AN IMPORTANT ISSUE, which residents of this area need to be concerned about, is the proposal which the U.S. government has to dump nuclear wastes in this area.

So far, test holes have been drilled by the government in Deaf Smith County and in Swisher County. Residents of these areas, along with most people in the entire Panhandle, are entirely opposed to such a program.

As much land as there is in such states as Nevada and Utah, where you can drive for miles without seeing so much as a jackrabbit, it seems so foolish to even be considering a nuclear waste disposal in an area which (1) supports people, and (2) grows the majority of the nation's foodstuffs.

Between constantly having to fight the government on such issues as the MX and nuclear wastes, plus the inability to get legislation favoring agriculture, one would almost think that there is a conspiracy in Washington to do away with the farmer, or at least farming as we have known it in this area.

But if this happens, what is the nation going to do for its foodstuff? We would like to have an answer to this question.

The Rains Came -- But So Did Hail

It seems that the long awaited rains have finally come, but, sadly enough, the good news had to share the spotlight with some bad, since many area farmers lost at least a part of their crop due to hail Monday night.

According to reports received Tuesday morning, the heavy hail and high winds were the two contributing factors responsible for most of the major crop damage in this area.

It was also reported in Bovina proper, that the city received some golfball-sized hail, which played havoc with trees, homes and small outside plants.

Reports of this nature came from residents in the Ridgelea addition and also on the more southern and western parts of town.

Sue Fowler reported that their farm had received about 1.4 inches of rain, and heavy hail, up to marble size, as well as high winds. She mentioned that they were probably looking to replant their cotton, but were unsure at the time she was contacted.

Ona Patterson at Rhea said they received a nice rain, but were fortunate enough to be excluded from the hail Monday night. She said they had received about 2.6 inches of moisture.

Sherley Grain at Rhea reported about ½ inch Monday night, with no hail.

Black Farm Supply said they had no hail and only about 2/10ths of an inch of rain last Monday.

Friona Feed yard reported that they had received about 1½ inches of rain, but no hail or high winds.

At the Oklahoma Lane Farm Store, a source there indicated that at the store, itself, there was only 2/10ths of an inch of rain and no hail, and they said they thought that this was the "norm" in that area, as far as rain and weather conditions went Monday night.

Harry Johnson at Sherley Grain in Bovina reported that on his farm, they had lost their cotton and wheat, and also said that although the hail was less than marble-size, the high winds were the major factor in the damage.

Johnson said they received about one inch of rain.

Other unconfirmed reports listed damage to the farms of Tom Ware, Thomas Rhodes, Tommy Williams, Kim Rundell, Gregg Bell and many others.

Rose McCain said that they

received about an inch of rain and "about four inches of hail." She added that she was kidding (about the amount of hail) but indicated that the hail really did considerable damage to their crops. She also said that tree limbs on some of their trees sustained damage as well.

In the Lazbuddie area, reports indicated that farmers in that area got as little as an inch, all the way up to 2½ inches of rain.

It was also stated that most of the hail received in that area was to the south and that some farmers were reporting that they had lost their

crops, according to Jerry Barber at Sherley-Anderson Elevator at Lazbuddie.

In the Ridgelea addition of Bovina there was hail and wind sufficient to do damage to some of the homes in that area.

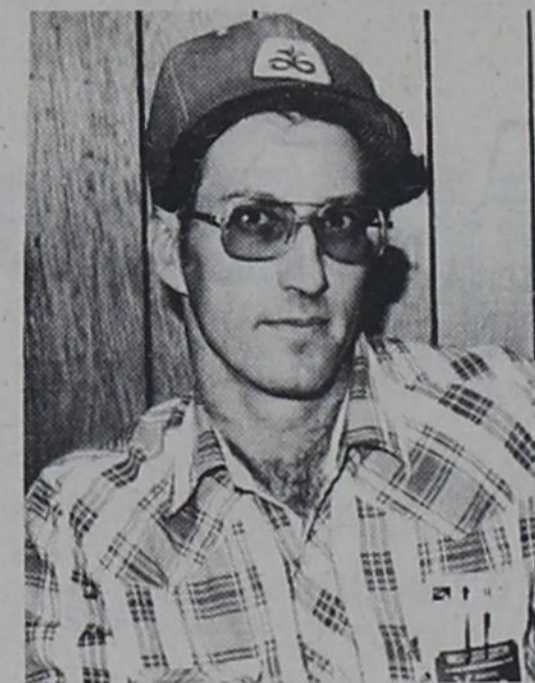

Crop, Livestock Reports Needed

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will begin interviewing Texas farmers and ranchers in mid-May on 1982 crop acreage and midyear livestock inventories, State Statistician Doug Murfield has announced.

Results of the confidential interviews, conducted through the mail or in person by field enumerators, will be published in June.

Murfield is urging farmers and ranchers to complete and return mail questionnaires promptly. Information will be combined for state and county estimates.

Murfield said estimates give Texas farmers and ranchers planning information for planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing and marketing. "Without these reports, most producers would have to depend on trade and other sources for information on crop and livestock prospects," he said.

Reports are also used by farm organizations and legislatures to plan and develop farm programs, extension economists and farm and ranch management consultants to advise farmers and ranchers, and exporters to plan and promote sales of Texas agricultural products in foreign markets.

Estimates are published annually for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, small grains, vegetables, fruits and pecans, and cash receipts from the sale of Texas farm commodities.

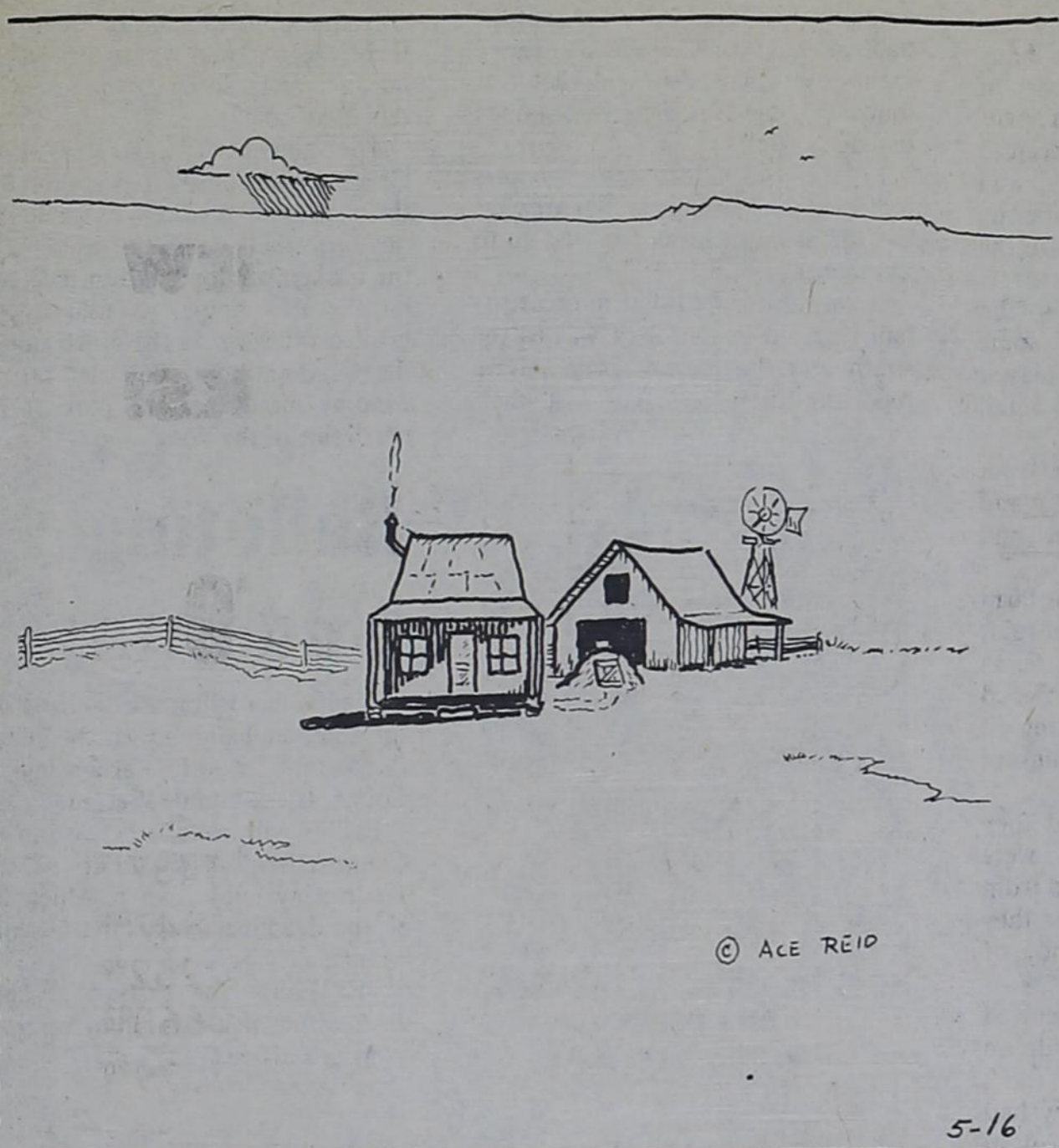

1972 Graduate Experiences

New Life In Costa Rica

When Linda Stanberry graduated from Bovina High School in 1972, she had no idea that her life would send her to the wilds of Costa Rica...but then again, she did not know what she would be doing some ten years later.

After her graduation from BHS in 1972, she attended Southwestern College in Oklahoma City, where she received a degree in Christian Education in 1976.

Linda, unsure of what endeavors she wanted to seek in life, set out studying Christian education with an emphasis on puppet ministry.

While attending college, she worked in the Veteran's Affairs office on campus, and also did some career counseling and enrollment work.

It was while she was still at school that she went on a tour of Mexico with a group of students who were involved in the puppet ministry, as she was.

It was then that Linda decided where her heart really belonged...with the people of the Latin American countries.

So, when the opportunity presented itself, she took a job as a worker at the Pentecostal Holiness Bible Institute of St. Ana, Costa Rica.

Up to now this might seem pretty exciting for a young woman whose idea of excitement had been metered to a small town. But, Linda was to realize that life in a foreign country was also very difficult at times.

Linda was assigned as a Short-term Overseas Worker (SOW) at the Bible School, and it was not long until she realized that life in Costa Rica was much poorer than she could have ever imagined.

For example, Linda had to become accustomed to the fact that the Costa Rican meal consisted mainly of two ingredients...beans and rice. Three times daily, these two food sources were spread in front of the students and the teachers as well, including

Linda. Occasionally, there would be eggs, either fried or boiled, and a Costa Rican food known as fried bananas, and perhaps a salad. Due to the high cost of meat, there was rarely meat served. The favorite meat among the Costa Ricans was a casserole of chicken and rice. Occasionally there would also be tuna. But, meat was saved mostly for special occasions.

Linda was to be the secretary to the General Supervisor to all the Latin American countries for the Bible School. Her duties consisted of many things, from supervising kitchen duties to teaching Bible school and writing English correspondence.

She was also involved in the puppet ministry.

Being that St. Ana was only 17 miles away from the capitol, San Jose, Linda might have had a good opportunity in which to enrich her life, had she had time to do this. But her duties at the institute kept her hopping most of the time.

For example, she rose at around 5:30 a.m. each morning, particularly if she had an early class, then she would assist with breakfast, making sure that the students did their share of the chores, then at 7:15 a.m. there was always a devotional with the students.

From 7:30 to 9:15 a.m. there were classes, in which Linda might teach occasionally, and following that there was chapel at 9:30 to 10:15.

Classes resumed from 10:20-12 noon, at which time the students congregated in the cafeteria for their noon meal.

In the afternoons, students had a variety of things to do. If they were not actively engaged in ministry somewhere, they were to work outside one day a week for two hours (men only).

These outside duties might include

cutting the grass with a machete, or washing windows which had bars over them to keep out robbers.

Women also had duties for which the afternoons consumed their time, some of which included cleaning up the kitchen, picking guavas for jelly, keeping up the vegetable bins and sewing.

Others studied English, played soccer, studied or did their laundry, as well as taking care of other personal appointments.

According to Linda, the number of students attending the school was relatively low, around 20 usually, due to the fact that it was hard for the students to get the money to attend.

The cost for six months of schooling was \$60, which is about \$10 a month, but many of these students were very poor, so poor, even, that they had to borrow books from the school and return these when they were through for another student to use.

Usually though, the school would allow a student to come to school on their honor to pay when they could. However, sometimes, the school would have to reject students who could not pay, especially if they had debts from semesters past.

The school did get a little help financially, Linda said, usually about \$300 monthly from state, churches

and donations.

Most of the students who finish the three year schooling become pastors, with many pastoring churches before they get out of school.

Church is held every week night in Costa Rica, and twice on Sundays.

Linda said that at 5 p.m. every weekend, the school closes and the students go home every weekend. Except for the few who live too far to go home on weekends, the rest return Sunday night in time for services.

Then, on Mondays, the school might start a little later, due to the late night travel of the buses, carrying students back to the institute.

According to Linda, she may not go back to Costa Rica. It all depends. Since her term of service is over on the SOW program she is not sure what she will do now.

She said she might go back to school and concentrate on sharpening her Spanish enough to get a degree in foreign languages (she already had a degree in Spanish from a source in Costa Rica). Or she thinks she might teach.

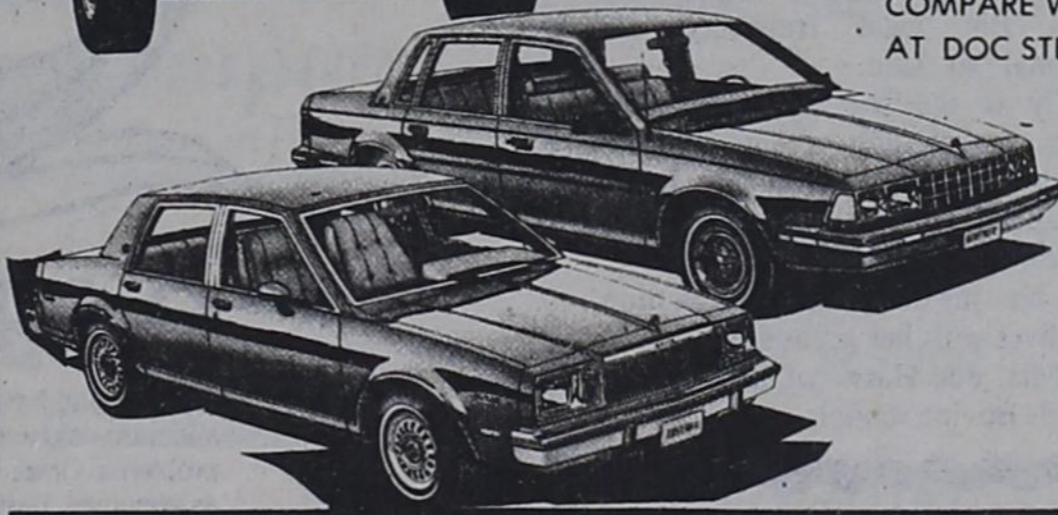

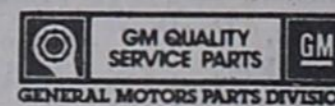

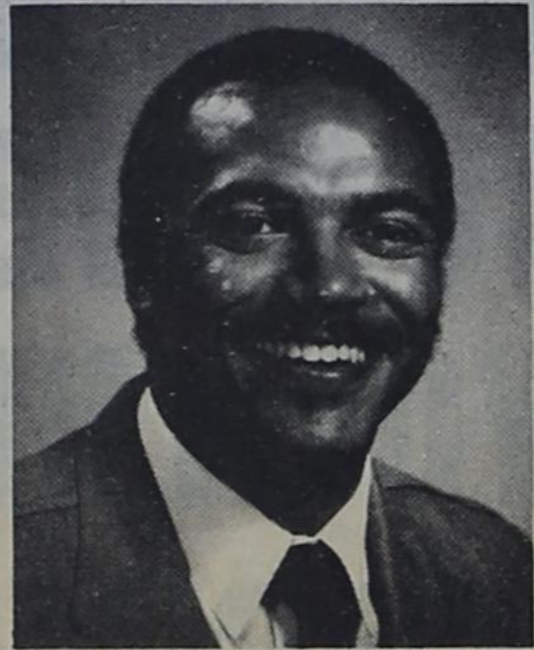

Henry Skala is Soil Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service serving Parmer County.

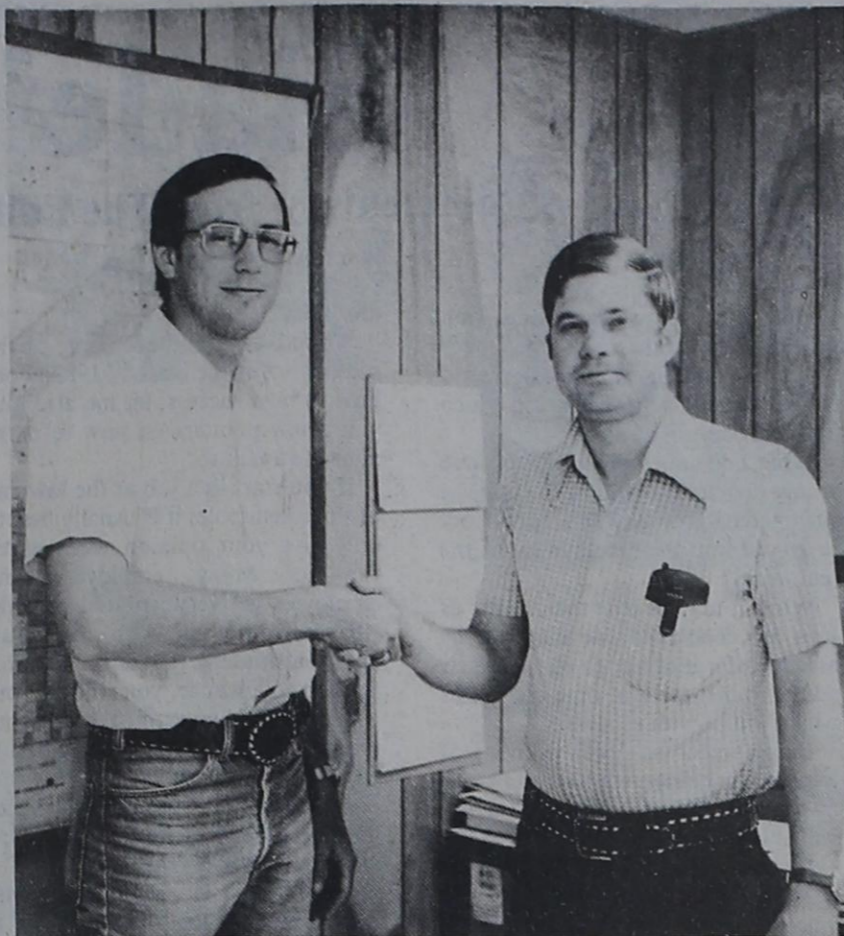
Skala will be assisting local farmers and ranchers in carrying out conservation practices on farms and ranches.

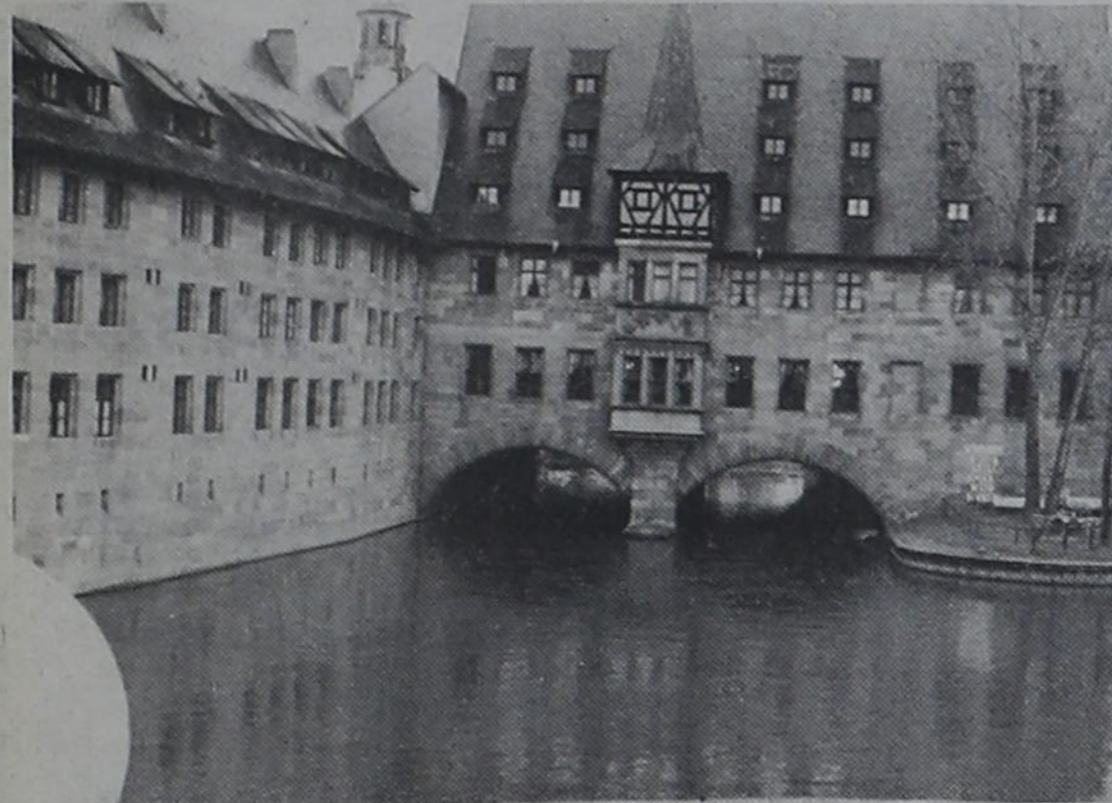

SPS Accepts 9% Rate Increase Recommendation

Southwestern Public Service Company announced it would accept a nine per cent rate increase recommended by the Steering Committee which represents 66 Texas municipalities served by the electric utility.

The agreement was reached following a study by the cities' rate study committee, and represents 71 per cent of the 12.7 per cent Texas retail rate increase requested by the Company.

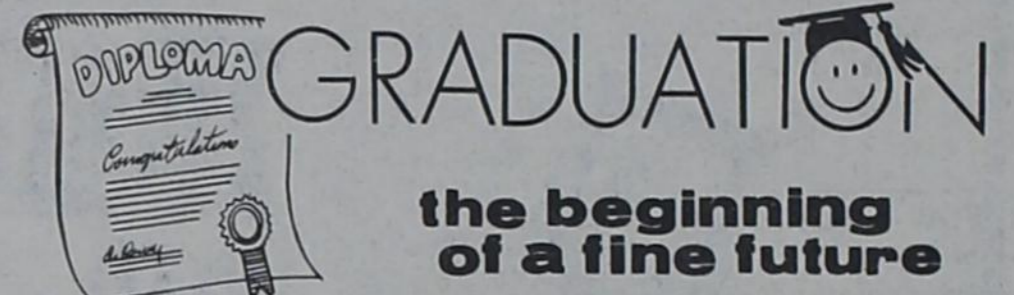
If approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), the new rate would be effective July 1, 1982, and would be expected to provide additional revenues of approximately \$13.6 million annually from customers inside the cities. The agreement only covers the rates for service supplied within city jurisdictions. Rates outside the cities, which are regulated by the PUCT, would generate approximately an additional \$15.8 million annually at

the 71 per cent figure.

Company president Bert Ballengee said "SPS agreed reluctantly because the combined revenues of \$29.4 million from city and rural customers is less than had been requested, less than is needed, and less than is justified by today's high money costs and the commitment the Company has made to its customers to change to coal as the fuel source in new power plants."

Ballengee said that "SPS would go along with the reduced increase because of the current economic situation which is affecting everyone. I guess we'll hurt just like everyone else," he added.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric utility service to a population of more than 1 million in a 45,000-square-mile area of the Panhandle and south plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

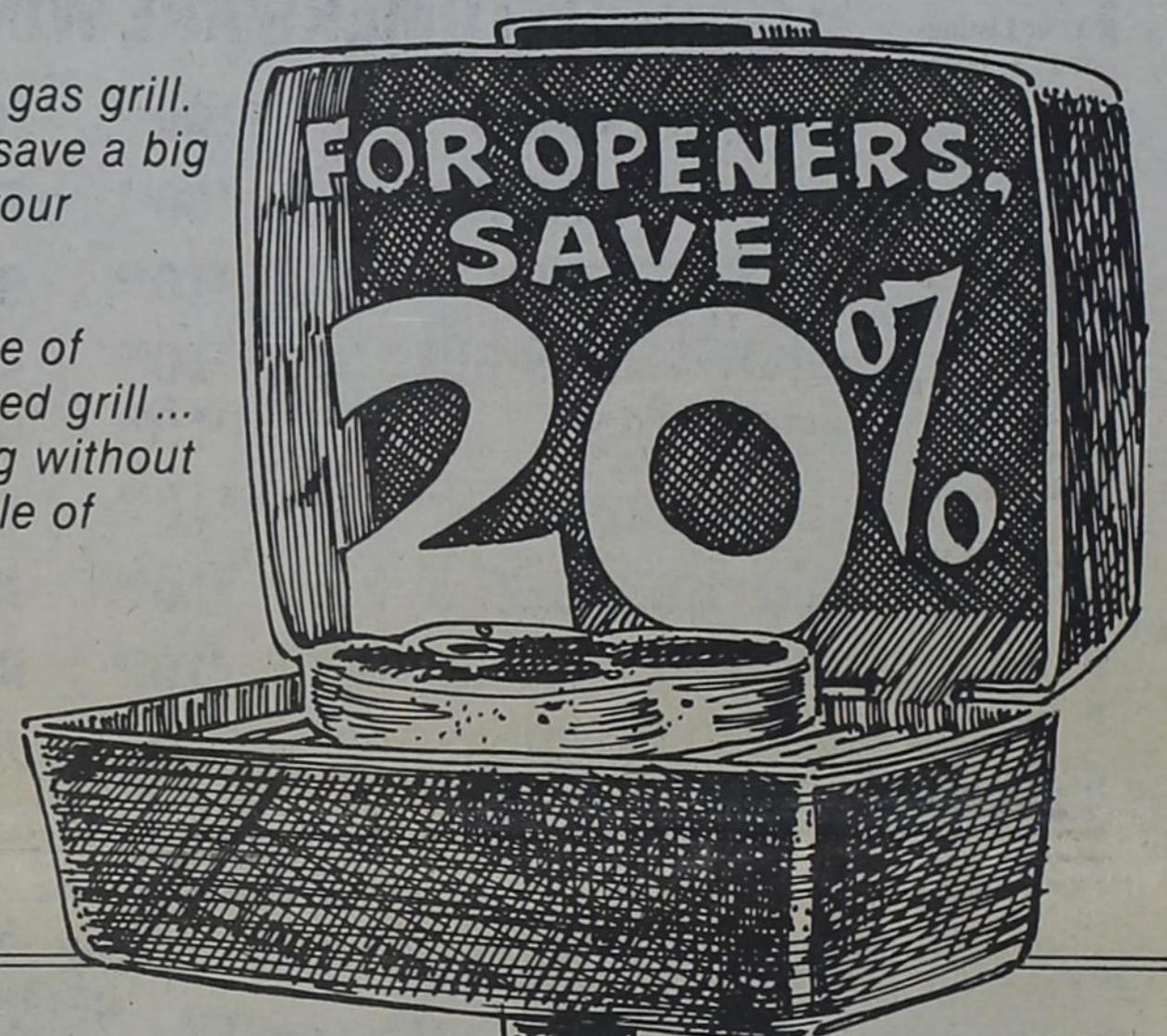
