County Clerk Virgil Love came across some very unusual papers in his work Tuesday.

They were Warranty Deeds on property which dated as far back as December 1889, and they had never been recorded in the clerk's office.

Love said that he had been around the county clerk's office for some 14 years and never before had he come across property deeds of such age which had never been recorded.

He said that often he has received instruments five, ten or fifteen years, but very very rarely any older than that.

The deeds were written entirely by hand on a long sheet of plain paper. No printing or typewriting was anywhere on the deeds.

Reds Begin Southward Surge

4th Day's Lull Shows Signs Of New Offensive

TOKYO, Friday, Jan. 19 (UP)—Communist troops began an ominous southward surge all across Korea Thursday. They almost trapped a United Nations armored patrol in the rapidly-filling no-man's-land south of Seoul.

The patrol fought its way out of Kumyangjang, 23 miles southeast of Seoul, against two companies of Communist troops moving in to fill the ground between Red lines and the U. S. 8th Army.

The UN forces escaped a flanking threat in a sharp fight. They killed or wounded 25 Reds and captured one Chinese prisoner.

The lull in major ground fighting went into its fourth day amid growing signs that the Reds were preparing for what might be an imminent new offensive.

American forces on the central front also clashed in a sharp fight with about 1,500 Reds in the hills 10 miles northeast of Yongwol.

But in abandoned Wonju, superior Communist forces on ridges outside the city watched without moving while an American company reconnoitered the flattened city and withdrew.

Intelligence and aerial reconnaissance reports said Communist hordes were moving south toward the battle line all along the 140-mile trans-Korean front.

Now that Communist China has rejected the United Nations appeal for a cease-fire in Korea, it was believed the Reds would not long delay an all-out offensive to push the 8th Army back into the old Pusan beachhead.

The requirements for the forming of a co-op and the laws guiding the formation of such a project will be discussed. Details of the program will be explained at the meeting and plans for getting a membership movement underway will be discussed.

Interested parties are urged to attend the meetings whether they have signed up for the co-op or not.

Frank Sparks will discuss the Responsibilities, Duties and Obligations of the citizen at 7:30 p.m. today in the American Legion Hall under the sponsorship of the American Legion Dulinda-Daniel Post No. 70.

In suggesting the observance of ROD month, the American Citizenship Committee of the State Bar Association stated, "We are disturbed over the possible loss of our rights and freedoms which are now in constant danger from two enemies—the communist and the lethargic American citizen—the one who wants to keep his liberties but is too lazy to do anything about it."

A bill of responsibilities has been prepared by the American Citizenship Committee for citizens to follow in carrying out their responsibilities, obligations and duties as American citizens.

According to the booklet, the city's income for 1950 was \$152,750 which was raised by the following methods: Taxes, 42%; Water, 32%; Sewer & Trash Fees, 12%; Parking Meters, 8%; Miscellaneous, 6%.

Of this income, \$151,445 was spent during the year in the following ways: Water & Sewer operation, 27%; Bond retirement, 19%; Bond Interest, 9%; Police, 8%; Streets 7%; Administrative, 6%; Fire, 5%; and Miscellaneous, 19%.

Also in the booklet are pictures of the city commissioners, Jack Muirhead, Pearson Grimes, Dave Fiensy and J. H. Rushing, and Mayor W. W. Linkenhopfer.

Introduction to the booklet is a statement to the citizens by Mayor Linkenhopfer.

Every citizen who did not receive a booklet was urged by Heck to come by the City Hall and pick one up.

The bill of responsibilities has ten items covering various duties of a citizen to retain his freedom and way of life.

First of the ten articles is that it shall be the duty of every citizen to render undivided allegiance to the Constitution of the U. S., to work for its betterment and perpetuation to respect the sovereignty of the people's government, and to defend the nation against all its enemies, whomsoever.

Another points out that each citizen should be familiar with the Constitution of the U. S. and be informed as to what his liberties and rights are his under that Constitution and to use those rights to the betterment of his own and his fellow citizens welfare.

These duties will be outlined by Sparks tonight.

C. G. Stinchcomb, president of the Legion Post, urged that every citizen be present at the meeting in order that we may have a stronger America.

VA Big Spring Hospital Needs Doctors, Nurses

The Veterans Administration Hospital in Big Spring has issued an urgent appeal for more doctors and nurses.

Dr. L. B. Andrew, manager of the recently activated V-A hospital, said that he plans to open an additional ward as soon as enough professional personnel can be obtained.

The installation was designed for a 250-bed hospital but is not operating at full capacity, Dr. Andrew said, because of a shortage of doctors and registered nurses.

Nurses' salaries range from \$3,400 to \$5,400 per year depending upon experience, education, and training, he said. Doctors' salaries also vary with qualifications.

Application forms are available at any major V-A installation, Dr. Andrew said, and completed application forms should be sent direct to the Big Spring V-A hospital.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 President Truman said today that wage-price controls will be imposed as quickly as practicable.

The President was asked at his news conference about reports that the controls might be ordered within a few days. Mr. Truman said he thought defense mobilizer Charles E. Wilson covered the situation in a speech last night at Philadelphia.

Wilson said controls will be imposed as quickly as possible. He set no date but a government source said a general price freeze, accompanied by a rollback perhaps to Jan. 1 of prices hiked recently, will be ordered in about a week. A "looser" order "stabilizing" wages will come later.

As the bomber, flying low over the field, dipped its wings in salute, one of the Russians said in English:

"It is beautiful—and how big!"

War Jitters Hit Europe

LONDON, Jan. 18 (UP)—Europeans became so jittery today over Communist China's blunt refusal to order a cease-fire in Korea that even the traditionally neutral Swiss were thinking about building up defense against aggression.

The government tightened security measures to safeguard Eisenhower and prevent further violence.

But Communist sources said they expected the protest demonstrations to continue with bigger turnout scheduled in Milan, Turin and Naples.

Police at Adrano on the island of Sicily were forced to open fire on a demonstrating agricultural workers last night when they refused to disperse.

One worker was killed by police bullets and 10 workers and 21 federal carabinieri police were injured, Reinforcements were sent to the island city.

The Communist newspaper Avanti in Rome called Eisenhower a "Gaulleitet" (Nazi overlord) and said "all Rome is raising a cry of protest" to his being here.

ORGANIZED RESERVE WINGS, AIR NG DUE MARCH 1-MAY 15

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (UP)—The Air Force announced today that all of its remaining organized reserve wings and most Air National Guard wings—a total of 150,000 men—will be called to active duty between March 1 and May 15.

The callup includes 12 Air National Guard wings, 21 reserve training center wings, a "major portion" of individual reserves, and "an undetermined number" of unassigned volunteer reserves.

Cavalry Medal Available To Texas Veterans

Officers and enlisted men, or their next of kin if the soldier is deceased, who served in the two brigades of cavalry organized by the State of Texas under authority of the War Department, between December 8, 1917 and November 11, 1918 are entitled to the Texas National Guard Cavalry Medal, Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry, the Adjutant General pointed out today.

These units were never drafted into Federal service and therefore were ineligible for the Victory Medal. So the U. S. Congress, in 1924, authorized the issuance of this distinctive medal for personnel of the 1st and 2nd Cavalry Brigades.

The medal is free. Persons who consider themselves eligible for one of these medals should write the Adjutant General, Austin, stating their length of service and name of unit.

'Butcher' Billy Denies Knowing Of Murder Spree

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 18 (UP)—Badman Bill Cook's spirits rose today, although the time was drawing close for his return to Oklahoma where he must stand trial for the kidnap slaying of five persons.

The weak-eyed little ex-convict perked up for the first time since his capture Monday. But he still denied remembering anything about killing eight asserted victims.

Cook apparently had forgotten even where he was being held and asked a county jail guard where he was.

"Don't you know?" the guard answered.

"Well, I know I ain't in Mexico," the suspect said. "They don't have beds in their jails."

Mexican authorities took Cook into custody at Santa Rosalia, 600 miles south of the border.

Capt. Earl C. Riley, chief jailer here, said Cook managed a wan smile when asked if he felt better. The 22-year-old former convict recovered from a dysentery attack after treatment with sulfa and penicillin. He now is eating hearty meals, Riley said.

The Joplin, Mo., youth will be transported to Oklahoma City, where a federal grand jury will convene Tuesday to consider an indictment against him under the Lindbergh Law. The federal statute provides a possible death penalty for kidnaping.

Divorces Show Decline In US

NEW YORK, N. Y. — Divorces granted in the United States in 1949 show a decline for the third year in a row, Metropolitan Life Insurance Company statisticians report. The estimated total for the

year was 391,000 which is a reduction of 7% from the 1948 total of 422,000, and of 38% from the peak year 1946.

Despite this trend, the number of divorces granted last year was the sixth highest in the country's history, exceeding that for every year prior to 1944, and more than one fifth higher than the figure for 1942, the first year of United States participation in World War



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

B-36's Drop Make Believe Hydrogen Bombs On Flight


LAKENHEATH, ENG., Jan 18 (U.P.)—Six giant American B-36 bombers that landed in England Tuesday from the United States dropped make-believe hydrogen bombs en route and were intercepted over England by British jet fighter planes.

Lt. Col. John Bartlett, operations officer on the flight from Fort Worth, Texas, declined today to disclose—presumably for security reasons—whether the bombers appeared without warning to the British fighter pilots. "All I can say is that normal interception took place," Bartlett said. "But when they intercepted us they sure did a good job. They were all around us."

Crew members of the 7th Bomb Wing of the 8th Air Force who flew the planes on their 5,000-mile flight said the British jet, Vampires and Meteors swarmed around the bombers while the 10-engine bombers were flying at 30,000 feet.

The U. S. Navy, which questioned the ability of the Air Force bombers to deliver atom bombs anywhere in the world,

claimed during the unification row that modern naval jets could "shoot down" B-36's if mock air battles were staged. The Air Force did not take up the challenge.

First Lt. C. F. Horton of San Antonio, Texas, who made the flight, said as many as 20 British-jets—believed slower than modern U. S. Navy jets—zoomed around his plane at one time over Britain.

He said smaller numbers of fighters also reached the plane at other times but that he had not used the four jets added to the normal six piston-engines on the plane to increase his speed. Commenting on the fight, Air

Texas GIs Assured Of Protection For Civilian Insurance

(SPECIAL)—Texans called to active military service needn't worry about their civilian life insurance policies lapsing.

That's the good word from C. E. Moody, industrial office manager of the Home State Life Insurance Company and graduate of the armed forces Field Economic Mobilization Course completed December 8th in Oklahoma City.

Moody, who is a captain in the Army Reserves, points out: "Most enlisted reservists, and many draftees, draw much less pay on active duty than they did in civilian life. Normally, this would work such a hardship that they would have to drop their commercial life insurance, thereby losing valuable protection for their families."

"Fortunately, the Soldiers and Sailors Relief Act provides that when a man enters active service, he can arrange with the finance officer to prevent a lapse of his civilian insurance while he is on duty, and for two years thereafter."

Moody explains that the GI's family is expected to make the premium payments on such insurance when possible, and that any payments made by the VA are to be repaid without interest by the serviceman at some future date. If he doesn't repay, the debt will be deducted by the VA from any benefits which might later accrue to him.

"For the benefit of wives and parents who may not have known about this," says Moody, "let me add that the beneficiaries themselves can apply for this protection if the insured serviceman is serving overseas."

Home State Life policyholders who might be affected by this ruling are being notified by their local agent.


