**VITAL CLUE IN ATTACK ON CANCER REPORTED**

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22 (UP)—Two University of California scientists came up today with what appears to be a vital clue in the attack on cancer.

It is the discovery of a deadly poison found in cancer tissue that seemingly causes its victims to starve to death. The poison is called proteose.

The research on proteose was carried out at the UC medical school by Dr. Kenneth G. Scott, assistant professor of experimental radiology and Dr. Robert S. Stone, professor of radiology and chairman of the department. The American Cancer Society provided funds for the work.

The work began after Scott found last year that the thyroid metabolism of animals with cancer is upset. He learned a large tumor prevents the accumulation in the thyroid gland of tyrosine, an amino-acid essential for the gland to produce the hormone, thyroxin.

Scott injected extracts of cancer tissue into animals in an effort to learn what caused this disturbance. He found the thyroid metabolism of these normal animals was disturbed just as though they had cancer.

Then Scott and Stone broke down the cancer tissue until they found the particular chemical that caused the thyroid disturbance. It turned out to be proteose.

When they injected proteose into normal rats, the animals acted as though they had massive tumors. They begin to lose weight and showed symptoms of "constitutional deterioration."

It was because the animals could not absorb tyrosine and other vital chemicals from food through the intestinal wall in a normal manner.

From their research, the scientists think that proteose possibly causes blood vessels around a tumor to enlarge, robbing the body of blood it should otherwise have.

In other words, proteose prevents the body from absorbing its normal supply of food. Then it "commandeers" for the tumor a share of the diminished supply of food that is available.

Proteose can be digested by enzymes. The problem now is to find enzymes that will reduce the proteose content of the tumor without seriously damaging the body.

If the scientists are successful, perhaps they may find they may "decrease the nutrients available to the tumor."

"And perhaps even more important results may be found," Scott said.

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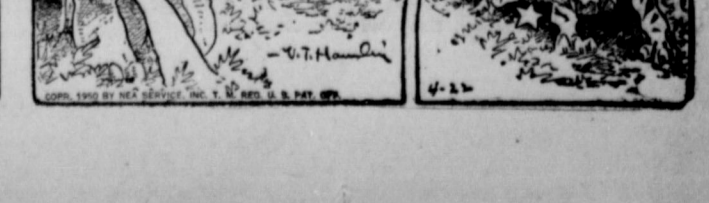

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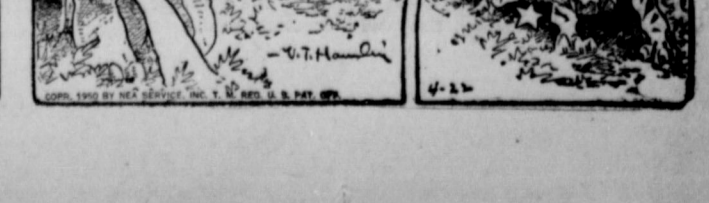

## PLUG 'N TRIGGER

The lesson for today in our primer on bass fishing is line and leader.

The beginner, if he wants to become a good fisherman, will be much happier with a 12-pound test line, because a light line is easier to cast and there are fewer backlashes when one is used.

It takes much more arm effort to cast a half-ounce plug with a 15 or 20-pound test line 50 feet than it does to cast the same plug 75 feet with a 10 or 12-pound test line.

Wrist-work is all important. The proper flip of the wrist is all that is needed to cast a plug with a light line. A heavier line takes more effort or a powerful cast, causing less accuracy and more perspiration.

Sooner or later the tyro nimrod will graduate to the eight or 10-pound test line but, in the beginning, pick a good hard-braided waterproof silk or nylon line of small diameter. The beginner also should remember to note the diameter size of the line among competitive makes.

That's because one manufacturer's 12-pound test line may be larger than another, and vice versa. Soft braided lines are better for finer casting but do not possess the wearing qualities of the hard-braided line preferred for fishing.

The plug, or lure, when used on a heavy or bulky line, invariably will travel faster than the line can follow. The result? A backlash.

The beginner's best all-around line is a smaller line of 12-pound test. As he progresses in bass fishing he will learn that light

eight to 10 pound test lines will take care of large bass and simultaneously give him the utmost in angling pleasure.

It is not only fun to cast with the least effort, but it is also fun to display your catch, even though someone might not believe the stories later. Thus the recommendation of a 12-pound test line for the novice, for there is no doubt that the 12-pound line will hold a bass more securely than the smaller eight or 10-pounder.

Bait casting line should be given the same amount of care and inspection that any good equipment is accorded.

The first four to six feet of line take the greatest amount of punishment while casting, thus the angler should test his line a few feet from the leader up every hour while fishing.

Never let the line lay coiled on the floor or bottom of the boat. Keep it reeled on the reel where careless feet can't injure the line. Many a good bass has been lost because the angler forgot to test every hour while fishing.

Color is not an important factor in line when a transparent nylon leader is used.

(I personally prefer the light green or grey mist line over black. Such line has a tendency to camouflage itself in the water, creating the impression that the

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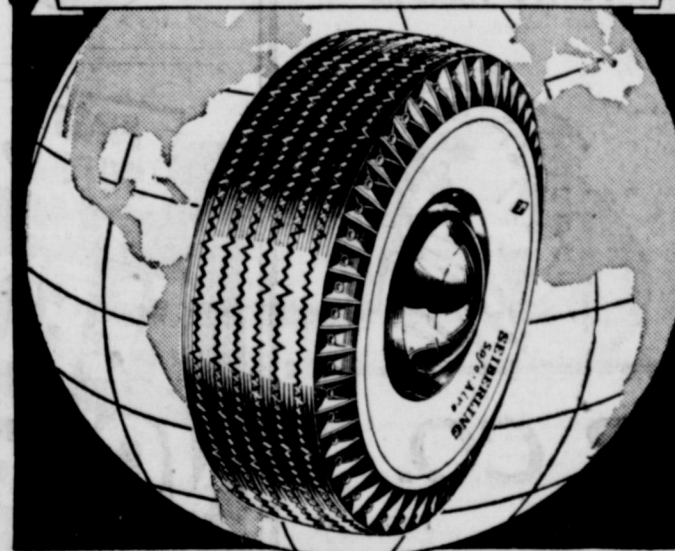

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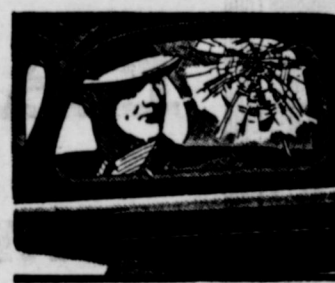

On the back of most leader cards are illustrations and instructions for tying various knots and loops to apply the leader to line and snap swivel. With a little practice, these knots and loops are mastered easily.)

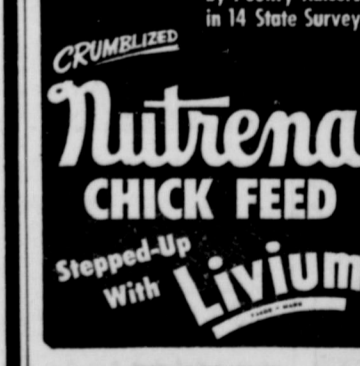

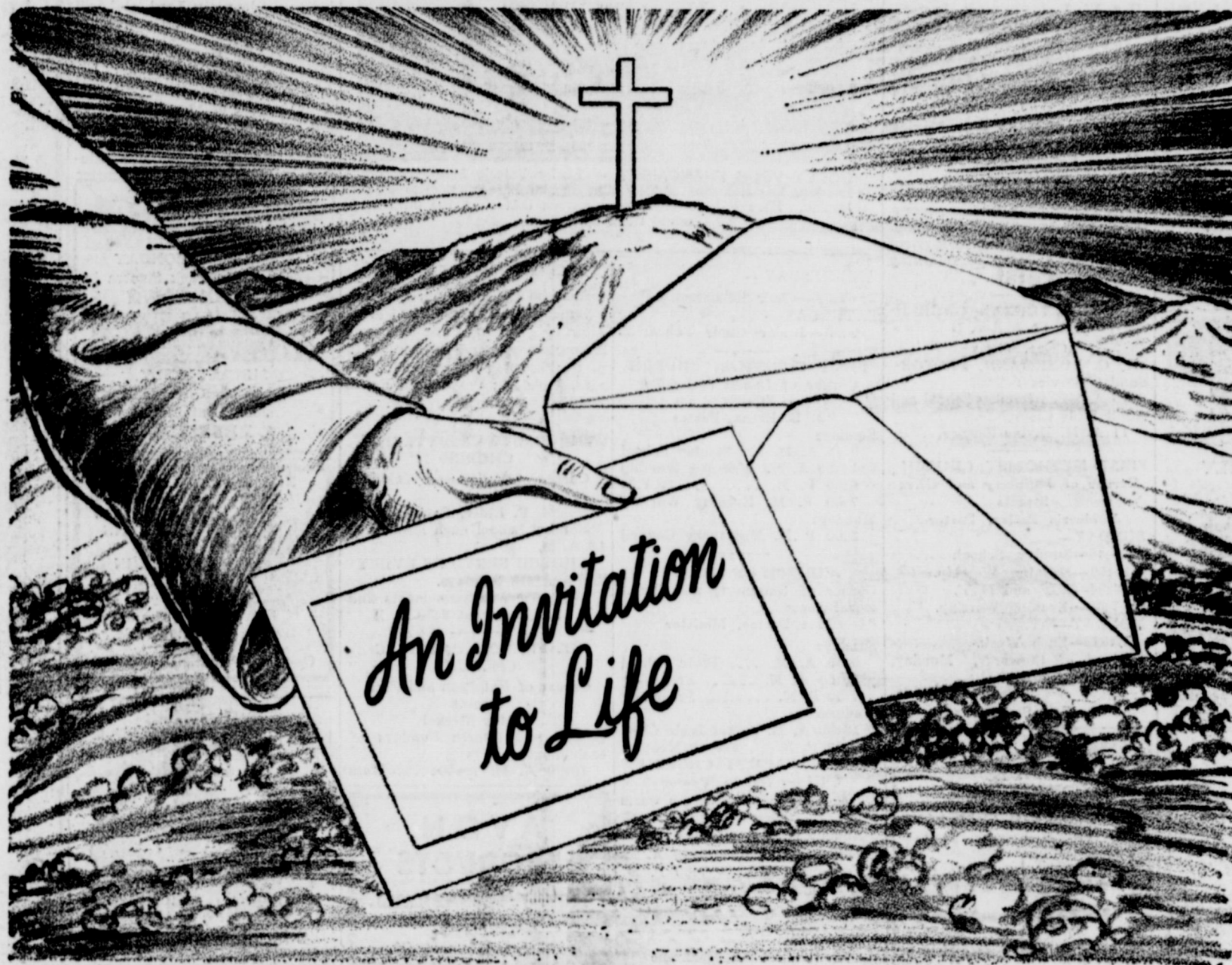

It is an invitation to rich and satisfying life. He invites to contentment instead of worry; He invites you to joy in place of sorrow; He offers health of body and mind; He calls you to trust instead of fear; He welcomes you to fellowship in place of your loneliness; He assures of inner peace instead of conflict and confusion; He would crown your life with "beauty in place of ashes"; He invites you to the love and forgiveness and kindness of the God who created you and sustains your life from day to day; you are invited to a good Life now and forever. This is "An Invitation to Life."
