third was being brought here from out of town.

"These three are definitely the Billy Rose bandits," the official said.

Three bandits invaded the swank east side home of the half pint showman on Jan. 26, forcing their way past negro butler, James McDonald, 35.

After trussing up McDonald, the three men carryin pistols looted Rose's upstairs bedroom, carrying away a safe full of jewelry and some furs. Rose estimated the entire loot at \$100,000. Police said the jewels and furs were worth only \$25,000, but Rose has insisted his original estimate was correct.

The high police official who announced the case's solution said McDonald was questioned night-long along with the members of the gang who had been arrested. McDonald has been held in \$100,000 bail as a material witness.

Rose had offered a \$5,000 reward for the capture of the bandits.

At the time of the robbery Rose and his wife, the former olympic swimming champion Eleanor Holm were away from home attending a Broadway Stage opening.

"I'm glad baby had her welp on," Rose said when he learned of the robbery, referring to \$250,000 in diamonds which Mrs. Rose wore to the opening.

FPC To Hear Plea For Expansion

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9 (UP)—The Federal Power Commission will hold a meeting here March 7 on an application of the Tennessee Gas Transmission Co., Houston, Tex., to expand its natural gas pipeline system.

The company asked for authority to expand its system by 250,000,000 (M) cubic feet of gas a day to enable delivery of 1,310,000,000 (B) cubic feet to the East coast. Total cost of the project was estimated at \$118,644,000 (M).

Included in the project would be construction of 786-miles or supplemental line along Tennessee's line between San Salvador field in Texas and Buffalo, N. Y.

Five Die In Albany Fire

ALBANY, Feb. 9 (UP)—A young unemployed truck driver, his wife and three children burned to death today when an explosion and fire destroyed their basement apartment.

Eight other occupants of the building escaped.

The dead were: Norbert Heppelle, 28, his wife, Margaret, 24, and their children, Theodore, 3, Gail, 16 months, and Henry, three months.

SENATE AWAITS HOUSE APPROVAL OF TAXES

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 9 (UP)—The Senate, having approved more than 20,000,000 in appropriations for improvement of the state hospital system, today looked to the house to speed up work on tax bills necessary to raise the money.

The house revenue and taxation committee approved the tax bills, two of them backed by the administration, but the full house balked at debate or other action on them until they were pruned formally.

House leaders hoped to have copies of at least one of the tax bills ready for distribution during the day.

Two of the money-raising measures approved in the house revenue and taxation committee were backed by the administration. The third, offered by Rep. Jimmy Horan of Archer, would put a one-cent-per-1,000 cubic feet tax on natural gas gathered, with additional levies on a graduated scale as the price increased above five cents.

The administration-backed bills would place in additional one-cent-per-pack tax on cigarettes and a flat 10 per cent increase of the omnibus tax.

GUNMEN ROB SALESMAN OF \$200,000 IN JEWELS

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 9 (UP)—Two gunmen robbed a jewelry salesman's apartment of diamonds valued at \$200,000 retail after one of them posed as a telegraph messenger to get inside.

Salesman Milton Cohen, 35, said the loot was a recent consignment from his employers, the New York wholesale jewelry firm of H. Hamburger. It was completely insured and had a wholesale value in excess of \$60,000 he said.

A man dressed as a messenger rang the Cohens' doorbell last night, he said, and told Mrs. Anna Cohen, 35, he had a package for which only her husband could sign.

Mrs. Cohen kept a chain latched on the door until her husband arrived to let the delivery man in. Once inside, the messenger pulled a pistol and herded the couple into the kitchen.

The bandit forced them to lie face downward on the floor, then admitted his confederate through a rear door.

"Where is the stuff?" Cohen said one of them demanded repeatedly.

He finally found the jewelry hidden in a black traveling case under a bathroom towel, Cohen said.

The case, secured by a combination lock, contained cut and uncut diamonds, some of them mounted.

The bandits then stole a coat and shirt as a change of clothing for the one disguised as a messenger.

They also took jewelry and a watch owned by Mrs. Cohen worth a total of \$1,580, although they left the gem salesman's watch and wallet.

After the holdup the men escaped through the back door, Cohen called police.

Money derived from these taxes would be used to streamline the state's ragged hospital system.

Rep. Vernon McDaniel of Wichita Falls and Rep. William Swindell of Commerce came forth yesterday with another tax measure, the seventh of the special session.

They proposed an across-the-board one-cent boost in the natural gas tax, estimating it would raise \$50,000,000 yearly toward operating and maintaining state institutions.

In a major action of the special session, the senate approved more than \$20,000,000 in appropriations for improving the hospital system.

Only one member, Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, dissented on the 1951 budget prepared by the House appropriations committee.

However, the senate passed two amendments on the 1951 operating budget, which totaled \$20,658,628.

One added \$23,500 to finance a surplus commodity distributing agency in the state and the other struck out \$2,40,000 construction allocation from the youth development Council Budget. Sen. Otis Lock of Lufkin said he would propose inclusion of the construction program in the state hospital building plan.

Of the total budget, \$20,170,628 will be used for operating the state's hospitals and three youth development council training institutions for the fiscal year ending Aug. 31, 1951.

The rest, \$488,000, will tide the hospitals over until the present fiscal year ends.

Both now go to the house floor for action.

he was a great big fellow, or because he was a lilliputian, I would feel like resigning," the ad quotes Judge Atwell. "I do not know we don't want a case to occur in America that the size is going to be decided by a man's physical characteristics."

Judge Atwell, the ad also says, told the anti-trust lawyers "if the judgment is not good then it is better to find out before an expensive trial than it is after an expensive trial. I do not think it is good, and thinking that, it is my duty to sustain the demurrers and motion to quash."

Captioned "The third time the anti-trust lawyers were wrong," the advertisement reviews two other actions—The Washington, D. C. bread case and the Wilson, N. C. Potato case—in which Federal Judges found no evidence to support "damaging" charges brought by anti-trust lawyers against A&P.

The anti-trust lawyers are "still determined to destroy A&P," the ad continues, but it adds, "Everything that has happened since this suit was filed proves that the American people don't want A&P destroyed." The ad cites how supplies, unions, competitors, newspapers through editorials and people "in all walks of life" have rallied to A&P support.

"The housewives of this nation, whose patronage has made this company big, are buying from us in increasing members and increasing volume," the ad says. "Apparently most Americans do not want to let the anti-trust lawyers in Washington blow the whistle on any businessman who does a better and more efficient job and grows big in the process.
