Government Is Offering Jobs

The U.S. Civil Service Commission today issued a new announcement of an examination for filling chemist, physicist, and meteorologist positions in the Air Force Research Center, Cambridge, Massachusetts.

The salaries for the chemist and physicist positions range from \$5,060 to \$10,800 a year and for meteorologist, from \$4,200 to \$10,800 a year. To qualify in the examination, applicants must meet a basic requirement of education and experience or both in the field for which they apply and, in addition, must have had from 1 1/2 to 4 years of appropriate professional experience. Pertinent graduate study may be substituted for part of the required professional experience.

Full information about the examination and the necessary applications forms may be obtained from the Commission's local secretary, Mr. O. L. McDonald, located at local Post Office, from Civil Service regional offices, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications should be sent to the Board of U.S. Civil Service Examiners, Air Force Cambridge Research Center, 415 Summer Street, Boston 10, Massachusetts, where they will be accepted until further notice.
