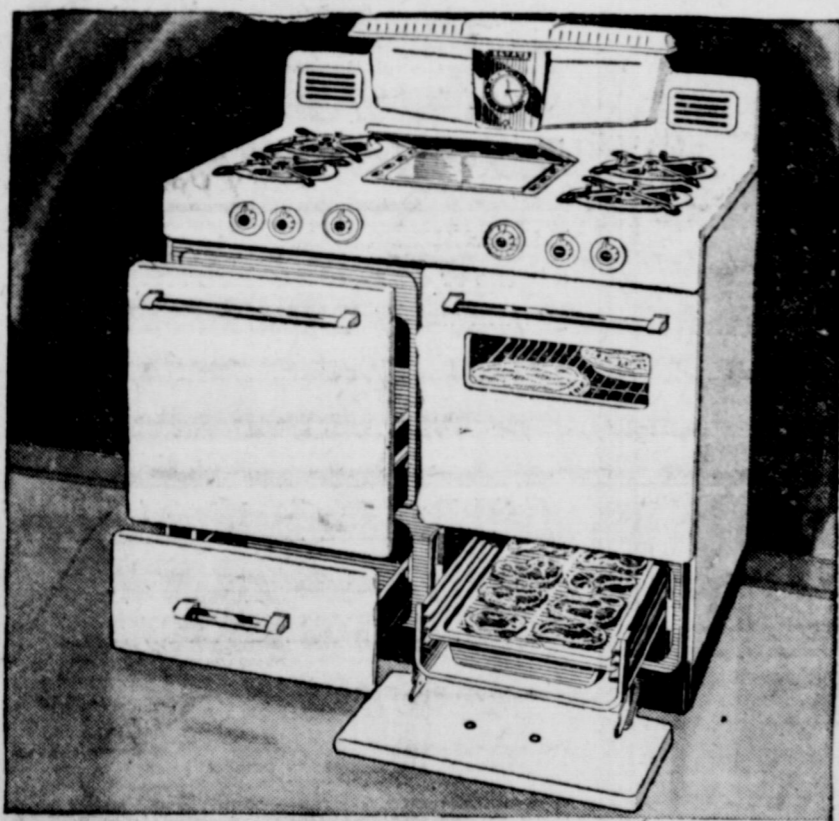

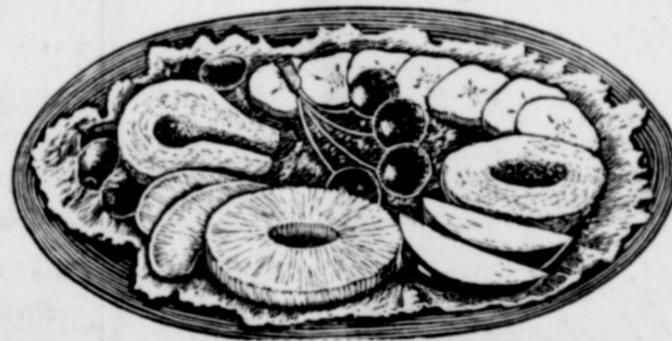

From what the old timers are saying the Catfish are moving around late this year, but safe due to start biting anytime now. Billy Walters says they have started, and this includes Mr. and Mrs. W.W. Walters. They took a 43 1/2 lb. Yellow Cat over the week end

at Eliasville just below the dam on trot line using Drum for bait up to 1 and one-half lbs.

A recurrence of that hectic fishing period of June 1947 is anticipated at 100-year-old Eliasville's Donnell Dam anytime within the next two weeks, Red Brownlow, one of the old timers, predicts.

The old timers have been anticipating a 'red' rise on the Clear Fork of the Brazos River to make fishing 'normal.' That rise hit the old dam May 26 and was continuing Wednesday morning.

Brownlow said the fishing would hold for at least two weeks. He quoted several of the old timers along the river as raving seen the large yellow catfish coming upriver from Possum Kingdom Lake and the Brazos River. None of the larger fish have been caught yet because the water has been running over the dam two swiftly to allow safe fishing from the ancient concrete structure.

## ★ THE SCOREBOARD ★ Cass Michaels Gives Senators Best of the White Sox Deal

NEW YORK—(NEA)—Baseball men contacted are unanimous in the opinion that the Senators got the best of the six-player deal that sent Scarborough, Eddie Robinson and Kozar to the White Sox for Michaels, Kuzava and Ostrowski.

Cass Michaels is the big difference, they point out. He is perhaps the slickest second baseman in the American League.  
Big Bob Kuzava has the mechanics of a great left-hander. The only question is his heart.  
Rae Scarborough easily might help a pennant contender, but the Chicago club hardly will be that while he retains his stuff. The latter is especially true now that the brilliant Michaels has been dealt off for no reason at all.

Of the players who figure to help either way, the Washington club got five years the best of it both ways. Michaels, 24, and Kuzava, 27, are that much younger than Robinson and Scarborough, respectively.

NOBODY could understand why General Manager Frank Lane passed Michaels along, leaving Red Corriden without an acceptable second baseman.

The White Sox have a first baseman in 22-year-old Gordon Goldsberry, who would serve the outfit just as well as Robinson at home while being developed.  
For these two reasons, close observers anticipated an additional deal or deals.  
New York offered the Senators five men for Robinson, who belongs either in Yankee Stadium or Detroit's Briggs Stadium, where his long shots reach the stands. The Tiger hitch was that they have no talent to spare.  
The Yanks were also hot for Scarborough. When Clark Griffith refused to listen, Casey Stengel offered the White Sox a package for Kuzava, which in the end was vetoed by General Manager George Weiss. The Red Sox fancied Scarborough.  
New York had the inside track, however, for the Yanks possessed

ing of oil to this area in the early 20's, the people who know the river have never been too busy to observe at least a week each summer to the national pastime of fishing off the old dam.

**SURE EQUIPMENT USED**  
Most of that fishing is done with surf equipment of the heaviest variety. And, it is done by those who go prepared to stay until the big ones bite. It is not unusual to see a fisherman hold the same fishing location for 42 hours with only brief relief for food, coffee and maybe a little sleep.  
When the big ones start biting, it will be a three-ring circus for some three days as fish weighing as much as 65 pounds are hauled onto the sand bars. Although most of the fishing is done immediately below the dam, the big fish have to be 'played' down the river to shallow water before they can be landed. It often takes as many as half a dozen co-operating fishermen to land one large yellow catfish.

It is not at all unusual for the fishermen to hold their own little 'court' right on the bank of the river to determine ownership of one of those big ones. That is occasioned by the numerous fishermen angling in the same big hole. In the 1949 fishing season, a 42-pounder was landed and there were eight hooks with lines attached to him. The problem of who should claim the monster had to be determined right there. That takes diplomacy that only those bearded old timers of Eliasville can dispense. Sometimes there are hooks with broken lines attached to the big fish when they are landed. In a case of that kind, sometimes a fisherman who has had a line broken will lay claim to the big one. He has to be at least partially satisfied.

**DISPUTES SETTLED**  
And, out of all the years of organized fishing at Eliasville, there is no record of any serious trouble arising out of one of those situations. They always settle their differences between themselves.

Eliasville handles the situation of fishing without a great deal of thought to the commercial 'angles'. The merchants of the town make available the normal merchandise and service but you can't rent a boat or cabin at the fishing hole. There is a small commercial camp

ground but if the fishermen of fishing without a great deal of don't care to rent space there, plenty of land is available for camping elsewhere. Live bait can be bought in the town.

This year's pilgrims will be just like those of past years. They will come in every type of transportation known to men. They will stay varying periods from a couple of days to two weeks. . . spending an entire vacation fishing and hunting squirrels around Eliasville. But, whatever length of time they send, the people of Eliasville will make them more than welcome and each newcomer who
