

Bailey County voters to take to the polls Tuesday

Bailey County voters, along with Texans throughout the state, will take to the polls on Tuesday for the November 8 General Election. It is expected to be a quiet day on the local level as all of the local races are unopposed. On the state-

wide level though, Democratic incumbent Governor Ann Richards and Republican candidate George W. Bush are running neck to neck in a race that is expected to be close.

Polls will be open on Tuesday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. The

seven voting places in Bailey County are as follows: Voting Box #1, Bailey County Courthouse; Voting Box #2, Bailey County Coliseum; Voting Box #3, Three Way School; Voting Box #4, Bailey County Extension Office; Voting Box #5,

Bula Community Center; Voting Box #6, Needmore Community Center and Voting Box #7, Muleshoe City Hall.

Seeking re-election in the county races are County Judge Marilyn Cox; County Com-

mission Precinct #2 C.E. Grant; County Commissioner Precinct #4, Bennie Claunch and Billie Redwine Downing, who won the Democratic primary for county clerk.

Also unopposed is Nelda Merriott, district clerk; Jack

Bates, Justice of the Peace for Precinct #1; and Todd W. Ellis, Justice of the Peace Precinct #4.

County Attorney Paul Crosnoe will also be seeking election to this office for the

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Medical technology advances with new CAT scan

Muleshoe Area Medical Center Hospital has just completed installation of a new Computerized Axial Tomography (CAT) scan machine which will enable local physicians to more accurately detect and pinpoint serious injuries and serious illnesses in patients.

The hospital contracted for the \$2 million CAT scan machine last February and installation was completed a few weeks ago. Richard Murphy, administrator for the hospital said that so far, the CAT scanner has been used 15 times.

"Now the machine can be used to do x-rays and detect serious injuries and serious illnesses that we couldn't do before," Murphy said.

The CAT scanner was housed in a mobile trailer until its recent installation. It is now housed in a small building which has been moved to the hospital's west parking lot, next

to the X-Ray Department.

The hospital is now operating the CAT scanner on a fulltime basis, seven days a week, Murphy said.

"This is advance medical technology in healthcare in Muleshoe," Murphy said. "And we're able to have this because

our physicians Dr. Purdy, Dr. McClanahan, Dr. Johnson and Dr. Allgood know when it is time to use it."

The CAT scan machine will be operated by the Radiology Department, under the direction of L.T. Johnson. Additional employees in the Radi-

ology Department who will also help operate it are Anita Gardea and Cynthia Baca.

Murphy said that the CAT scan operates at 360 degrees and creates a computer image of a person's inner body.

"It is a super x-ray machine that does more than a conven-

tional x-ray system," Murphy said.

Prior to the installation of the CAT scan, patients had to be sent to Lubbock or wait until a mobile unit came to the Muleshoe hospital once a week.

Engineer examines city water leak

An engineer from a firm Parket, Smith, Cooper-McMorris of Amarillo was in Muleshoe on Thursday, examining a leak in the city's million gallon reservoir.

The reservoir is the primary ground storage reservoir which holds the city's water supply.

The Muleshoe City Council held a special meeting on Tuesday to discuss the leak, which was discovered last week during a routine check.

Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr said that the leak

right now is not causing any problems because some temporary adjustments have been made, mainly by lowering the water level in the storage reservoir.

"We are not loosing any water right now," Marr said. "We had to lower the water level, but other than that, the city is not being affected by it."

Marr said that the engineer looked at the reservoir Thursday and said that it appears a liner located inside

the concrete tank needs to be replaced. The liner is basically what holds the water.

At this point, the city does not know how much it will cost to be repaired or at what kind of time frame they are looking at, but bids will be taken for the repair.

The City of Muleshoe has two other concrete tanks and two elevated tanks located in different places of the city which also hold the city's water supply.

Muleshoe closes season with disappointing loss, 39-6

The Muleshoe Mules saw their season come to a disappointing end Friday night as Shallowater took the field at Benny Douglas Stadium and piled up 39 first-half points, holding on to win 39-6 on a cold, wet night.

In a game where virtually any and everything that Shallowater (6-1-3, 3-0-2 in District 2-3A) tried worked, Muleshoe (3-7, 1-4 in District 2-3A) couldn't get anything to go their way.

The Mustangs scored on their first play from scrimmage, a 49-yard bomb from Dereck Blair to Jay Luck, to set the tone for the first half. Shallowater's second drive was nearly thwarted when Robert Jaime deflected a Blair pass intended for Cole Roberts. Jaime had the ball in both hands, but it squirted free and Roberts nabbed the tip for a 33-yard gain. Two plays later, Ryan Lupton went 33 yards to put the Mustangs ahead 14-0.

Late in the first half, the Mules had another good defensive play erased by a fluke reception by Roberts. Defensive back Jimmy Gauna made a leaping deflection of another Blair pass to Roberts, but before the ball hit the ground, it bounced off Mike Villarreal (who was on the ground) and popped up into the hands of Roberts for a 17-yard gain. Three plays later, Cory Menton booted a 35-yard field goal. Shallowater finished the game

with five fumbles, but the Mule defense (Villarreal) managed to get their hands on only one of the loose balls.

The Mule offense also had their share of opportunities that didn't pan out. Trailing 14-0, Rashad Kirven returned the ensuing kickoff 45 yards before the kicker (Menton) made the touchdown-saving tackle. The Mules offense started to click, with Gauna hooking up with Daniel Garbarino twice for 22

yards, putting the ball at the Mustang 20-yard line. However, Gauna's next pass for Garbarino went long and was intercepted in the end zone.

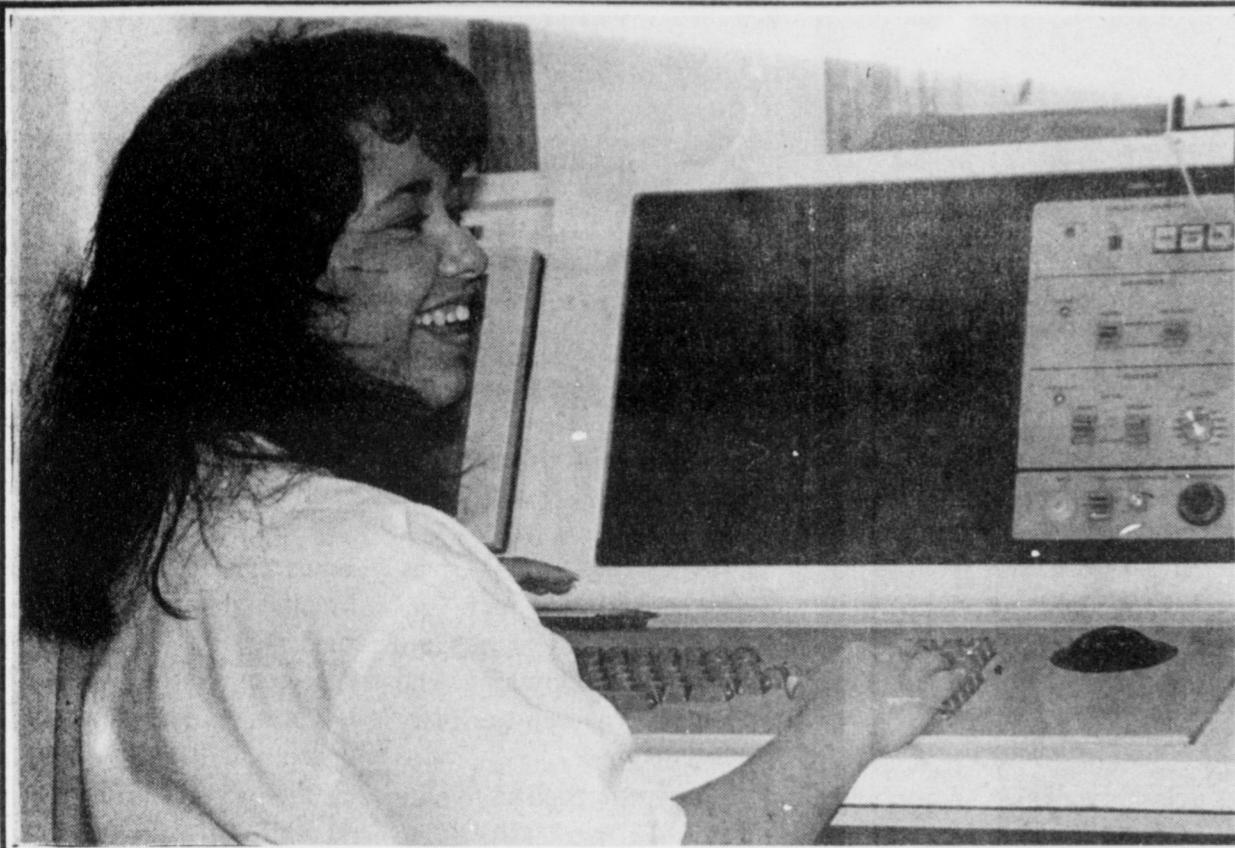
Another Mule drive stalled in Mustang territory when a fourth-and-eight screen pass was defended well.

The Mules had a chance to score early in the fourth quarter when Kirven took a fourth-and-three pitchout around the right end for 60 yards. Kirven again

was about to score when Menton made a diving, touchdown-saving tackle at the 3-yard line. The next play, however, Gauna was hit hard and fumbled and Shallowater recovered.

It seemed as if the Mules were destined not to score, but Gauna atoned for his early fumble by putting the ball across the stripe from two yards out. The play, a fake toss to Kirven sweeping right, fooled the Shallowater

defense, but Gauna still had to knife between a pair of Mustang defensive linemen, which he did. But, as was the story all night, the Mules ran into problems on the point after attempt. A high snap was fielded by kicker Edward Rodriguez, who ran backwards for 15 yards to avoid the rush, reversed his field, broke through three tackles before eventually being hauled down at the 7-yard line.

"It's a tough way to end the season," said MHS head coach Randy Adair. "It's not fun to get beat like this."

"But our kids showed a lot of character in the second half," he continued. "Kids with less character would've given up when they were down and let Shallowater score more points, but we didn't."

The Mules actually outscored Shallowater in the second half,

6-0, and put the brakes on the Mustang offense which compiled most of their 371 yards before the half.

Muleshoe finished the game with 192 yards of offense. Kirven's string of 100 yard games was broken, as the senior finished his last game with 97 yards on 16 carries. Although the numbers sound impressive, Kirven was held in check the entire night except for the 60 yard run. Gauna completed 9-of-19 passes for 101 yards, but was intercepted three times.

Despite the loss, Adair remained positive about the Mules' play, as he has all season.

"Those 19 or 20 kids that played hard all year deserved to have more success, but sometimes life deals you obstacles," Adair summed up. "You've got to learn how to overcome those road blocks, that's the challenge we faced this year."

"I'm not ashamed or embarrassed with what we've accomplished this season. The kids have built character, leadership abilities and the intangible qualities that it takes to be successful in life."

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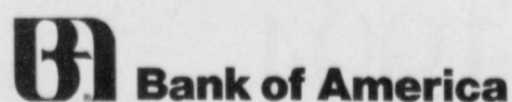

Friend retires from life



I was reminded of Harry Johnson today.

I'd been driving down a long stretch of country road. The dust boilin' up in the rearview mirror, a thermos of coffee in the seat and the sun warmin' the cab of the pickup.

It was a fine fall day. Cool, but not crisp. Still dry. The brush and grass have given up on rain ever comin' and are shuttin' down to hibernate.

Great day to be workin' cows.

I first met Harry in the feedlot. He was the cattle foreman. He was not happy there. He was an 'outside' man. He'd spent his life workin' on ranches. I don't know if he ever owned one himself but he was a cowboy. A cowboy's cowboy. Which meant he took care of the cows like they were his own.

He lived in Bruneau, Idaho. Somewhere along the way he married Iris. She was a school teacher in that little community, I think. Harry told me he learned a lot about his wife the day he got his first paycheck after they were married.

He was cowboyin' for some outfit down there in Owyhee county. His check was for \$30. He stopped at Angel's to have a beer and cash his check. They had a card game goin' and Harry got sucked in. By the time he had realized his predicament, he lost \$29.

Harry said he went down the street to his house. He walked in the door with his hat in his hand and confessed to his new wife. She looked him over. She couldn't believe he

came home with one dollar! She suggested he might as well go back and try and lose it all. Well, he hiked back to Angel's, hit a lucky streak and won it all back!

Harry retired in 1973. We had a party for him in Mountain Home. Harry got up and said, "Just like the shipwrecked sailor who found a woman on a deserted island, I didn't come here to make a speech." Then he sat down.

Harry didn't take well to retirement. We'd make sure he got included in all the brandings and cow workin's. He'd come

to a few. But we couldn't get him to help. He'd lean on the fence or set in the cook trailer and visit. Matter of fact, he wore his bed slippers.

I used to think, 'Gosh, he needs to keep busy.' He knew how to do everything better than all of us but he never butted in.

I never figured out whether he had just decided to relax and soak up the sun after a lifetime of hard work or whether he put on his bed slippers and waited to die. He only lived eight more years after he retired.

Either way, he was my friend and I think about him now and then. 'Specially on bright fall days like this when you can lay on the south side of a windbreak, peaceful like and sorta doze.

Some Thoughts On Caterpillars and Tadpoles

As the story goes, two caterpillars once sat on a green leaf watching the aerial acrobatics of a beautifully-colored butterfly. They watched as the nimble butterfly deftly performed loops, rolls, and all manner of seemingly complicated and dangerous maneuvers.

Finally one caterpillar announced to the other, "You'd never get me up in a thing like that!"

Do you suppose a tadpole swimming comfortably in the cool safety of his pond might have similar feelings as he sees a frog sitting on the creek bank? "Look at that poor miserable creature," he might say to a brother tadpole. "How would you like to have to swim in jerks and move about on the ground in the air in undignified hops? Look how unbecoming those long legs are! I tell you, we should be thankful to have been born tadpoles!"

Biologists use a sixty-four dollar word for the process that changes caterpillars into butter-

flies and tadpoles into frogs. The word is *metamorphosis*. The dictionary defines it this way: "a transformation; a marked change in appearance, character, condition, or function." A metamorphosis is a change, a transformation.

Did you realize that the Apostle Paul uses this very word in the familiar passage in Romans 12:2? "Do not be conformed to this world," he writes, "but be transformed by the renewal of your mind." Experience a metamorphosis. Be transformed. Be changed.

Change is rarely comfortable. Doubtless our friend the caterpillar will be distressed when he and his companions begin to feel an irrepressible desire to build cocoons. Surely Brother Tad Pole will be frightened when he feels legs beginning to protrude and his tail starts to disappear.

Giving our lives to God and trusting Him to begin a spiritual transformation in them can also be frightening. After all, we don't know what He may have in mind. One thing is sure—the change will be for the better. I think you'll agree—it is better to be even a fledgling butterfly than to be a worm with potential!

Rotary Club hears program on food bank

Muleshoe Rotary Club met Tuesday, Nov. 1 in the Muleshoe Civic Center. President Charles Moraw brought the meeting to order. Crystal Howe addressed the club about her future trip to London, England as a cheerleader representative from Muleshoe. Crystal asked for support from the Rotary Club.

Bill Liles was responsible for the program. He introduced Kenneth Gray of Lorenzo. Kenneth is a volunteer board member of the Food Bank of Lubbock.

Kenneth told the Rotary of the activities of the Food Bank and about the acquisition of a plant site and dehydration equipment in Lubbock. The Food bank now distributes food to 16,000 people per day through 265 agencies in 77 surrounding counties.

With the dehydration plant, the Food Bank hopes to eventually feed 20 million people worldwide. Gray says that the dehydration plant can process 40,000 pounds of fresh food a day.

The Muleshoe Rotary Club envisions a plan to coordinate with area growers and packers to ship excess potatoes, carrots and other vegetables to the Lubbock dehydration plant. A large amount of locally-produced vegetables are not shipped to stores because they do not meet standards.

However, they are edible and can be used through the dehydration plant rather than dumped back in the fields.

Bruce Barrett of Springlake Potatoes and Buck Campbell of BC Produce were also invited to attend the meeting but after receiving confusing instructions from Max King, Stan did not attend. Hopefully, he will be able to attend another meeting.
