High School Senior Is Arrested As King Pin Of Marihuana Ring

HOUSTON, May 19 (UP)—Police and Federal Narcotics Agents announced today that they had cracked a marihuana ring with the arrest of several persons, including an 18-year-old high school senior who described himself as the "kingpin" of the group.

The youth, John Thomas Graham, was arrested in a school cafeteria yesterday, and agents then arrested five others, including two juveniles. Two others are sought.

Agents said the gang had been selling marihuana to Sam Houston High School students. All were arraigned today before U. S. Commissioner Ralph Fowler on federal charges of sale and possession of marihuana.

UMT Supported By Club Women

HOUSTON, May 19 (UP)—The General Federation of Women's Clubs today threw its support behind universal military training for as long as there is a "definite threat of national security" and urged President Truman to seek bipartisan cooperation in government.

Those two points topped a list of resolutions adopted by some 2,000 delegates to the Federation's 60th annual convention at their closing session here yesterday.

The women qualified their support of UMT, however, by asking that it be "democratic" and universal in application and that it be administered by a panel of both civilian and military personnel, mostly civilian.

The four-day convention closed last night after an international forum dinner with Mrs. Perle Mesta, U. S. minister to Luxembourg; Erwin D. Canham, editor of the Christian Science Monitor; Sen. Bourke Hickenlooper, R., Ia., and William C. Foster, administrators of the economic cooperation administration as speakers.

Foster said that America should prepare to face an "indefinite period" of armed truce, but that the free world would be so well mobilized in 18 to 24 months that

Yankee Teacher Sets Boy On Fire

DETROIT, MICH., May 19 (UP)—A 17-year-old high school student fought for his life today after an initiation prank turned him into a human torch.

Douglas Brisbee suffered second-degree burns over most of his body last night when one of his teachers tried to shock him with an electric magneto.

Instead, the magneto touched off a blaze on the boy's paint-smeared chest.

The youth was one of 20 initiates into the Cass Technical high school Aeronautical Club.

Brisbee was stripped to the waist and silver paint was daubed on his chest. The paint caught fire when Instructor Arthur Elges, 37, touched him with the magneto.

At receiving hospital, doctors spent more than an hour removing paint from the boy's body so they could treat the burns. Physicians said skin grafts may be necessary.

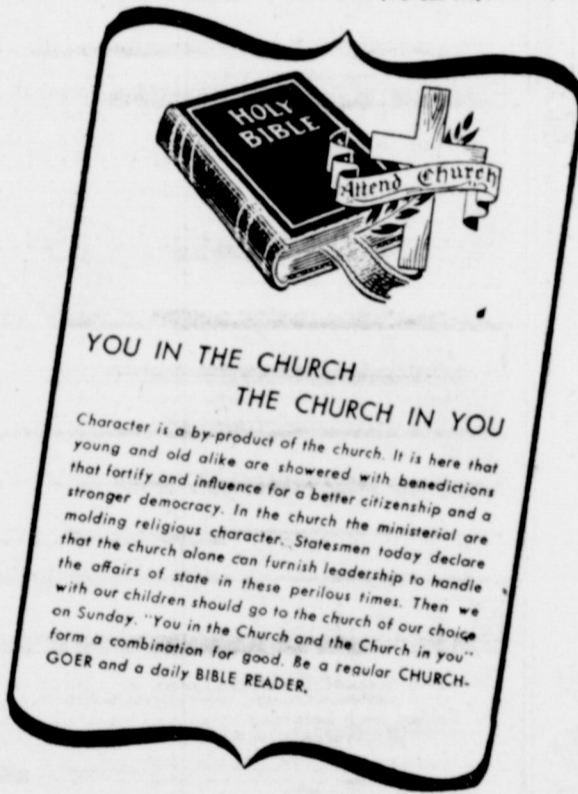

Southwest Cattlemen Assert Small Operators To Be Hurt

WASHINGTON, May 18 (UP)—Southwest Cattlemen told Congress today "small" Texas operators—those who have only \$100,000 ranches will suffer most under beef price rollbacks.

Ray W. Willoughby, San Angelo, President of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, made the assertion before the House Agriculture Committee.

Willoughby and other operators of "medium-sized" Texas ranches urged farm congressmen to vote to kill beef price controls when legislation to extend the de-

production act beyond June 30 comes up on the House floor. They said consumers won't benefit from the scheduled price rollbacks because they will have to get their beef at "high prices" from the black market.

Willoughby, who operates a "medium-sized" 40,000 acre ranch testified that he couldn't operate profitably under the government's price order.

"How about the small, family-sized operator?" asked Rep. Harold O. Love, R., S.D. "Won't he be hurt more because of higher costs?"

"That's right," Willoughby said, adding that rollbacks will "drive the small producer out of business."

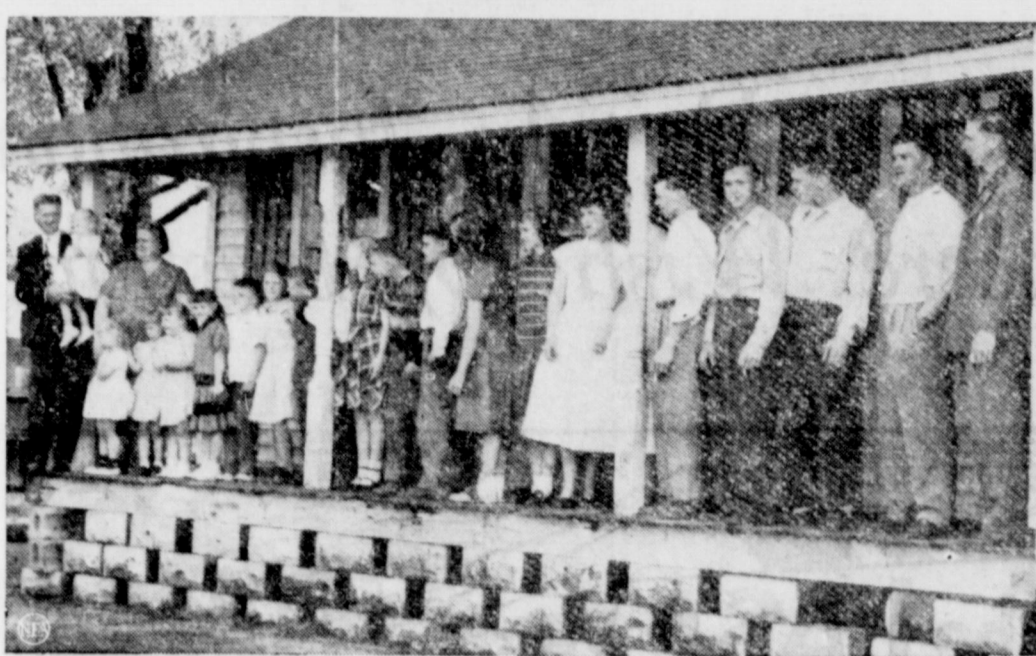
He cited the "actual operations" of a family-sized stock farmer, an operator who has only 1,700 acres and some 100 cows. At \$65 an acre, that's a \$110,500 ranch, Willoughby said. He said the operator has figured that under the first rollback alone he will be forced to take \$50 a head less for his calves than it costs to produce them.

Rep. Paul C. Jones, D. Mo., said he was "disturbed" at reports that cattlemen were "getting into speculation" earlier this spring "on the theory there wouldn't be any controls on cattle."

He said he was told by a "reliable source" that one cattleman bought calves for \$300 a head and the very next day refused an offer of \$400—or a profit of \$100 each.

Jack Roach, Amarillo, Tex., rancher, said he never heard of anything like that. Rep. W. R. Poage, D., Tex., said the story couldn't be true because it just "didn't make sense."

Norman Moser, Dekalb, Tex., and C. K. McCam, Victoria, Tex., joined Willoughby in urging the committee to help scrap beef price controls so "we can produce without shackles." They said the order will cut beef production.

Gulf Coast Is Full Of Plants

HOUSTON, May 19 (UP)—The Texas and West Louisiana Gulf Coast is studded with chemical plants valued at \$750,000,000 according to a report prepared by Dr. F. A. Buechel, manager of the Houston Chamber of Commerce's Industrial Research Department.

The report said another \$100,000,000 is the value of planned expansion of chemical plants this year and next. The figures, Buechel said, don't include the \$80,000,000 in construction or expansion of such plants as shell, carthage hydrocol at Brownsville and Ethyl Corp.

Thus, the Gulf Coast Chemical Industry has invested, or will invest nearly one billion dollars in plants and equipment, Buechel said, adding that the total figure did not include investments in some related industries such as the \$80,000,000 Reynolds Metal Plant under construction at Corpus Christi, nor Alcoa's \$15,000,000 expansion at Fort Lavaca, near Corpus Christi.

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Do Away With Washdays

Ideal arrangements of the many modern conveniences available to housewives can do away with old-fashioned washday drudgery. Mrs. Ethel W. Sparks, Acting County Home Demonstration Agent of Eastland County, says that laundry equipment and arrangement should be built around four convenient work centers.

First, the preparation center for sorting, stain removal and soaking should be located near the laundry entrance and next door to the washer. Starching might be done in this center, too, Mrs. Sparks adds. The work surface should be adequately lighted; there should be a sink to provide water, a hot plate for starch making, and storage space for supplies, such as starch, bluing, soaps or other detergents, water softeners if needed, but for other types of electric washers, the tubs should set so that the washer need not be moved during washing.

Mrs. Sparks says that the drying center should be located in accordance with the type of drying done. If an electric clothes dryer is used, it should be placed next to the washing center. If the clothes are dried on lines in the yard, a laundry cart would be handy for transporting the wet clothes to the lines. The lines should be near the laundry.

The last but certainly not the least important center listed by Mrs. Sparks is that for ironing. She emphasizes adequate lighting with plenty of space. The equipment
