

Russia Soon To Have Enough A-Bombs For Devastating Blow

SAN FRANCISCO, May 19 (UP)—Gen Omar N. Bradley predicted today that Russia probably will have enough atomic bombs in a few years to deliver a "devastating blow" anywhere.

To meet this threat, of the "Atomic blackmailer," the chairman of the joint chiefs of staff set forth a four-point "must" program:

1. "Prepare our own defenses so that no attack on the United States will cripple this arsenal of the Western world."
2. Prepare, along with our friends in the North Atlantic pact, to make Europe reasonably secure from being overrun quickly on the ground."
3. Encourage every nation outside the iron shroud of Communism to be strong, to

resist and to survive."

4. Let those nations now under the heel of Soviet-inspired peoples' government know that we will welcome them when they are unchained."

Bradley reviewed the U. S. position in the Cold War struggle in a speech prepared for delivery at a combined meeting of the Chamber of Commerce and the Commercial Club

of San Francisco. He spoke on the eve of the first "armed forces day."

Bradley said the United States and its allies, in a few years, "May have to face the reality of Russian atomic strength."

"The United States may be able to stay ahead in the number of A-bombs, he said, but the Russians "will probably

have enough to deliver a devastating blow at any area they propose to strike."

When that time comes, he said, he was sure the United States would not have any part of "appeasement at the Elbe."

He was equally certain that this country will not "pull back into a gopher hole of isolation and leave our friends in Europe at the mercy of the atomic

blackmailer."

He also said he does not believe the United States and its allies will "be lured by the siren song of preventive war which can only lead us and our friends into chaos and destruction."

Bradley said his four-point proposal was a "choice for freedom through continued strength."

"It calls for unselfishness, and may even require new measures that encourage the greater good, in place of any selfish advantage," he said. "But it is all within the power of this nation."

"If we can mobilize our forces for war, then we can certainly mobilize now our potential for peace."

The program, he said, should

be coupled with increased production conducted with total diplomacy and backed up with adequate armed forces.

"In this way, our defense plans can be part of our strategy for a lasting peace," Bradley said. "We can disrupt and break up the Soviet design. We can create order out of disorder. We can deny the influence of Communist slavery."

Assistant US Commissioner Says Nazism Dead German; Estimates Seven Million Former Nazis Left

NEW YORK, May 19 (UP)—Benjamin J. Buttenwieser, assistant U. S. high commissioner for Germany, said today that Nazism has been destroyed and Americans should show "patience and understanding" toward the German people.

He delivered before the foreign policy association the same speech which the anti-defamation league of B'nai B'rith in Cleveland refused to hear.

League officials cancelled the Cleveland affair after reading a copy of Buttenwieser's speech and deciding that he failed to hit the "vicious elements" among the Germans.

In referring to German Nazism, Buttenwieser said he believed he could say safely that "except for some fragments, it has been destroyed, never to rise again. There are many who will challenge this view," he went on.

Buttenwieser conceded that nationalism in Germany is rising again, but said that nationalism, in its proper sense, "represents pride in one's country."

The United States, he added, must help the Germans grow in self-respect and eventually toward full cooperation with democracy. He estimated there are 7,000,000 former Nazis in Germany, many of them in public office or in high business positions.

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CIO Union Demands More Active Voice For Labor In Foreign Policy

CLEVELAND, O., May 19 (UP) —

The 17th biennial convention of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America (CIO) ends today with the nomination of officers after a week-long session in which the 1,500 delegates demanded more active participation for labor in foreign policy.

Jacob Potofsky, president of the 375,000-member union, was expected to be re-nominated without opposition, as was Jack Kroll, ACWA vice president and head of the CIO's Political Action Committee.

Potofsky earlier in the week asked that labor be given more say in foreign policy and the delegates backed him up today with a resolution which "demands that labor be given a full voice, as a matter of right, in the determination and implementation of foreign policy including all assistance programs."

A sound foreign policy, the delegates said, "requires the active vast experience in negotiations, labor's moral appeal, and labor's deep and intimate understanding and knowledge of the needs and hopes of the American people makes this participation a matter of right."

The Union further demanded that Marshall Plan and point four assistance be extended only "to those governments which protect the rights of workers to form trade unions of their own choosing and to bargain collectively."
