### Stalin Will Celebrate 72nd Birthday Friday; History Told

Tomorrow is Joseph Stalin's 72nd birthday. He probably yields more absolute power over more persons than any man who ever lived. He is revered by millions and hated by millions, but hardly anybody is neutral about him. Stalin isn't that kind of a man; if you aren't for him you have to be against him.

Like all men who have attained ripe age and eminent office, Stalin can look back and see turning points in his career. There were three big ones in his lifetime—three occasions when, by accident or design, the right thing happened to him at the right time. Had events gone the other way on one of these occasions Stalin would be living in obscurity and the whole history of this country might be different.

May, 1899—A student named Joseph Vissarionovich Djughashvili was expelled from the Theological Seminary at Tiflis, Russia. The faculty complained he was sullen and rebellious, that he persisted in reading unauthorized books, that his entire approach to life obviated was not one that should be held by a young man being educated for the priesthood. That expulsion made a revolutionary out of Djughashvili, and he changed his politics and his name. He became a Communist named Stalin.

November, 1927—Lenin, the father of the Russian revolution, had been dead long enough for the fight to get hot among the men who are trying to inherit his power. Leon Trotsky for a time seemed to be the logical choice. He was a hero of the revolution, a popular commander of the Red Army, an eloquent orator. But Stalin—so obscure that he was rarely mentioned in the early histories of the Communist revolution—had been working quietly in committees and behind the scenes driving nails into Trotsky's political coffin. Now he was ready and he put through a motion expelling Trotsky from the Communist Party. On that day Stalin became the

### State May Offer Help In Trying Galveston Cases

AUSTIN, Dec. 20 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers may announce today whether he will appoint a special prosecutor in the Galveston gambling cases, contingent upon approval by the Galveston county attorney.

The governor was told late yesterday by Attorney Gen. Price Daniel that he may make such appointment if the county prosecutor approves and pay him from executive department funds.

Advised of the opinion, Galveston county attorney Raymond MaGee declined comment until he sees the ruling.

MaGee, who serves as both county and district attorney for Galveston appeared last June before the House crime investigating committee when members of the Maceo organization and state and Galveston authorities testified.

The governor was ill with influenza yesterday when Daniel's opinion was given.

Shivers submitted two questions to Daniel, prompted by indictments returned Nov. 28 by a Galveston county grand jury against 23 persons, including 16 members of the Maceo empire.

Editor Clyde Ragsdale of the Texas City Sun had submitted the questions to the governor. Ragsdale had charged that vice and gambling were wide open in Galveston county and urged that a special prosecutor be named.

The questions Daniel was asked were what authority the governor has to appoint or help provide a special prosecutor to assist in prosecution of felony gambling cases, and secondary what authority he has to request a change of venue in a pending felony case.

### Dean Believed To Be In Red "VIP" Camp

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Dec. 20 (UP) — Maj. Gen. William F. Dean, outstanding American hero of the Korean War, apparently is living fairly comfortably in a "VIP" Communist prison camp at Pyongyang, the North Korean capital.

Though some mystery still surrounds his capture and the failure of the Reds to boast of such an important prisoner, evidence is increasing that he is alive and, like the other 3,197 American prisoners, probably suffering principally from boredom at the moment.

It is believed that Dean is in prison camp No. 6. This apparently is a small "special" prison camp and the Communists seem to be giving him very important-person treatment.

Alan Winington, correspondent for the London Communist newspaper Daily Worker, who acts as a sort of unofficial Red spokesman, said today that Dean was captured Aug. 25, 1950 near Jinan, a village 30 miles south of Taejon.

It was at Taejon that Dean disappeared July 20. He was last seen, smoking pistol in hand, making a last stand against overwhelming odds with a tiny group of men of his 24th United States Infantry Division.

Winington said he got his information, without further details, at an official briefing today from the Communists.

### Eighth Making Plans To Care For POW's If They Are Freed

PANMUNJOM, KOREA, Dec. 20 (UP)—Orders were issued today for a mass airlift of American prisoners of war to Japan if a Korean armistice is concluded.

Truce negotiations are deadlocked, and the chance that the prisoners will be freed by Christmas becomes daily more remote.

But Gen. James A. Van Fleet ordered all major staff sections of his 8th Army to concentrate on plans to receive, care for and transport to Japan by plane the

3,198 American prisoners listed by the Communists as in North Korean prison camps.

No progress was made Thursday in the truce negotiations. Talks on the terms of enforcing a armistice agreement, to prevent cheating, remained static. The Allies refused to resume discussions on an exchange of prisoners by the United Nations command and the Communists until the "pitifully small" list furnished by the Reds is studied and analyzed.

Retorting to the "pitifully small" charge, the Chinese Communist Peiping Radio said Thursday night that the lists of United States war prisoners "utterly disprove" American "propaganda" that thousands of prisoners were slaughtered. The list actually "proves the reverse," Peiping said.

"The Americans have been rigging phony figures of those missing in action by the simple device of leaving corpses on the battlefield and listing them as missing," Peiping continued. "The Americans hoped to get away with the terrific propaganda scam. It flopped."

Under Van Fleet's order, all UN prisoners will be identified first on their reception in the Allied lines and then will be given a preliminary medical examination and new clothing. There will be no questioning of them.

Then the American, and probably all the other non-Korean prisoners, will be flown to Japan at once. The freed South Korean prisoners will be turned over to their medical officers.

Donald Davis, executive vice-president of the First National Bank, Gorman, has disposed of his holdings in that city and will move to Lamesa within the next few days, where he assumes a similar position, executive vice-president, of the Lamesa National Bank.

Mr. Davis was born in Eastland county, and is therefore a real native. He and his wife have many friends, not only in Gorman, but in Eastland county cities, who regret to see them go. A son, Billy is attending S.M.U.

Mr. Davis has been connected with the Gorman bank for 31 years, and during recent years has acted as head of the Peanut Growers Association.

In conversation with the writer, Mr. Davis said that while he hates to leave Gorman and Eastland county, he feels he can better himself by making the change.

**Chrysler Will Build Heavy Tank For Army**

NEWARK, Del.—A pilot model of a heavy tank of entirely new design has been completed in the Chrysler Delaware Tank Plant in less than a year from the date that the company took on this defense assignment and started to build the plant, it was announced today by Robert T. Keller, general manager of the plant.

The first Chrysler - assembled pilot model of the new heavy tank, designed by Army Ordnance and Chrysler Corporation, was completed on November 19th, less than eleven months from the date the tank building contract was announced and only ten months after ground was broken for construction of the tank plant.

While details of the tank are still under security restrictions, Army Ordnance officials have de-

clared that the new heavy tank will outlast any land-fighting machine ever built.

Although the exact date the tank will go into volume production cannot be revealed at this time, Mr. Robert Keller said that construction of the tank plant is more than a month ahead of schedule.

"Machine tools are more difficult to get but every effort is being made to meet all schedules, and we expect to do so," Mr. Robert Keller said.

All major construction on the 900,000 square foot main manufacturing building, boiler plant, and test track has been completed and these facilities have already begun to be used. Well on the way to completion are the office building, paint shop and repair shop.

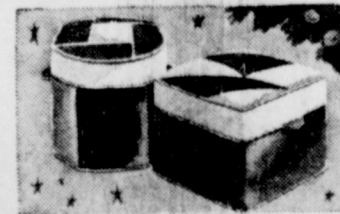

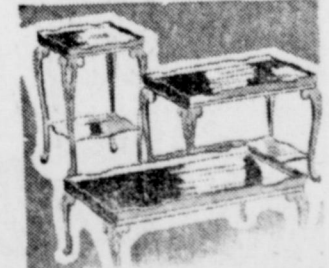

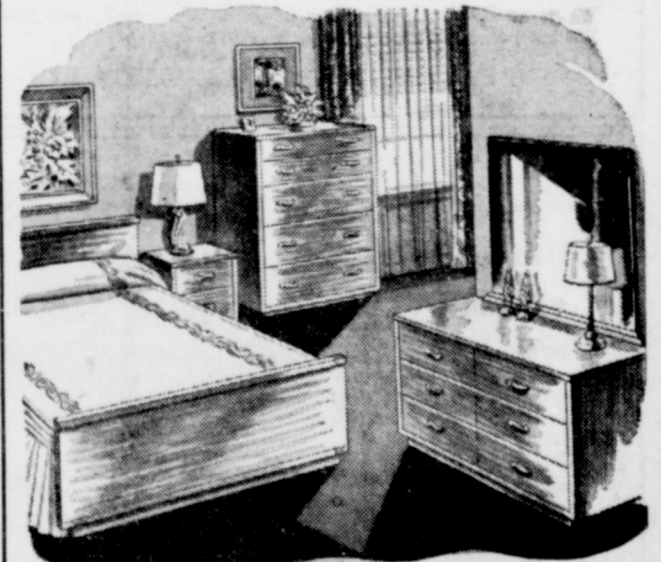

## Braves' Marshall Has Perfect Year Fielding In 1951

NEW YORK, Dec. 20 (UP)—For fielding perfection personified, it was Willard Marshall of the Boston Braves in 1951. Marshall handled 231 chances in 136 games without an error for a flawless 1,000 percentage, official National League fielding averages disclosed today.

By doing so, he became the second outfielder in Major League history to go through an entire season without a blemish. Danny Litwiler played 151 games for the Phillies in 1942 without making an error.

Jackie Robinson of Brooklyn also caused a change in the records when he posted a .992 mark to lead the second basemen. His figure erased the .987 mark compiled by Al (Red) Schoendienst of the Cardinals in 1949.

By participating in 137 double plays, Robinson broke his previous mark of 133 fashioned in 1950. Team-mate Gil Hodges also broke his own league double play record by having a hand in 171 twin killings.

St. Louis was the best fielding team with a .980 average with the Dodgers second, one point behind. The Cubs were last with .971.

But for sheer almost unbelievable drama nothing touched the moment when Bobby Thomson's home run blast in the last inning of the final playoff game capped the greatest comeback in baseball history.

So the 10 best sports stories of the year are judged here in this order:

1. The Giant pennant victory.
2. The basketball scandal.
3. Ben Hogan's National Open triumph.
4. Army's cribbing scandal.
5. Joe Walcott winning the heavyweight championship.
6. Randy Turpin's title upset of Ray Robinson.
7. The World Series.
8. Marueen Connolly winning the National tennis championship at 16.
9. The Kentucky Derby.
10. Joe Dimaggio's retirement.

That's overlooking a number of fine stories, such as Allie Reynolds' two no-hitters and Harry Chandler's ousting as baseball commissioner to be succeeded by Ford Flick. But we'll stick with our 10.

The sensational Giant finish wins top honors because it will go down in sports history not only as one of the top stories of 1951 but also as one of the best of all time. It was a performance which overshadowed even that of the 1914 miracle Braves.

Hogan's retention of the open championship deserves its high spot. On the heels of his terrific 1950 comeback, Hogan once more proved the master in ramatic fashion. Five strokes back of Bobby Locke at the start of the final round, he stormed through once again in the inimitable Hogan manner to thrill the sports world.

Walcott's grim pursuit of the title, and his ultimate triumph at an age when most boxers are long since through, was a smash ending for one of the fight game's most sentimental odysseys. And Turpin's flat loomed large because of the Robinson reputation.

The Kentucky Derby has to crowd into the picture as one of the year's most glamorous sporting events—even with the book-
