### Congressmen, House Wives And Broadcasters Fight House Ban

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (UP)—Congressmen and housewives joined the broadcasting industry today in protesting Speaker Sam Rayburn's ban on radio and television coverage of House committee sessions.

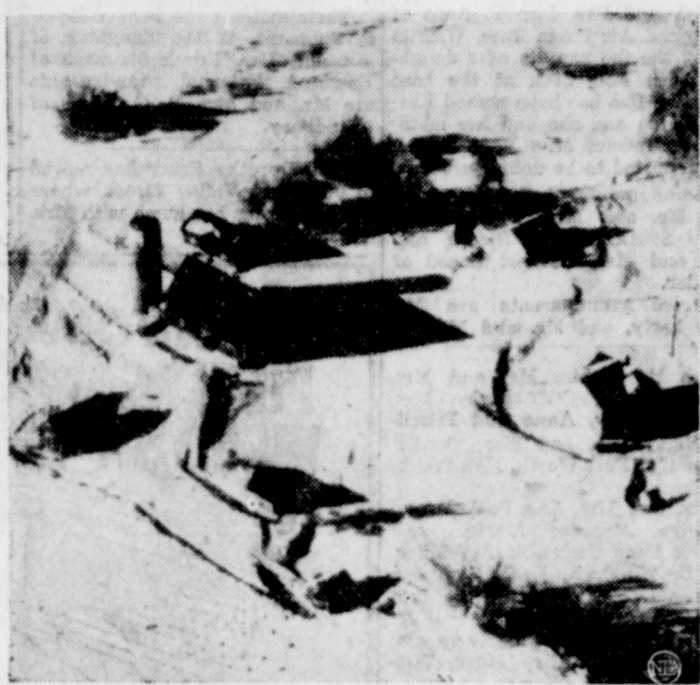
Rep. Paul W. Shafer (R-Mich.) called the order "one of the rawest examples of censorship" he'd ever seen.

As it became apparent that the public will see and hear much less of Congress in action, housewives began objecting to the ban on televised sessions of congressional activities, which they regard as welcome breaks from darning and diaper-changing.

There was no indication, however, that Rayburn will back down or that the House itself will modify the Texas Democrat's ruling.

Rayburn's stand was supported by the House of Delegates of the American Bar Association. Meeting in Chicago, the lawyers adopted a resolution opposing television coverage of either Congressional hearings or court proceedings.

Hollis M. Seavey of the Mutual Broadcasting System, chairman of the executive committee of the Radio Correspondents' Association called a committee meeting (at 12:30 p.m. EST) today to con-

### New Locations Are Being Made In Eastland Co.

Some activity is being shown by members of the oil fraternity in Eastland County, and several new locations have been made or are under construction.

Texon Oil Corporation of Abilene, has staked a wildcat in Eastland county, two and one half miles Southwest of Rising Star. Scheduled for 2360 feet with cable tools, No. 1, W. W. Ezell will be 2,480 feet from the East and 1,320 feet from the South lines of second 900, SA&MG survey.

D. W. Henke, Dallas, staked three locations in the Grover Hart Field six miles southwest of Cisco. No. 1, H. S. Stubblefield Estate is to be a 4,000-foot rotary exploration 330 feet from the south and west lines from the northwest quarter of Section 102, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

No. 1, Ben A. Brown is to be 600 feet from the south and east lines of section 108, Block 3, H&TC Survey. It is also staked for 4,00 feet.

No. 1, Anna (S. B.) Parks will be 6600 feet from the south and west lines of the north half of the southwest quarter of Section 108, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

### Korean War At Almost A Halt

8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea, Feb. 26 (UP)—The Korean War came to an almost complete halt both in the air and on the ground today.

Over 14 sorties were flown by 6th Air Force planes because of the almost solid overcast over North Korea. It was the lowest number of operational flights since Sept. 26, 1951, when the weather limited the 6th Air Force to seven sorties.

An 8th Army communiqué said there was no significant contact with the enemy on the ground except on the central front, where UN patrol fought light engagements with Red units up to two squads in strength.

Jim Bormann, news director of radio station WCCO, Minneapolis and St. Paul, and president of the National Association of Radio News Directors, protested in a telegram to Rayburn that rules should be modified to give radio and television "the right to equal access to the news."

### Texas Christian Churches Plan Big Convention

A "get-out-the-membership" campaign was under way in most Texas counties this week in preparation for the sixty-fifth annual convention of Texas Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) in Houston, March 10-13, stated Rev. Otto Marshall, local pastor, today.

Hosts to the annual assembly will be the Christian churches of Harris county. The campaign got under way covering the Gulf Coast area in Texas' District 8 on Jan. 22.

President Kenneth M. Hay, pastor of Lakeview Christian Church, Dallas, has asked ministers of each of the more than 400 Christian churches in the state to spearhead local drives for advance registrations.

### Missing Redhead Found; All's OK

FORT WORTH, Feb. 26 (UP)—Gwen Ann Hasty, 20-year-old redhead who "disappeared" on a bus trip from California to Texas, was resting at her aunt's home today, perplexed that her actions had "caused so much commotion."

Hasty, at first reported to be a television singer, said she was "detained" in El Paso.

"I just stayed over with a girl friend, after I got sick on the bus." The girl left Azusa, Calif., by bus last Wednesday. Thursday she sent a telegram from El Paso to her aunt, Mrs. J. B. Larue, that she was catching the "next bus" to Fort Worth.

Mrs. Larue heard nothing more, and, fearing the girl had met with foul play, reported her missing yesterday. She said her niece had been appearing with the Spade Cooley western band in Los Angeles on television.

Miss Hasty, who finally showed up at her aunt's home last night, said she had never appeared on television.

"I don't even watch it," she said. "I don't know how such a report got started. I don't even know Spade Cooley. I only know his singer vaguely."

Miss Hasty said she had studied for opera in Hollywood and doesn't think my voice would be quite in tune with Spade Cooley's music."

She planned to spend a few days in Fort Worth then visit her grandmother in Wichita, Kan., where she lived before moving to Azusa 10 years ago.

### Former Governor Alabama Free Of Drunken Charges

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 26 (UP)—Former Alabama Gov. James E. (Kissin) Jim Folsom was acquitted here yesterday of drunken driving charges.

Fourteen witnesses testified Folsom appeared sober after being arrested the night of Feb. 8 near Morris, Ala., by Patrolman L. E. Neuman, who was appointed during Folsom's administration.

Neuman and another trooper testified the governor was drunk. They said he wept when arrested and vowed he would be shot before he would go to jail.

### Texas Schools Among The Best, Marshall Says

Rev. Otto Marshall was guest speaker at the Rotary luncheon Monday, and he chose for his subject "Education." This proved to be very timely, for next week we are to celebrate Public School Week.

Among other things the speaker pointed out, with great pride, the Free School System in Texas. Back not so many years ago Texas Schools ranked 42nd in the nation. It was seen that something had to be done, and it was not long until it had climbed to 36th place, still much too low.

Today, it ranks with the top dozen in the nation. In early days Texas was sparsely settled and it was impossible to have a good school system in some areas. But today with good roads, good cars and seemingly plentiful funds, there is a different story. We have free Texas books, well trained teachers, good buildings and even free transportation. Every child in Texas is guaranteed a full 9-month school term. If there is no such school in his area, he will be taken to a good school.

Racial problems proved a handicap for many years, but that has been cared for in most instances.

Today children in Texas may obtain a well-balanced education in our Free Public Schools, and they offer more than special class schools, it was pointed out. Parochial and private schools do not offer what the free school offers, it is claimed.

Certain changes are being made from time to time, and others will follow, but on the whole, Texas ranks with the best in every way.

### One American Injured In Train Wreck

Pusan, Korea, Feb. 26 (UP)—A north-bound Army train crashed into the rear of a passenger train 10 miles from Pusan last night killing two persons and injuring five others including an American engineer.

A signal error was blamed for the crash. The crash occurred on the main Pusan-Seoul railroad line at the Kupo Compound station. The Diesel-powered Army locomotive and the last car of the passenger train were damaged.

### Reds May Be Stalling Truce To Start Battle

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Feb. 26 (UP)—The United Nations Command said tonight that Communist truce negotiators may be stalling to delay a cease-fire until May Day or to cover preparations for a spring offensive.

May Day is a traditional Communist holiday.

Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's headquarters broadcast the charge from Tokyo in a "Voice of the U. N. Command" program as Red negotiators here rejected an Allied compromise offer designed to break the deadlock over policing a truce.

Chinese Col. Pu Shan categorically refused to drop Russia from the proposed neutral truce supervision commission despite the U. N. offer to match the gesture by withdrawing Norway.

The U. N. headquarters broadcast from Tokyo said the Reds had warned at a recent negotiating session that "as far as they are concerned, an early truce was out of the question."

"They estimated" that the delay might take "another 70 days," the broadcast said. "If this figure has any significance at all, it is that a delay of that length brings the talks right up to May Day for the Reds."

"This is a veiled threat to the free world that unless the U. N. command accedes to the Reds, a new Communist offensive will begin this spring."

"Or is it an indication that the Reds will make the signing of an armistice coincide with their auspicious holiday?"

"Only time and the outcome of the talks at Panmunjom will reveal the answers."

The broadcast said the Reds have made it clear they will delay the truce talks as long as possible to win their fight to force the repatriation of even war prisoners who do not wish to return to Communism.

But, the broadcast added, the Reds have changed their "unshakable" stands before. They may be trying to "horse-trade" one point for another, it said.

### D. Henderson Dies In Dublin; Is Buried Monday

D. Henson, 57, died in a Dublin hospital Sunday, following an illness of many months duration. He was buried in the Dublin cemetery Monday afternoon at 2:30.

Mr. Henson lived in Eastland for almost two years, and was owner and operator of the Mercury Automobile agency here. His health began failing several months ago and the agency was sold to Paul Daniel, present operator.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. D. Henson; two brothers, John Henson of Dublin and Frank Henson of Stephenville, and well as a great host of friends.

A half-hour program with leading stars of entertainment dramatizing Red Cross services through the theme of neighbors helping neighbors will launch the 1952 fund appeal over all radio and television networks between 6 p.m. and 10 p.m. CST, Thursday night, Feb. 28. President Truman, presented by Mr. Harriman, will speak from the White House during the last five minutes of the program.

Jessica Tandy, now co-starring with Hume Cronyn in the Broadway hit, "The Fairposter," will narrate the program in a role symbolizing the Red Cross volunteer.

Mr. Cronyn will play the part of a Midwestern farmer overwhelmed by flood. ### Acheson States On Congress Can Grant The Plea

LISBON, Portugal, Feb. 26 (UP)—French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman said today he has the "firm hope" that the United States and Great Britain will guarantee France against any future German sellout of the European Army.

Schuman said the guarantees he mentioned would be both political and legal.

The statement of the French Foreign Minister, made at a press conference, caused a sensation. It was made after he conferred with secretary of state Dean Acheson and British foreign secretary Anthony Eden, fellow delegates to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization meeting which ended yesterday.

Official American quarters at once threw cold water on Schuman's statement.

These informants said that only Congress could give such guarantees.

Acheson at an hour-long conference today with Schuman and Eden, simply reaffirmed what Congress had already authorized—the maintenance of six American divisions in Europe and the American hope for European unity, informants said.

France is afraid that the Germans, "even if they are armed, may evade or repudiate their obligations to keep their armed forces merely as a part of a six-nation army under Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, pledged to resist Communist aggression.

The three foreign ministers, at their meeting, decided that Western Germany's defense contribution to the Western European Defense Organization next year should be 11,250,000,000 marks (\$2,678,000,000). This is the figure the western allies have demanded.

Acheson, Eden and Schuman arranged an afternoon meeting to draft a statement announcing this.
