The nation's 2,900,000 Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Explorers and their adult leaders will observe Boy Scout Week, Feb. 6-12, marking the 42nd birthday of their organization, by giving the nation a unique birthday gift. Eastland Scouts will attend a special Scout Sunday church service, next Sunday the 10th. All scouts will be in full uniform. Local Troop 6, is planning a Scout Week troop party.

### Reds Want Full Dress Conference After Armistice

PANMUNJOM, KOREA, Feb. 6 (UP)—The Communists demanded today a full-dress peace conference within 90 days of a Korean armistice to discuss the withdrawal of foreign troops from Korea and a general Far Eastern settlement.

North Korean Lt. Gen. Nam Il submitted the Red proposal at the first meeting of the full armistice delegations since Dec. 3. Vice Admiral C. Turner Joy, head of the United Nations delegation, received the document without comment at the 20-minute meeting. He asked—and was granted—a recess until 10 a.m. tomorrow (8 p.m. today EST) to study it.

Western observers noted, however, that the proposal would entail political negotiations with the Chinese and North Korean Communist governments, neither of which the U. S. recognizes. It also apparently would exclude the South Korean government from the conference.

The full plenary session was convened to take up the fifth and final item on the Korean armistice agenda—recommendations to be made to the belligerent governments for a final Korean peace settlement.

She was asked to fill out a form to collect the \$10,000 life insurance. Mrs. Bogen, the wife of Harold Bogen, a World War II veteran, looked surprised and then smiled across the breakfast table at her three children... and her husband. They had no explanation for the obvious error.

### NEW YORK COURT CONVICTS JAMES MORAN FOR SHAKEDOWN

NEW YORK, Feb. 6 (UP)—James J. Moran, friend and political protege of former Mayor William O'Dwyer, was convicted last night as the mastermind of a \$500,000-a-year shakedown racket run by New York City firemen.

Moran, 50, was tight-lipped but expressionless as the jury of 12 middle-aged businessmen found him guilty of 23 counts of extortion and one count of conspiracy. The jury returned its verdict at 9:50 p.m., just 2 hours and 13 minutes after General Sessions Judge John A. Mullen ended his charge and gave the jury the case. Moran faces a possible 'maximum' sentence of 348 years in jail, and a \$500 fine. Judge Mullen set March 4 for sentencing, revoked Moran's \$25,000 bail and remanded him to the Tombs Prison. The former city official, who rose high in the administration with O'Dwyer as his mentor, is

under sentence of five years in jail and a fine of \$2,000 on his conviction for perjury before the Senate Crime Investigating Committee. He has appealed that conviction to the U. S. Circuit Court. Moran was accused in his extortion trial of setting up a coordinated system of collecting illegal fees from fuel oil equipment installers before fire permits would be issued. He was charged with receiving as much as \$2,500 a week, which was collected by his aids while he was first deputy fire commissioner under O'Dwyer from December 1947, to November, 1950. O'Dwyer appointed Moran to a life-time, \$15,000-a-year post as commissioner of water supply just before O'Dwyer announced his resignation as mayor to become ambassador to Mexico. Moran resigned the water board post under pressure after testimony at the Kefauver hearings last March linked him with a notorious policy racketeer.

# King Of England Dies Early Today

## Princess Elizabeth Becomes Reigning Sovereign Of Empire

LONDON, Feb. 6 (UP)—King George VI died peacefully in his sleep early today and 25-year-old Princess Elizabeth became reigning sovereign of the British Commonwealth and Empire. The new queen, who will reign over one-quarter of the world's surface and population, was vacationing in Nairobi, Kenya, an African colony, when the death of her 56-year-old father elevated her to the throne. She was expected to return at once to England with her husband and Prince Consort, Philip, Duke of Edinburgh. They had been scheduled to sail from Africa tomorrow for a royal tour of Ceylon, Australia and New Zealand. Buckingham Palace announced shortly before 11 a.m. (6 a.m. EST) that the King had died unexpectedly in his sleep at his country estate at Sandringham, Norfolk, 60 miles north of London.

The cabinet met at 10 Downing Street. A silent gathering of about 50 men and women watched Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and other ministers arrive. There was no immediate announcement of the date of the King's burial. However, he will be laid to rest alongside Britain's long line of monarchs in hallowed Westminster Abbey. It is in Westminster Abbey also that the new Queen Elizabeth will be formally crowned six months hence. But Elizabeth, in fact, became reigning sovereign over the 14,435,000 square miles and 539,870,000 persons who make up the British Commonwealth and Empire immediately upon the King's death. As soon as Elizabeth arrives back in Britain, the Privy Council will meet in the throne room at St. James Palace to approve a proclamation formally naming her sovereign. Once the council has approved the proclamation, Elizabeth will be summoned to sign the declaration and take her oath as head of the Church of Scotland. Parliament will be summoned to take an oath of allegiance to the new ruler. As one of her first duties, Elizabeth will send messages to the armed forces at home and abroad asking for their allegiance. She also will broadcast to the nation and empire. Elizabeth is Britain's first reigning queen since the memorable Victoria. Her husband is the first Royal Consort since Albert, husband of Victoria. Their three-year-old son, Charles is now Crown Prince.

Miss Williamson is a member of the campus Young Women's Auxiliary, Life Service Band and Chapel Choir. A sophomore, she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dee F. Williamson of Eastland. Other run-off candidates for Beauty are Loretta Gullette of Joplin, Mo., Pat Baxter of Anson and Patsy Morrow of Munday. Nine girls were nominated for the honor. Twelve male students competed in the preliminary election Beasat. Bill Preston, Abernathy, Bill Denton, Brisbane, Calif., and Bill Cagle, Childress, will vie in the run-off.

## DEMOCRATS HOPE TO SQUELCH KEFAUVER IN 3 STATE RACES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (UP)—Pro-Truman Democrats hoped today to squelch the early season presidential bid of Sen. Estes Kefauver by defeating him in three key state primaries. The party regulars are counting on President Truman himself to carry the ball against the Tennessee Senator in California as well as New Hampshire, Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D. Okla.) a Truman supporter, will challenge Kefauver in Nebraska. The triple-pronged "stop Kefauver" strategy unfolded as Mr. Truman gave fresh evidence of his determination to remain in the driver's seat of the Democratic party this year, whether or not he runs for reelection. He told a Veterans of Foreign Wars dinner here last night that he expects to have "a lot of fun" during the coming political campaign, and hopes it will have "the right result."

## Woman's Body Found In San Antonio River

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 6 (UP)—Police detectives today questioned the husband of a brutally stabbed woman whose nude body was found yesterday in the San Antonio River. Mansell W. Elder, 43, was arrested at his apartment last night for questioning in the pre-dawn killing of Mrs. Florence Elder, the man's attractive 41-year-old wife. Police Detective Sgt. Eddie Campa said Elder last night told officers he was home at the time his wife was murdered and her body thrown in the San Antonio River shallows inside the city limits. Mrs. Elder was slashed or stabbed 31 times about the face, neck, chest, stomach and back. One breast had been mutilated and police Chief Robert Allen declared, "this looks like the work of a fiend—a sex fiend." An autopsy was being conducted to determine whether the woman has been raped. Time of the slaying was set at 1:35 a.m., on a statement by Mrs. Maria A. Fuentes that she heard screams of "don't! Oh, please don't! please don't!" Mrs. Fuentes lives in an apartment across the narrow, winding river. Clothes were strewn along the bank. A yellow blouse and a pair of tan sandals were found in debris above a falls. The body was in a clump of bushes at the river's edge, 100 yards above the falls.

## Texas Facing Loss Of Soil From Drouth

AUSTIN, Feb. 6 (UP)—Dust-bowl conditions are building up in Texas and unless immediate steps are taken the state's fertile top soil will be "gone with the wind," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White warned yesterday. White urged farmers to use wisely the small amounts of moisture available and suggested other soil-conserving measures such as "strip-cropping," contouring and terracing. "A long drought and heavy winds set the stage for dustbowl conditions," White said. "It is imperative that preventive measures such as these be taken." Calling this week's dust storm the "worst since 1936" White said "no one knows how many tons of Texas soil were carried with the dust as it drove southward over the Gulf of Mexico." White criticized farmers for forcing the soil to get more production out of maximum acreage. "I am for full production," he said, "but we can't afford to abandon the practices we know will hold our soil and soil moisture."

**DOLLARS and SENSE in FARMING**

**Doesn't Put All His Eggs in One Basket**  
SEARCY, ARK.—Gene Smith is a diversified farmer. Besides his flock of pullets, he has a good-sized milking herd, acreage in pimientos, tomatoes, strawberries and a variety of vegetables.

Gene is set up to sell either eating or hatching eggs. "Careful selection of clean and uniform eggs gets me a premium on my Layena eggs," he says. "And when I sell hatching eggs, I cross New Hampshire pullets with Delaware roosters to get Indian River broilers."

The New Hamps are always busy in the nests. Chicks Gene put down May 3 were laying in 5 months and averaged 60 per cent production through the winter.

Gene's poultry management includes new and old ideas. He uses community-type nests 12 feet long. The tops are angled—to discourage roosting—and can be lifted for gathering eggs.

It becomes too moist. Pit roosts run along the closed north wall; however, Gene plans to take these roosts out for the next group of pullets.

Birds have Layena Checker-Etts before them at all times. On winter evenings a "hot mash" is fed—all the hot water and Checker-Etts the birds will clean up in 15 minutes. When the mixture is ready, pullets are run off the roosts so they'll fill up for the night. Kerosene-heated waterers are used in cold weather.

An automatic switch turns light on from 4:30 in the morning until daylight and from dusk to 7:30 p. m. Extra "working" hours for the layers mean more eggs for Farmer Smith.

Twenty-six registered Jersey supply Grade A milk in the Searcy community. The dairy barns are not fancy but are clean and serviceable. Gene says the herd is his biggest business and takes most of his time.

And Gene does his share of dirt farming. On the rolling hills of White County, he grows an acre of pimientos. Doesn't sound like much, but the acre yields are about 500 cases of 12 half-pint jars each year. The pimientos, which are crossed with a pepper, keep growing back until frost kills the plant. Gene does his own cleaning and canning and sells the pimientos in many parts of the state.

Gene is proud of his early tomatoes. The average crop comes in about July 4, but he usually has tomatoes on June 10. In some years he has had a crop ready in May. In addition to these crops, Gene also has 1 1/2 acres in strawberries and grows a variety of vegetables.

**UN Tanks Ram Six Miles Into Red Territory**

8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, KOREA, Feb. 6 (UP)—A powerful United Nations tank-infantry force rammed six miles into Communist territory today on the western front and blasted enemy supply lines and installations with direct fire for three hours.

More than 20 medium tanks lumbered across the frozen paddies in sub-zero weather at dawn in a surprise armored raid into Red territory north of Chorwon. Not one allied tank was lost.

"We hurt them," the allied tank commander said. "We could hear the Chinese radios calling for help."

Allied infantrymen jumped off at 4 a. m. and secured the hills in no-man's land surrounding the flat, snow covered valley through which the tanks drove.

In the air, American F-86 Sabre jets patrolled North Korea and dared Red MIG'S in vain to come over the Yalu River and fight. It was the second straight day that no MIG was damaged.

Allied pilots made up for the absence of air-to-air combat by shellacking North Korean rail lines in 127 places.

**Operators Cut Talks With The Drivers Unions**

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 6 (UP)—Truck operators' refusal to hold further talks with representatives of 10,000 long-haul drivers and federal mediators left little hope today for early settlement of a strike affecting 10 southern states.

A. E. Green, chairman of management's negotiating committee, informed conciliation panel chairman Yates Heafner yesterday the operators "believe nothing can be accomplished by further meetings."

"We are willing to submit all issues involved to the jurisdiction of the Wage Stabilization Board

or other appropriate government agency," Green said.

The chairman of the union's southern conference, M. W. Miller, said "we stand ready to meet any time night or day—with or without the conciliation service."

Heafner said "in view of the circumstances... no further conferences have been scheduled." Meanwhile, freight continued to pile up in Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Florida, Kentucky, Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Louisiana.

Court To Say How Much For Saving Cargo

GALVESTON, Feb. 6 (UP)—The Federal District Court here was faced today with the problem of whether three seamen who risked their necks in a tiny shrimp boat to rescue a derelict barge should be entitled to the barge and its cargo, valued at \$90,000.

Deputy U. S. Commissioner C. B. Jackson said a hearing probably will be set for June on the petition filed by George Sarish, Sr., owner of the shrimp boat, and fishermen Daniel F. Nelson and Carl Schuh.

The barge, which carried 9,000 barrels of crude oil when it broke loose from a tug last Saturday, was owned by the National Transport Co. of Houston.

Officials of the company have offered the three a \$30,000 reward.

They claim the barge had not been abandoned, although it was loose, and therefore, full salvage rights could not be claimed.

E. J. O'Donnell, an executive of the company, said the court must decide whether the fee would be more or less than the \$30,000 post-aid.

### Shivers Says Voters Get Control Back

AUSTIN, Feb. 6 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers believes Texas voters must decide this election year between "creeping socialism" and returning government "to the man on the street."

The governor, a foe of the Truman administration, spoke yesterday to the Austin Rotary Club. He stressed the importance of attending precinct conventions on May 8.

"Unfortunately or fortunately,"

the governor said, "the people of the United States do not have opportunity to vote on the selection of their chief executive except through conventions."

The governor is personally plumping for an uninstruced delegation to the National Democratic Nominating Convention.

But he urged his listeners to "participate in these precinct conventions—regardless of what side you're on."

"If you want creeping socialism—say so. If you want the return of power—to the man on the street, you ought to say that, too," he added.
