## **Optimism High** On Talks Will **Start Again**

UN ADVANCE BASE, MUN-SAN, KOREA, Oct. 18 (UR) -United Nations liaison officers for the first time expressed optimism today that Korean armistice talks may be resumed soon

U.S. Cols. Andrew J. Kinney and James C. Murray emerged emerged smilling from a 105-minute meeting with Communist liaison officers in a tent in Panmunjom and told UN newsmen: 1. There are grounds for op-

2. The UN delegation submit ted a compromise proposal de signed to eliminate the main obstacle to resumption of the ar mistice conference-the size of the neutral zones around the UN truce camp at Munsan and the Communist camp at Kaesong,

3. The liaison teams arrived "at a substantial agreement on one or two positions which have been in dispute."

4. Col. Chang Chun San, Chief Communist liaison officer, agreed there now was "very little difference between us."

Chang is expected to give his reply to the UN's new compro mise proposal at a liaison meeting at 10 a.m. tomorrow (8 p.m. to day EST). It calls for three-mil neutral zones around both Munsan and Keasong instead of the five-mile zones sought by the Reds and the 3,000 yard-zones

originally suggested by the UN. The turn for the better in the liaison negotiations coincided with disclosure that the United States had asked Russia to "act" to persuade Communist negotia tions in Korea to stop stalling and agree to a "realistic" armistice.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Eastland, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned, and WHEREAS, there are now outstanding \$228,250.00 of Water works & Sewer System Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1941, payable from the net revenues of the City Waterworks & Sewer System and secured in the manner authorized by Articles 1111, et seq., Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, and the Board of Commissioners deems it advisable to issue bonds for the purpose of providing funds with which to im-

prove and extend the waterworks system, and WHEREAS, the fact that the City had suffered from a prolonged drough and its water supply has been seriously impaired and endangered and to the end that the public peace, property, health and safety are now impaired requires that this be designated as an emergency measure within the discretion of the Board of Commissioners and that the rule prohibiting passage as an ordinance on the day on which it is introduced

be suspended and that this ordinance take effect immediately from and after its pass-NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS: 1. That an election be held in the City of Eastland, Texas, on the 3rd day of November, 1951, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Eastland, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said city in the amount of \$25,000.00 maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the Board of Commisgioners, the maximum maturity being not more than fifteen years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of 3% per annum for the purpose of improving and extending the city waterworks system to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, the charter of said City and the laws of the State of Texas, each to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligations out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of said waterworks system, and in the discretion of the Board of Commissioners to be secured in addition by a deed of trust on the physical properties thereof and by a grant to the purchaser under sale or foreclosure under such deed of trust of a franchise to operate said system and properties for a term of ten years

2. That said election shall be held within the City of Eastland, Texas, at the usual voting place in Room 4 in the City Hall, and the following persons are hereby ap-

pointed directors of said election: H. L. Hassell, Presiding Judge,

Mrs. Marene Johnson, Associate Judge, and

Mrs. Fred Maxey, Associate Judge. 3. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925 as amended, and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 163, Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature as further modified by the provisions of Article 1111-1118, both inclusive, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 as amended. Only regularly qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

4. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

For the issuance of Waterworks Improvement and Extension Revenue Bonds. Against the issuance of Waterworks Improvement and Extension Revenue

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the expressions on such proposition thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on

such proposition. 5. A copy of this ordinance signed by the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners of said City and attested by the City Clerk shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes 1925 as amended. The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall in said City and also at one other public place in said City, the said City constituting the sole voting precinct for said election, not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. He, shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said city. The day of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections.


