Guar, a new Summer legume, introduced by the Upper Leon Soil Conservation Districts last year, is proving to be the best soil builder tried in his area, since the advent of vetch, according to reports from district cooperators. James Smith of the Lakeview Conservation Group, was one of the farmers who tried guar last year. He planted it after he had harvested vetch and rye. He combined 500 pounds of seed per acre and then drilled the land to vetch and rye again.

From one end of the field to the other the old guar rows can be

picked out, as the grain is much taller where it crosses the row than in the middle.

Buck Maples stripped his peanuts with guar on a 2 and 8 basis, and then drilled the whole area to vetch and rye last fall. At the present time the strips are easily identified by the dark green, vigorous strips of rye, following the contour rows of guar, while the rye following the peanuts is much paler in color, and has much less foliage on it. The vetch is also better in the guar strips than where following peanuts.

L. K. Gregory, district conservationist at Kennedy, Texas reports that corn, flax and other crops have almost doubled their guar.

Fred Brizendine reports that his guar made excellent growth, reaching almost shoulder height.

George Goss planted two small plots of guar which produced 700 pounds of seed per acre. This compares favorably with any grain sorghum grown here.

The seed from this crop can be ground and fed to livestock as a high protein meal, or if cut for hay, the protein content averages about 2 per cent higher than alfalfa.

Te seed are available at as little as fifteen cents per pound, and in 3-foot rows, only ten pounds per acre are needed for planting.

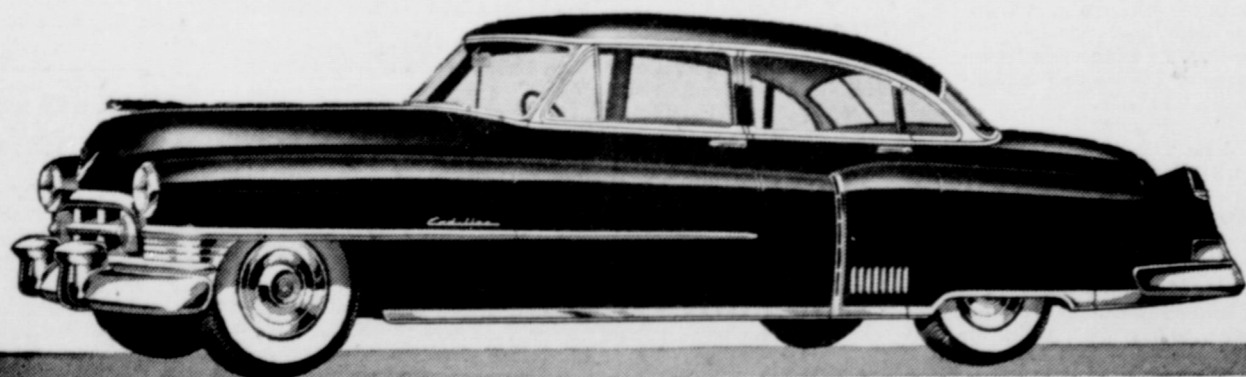

Your Health

After a physical examination to check for abnormal physical structure which would be a cause of sterility, one of the first tests a doctor might make in the study of a barren marriage is to determine the time of the wife's fertility.

This simple test is a daily record of temperatures which the wife makes over a period of two or three months. Such a chart will show, in normal cases, an elevation of body temperature towards the middle of the monthly menstrual cycle. Presumably two or three days following this period of higher temperature set the period of maximum fertility.

What happens when the temperature rises? When the egg which a woman normally produces each month leaves the ovary to enter the womb, her body releases a hormone called progesterone. This hormone prepares the womb for what is, thought to be nature's way of nourishing the egg if fertilization takes place, and is there fore vital for the continuation of pregnancy.

In fact, in cases of threatened miscarriage, this is one of the medications which is given in hopes of retaining the hoped-for child. The failure of the body to manufacture progesterone at the proper time, is one of the many causes of infertility in women.



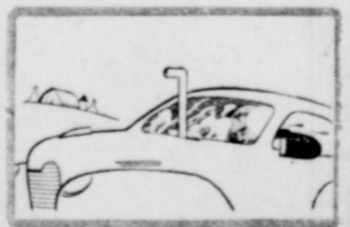

The 26 year old woman disappeared five days ago from a tourist court here. One note was found in her cabin and another in her car parked on the beach.

Relatives said Mrs. Bell was dependent over family troubles. Officers and Coast Guard crews believed the body of a drowning victim would have surfaced quickly this time of year.

HOUSTON, May 23 (UP)—Any trucks used to haul explosive materials will be barred from the new Washburn tunnel after its opening Saturday.

County Commissioner Hugh A. May said that the vehicles may not pass through the under-water tube even if empty. Horse and mule-drawn transportation also will be barred, May said.

Commissioners Court also announced yesterday that the tunnel has been insured for \$5,600,000 with the premium to total \$35,000 over the next three years.

The \$8,000,000 tunnel, linking Pasadena and Galena Park, will be opened to traffic after county-wide ceremonies Saturday morning.

HOUSTON, May 23 (UP)—The Texas Water Code Committee will hold its regional meeting here tomorrow and Thursday.

The group, appointed by Gov. Allan Shivers, will return to Austin to submit a report to the Texas Water Committee.

Hearings have been held over the entire state. The gathering here is in the final group of public discussions scheduled.

HOUSTON, May 23 (UP)—A motorcycle crash sent a 33 year old Houston fireman to the hospital today in serious condition.

Herman Alexander Hamilton underwent emergency surgery this morning for internal injuries suffered when his motorcycle rammed into the back of a car.

His companion, Dorothy Watt, was released after hospital treatment for face cuts.

Hamilton told investigators the car slowed unexpectedly. The driver was William W. Slater, 26, of Baytown.

No charges were filed.

EDINBURG, May 23 (UP)—Four new Polio cases raised the Rio Grande Valley's Infantile Paralysis toll today.

Admitted to the local clinic were a three-year-old Mission girl, a 27-year-old Edinburg woman, an 18-month old Edinburg girl and a 23 year old San Juan man.

WACO, May 23 (UP)—McClenan County's traffic fatalities for the year stood at 13 with the death of a Fort Hood soldier.

Jack E. Finney was killed yesterday when his car and a trailer-truck collided near here on the Waco-Austin highway. Johnny Ganske, Waco, the truck driver, was not hurt.

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 23 (UP)—Frank Palmore, 76 year old Oklahoma City nightwatchman faced first-degree manslaughter charges today in the shooting death of his Texas nephew.

Palmore was charged in the death of Wesley Enlow Thompson, 66, of Seagraves, Tex. He contended he shot in self-defense during an argument over a domino game.

Snake Hunters Find Boas Grandchild

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., (UP)—Two famed snake hunters, searching a dense swamp four miles from this city of 250,000 population for a 30-foot Boa Constrictor believed to have escaped from a circus train 53 years ago, captured its "grandchild" last week.

The monster reptile had been the subject of oft-repeated rumors that had grown into swamp legend for years. When the search got into the open, anxious mothers ordered their children not to stray from cleared ground.

Ross Allen, head of a Florida reptile institute, and Dr. W. T. Neill, biologist and college professor, captured the 10-foot grand-baby with a body the size of a man's leg.

"Where this one came from, there probably are more," they said. The 45-pound boa taken after a night-long hunt through the stag-

nant vine-chokes swamp could easily crush the life from a man in minutes, Allen said. It could swallow whole a small child or dog.

Children were ordered to stay close to their homes, and mothers peered often from windows to see if they obeyed.

The Boa was found half-buried in an Armadillo hole. Instinctively timid, the snake lay still while Allen and Dr. Neill shoveled away dirt 10 feet away and uncovered the tail. Allen pounced on the snake's head and Neill caught the other end.

"We stretched it," Allen said. "It's weak as a kitten when struck out."

Old timers living along the swamps rim remember when a circus train derailed near there in 1897. A gaint boa constrictor was said to have escaped in the accident.

The snake story made the rounds for years but no responsible citizen would admit seeing a 30-foot reptile for fear of being

branded a liar. Then, two weeks ago Cleveland Jones, retired engineer, came face to face with "it". Johnson's hired man, M. M. Moore, also saw it, peering through bushes on the edge of Johnson's 100-acre tract.

Allen said the Boa and its relatives have been eating Armadillos which infest the swamp, and reasoned that the snakes had not preyed on neighboring dogs because their appetites usually were satisfied.

He said a Boa in its native habitat grew about 18 inches each

year. The one captured last week was about seven and one-half to ten years old.

"It's entirely possible the snake which escaped from the circus train gave birth later to several," Allen said. "They have 'em in litters like puppies."

He said this Boa was the first captured in Florida and probably in the United States.

Largest of the Indian tribes in the United States today is the Navajos of Arizona and New Mexico, now more than 50,000 strong.

This is a step in the right direction, but it is not the end of the matter, whether or not the current Congress takes further action. The maintenance of these taxes, regardless of the percentage figure, is a breach of faith now that the war is long over.

They are not "luxury" taxes. Applying as they do to commercial passenger transportation, a long list of commodities including baby oil and the most inexpensive cosmetics, they fall on many absolute necessities — and, for the most part, they are paid by people of small or moderate means.

It must not be forgotten that these taxes were strictly part of the wartime emergency legislation. They were imposed, not only for revenue reasons, but to discourage the manufacture and use of anything that did not contribute to the war effort. They came into being, in other words, at a time when it was necessary to sharply reduce civilian living standards and habits.
