Christmas Will Go To Marines Via Helicopter

WITH THE 1st MARINE DIVISION, KOREA, Dec. 24 (UP)—Marine helicopters are ready to take Christmas to the Leathernecks in the foxholes of the cruel East Korean Mountains.

A year ago, the situation was bleak—the Marines were still on the way back from the effects of their grim fight with the Chinese at the Chosin Reservoir. But this Christmas, if all goes well, they will have everything—decorated trees, presents, special shows in the movies and in the flesh, tons of mail from home and the following Christmas dinner: Stuffed celery, mixed pickles, olives, shrimp cocktail, roast turkey, cranberry sauce, peas, corn, candied sweet potatoes, whipped potatoes, fruit punch, hot Parker House rolls, cole slaw, dressing, fruit cake, mince pie with hard sauce, fresh fruit, coffee, mixed nuts and assorted candies.

The plan is that up front the men in the lines will spell each other so that all may get the helicopter feast. Mail deliveries are coming in at the rate of 75 bags a day. Not only the relatives of the Marines but many others have sent them gifts—private families like "The Jarretts" of Cokeville, Wyo; organizations like the Armed Forces Wives Club of Boston, Mass., office worker like those in the Kiplinger News Agency of Washington, D. C. Jewish Marines will get presents from the women's division of the National Jewish Welfare Board.

Hollywood stars Paul Douglas and Jan Sterling, touring with a USO show, are to do some of the entertaining.

The division's 27 chaplains will hold special services for men of all religious faiths.

Poll Shows CIO Steel Workers Favor Walkout

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 23 (UP)—Rank and file steelworkers in the Pittsburgh district don't want to strike but they will walk out New Year's Day to back up their wage demands, a spot check by the United Press disclosed today.

Some of the workers wouldn't talk. Others freely expressed their opinions on the wage deadlock between the CIO United Steelworkers and the producers. Several said they are willing to work under the Telf-Hartley 60-day provision, if necessary.

Clayton Rand Says

LOW COST OF GIVING
I have received a pamphlet from a brokerage firm setting forth the low cost of giving. What with the high cost of dying, an increasing number of people who can afford to are trying to give away what the government is trying to take from them.

Though gifts of any size may be made, the present federal income tax law allows deductions for contributions up to 15 percent of adjusted gross income, which is, broadly speaking, gross income less business deductions. If you are a married tax payer and have two children and have an aggregate adjusted gross income of \$4,000 and want to give away \$600, under income tax rules and regulations, it will cost you \$478 to do it. If your aggregate gross income is \$500,000, however, it will cost you only \$7,024 to give away \$75,000. The more you have the less it costs you to get rid of it. Never before has it cost so little to give away so much.

And because of income taxes, gift taxes and death taxes, there never was a time when it was so hard to take it with you. On account of the inheritance tax cut which can't even leave it. A philanthropist was asked, under the circumstances, how he was able to give away so much and still have anything left. "Well," he replied, "the Lord has a bigger shovel than I have, and as I shovel out, He shovels in."

Forty-One Known Dead Death Ends Gay Christmas Party In Tijuana, Mexico Sun.

TIJUANA, MEX., Dec. 24 (UP)—A flash fire early Sunday swept through this Mexican border town's civic auditorium in the midst of a gay Christmas party and hours later police reported 41 persons had died in the flames.

The gaily of the celebration was believed by authorities to have been partly responsible for the blaze which in addition to its death toll, burned 52 persons seriously and left 60 others injured, many of them trampled in rushing for exits. One person was reported missing.

At 1 p.m. the fire was reported entirely under control although the wreckage of the auditorium still was smoking. Firemen, augmented by equipment rushed across the U.S.-Mexican border, kept the blaze confined to the auditorium and several small dwellings and houses surrounding it.

Police said the fire apparently started shortly after midnight when a Christmas tree on the stage of the auditorium was knocked over in a scuffle by two unidentified celebrants behind the curtain on the stage.

The incident drew only a happy response from the crowd of about 200, many of whom squirted beer on the tree as its lights apparently short-circuited and the three burst into flames.

But the gaily turned to horror as the flames set fire to drapes on the stage and the fire quickly spread through the auditorium. The audience, a majority of them women and children, made a mad rush for the exits. Screams punctuated the night and soon were drowned by the crackling of the flames as they gutted the structure.

Hundreds began gathering outside the auditorium as the sound of fire trucks attracted the attention of nearby residents. And as the magnitude of the disaster became apparent to the crowd, the cries of relatives almost could be heard over the noise of the fire.

The weeping throng was held in check by extra details of police while firemen poured water into the building. The extent of the disaster did not become apparent until firemen could enter the structure and there begin the grisly task of ad-

ding up the toll. The victims included many children, among them a group of orphans brought to the auditorium for the pre-Christmas celebration. The blaze was the worst in Tijuana's history in the size of its death toll although the border town has been swept by flames several times in the past by fires that covered larger areas.

The three-story civic auditorium was left a hollow shell but its walls remained standing. The structure is located a half-dozen blocks from the tourist area and its many luxurious shops which exist chiefly on American patronage.

Retail Prices Show Decline In Most Areas

The H.C. of L. (High Cost of Living) seems to be holding its own. No startling declines have been noted, though no great advances have been listed.

Down at Houston retail prices showed an advance of 0.4 percent during November. Fruits and vegetables showed the highest increase with 1.6 percent. Fresh varieties prompted by the Christmas season, showed a large gain—almost 3 percent and promises of higher prices in December. Sugar and sweets—Christmas stuff, showed marked increases.

All over the country with the exception of the extreme East and Northeast sections, buyers are finding fish, meats and poultry about 1.8 percent lower. Eggs steady, though holding their own. Rents over the nation, especially residential property, is gradually moving upward. Refrigerators and furniture are up 0.8 percent.

Clothing, including nylons, are showing a small decline, television sets show declines in price.

While the report covers the South, generally, some cities report greater increases. For instance in Dallas fresh fruits advanced almost 10 percent, though in Baltimore, 2000 miles from citrus growing areas, the advance was slightly over 5 percent.

Fats and oils are down in most sections, with only Little Rock, showing an advance of 0.7 percent.

With the passing of the Christmas season, prices for most all items, will likely decline.

Short Days And Long Nights Are Slowly Passing

Friday, December 21, was the shortest day of the year. Most people started to work at or before sunrise, and rush through the world, a fellow had to hurry if he completed his daily tasks before dark. This worked a hardship on those who seem unable to get up before day.

But now that days are getting longer (about one minute a day) this burden will gradually fade out. And along next Summer we will have some 14-hour days. Compliments will then come from the fellow who just can't get enough sleep.

Trial Comes Two Days After Red Action Told

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Dec. 24 (UP)—Four American airmen were convicted Sunday in a one-day trial by a Communist military court of violating the Hungarian border and were ordered to pay fines of 360,000 forints (\$30,000) or spend three months in jail.

The court ordered the confiscation of the U. S. C-47 transport, forced down in Hungary by Soviet fighter planes Nov. 19 with the four crewmen aboard.

An official announcement of the trial, barren of detail, said the Americans confessed that they deliberately flew in over Hungary by daylight in good weather with their navigation equipment working.

The U. S. government, in an exchange of notes with Hungary over the incident, said the plane was lost while flying from Erding Air Base near Munich to Belgrade with supplies for the American embassy in Yugoslavia.

The sudden trial followed by two days a government announcement that the four would be tried by a military court. Informed of the trial by newsmen, the newly arrived U. S. minister, Christian Ravndal, said:

"It is a complete surprise to me. We had no idea when a trial would be held. I cannot make any comment now."

The official announcement said the four defendants acquiesced in the verdict.

They are Capt. John J. Swift of Glen Falls, N. Y., Capt. Dave H. Henderson of Shawnee, Okla., Sgt. James R. Elam of Kingsland, Ark., and Sgt. James A. Duff of Spokane, Wash.

The official Hungarian news agency MTI in announcing the verdict gave no indication of how quickly the United States must choose between paying the fines or leaving the airmen to serve the prison terms of three months.

Ravndal was asked whether the U. S. government would pay the fines to obtain the release of the airmen, but he would only say: "I really can't make any comment now."

The official announcement of the trial said the Americans admitted that they "violated the Hungarian border near Gyula on Nov. 19."

The news agency said they were unable to give a "satisfactory explanation" of why they carried maps of some parts of the Soviet Union and the People's Democracies, as well as parachutes "in superfluous numbers," a radio transmitter and bundles of blankets.

The court held that the lack of such an explanation made it "plausible" that the crew intended to drop those articles to "spies and diversionists active in the People's Democracies."

A government announcement Friday of intentions to try the men charged that the violation of the border was carried out "with the criminal intention of dropping spies and diversionists" in this country.

Today's announcement gave no indication of the time required for the trial, nor did it say where the four men are held.

Polio Cases Hit New Year High In Galveston
GALVESTON, Dec. 24 (UP)—The Galveston Health Department disclosed 10 persons have been stricken with polio since Dec. 1, pushing the 21-day total higher than for the first 11 months of 1951.

Dr. Herman Weinert, city health director, said there has been one death from bulbar polio. Weinert said the 10 December cases in the city limits followed no particular pattern, with incidence reported at scattered points throughout the city.

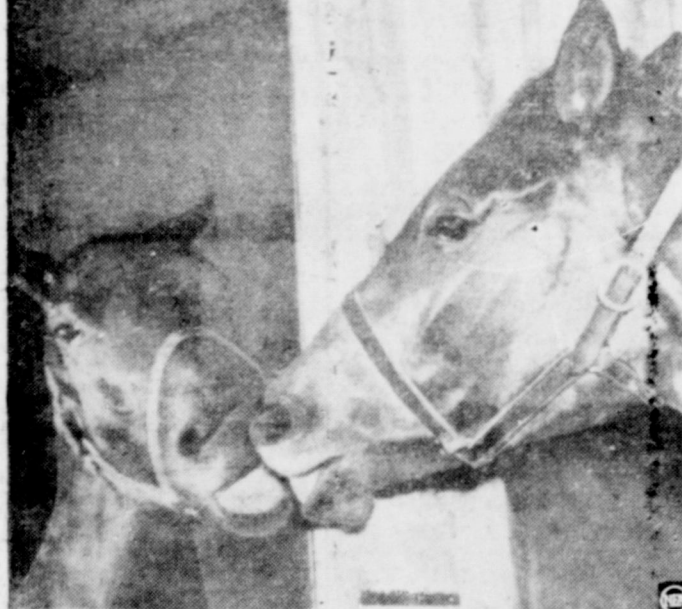

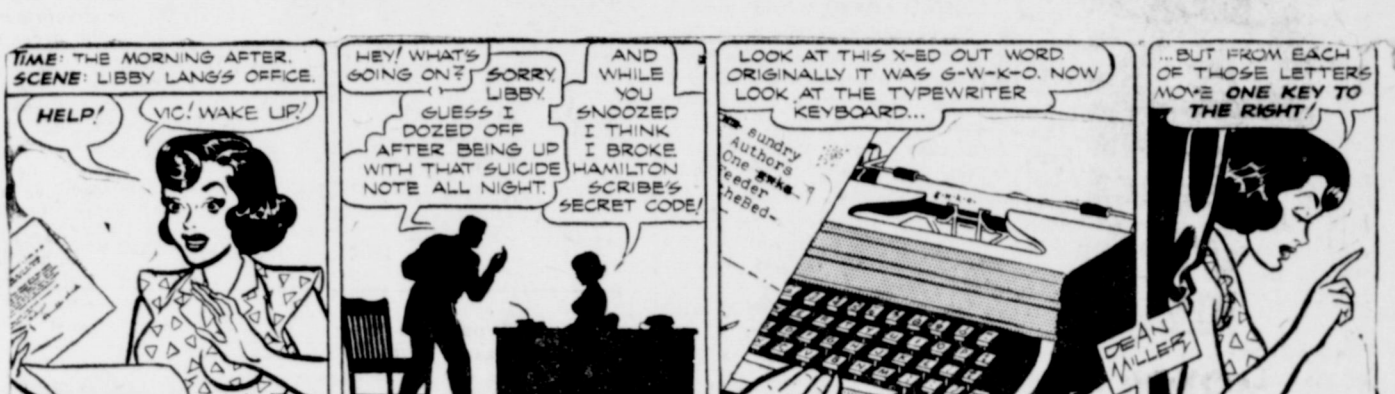

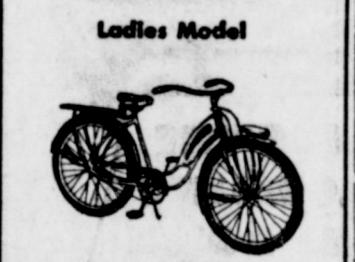

Arbor Day Will Be Observed in January

Arbor Day will be observed in Texas January 18. The third Friday in January was established as Arbor Day by the 1949 State Legislature.

Until last year Arbor Day had been observed in Texas on February 22. Schools, garden clubs, and civic clubs are encouraged to observe this day. There are numerous ways that it can be observed besides planting trees. Actually, it is more desirable to protect growing trees than to plant additional trees without adequate protection. Any program designed to acquaint Texans with the economic value of the forests would be a creditable observance. School teachers can encourage recitations and essays on appropriate tree and forestry subjects.

"Arbor Day," Circular No. 22, other publications, and motion pictures are available from the Texas Forest Service for use in connection with Arbor Day programs.

Combine rolled oats and sour milk, add egg and beat well. Add sugar and mix. Add cooled fat. Sift together flour, salt, baking powder, and soda. Add rolled oats mixture, stirring only enough to dampen flour. Fill well-greased muffin pans 2/3 full. Bake in hot

oven (400° F.) about 15 to 20 minutes. Yield: 10 to 12 muffins.

Winged Apple Muffins: 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour; 1/4 cup sugar; 1 teaspoon salt; 3 teaspoons baking powder; 1 egg, beaten; 1/2 cup milk; 4 tablespoons melted fat; 2 cups corn flakes, bran flakes, or whole wheat flakes.

Sift together flour, sugar, salt and baking powder. Combine egg and milk, then stir into dry ingredients being careful not to overmix. Add slightly cooled fat and stir just enough to mix ingredients. Carefully fold in cereal flakes. Fill greased muffin pans, 2 inches in diameter, 2/3 full.

Topping: 1/2 cup sugar; 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon; 2 small apples (24 slices). Combine sugar and cinnamon in small bowl. Peel and core apples; cut in quarters and slice into thirds. Dip slices in sugar-cinnamon mixture and press two slices curved side up into each muffin. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) about 15 to 20 minutes. Yield: 12 muffins.

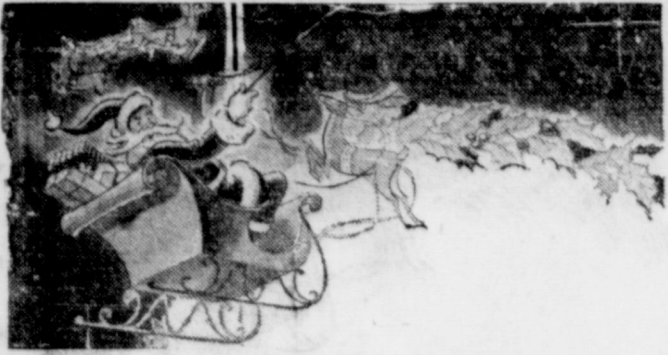

greens is decidedly important now. That's because poorly drained soils are apt to freeze deeper than those in well drained areas. In some cases, expanding frozen soil thrusts young trees right out of the ground.

No need to wonder about how well your grounds drain, either. G. F. Bassler, field supervisor of the Davey Tree Co., recommends a simple test for this. Dig a hole about two feet deep and fill it with water. If drainage isn't complete in 36 hours, you've got a problem on your hands. The answer may lie in installation of tile lines to run off excess water.

Adequate drainage, like adequate watering, is essential to tree and shrub health, and notably to evergreens. Almost every home owner tries to give his evergreens a giant drink before the first big freeze-over occurs. However, few realizes the dangers of water logging, especially in heavy

clay soils. Transplants with their abbreviated root systems, are decidedly vulnerable to deep freezing.

Good mulches in combination with adequate drainage give young trees a winter assist. Coverings of peat moss, leaves or other humus material over root areas serve to equalize soil tem-
