Baby Joins 33 Who Die In Chicago

CHICAGO, May 26 (UP) — Search crews found evidence today that a baby died with 33 other persons in an explosion and fire that blasted a south side neighborhood when a trolley ploughed into a gasoline tank truck last night.

Fifty persons were injured in the disaster. Police and firemen dug through the ruins of seven buildings ignited by the searing flames that trapped passengers aboard the crowded trolley.

Patrolman Van Clay found a baby's foot lying in the street near the crash scene. It was sent to the police laboratory.

Officials believed the baby's body may have been consumed in the fire that left four of the seven buildings with all interior walls and flooring burned out.

Deputy Chief of Police Philip Breitake said there was a possibility, however, that the baby's body was one of the charred pieces in the Cook county morgue.

The search crews proceeded gingerly for fear that the water-soaked walls still standing might collapse.

They believed, however, that the bodies of all victims had been found.

Meanwhile, officials organized a sweeping inquiry to determine whether criminal negligence was involved in the disaster.

Coroner A. L. Brodie said he would impanel a jury of experts June 1 to investigate. He was expected to coordinate inquiries by the fire department, police, state fire marshal, the interstate commerce commission and the state commerce commission.

Private investigations were expected by various insurance companies and by petroleum associations interested in the shipment of gasoline and other inflammables.

A search for four children previously reported missing was abandoned after one reported that she personally had handed them through a window of their flaming apartment to a stranger who apparently took them to his home. Radio stations broadcast a request for the stranger to take the children to the Red Cross for return to their mother.

Final Payments School Taxes Are Due Now

If you paid 1949 school taxes by partial or split payments plan, the second and final installment is now due.

It is permissible each year, where an individual does not care to take advantage of the discount given the first three months of the tax paying season to split the amount of tax into two installment payments.

One half of the tax must be paid on or before November 30th of the current tax year, and the remainder is due on or before June 1st of the following year.

Under this plan, which is convenient to those tax payers, having a large amount of tax to pay, even though you are not able to take advantage of the discount, you also do not have to pay penalty and interest on the last half of the taxes, which fall due after taxes become delinquent on February 1st.

Cisco Receives 3 Inches Rain During Storm

Three inches of rain, preceded by a chilling cold front, pelted down at Cisco, filling the streets and sweeping into some houses. One mishap, accredited to the blinding rain, lightning and thunder storm at Eastland, was reported.

Firemen answered a call to the Guy Paterson residence in the Hillcrest addition where lightning reportedly burned out wiring. The Pattersons were at junior high school graduation exercises when the lightning struck and no damage report had been received in this office late Friday morning.

Sixteen automobiles were counted stalled or "waitin' out the rain" between Ranger and Eastland during the height of the storm. Wind shield wipers were useless against the blinding, wind-blown rain. Sheets of water pelted down and obscured the entire highway at times.

Leon Creek, just east of the city was filled to overflowing early Friday morning and the city lake had risen approximately three inches. Water for the third time in less than six weeks, was flowing over the spillway.

The Eastland Telegram rain gauge, located at the Modern Cleaners, reported 1.35 inches of precipitation in down-town Eastland. J. A. Beard's gauge showed 1.45 inches, and the Leon Power Plant reported .90 inches.

Soviet Troops Seize Chunk Of Iran Territory

TEHRAN, Iran, May 26 (UP)—Soviet troops have seized a five-mile strip of Iranian territory in the isolated far eastern section of the country, the newspaper Teherran Mossavar said today.

The Russians have refused to withdraw despite a strong protest to the Soviet Embassy here by the Iranian Foreign Ministry, the paper said.

The newspaper said the seized area was near the town of Sarakhs, in Eastern Khurasan province about 100 miles east of Meshed.

The border there is formed by a dry river bed and has been the scene of frequent disputes.

Authoritative sources meanwhile said acting Iranian Foreign Minister Ala Ghilori Ardalan conferred yesterday with U. S. Ambassador John Cooper Wiley, American embassy sources declined to reveal the subject under discussion.

Big Three Challenges Russia To Hold Vote On Eve Of Peace Rally

PHILIPPINE GOVERNMENT CALLS ON SOUTHWEST ASIA TO ORGANIZE

BAGUIO, Philippines, May 26 (UP)—The Philippine government called on delegates of seven nations of Southeast Asia today to form a permanent security organization against aggression in the Orient.

Foreign Secretary Carlos P. Romulo made the proposal as delegates of the Philippines, Australia, India, Pakistan, Ceylon, Indonesia and Thailand opened a conference to further their mutual interest.

Romulo did not say exactly what nature such a body should have and what actions it could take, and he did not specifically name Communism as the threat it would guard against.

But the meaning of his words was clear to the delegates, all of whose countries are faced with the Communist danger, though in different degree.

Philippine President Elpidio Quirino came close to spelling it out when he asked for mutual efforts to counter "the terrible menace which overhangs the world."

The Chinese Nationalist regime of Chiang-Kai-Shek was not invited and its observers were barred from the closed sessions to follow.

Today's session was open to foreign diplomats but the Chinese ambassador ignored the invitation. Romulo, who also is president of the United Nations General Assembly, called for joint action after being elected president of the conference by unanimous vote.

He said his government hoped the parley would create a permanent regional organization which would guard internal security in Southeast Asia.

CHICAGO, May 26 (UP)—International Harvester Co. and the International Association of Machinists (Ind.) have reached agreement on a "contributory pension plan" and a liberalized health-welfare program.

The agreement, announced yesterday by both the company and the union, becomes effective July 1, 1950, if it is ratified by the IAM locals.

It provides a guaranteed minimum \$100-a-month retirement income for employees with 25 or more years experience after they reach 65.

In addition, the employe may receive the "pension annuity purchase by his own contribution."

The company will pay all costs of the liberalized health-welfare plan which provides a \$2,600 life insurance program, and increased hospital and surgical benefits for employes and their families.

Perhaps 500,000 Communist Youth To Participate In Berlin Ceremony

BERLIN, May 26 (UP)—The United States, Britain and France challenged Russia tonight on the eve of a long heralded "peace" demonstration here to cooperate in holding free elections to unify all Germany.

The reopening of the all-Germany election issue was calculated to take some of the wind out of the sails of the Communists who were massing young people in East Berlin for the toughest demonstration here since the tense days of the Russian blockade.

Britain rolled armored cars into Potsdamer Platz, the Times Square of Berlin, to guard against any violence during the rally of perhaps 500,000 Communist youths. Allied commanders have promised that any Communist attempt to cross into West Berlin will be repulsed.

Some 100 youths shouted insults at West Berlin police today along the Soviet-American sector border. Ten Russian soldiers and 35 East German police looked on passively.

Against that backdrop, the three Western High Commissioners sent separate letters to Gen. V. I. Chukov, Russian commander here, saying:

"My government would be prepared for me to share in the responsibility of framing an electoral law under which all-German elections could be held."

The letters listed eight principles drafted by the Big Three Foreign ministers at their recent meeting in London under which "German unity should be achieved." They were:

1. Free election of an all-German government.
2. Guarantee of freedom of movement, speech, radio, press, association and assembly and liberty from arbitrary arrest and detention.
3. Freedom of action for all democratic political parties.
4. Independence of the judiciary.
5. Prohibition of political secret police and police formations like the present East zone military force which the Western powers have labeled an army in disguise.
6. Assurances of a unified German economy, currency and customs and four-power agreement on such matters as reparations and industrial limitation.
7. Return by Russia of all plants seized from Germans in Soviet zone.
8. Establishment of a four-power commission exercising its reserve powers so as to permit the German government to function effectively.

Local Wits Have Little Joke Now At Wayland Cost

PLAINVIEW, May 26 (UP)—Local wits today suggested "Smoke gets in your eyes" as Alma Mater song of Wayland college, following yesterday's unanimous approval by college trustees of President J. W. Marshall's "no-smoking" edict.

Dr. Marshall, with the announced intention of bringing "positive Christianity" to Wayland college, said recently that any student found smoking, drinking or gambling "anywhere at anytime" would be expelled.

His action brought the resignation from the board of Judge Frank Day, a pipe-smoking veteran of more than 25 years on the board.

UT SCIENTISTS WORKING ON MIRRORS THAT MAY REPLACE EXPENSIVE LENSES

AUSTIN, May 26 (UP)—University of Texas scientists worked today on a mirror-type gadget which may take the place of lenses in cameras and microscopes.

The new mirror optical systems are known as "objectives."

Howard S. Coleman, director of university optical research, said they would make optical instruments cheaper and lighter.

"A student-type mirror microscope should cost about \$50," he said. "That instrument, with a lens, now sells for \$150."

Coleman said similar reductions could be expected in mirror cameras.

"Not only will telephoto objectives cost less than corresponding lenses, but their length and weight will be greatly reduced," he said.

Coleman said the research project, undertaken in cooperation with the Armed Forces and the National Research Council, is just getting started. Tests began last February.

The University of Texas was chosen for the project because its optical research laboratory is the only known place in the world with adequate facilities for making the tests.

Farm Roundup News

The people of our nation have come to know that we must conserve our soil if we are to have continuous, abundant agricultural production. And, we have learned too, that it must be efficient conservation—the kind that will keep our land permanently productive.

In turn, soil conservation requires intelligent use and maintenance of our land resources. This may mean terracing to hold soil and conserve rainfall; it may mean proper use of our pasture grasses if we want to have and keep the good grasses which will produce the most pounds of beef, wool or mohair. It may mean adding a soil improving crop to the rotation, in order to increase soil productivity; or, it may mean seeding grass on abandoned cropland, or land that has ceased to pay a profitable return.

We, as soil conservation technicians, realize that when a group, or an individual asks his soil conservation district for assistance, and the district in turn asks us

to help him; that he has a problem, and a desire to do something about it. We have come to know that effective soil conservation requires a plan; a workable, practical layout of the farm, showing what needs to be done, and what can be done in every field and pasture. It is at this point that effective planning takes place. By walking over the farm or ranch with the owner, field by field, pasture by pasture, discussing each problem with him on the ground, and developing plans for treating each acre according to its needs, and the desire of the landowner. We endeavor to assist the landowner in doing only those things which he cannot do for himself, in the development of his plan, and at the same time we try to lead him to realize that there is no substitute for quality and thoroughness. An effective, workable plan meets the desire of the landowner as well as treating each acre according to its individual capabilities. Each acre of land, like each human being, is different from the next one.

The trained soil conservation technician has learned that half-way measures will not do the job. Each conservation measure applied to the land is designed to support another one and the conservation work on one farm is carried out with an eye to the next farm. This viewpoint is essential, for erosion has no respect for boundary lines. Gullies do not stop at fence lines, and neither do dust storms.

Essentially, the soil conservation service is a corps of trained, experienced specialists in soils, plants, animals and land use; organized to work cooperatively with farmers out on their land, chiefly by supplying technical assistance, all the way from planning the work to helping with its application and maintenance. The service also carries on, in cooperation with the state experiment stations throughout the country, a program for the development of new and better methods of conservation, and for getting immediate, practical answers to questions that are constantly arising.

Erosion is a major threat to the

culture, because where erosion is permitted to go on unchecked for a very long time, the standard of living soon goes down. Around the world, since the beginning of history, poverty has followed in the wake of erosion.

The conservation of soils and water is one of the imperative jobs of America. There is no political, economic, social, or scientific disagreement about this fact. Fertile soil is a matter of national concern. Louis Bromfield expressed his concern as follows: "We know that poor, worn-out land, makes not only poor crops and scrubby cattle, it makes poor under-developed, under-nourished people as well. The great problem of American agriculture is the decline of human stock through the decline in fertility and mineral content of the soil itself. 'Poor land makes poor people,' is a saying every American should have printed and hanging over his bed."

We are faced with a situation similar to the one which faced the Jewish people, after their release from Babylonian captivity. The people knew the wall around Jerusalem must be rebuilt, but the task seemed so enormous they could not muster the courage to begin. They dreaded the job, and put it off for 98 years. The prophet Nehemiah arrived on the scene, and through skill and un-

matched leadership, convinced them of the necessity for doing the job. He created a desire within them, and then led them in the task. The job was accomplished in 52 days. Biblical history records the statement, "And they built the wall for the people had a mind to work." If we as a nation are going to meet the demands for the conservation of our soils and man, we must all have a mind to work. When we do, the job will be accomplished, in record time.

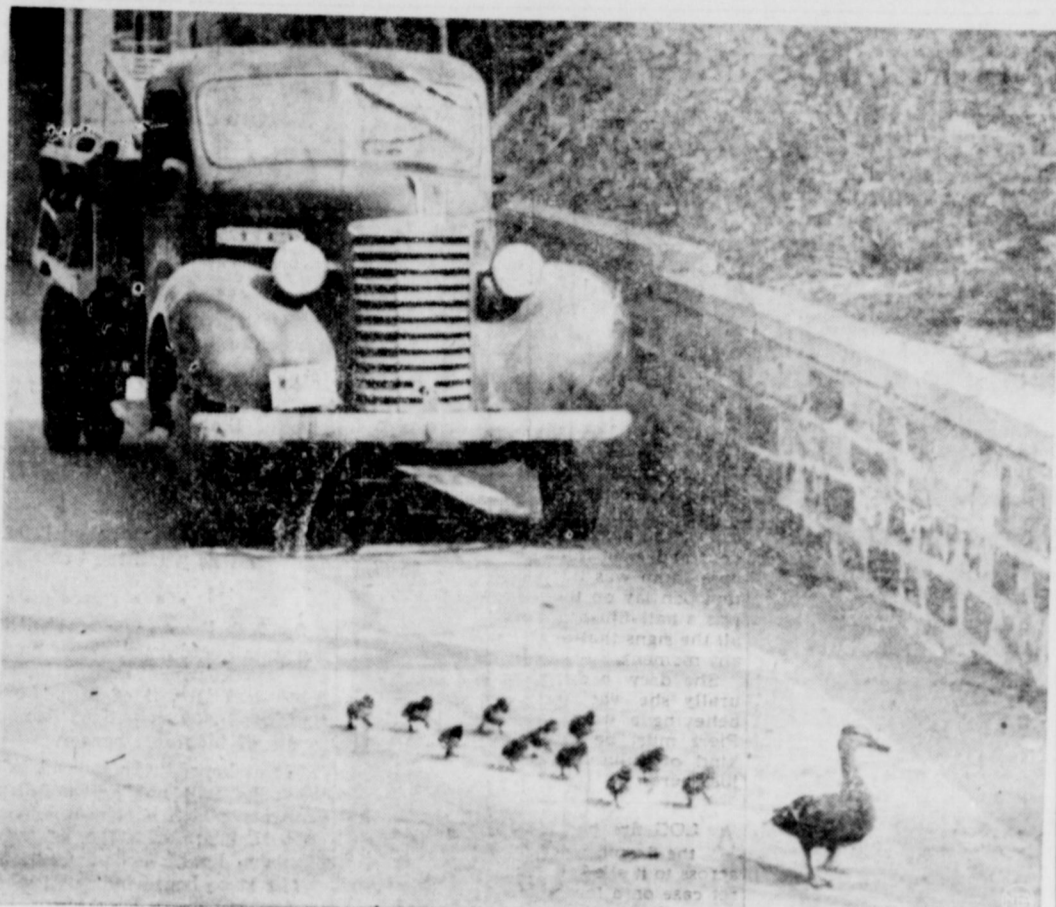

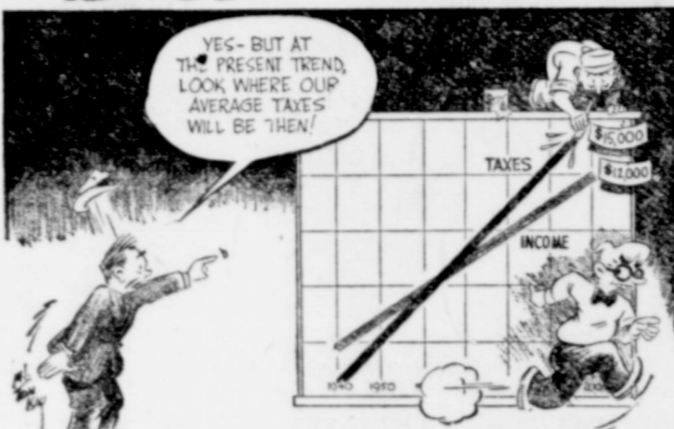
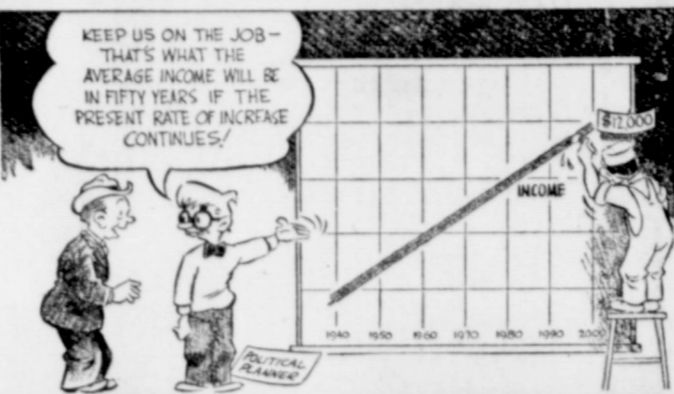

Who'll Pay the Deficit?

Medical Journal Says Editorially That It Believes Dr. Sander To Get License To Practice Medicine, Back

BOSTON, May 26 (UP)—The New England Journal of Medicine has said editorially it believes Dr. Hermann N. Sander will regain his license to practice medicine in New Hampshire.

The oldest medical weekly in the nation said in reviewing the case of the 42 year old Candia physician acquitted in the "mercy slaying" of a woman cancer patient that the New Hampshire Board of Registration in Medicine gave "reason to believe" Sander would be permitted to resume his career.

Sander's license was revoked by the state board April 19 for "morally reprehensible" actions in the death last Dec. 4 of Mrs. Abbie C. Borroto, 59, a patient doomed to die of incurable cancer.

"It is hoped," the journal said, "that he will not again fail to realize the high standards of conduct that are expected of every physician by his colleagues."

The state board indicated when

it revoked Sander's license that it would not consider an application for reinstatement before June 19.

Dr. Sander already has announced his intention of applying for reinstatement of his license.

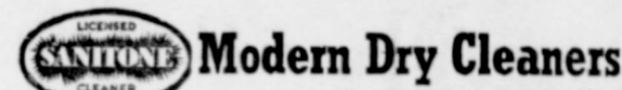

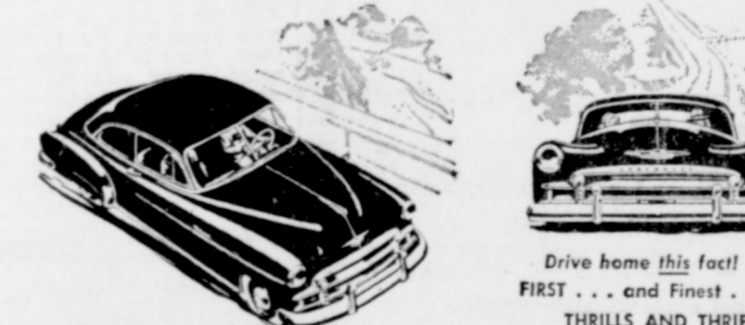
