Captain and Mrs. H. B. Murphy are the guests here in the home of the Captain's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. (Pat) Murphy. They have also visited in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Brock while here. They will leave Friday to visit with Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Burgess in Lagrange, Ga. before going to Savannah, Ga. where he will be stationed at Hunter Field as property disposal officer.

They visited last week in Abilene with Mrs. Murphy's brother, W. T. Hays, and Mrs. Hays, 810 Lilius St. Mrs. Murphy is the former Miss Gladys Hays.

They are happy to be back. Captain Murphy was stationed in Japan for three years and was joined by Mrs. Murphy two and one-half years ago. For two years the Captain was stationed at Tokyo, but at the beginning of the Korean affair he was sent to a base in southern Japan with the Third Bomb Wing.

He joined the Air Force in 1942. He attended Hardin-Simmons University and was called in 1948 from his reserve status to active duty.

The couple enjoyed their time in Japan and liked the Japanese people. They made many Japanese friends in Tokyo and Yokohama. In the three years they were there they observed the many changes that came in the Japanese way of life from the American Occupation. Customs and dress of the natives have undergone marked changes. Particularly in the younger generation, they said, have the changes come.

There were many festivals and ceremonies in Japan. Hardly a week passes without some special observance, they commented. Now the young people do not participate as much as they did when the Murphys first went to Japan.

When the Army of Occupation was first there more of the women wore the traditional kimonos and robe. Western dress has been quite generally adopted now.

Mrs. Murphy liked the Japanese foods; Captain Murphy didn't. He much prefers plan American cooking. Despite the vegetable farm on the base, they did not get as many fresh vegetables as they would like to have had, and that is one thing they are completely enjoying now they are home again.

They found the Japanese very sports minded with baseball and track coming first in general interest. Skiing is also a widely participated pastime. They made a few trips to Akakura on the western coast.

They visited Hiroshima. Very little visible evidence of atomic damage remains, they reported. Most of the damage is overgrown again, but the trees remain blackened bare stumps.

Go back? They would like to in a few years to see the changes that will have taken place. A new super highway between Tokyo and Osaka will mean so much to the country, they said.

They brought some of Japan back with them; lines, silver designed especially for them, low oblong tea tables in camphor wood and cherry, and a small God of Wisdom. He is one of the seven gods of good fortune. Nearly every Japanese household has all seven. The Murphys have a miniature set carved from ivory besides this one god, which stands about 16 inches high. It is presumably about 200 years old but all items for sale are "old" they laughed.

Life in Japan they found very similar to life in the States. They didn't even have to know Japanese for most of the Japanese they had contacts with knew English. Captain Murphy found them good workers, conscientious and anxious to learn more about American ways. He had about 75

Cockroaches have been eliminated as a carrier of the polio virus, Dr. Chin Min Hsiang of the University of Texas' medical branch revealed today.

Dr. Hsiang, aided by Dr. John Micks and Dr. Morris Pollard, is conducting a series of experiments to eliminate as many insects as possible as polio carriers.

### Veteran Plane In For Overhaul At West Coast Base

SACRAMENTO, CALIF., Oct. 18 (UP)—A beatup B-29 named "Bub" with the picture of an old man on its side was here for overhaul today after 107 Korean missions in which it dropped 1,000 tons of bombs.

The "Bub," oldest B-29 in the Far East Air Force, had logged more than 2,800 hours in the air, including World War II service. ### Baptists Will Gather In Oct. At Houston

HOUSTON, Oct. 18.—The more than a million Baptists in Texas will plan their 1952 denominational program in sessions here Oct. 23-25.

It will be the annual meeting of the Baptist General convention of Texas. An estimated 5,000 "messengers" from outside of Houston will be on hand at the city's new Coliseum building for three days of reports, planning and inspiration. William Fleming, a layman from Fort Worth is convention president.

State conventions of the Woman's Missionary Union and the Baptist Brotherhood will meet Monday and Tuesday, prior to the opening of the general convention Tuesday evening.

At Dallas Dr. J. Howard Williams, executive secretary of the convention, reported that Texas Baptists number 1,100,000 members in 3,445 churches. Each congregation is autonomous but works in cooperation with the denominational program on matters of promotion, education, benevolences and missions.

Souls and denominational finances will be given primary consideration in the week's deliberations, according to convention officials. The convention has as its goal the winning of 250,000 new converts this year. It will consider the adoption for the third consecutive year of a financial budget of \$10,000,000 for 1952. Half the money would be raised through the churches and half would be sought in large gifts by individuals.

Reports from Texas Baptist educational and benevolent institutions, from the various departments through which the convention carries on its work, and from mission activities of the Southern

Baptist convention will be heard. Inspirational speakers will include Dr. A. B. Rutledge of Marshall, preaching the convention sermon; Dr. Duke K. McCall, president of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky.; Dr. J. D. Gray of New Orleans, president of the Southern Baptist convention, and Billy Graham, the evangelist. Graham will preach at the convention's closing session Thursday night. The new film "Mr. Texas" featuring Billy Graham will be shown at the close of the session Wednesday night.

### Applications Are Open For Game Warden School

AUSTIN, Oct. 18.—The Director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commission said applications may now be made for the game warden school at Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Applicants will be given an opportunity to demonstrate their qualifications by employment during the coming hunting season. Candidates for the game warden school will be selected from this group.

He said requests for information on the course beginning in February should be addressed to him at the Game and Fish Commission headquarters in the Walton Building, Austin.

The Law Enforcement Director said applicants should be between the ages of 21 and 40 years, have at least a high school education and be in good physical condition. Salaries for game wardens in the field ranges from \$2400 to \$3600.

The approximately 15 men to be chosen for the four month course at A&M will, on graduation, be assigned to the regular state game warden force.

Since this course was established six years ago, almost 100 new men have been channeled into the regular warden force to fill vacancies caused by retirement and other reasons.

The 1951 class of 19 was graduated last May.

The Director of Law Enforcement said the course will be conducted in cooperation with the Department of Wildlife Management at A&M College.

One of the major phases emphasized by Commission personnel with the annual classes concerns law enforcement.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 18 (UP)—Bandleader Ted Lewis had his battered 35-year-old top-hat

back today. He had reported it stolen from a nightclub here during last weekend.

The "Is Everybody Happy" musician found his famous top-

piece in a chandelier at the nightclub yesterday after an anonymous telephone tip from a woman.

Lewis said the woman hung up before he could make good his

offer of a \$100 reward for return of the hat, which he said was insured for \$50,000.
