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## Crime Records Indicate Women Behave Better Than Men

WASHINGTON, March 20 (UP)—Women behaved themselves better than men last year, the FBI reported today.

Youth played a "predominant part" in crimes against property in 1949. Crime increased by 4.5 per cent throughout the nation, with the increase higher in the country areas than in the cities. However, there was a decline in the number of murders, negligent manslaughter and automobile theft cases in the nation. Rape in rural areas increased 1.9 per cent last year, while in the cities the increase was three-fourths of one per cent. The statistics appeared in the FBI's annual uniform crime reports. FBI director J. Edgar Hoover said 1,763,290 major crimes—or one every 18 seconds—were com-

mitted in the United States last year. In an average day, 1,100 places were burglarized; 293 persons feloniously killed or assaulted; 162 persons were robbed; 440 cars stolen, and 2,800 other thefts were committed. The FBI said that 27.4 per cent of those charged with robbery, embezzlement, burglary, larceny, auto theft, fraud, forgery, counterfeiting, arson and receiving stolen property were under 21 years of age. The crime increase in rural areas was 8.5 per cent; in the cities 4.2 per cent. Here are the types of crimes and the increases:

Rural—Burglaries, 17.5 per cent; robberies, 12.7 per cent; larcenies, 7.4 per cent; aggravated assaults, 1.9 per cent; rapes, 1.9 per cent. Urban—Burglaries, 6.7 per cent; robberies, 6.4 per cent; larcenies, 4.6 per cent; aggravated assaults, 2.1 per cent, and rapes, 0.3 per cent. The FBI reports showed that 713,444 men were arrested last year, or an increase of 4.5 per cent over 1948. On the other hand, female arrests increased only 2.1 per cent. The FBI examined 792,029 fingerprint arrests during the year, an increase of 4.3 per cent over 1948. Women represented only 9.9 per cent of the persons whose cards were sent here for checks by police.

# FINGERPRINTS Don't Lie

Yet it's the old Latin saying all over again. 'Who will guard the guards?' We have guardians, and most of them are willing to risk death at their task. But you can't guarantee that all of them will or that all of them are honest. The very honesty of the honest ones works to protect the crookedness of the crooks."

From his utter misery Stivers spoke: "You're accusing Kelso of murder and of destroying the evidence against him. That's a pretty serious charge, Queripel. You haven't an iota of evidence against him."

"That's all too true," said Queripel. "You've got to start all over and get it."

"I'll admit the trail is pretty cold by now. Kelso probably destroyed the prints you took from the telephone, if my theory is correct," said Queripel. "But when you collected your specimens from the Palmer home, did you take any from the back doors or window sills or other places the killer might have entered?"

STIVERS sighed. "Of course not," he said. "I suppose you'll

think it's a poor cop. But the case seems to open-and-shut against Moody. He had been seen going in the front door shortly before the discovery of the crime. Kelso brought in the names and addresses of several people who had seen him enter."

"Kelso! Kelso!" snapped Queripel. But he didn't condemn Stivers as a "poor cop." Queripel himself, from the newspaper accounts, had at first believed in Moody's guilt. Who would doubt the evidence of fingerprints? "But," Queripel went on, "the killer might well have slipped in the house by the back way, or come through the cellar door, or climbed over a window sill. You naturally assumed he came in the front door. But assuming is dangerous."

Poor Stivers nodded and tossed his hands in helplessness. His pride had suffered in his fall. Queripel revived him with a word: "What would you say to our going out to the Palmer place and giving it a real going-over?"

DETECTIVE JAMES STIVERS leaped to his feet with a renewal of life and hope and self-respect. From his chest he quickly obtained permission to complete the checking of the Palmer home for prints.

Indeed, Stivers was furnished with a key to the front door, since the house had been locked up and more or less sealed after the first hours of the murder had been removed. Azalea Palmer had been taken away from the grewsome emptiness by her friend Nadine Fennell and was now living with Nadine's parents in their apartment.

Because there was no police car available, Queripel took Stivers in his own machine. They parked the car at a distance from the house.

It was Martin Queripel's first visit and the huge Palmer home seemed to him to be something like a mausoleum when he first walked into it.

But Queripel brushed aside this feeling and in another moment he was a detective again.

## New Book Gives Facts About Gas Economy

Are you interested in saving up to 60 percent of your gasoline bill?

Such savings are possible for city drivers if they adopt a system of "Planned Driving in City Traffic" as outlined in a booklet published by the Service department of Plymouth Motor Corp. The booklet, which sets forth results of actual road tests, is titled "Fuel Economy Through Planned Driving".

Here are some of the facts the booklet contains:

By driving at 50 miles per hour instead of 70 on the open highway, a driver can save one gallon of gas or more out of every four.

City drivers, by avoiding unnecessary stops, can save one gallon or more out of every three and take only 10 percent more time over a 10-mile course.

By using lower gears for starting, and shifting to the next higher gear as soon as the engine will run smoothly in the higher gear, a driver will get maximum fuel economy. Second gear at 20 MPH gives 15 percent less economy than high gear at 20 MPH, and low gear at 20 MPH gives 35 percent less economy than high gear at 20 MPH.

When the temperature is 30 degrees above zero, eight miles of driving are required to warm up lubricants so the car will deliver maximum economy.

There are, according to the booklet, several factors which

cause a car to use more gasoline at high speeds. For example: "A steady speed of about 35 MPH requires only about 10 horsepower. But, step up that speed to around 70 MPH, and your engine has to deliver nearly 60 horsepower to do the same amount of work. You may get there a little faster, but the gasoline really melts away. To get twice the speed, you need 10 times the horsepower."

Increased wind resistance at higher speeds and additional friction between moving parts in the engine as the speed goes up also contribute to higher gasoline consumption.

Gasoline saving in city driving, according to W. B. Rice, director of service of Plymouth, is "a simple matter of timing, looking ahead as you drive, judging the speed of traffic flow, and gauging approximate setting of traffic lights. If you do a good job of timing, plenty of extra stops and starts can be avoided. And, the fuel economy will be improved. Jet-propelled take-offs may be fun, but they're not worth the extra gas they cost. What if you do beat Joe Blow away from the traffic light? The joke's still on you because those fast starts really hurt your gas mileage."

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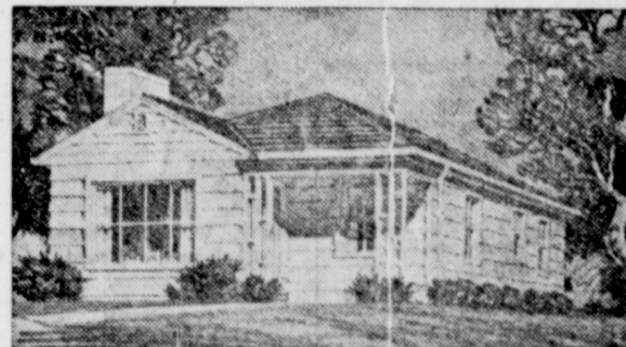
