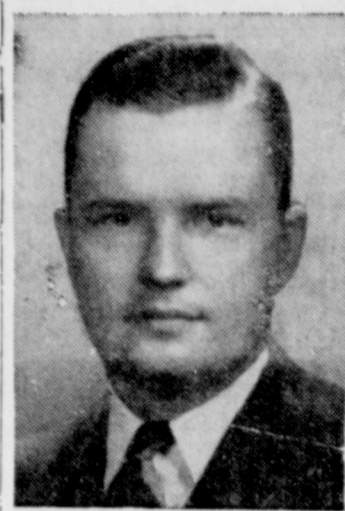

## Successor To Lilienthal Named

KEY WEST, Fla., March 22 (UP)—President Truman has selected a successor to David E. Lilienthal, who resigned last month as chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, it was learned today.

The successor's name will be submitted to the Senate for confirmation before the chief executive leaves here at the end of his current Florida vacation. Mr. Truman now plans to return to Washington in early April. According to the best information available, the chief ex-

ecutive also will be ready within a short time to nominate another AEC replacement to succeed commissioner Lewis Straus whose resignation becomes effective next month. The man selected as Lilienthal's successor has agreed to accept the nomination, according to sources here, and only the final determination of Straus' successor is holding up the nominations. Lilienthal's successor will be nominated as a member of the AEC. The president designates the chairman so it will not necessarily follow that the man appointed to the Lilienthal vacancy will be the chairman. Sumner Pike, an AEC member, is now serving as acting chairman, but administration sources expected Pike to leave the commission shortly after the new appointments are made.

# OIL COMPANY HEAD WARNS AGAINST COMPLACENCY

SAN ANGELO, Tex., March 22 (UP)—The president of Standard Oil Company of New Jersey warns against complacency toward increased federal control of lives and property.

Eugene Holman, returning to his native San Angelo to address the Board of City Development last night, said that when "the dilution of freedom goes beyond a certain point the trend becomes difficult to reverse."

He described the conflicting

philosophies of freedom and state control as "fuels that serve to energize people."

He held that freedom of the individual never could be complete because it would make group living impossible and absolute control by the state of every individual's act likewise would be impractical.

Regulation, he said, gradually becomes control.

"This intrusion of the state usually takes place in what seems to be a natural, even kindly fashion," Holman said. "One of the most common ways is by the offer to fulfill men's hopes. Hope is a wonderful thing, of course. It keeps the world going, but

only hard work brings fulfilled hope. The state, whose duty is to guarantee the rights of man, is peddling false wares when it offers to fulfill hopes."

The people of a country, often muddled by promises, permit the state to take more and more control sometimes until "they are no longer free."

Holman said the English government has control over actions which he said should be decided by the individual.

For instance, he said, an English professional man must obtain government permission to bring from abroad books or tools he needs in his work.

Holman said he did not know at just what point it becomes impossible to reverse a progressive adulteration of the "fuel of freedom," but asserted a point could be reached where the nature of a country's energy source is changed fundamentally.

"Seeing that our fuel is not diluted with regulation to the point where it is forever changed seems to me to be the most important problem facing our country today," he said.

# Leaves Note Of Advice, Then Shoots Self

HOUSTON, Tex., March 22 (UP)—A 16-year-old high school student who wrote a note of advice to Houston youth that "your mother and daddy know best" and then shot himself with a German Luger pistol was in critical condition today.

The handsome schoolboy, Boyd James, Jr., basketball player for a church team, shot himself late yesterday through a pillow to muffle the sound while his mother was shopping at a nearby grocery store.

When she returned she found young Boyd lying on the dining room floor where he had dropped after staggering from his bedroom.

A note in the boy's room said: "Well, I think this would be best for all. Now there are only good Jameses left. The bad one is gone. I would like to say to all the boys and girls in the city: 'Your mother and daddy know best. You may not think so at the time but when you are out on your own, you will thank them a hundred times of more. Never get where you do not because you can see where it gets you. You wind up with a broken heart and death.' The word death was underscored.

The youth had been ill for several days and had returned home from school at noon. His father said young Boyd had been depressed for some time because of low marks in school.

The old pistol had been received by the elder James from his father many years ago but had never been fired.

The boy's father is a department superintendent for the Gulf Research and Development Company.

# 50-Year-Old Monastery Burns

CUMBERLAND HILL, E. I., March 22 (UP)—The half-century old Cistercian Monastery of Our Lady of the Valley was destroyed by fire early today and fellow Catholics hastened to offer sanctuary to the 130 trappist monks and guests who were forced to flee.

The blaze apparently broke out in the infirmary and spread rapidly to the massive granite chapel and a guest house. Built on a hilltop by the patient hands of the gentle monks, the structures will cost \$250,000 to replace.

The fire raged out of control for two hours while brown clad lay monks and white robed choir monks helped firemen from eight surrounding communities fight the flames.

The Rev. Dom M. Edmund Futterer, O. C. S. O., Abbot of the monastery, accepted the offer of sanctuary given by Mount St. Charles Academy at nearby Woonsocket. The exhausted monks stretched out on improvised beds in the school gymnasium.
