Republic Dislikes Concessions Being Made To Reds At Panmunjom

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Feb. 9 (UP)—The South Korean government denounced United Nations truce negotiators today for yielding to the Communists like "a defeated command."
"The Korean government views with great concern the continuing concessions which the U. N. delegates are currently making at the Panmunjom cease-fire talks," the government statement said.
It said the Reds were using 3,600 U. S. war prisoners as "hostages in order to demand" even further concessions.
"Neither the people nor the government of the Republic of Korea can tolerate these insulting humiliations," the Korean statement said.
The bitter statement was issued at Panmunjom, temporary capital of South Korea, as U. N. truce negotiators at Panmunjom accepted with reservations a Communist proposal for a high-level peace conference within 90 days of the conclusion of a Korean armistice.
Under the U. N. counter-proposal, the conference would be limited to a discussion of the withdrawal of non-Korean forces from Korea, a peaceful settlement of the Korean situation and other Korean questions. The Reds had wanted to extend the talks to include a general Far Eastern settlement.
Vice Admiral C. Turner Joy, head of the U. N. delegation, also insisted that the South Korean government be represented in the talks. The Communist proposal had mentioned only the North Korean and Chinese Communist governments and the U. N. as participants. South Korea is not a member of the U. N.

UN Loses 10 Planes During Last 7 Days; No MIG's Downed

8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea, Feb. 9 (UP)—United Nations airmen, seeking revenge for the loss of 10 planes during the past seven days, probably destroyed one Communist MIG-15 jet fighter and damaged three more in air battles today.
The damage claims were the first in three days of intermittent air fighting. The "probable" was the first claimed by the UN since Jan. 25.

Air Force Is Cutting Plane Production 24%

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9 (UP)—The Air Force has been forced to whack 24 percent off its peak monthly aircraft production goal to conform with President Truman's new "calculated risk" defense budget.
The result will be to postpone until at least the end of 1955 the time when the Air Force will build up to its goal of 143 modern wings.
The first official word on the size of the cutback in military aircraft production plans was disclosed yesterday when Air Force officials were explaining to a House Armed Services Subcommittee why they have cancelled some machine tool orders.
Air Force undersecretary Roswell L. Gilpatrick told the House group that the peak production goal for Air Force planes had been knocked down from 1,250 a month to 950. He told reporters afterward that the 1,250-plane peak was to have been attained in late 1953, but the lower goal will be reached still later.
These were the first official figures to give precise meaning to previous disclosures that aircraft production had been "stretched out." They were the first to show the scope of the major cutback in schedules ordered last month.
Gilpatrick did not amplify his comment, other than to say the lower goal was a reflection of the administration's decision to postpone the time when the Air Force will have 143 wings. It now has about 90.

The Communist planes did not venture within range of Allied anti-aircraft guns.

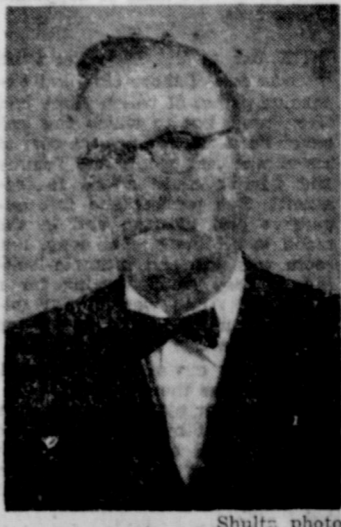

Indians Granted Millions To Pay For Their Timber

WICHITA, Kan., Feb. 9 (UP) —Oklahoma's Wyandotte Indians are confronted with the reverse of the usual indian problem: They want to get rid of some land. The plot is a small strip in downtown Kansas City, Kan. It's used for a burial ground—but only two Indians have been buried in it since 1855. Lawrence E. Zane, chief of the Wyandotte Tribe, tried to interest somebody at a Democratic party rally here yesterday in the Indians' problem. "It is of no earthly use to us," Zane said, "We don't want it and we don't need it." Congress gave the land to the Wyandottes in 1855. The title was retained by the United States and

the burying ground now is governed by the U. S. Department of Interior. A bill now before Congress would give the Wyandottes money in return for the land.

Truck Strike Talks Moved To Dallas

DALLAS, Feb. 9 (UP)—Negotiations in the week-old strike of 7,000 truck drivers in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana shifted to Dallas today.

The Southern and Southwestern Truckers were the only group still out in a strike which originally involved more than 13,500 long-haul drivers, members of the AFL Teamsters Union.

D. Yates Heafner of Charlotte, N. C., who presided at the federal mediation sessions in Memphis, Tenn., called together representatives of the union, operators and the federal conciliators.

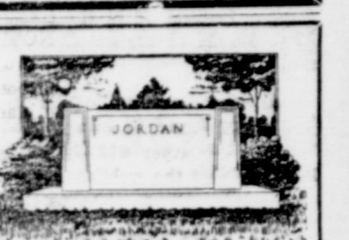
The Memphis sessions yesterday settled the strike of 5,000 long-haul truckers in six southeastern states.

Under that settlement, the drivers received a 19-cent hourly wage hike and a mileage rate increase

of 3-4 cent. The drivers formerly made \$1.41 and 5 1-4 cents a mile. Frank E. Bacon, chairman of the Southwest Negotiating Committee, said 24 lines still were strikebound in the southwest.

West Germans OK Joining Defense Plan

BONN, Germany, Feb. 9 (UP)—The lower house of the West German Parliament voted 204 to 156 to support German participation in West European Defense provided it was "a partner with full equality of rights."

The vote yesterday ended a two day debate on rearmament—the most bitterly contested issue in Germany today.

The House vote is only the first step toward rearmament. A tough battle is expected from the Socialist opposition when the government introduces a conscription bill and asks for ratification of the treaty providing for the formation of a six-nation European Army.

Political sources believe Chancellor Konrad Adenauer will be able to muster a hefty parliamentary majority for rearmament plans, but they do not believe it will be as large as the 90 vote majority the government amassed last month in the ratification of the Schuman Plan.

Yesterday's parliamentary victory was made against strong Socialist-Democrat opposition. The Socialists repeatedly have said they will use every possible means in the fight against rearmament.

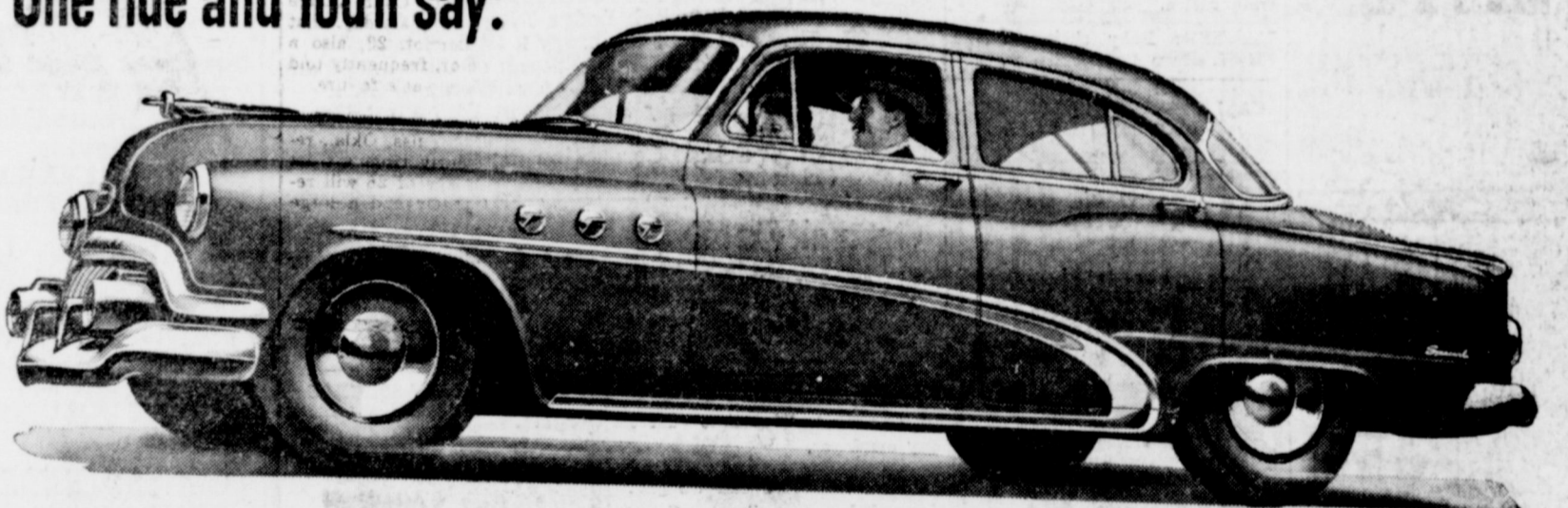

LONDON, Feb. 9 (UP)—A curtain of mourning hushed today the favorite subject of the gossips of fashionable West End London—when and whom will pretty Princess Margaret marry.

The death of her father King George VI means that the pert 21-year-old gay princess will be unable to be married for about a year. And then she must ask permission of her older sister—Queen Elizabeth II.

When the period of mourning for her father is ended—and it can be from six months to a year—the first great royal event will be the coronation of Elizabeth. This probably will be sometime in 1953. A palace spokesman said it would be impossible to plan both a coronation and a royal wedding at the same time.

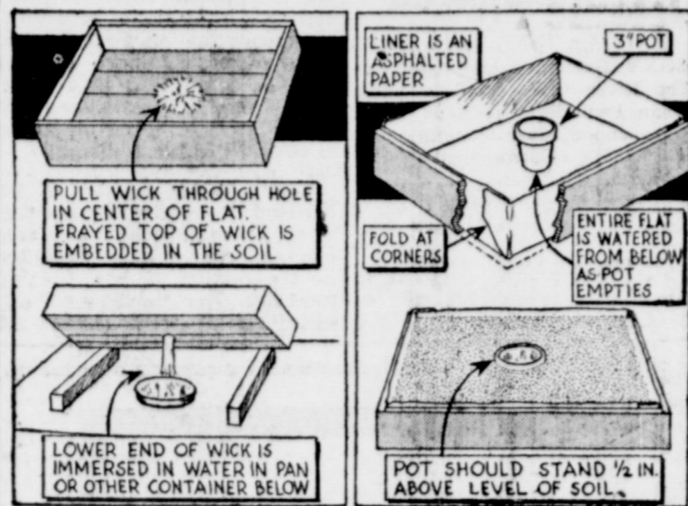
Margaret's name has come to mean champagne and the picture of a fairytale princess to many Britons. She is called the "Sweet Heart of West One"—London's theater and night club district. But, she is very much a family girl.

With each of her 21 years Margaret's responsibilities have increased. Now she is third in line for the royal throne—behind 3-year-old Prince Charles, her nephew, and 18-month-old Princess Anne, her niece.

As the burden of becoming queen falls upon her 25-year-old sister Margaret will have to take a larger share in countless public duties.

By her own choice she will remain close to her grieving mother while her sister turns to affairs of state. She probably will move into Clarence House with the Queen Mother when Queen Elizabeth and her family move into the Royal Apartments in Buckingham Palace. Since she is 21, Margaret could have her own private apartment, but prefers to stay with her mother.

You Can Water Seed Box Safe Way Florists Use



Two Methods of Watering Seed Box O. K.'d by Science.

Automatic watering methods which are widely practiced by florists can easily be adopted by amateur gardeners who start seeds in their homes. They make it possible to provide constant moisture for indoor seed boxes without danger of overwatering, or forgetting to water the plants, with possibly fatal consequences.

Amateurs who prefer to start their own seeds indoors rather than purchasing seedling plants, are able to make important savings, and to enjoy an unlimited selection of the subjects to be set out in their gardens. They can grow exactly the varieties they prefer, including the latest novelties, or old favorites.

Latest methods of preventing disease, using artificial light when needed, and regulating moisture make success certain for those who use them.

Most failures of flower and vegetable seeds to grow are probably due to either a lack or an excess of moisture.

If the soil gets too dry, the tiny seedlings with their shallow roots may perish in an hour. If kept too wet, fungi may develop, resulting in the fatal disease called "damping off." To keep the moisture "just right" was formerly a matter of experienced judgment, and required a constant watch on the seed flat, difficult for the amateur.

But science has found two methods which may be followed, both better than spraying on water from above. These methods are illustrated. On the left is the wick method; on the right, sub-irrigation.

The wick method consists of using a burlap wick or one of fibre glass, inserting one wick in the center of the flat spreading it over about three inches in diameter on the bottom of the flat inside and letting the wick hang in the water. The water then moves up to the soil by capillarity and keeps the flat at a constant uniform moisture content.

In the sub-irrigation system a waterproof liner is used to hold water until it rises through the soil above. If a pan sufficiently large is used beneath the flat, in using the wick method, sufficient water for several days may be provided, and it will rise only as fast as needed, enabling plants to be left unattended for a day or two, when necessary.

With either method there is no danger of tiny seedlings being washed in the soil when water is applied.

Petition Out In Colorado For General

DENVER, COLO., Feb. 9 (UP)—Blank petitions, with room for 125,000 names, were being circulated here today in behalf of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower for president.

Supporters of the General as the GOP presidential candidate yesterday opened a state Eisenhower for-president headquarters in Denver and launched a campaign for grass roots support.

Colorado campaign manager Gordon Weller said the petitions "don't have any legal bearing," but added that "we want to collect as many names, addresses, and telephone numbers as we can to show that we have the support of the people."

Nudist Magazines Held Better Than Strip-tease

NEW YORK, Feb. 8 (UP)—Former Assistant U.S. Attorney O. John Rogge told the Supreme Court yesterday that "the plunging neckline of Faye Emerson" was a "device for stimulating sexual interest." Rogge was arguing a motion to prevent the city from banning newstand sale of two nudist magazines.

"It is the strip-tease, as its very name indicates—it is the art of Gypsy Rose Lee that leads to sexual stimulation, and not nudism," he said.

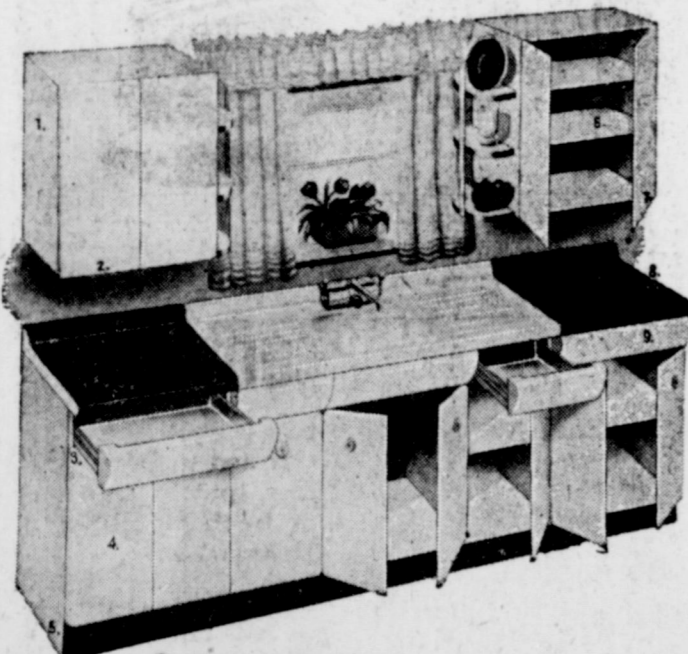

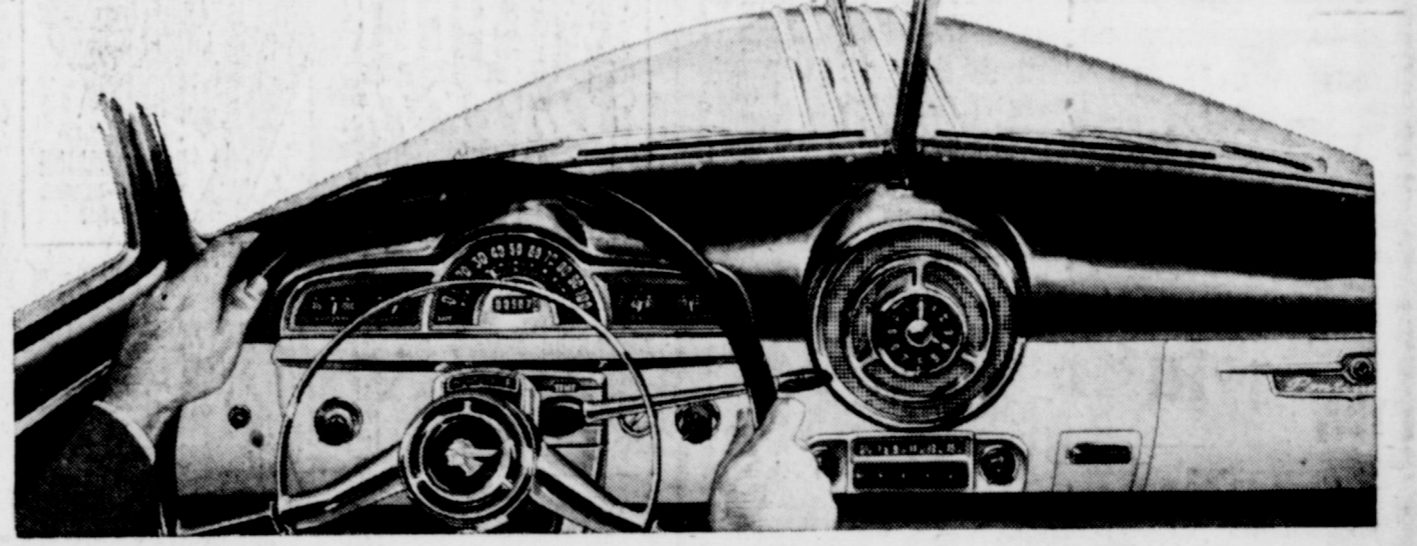

Subjects Allowed To View King's Body For First Time

SANDRINGHAM, England, Feb. 9 (UP) — The Royal family gave King George VI back to his loving subjects today.

Hundreds of workers and tenants on the royal estate who knew him as Squire and "Guv'nor" as well as King filed sorrowfully past the plain wooden coffin lying in little St. Mary Magdalen Church.

They were only the vanguard of the tens of thousands of Britons from Peers to Commonsers who will pay George VI final homage while he lies in state in Great Westminster Hall in London next week.

The Royal Family accompanied the coffin from Sandringham house 250 yards across the grass lawns of the Royal Estate to the church in a torchlight procession last night.

But even as 200 estate workers, woodmen and gamekeepers began lining up to await the opening of the church doors at 10 a.m. (5 a.m. EST), Queen Elizabeth II slipped inside again this morning for what may be her final private tribute to her father.

The 25-year-old Queen, garbed in black and obviously emotionally and physically tired, walked alone slowly through the yew trees from the royal residence to the church. She emerged a few minutes later and walked back to Sandringham

House to take up pressing affairs of state.

The King's body, dressed in his favorite uniform of an Admiral of the Fleet, lay in a simple oak coffin, on trestles before the rails of the gleaming silver altar. A metal plate was inscribed, "Albert Frederick Arthur George Windsor; Born 1895; Died 1952."

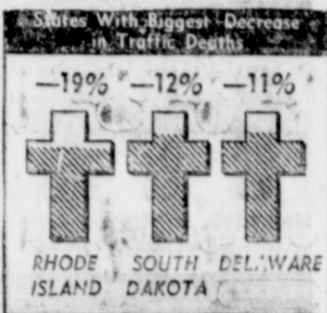
The coffin was only three feet from the spot where the King had worshipped only last Sunday. Around the bier was an honor guard of gamekeepers, foresters and four Grenadier guards. The soldiers stood with arms reversed and heads bowed on breasts.

The only flowers in the church were three wreaths of spring flowers—from Queen Elizabeth, Queen Mother Elizabeth and Princess Margaret. They lay on the coffin.

Only tenants of the royal estate and the villagers of Sandringham were permitted to enter the church. Police who know all local inhabitants were stationed at the doors to make sure that outsiders did not obtain entrance.

The coffin will lie in the church until Monday, when it will be placed on a gun carriage and drawn by Grenadier Guards to Wolferton Station, three miles away, for the journey to London.
