UN Passes Western Disarmament Plans

Russian Bloc Voted Against Western Plan

By Richard Witkin Inited Press Staff Corresponder FARIS, Jan. 11 (UP)- The Inited Nations gave final approval today to negotiation of western program for a world arms count and reduction by the new UN Disarmament Commis

The vote was 42 to 5, with sev n abstentions. The arms study olan previously was overwhelming approved in committee.

The five-nation Soviet Com munist bloc voted againist th proposal, largely because it structs the new commission base its work on the Baruch blu prinit for atomic controls,

However, Russia has prom to take its seat on the 12-natio body which must begin work with in 30 days.

Today's action climaxed a cam aign by the western powers at his UN session to seize the peace nitiative which the Russians have virtually monopolized in previou rears.
