EASTLAND GOES ON BLITZ AGAINST FIRE FOR ONE DAY

EASTLAND, April 12 — This city fireman, a boy scout and two thriving oil center of 6,000 people insurance field men will inspect going on a one day blitz against every business and public building from basement to attic during the day. Where they find a potential cause of fire, they will leave a bright red tag to remind the owner or tenant that danger is present. Each owner or tenant also will get a complete report showing all hazards located with suggestions as to how they may be corrected.

Tom R. Chatfield of Dallas, an executive of a fire insurance company and president of the North Advisory Association, an organ-Texas Field Club, will direct the inspection of capital stock insurance companies. It will be the 14th city-wide inspection conducted in Texas since the state's four insurance field clubs began the program more than two years ago.

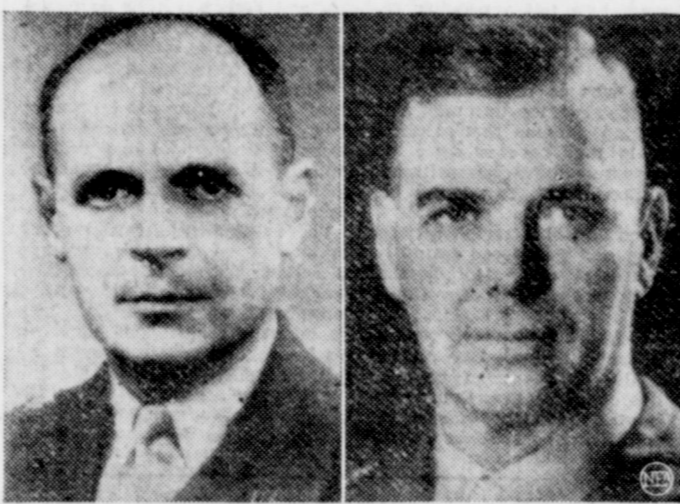

Funds Drive Progress Is Satisfactory

Progress on the hospital funds drive was reported to be satisfactory today by C. W. Hoffman, chairman of the funds committee.

"The committee is working and progress thus far has been satisfactory," Hoffman said. "Nothing has occurred so far to discourage us, however, nothing has occurred to assure us that we will reach the goal of \$100,000 this month."

Other members of the funds committee are W. B. Pickens and Jack Frost.

"A lot of questions are being asked about how the hospital is to be built, who is to operate it, who is to be in charge, etc.," Hoffman continued. "I think those questions should be answered later, probably at a public meeting."

"The important thing now is to raise the \$100,000," he added. "After we get the money then someone can figure out how to spend it."

"The duty of the funds committee is to raise the money for a hospital," Hoffman concluded. "A satisfactory plan for the building and operation of the hospital can be worked out later by another committee or at a public meeting."

If the reaction of a number of persons recently interviewed on the hospital question can be taken as a guide, Eastland citizens seem to be fully in favor of the drive.

"I cannot visualize our community without adequate repair facilities for our automotive engines," Herbert Westfall said. "Our present situation indicates that we are more concerned with the mechanical condition of our cars than with the physical and mental condition of our people."

"If we pull together the hospital is a cinch," was the opinion of Mr. Stambaugh.

Henry Pullman stated, "This town doesn't have a hospital and it sure needs one. I am behind it 100 per cent."

"We must have a hospital, that's all," was Frank Day's reply.

M. M. Martin said, "It is the best thing the city can do. I'll do all I can."

"I am very much for it," J. L. Riggan reported. "It is one of the greatest things that Eastland can do."

One of the largest attendances in four years, about 55 persons, were present for the breakfast.

W. B. Pickens addressed the group, explaining plans for the drive and the disposition of funds which will be raised.

Prizes Offered In Return Of Inspection Blanks

Prizes of \$10, \$3 and \$2 will be given by the chamber of commerce to the three school children who return the most of the home inspection blanks which were distributed to Eastland homes last week.

The blanks were passed out to homeowners of the city by members of the boy scouts last week. Blanks brought in by the children must be completed and signed to count in the contest.

Distributed in connection with the fire prevention inspection in Eastland to be made May 3, the blanks are primarily for the purpose of educating the home owner as to what fire hazards may be present in his home so they may be corrected if the owner desires.

An inspection of business houses will be made on May 3 by a 35 man inspection team from the North Texas Field Club, assisted by boy scouts and volunteer firemen.

The group will arrive in the city May 2, and will have a meeting at the Texas Electric Service Company building that night.

Five of the 35 men will operate as headquarters unit in the inspection and the other 30 will be divided into 15 two-man teams. The teams will be aided by boy scouts and volunteer firemen and will make an inspection of the business buildings of the city, with the consent of the owner. All fire hazards will be tagged and the owner will be urged to make corrections.

The fire prevention inspection is purely on a volunteer basis, and the co-operation of everyone is urged so that the city may have less fire hazards to endanger lives and property.

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COUNTY STOCK SHOW WILL SHOW ALL BREEDS OF ANIMALS

Dairy animals to be shown at the annual Eastland County Dairy show at the Fireman's softball field in that city on Wednesday, April 18 need not be purebred or registered if they are representative of their breed according to A. Z. Myrick, Cisco, President of the County Dairy organization.

All persons in the county with female dairy animals are urged to bring them in to the one-day show, on the ground by 10 o'clock that morning and can be removed and taken home immediately after they are classified, he said.

Cy Evans, prominent Dallas County breeder of Jersey cattle has been invited to attend the show to talk to the group on some phase of dairy breeding or management. It is not known as yet whether he can accept.

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce Agricultural Committee under Manager H. J. Tanner, have completed work on the show catalogue which is expected to come from the printer by the middle of next week. M. D. Fox, local vocational agricultural teacher headed a committee that worked out the rules, regulations and set up the different classes of animals to be shown. A. M. Meekma, Dairy Specialist of the A&M College Extension Service will classify the animals. In a classification show the individual animals are competing against the ideal dairy animal instead of against each other.

H. L. Geys, Jack McCarty and S. P. Spenny, Rising Star, have been named as the committee to handle both the Junior and adult judging contests to be held during the morning session of the show. Cash prizes are to be awarded to both senior and junior winners on the judging contests as was done in past years.

A grand total of \$350.00 will be distributed to owners of prize winning animals as well as to the winners of the senior and junior judging contests for the one day show.

All persons interested in the growth of the dairy industry in the county are urged to attend and see the animals.

The regular monthly meeting of the Eastland County Dairy Association will be held next Thursday night, April 12, at 7:30 o'clock in the conference room of the Texas Electric Service Company at Eastland to complete all show details, Myrick concluded.

Eastland County Has 10 Known Slot Machines

AUSTIN, April 12 (UP)—On the basis of Federal tax payments, Dallas County leads the state in the number of slot machines, information released by Attorney General Price Daniel revealed today. Dallas has 1579.

Daniel said the total on slot machines, as shown by federal tax records, came to 9,555—the greatest number of any state in the nation.

The attorney general released a breakdown county-by-county list on the number of one-armed bandits and similar gambling devices in Texas. However, he stipulated that "the newspaper man make it clear that these county lists do not necessarily indicate the present situation as to the number of existence of slot machines in any county."

The list showed the number of slot machines on which federal taxes have been paid since last July 1 and through the present date. Eastland County has 10 known slot machines.

LOCAL BOARDS TO HAVE SAY

WASHINGTON, April 12 (UP)—The House voted today to give local Draft Boards the final word on who is deferred to go to college.

The boards could not be required to defer anybody solely on the basis of forthcoming nationwide college deferment tests.

Rep. Paul J. Kilday, D., Tex., who sponsored the proposal as an amendment to a pending Draft and Universal Military Training bill, said it would not prohibit the tests, which already have been scheduled.

It would mean that each Draft Board can use its own judgment on college deferments. It can disregard the test scores if it so desires.

Selective Service Officials said in advance of the vote that the Kilday proposal would not upset their plans for the first three tests, to be given in May and June at more than 1,000 schools.

Students who make a score of 70 or better on the tests will be entitled to consideration by their local boards for deferment to start another college year.

Such deferments will not be mandatory, whether or not the Kilday Amendment becomes law. But draft officials said they expect most local boards to follow the national pattern.

The Kilday Amendment was approved.
