### Around The Square With Mack

From now until the 2nd of this month, the main subject for discussion in Eastland will likely be water. And so far as we are concerned we can't think of a better one for we are famous for the lack of water. Of course Eastland is not the only dry town in West Texas. In fact most all of Texas is dry at this time, though in some sections people are just standing by and waiting for nature to take its course.

In Eastland we propose to do something about it. We can't make it rain, but we can provide suitable storage for water when it comes. Only the good Lord can make rain, and He has always done so, though there have been times we have been rather worried. But now that we know the real meaning of water, its value, its necessity, we are beginning to take courage.

In conjunction with our Sister City, Ranger, we plan to build a dam that, when completed will hold 28,000 acre feet of water, and once the lake is filled there will be water for everybody and everything. We may have dry years and crop shortages in the future, but we will not be without water, plenty of water for commercial and industrial purposes. And when we can begin leaning on industry a crop failure won't completely "lick us."

Water means almost as much as life itself. Eastland can either dry up and blow away, or build into a bustling, bustling little city where factory whistles will be as common as home made sin. Water is the answer. Without water we can't have steam for the whistles.

Why should Eastland people be forced to go to the Possum Kingdom to fish and fight rattlesnakes, when they could have more fish and less rattlers right here at home? It just doesn't add up.

Indications are good that the election will carry with many votes to spare, but we are not in position to know for sure. Therefore, it becomes the duty of every open-minded citizen in the two cities to work and talk for the bonds. It is a matter of having everything to gain and nothing to lose if we get the water. On the other hand if we should fail to get the water, everything is already lost. It is just this serious.

Efforts have been made to see that every man and woman in the district understands the whole set-up. There is nothing to hide—no under-cover business. If you want information write us or bring us your question, and it will be answered. These questions with the answers will be published, thus giving everybody the benefit of information they might desire. Address your communication to the Editor of this paper. If he can answer he will do so, and if he can't he has a mighty good lawyer who can.

Then when you have the information appoint yourself a kind of walking delegate—go out and tell others how much a vote means for the future prosperity of Eastland. It will help everybody and will hurt nobody.

Don't let the figures scare you, for in truth you will pay very little if anything. Your water rates are not to be hoisted, merely making it possible for you to have all the water you want when you want it and at a reasonable price. It is as good as it sounds.

### Round Grove Farmer Reaping Profits From Care Of His Soil

For the past twenty-one years Wade George, Round Grove Community, has practiced and preached planting fall cover crops and wind stripping peanuts. Twenty-one years ago he planted his first cover crop of rye and has continued the practice since. However, about three years ago he began using vetch with his rye and believes this has added much to the value of his protection from wind erosion and soil improvement. Until seven years ago he used cow peas as wind strips but upon convincing himself that this was not giving the protection he needed, he then began using red top cane and sudan, using eight rows of peanuts to four rows of the strip. This practice was what he wanted, for the red top and sudan grew tall enough to keep the wind from sweeping the peanut land and piling sand upon the next strip after the peanuts were harvested.

Recently when walking over the field with Mr. George, the latter asked, "Do you see any more sand piled upon that east fence row now than was there when we walked across here several years ago?" The answer was no. Wind erosion has been held to a minimum despite the fact that dry weather has hindered the growth of cover crops and strip crops.

Recently one of George's friends stopped while passing along the road and observed that the vetch and rye in front of the house was much greener and more vigorous than that of an adjoining field. He asked, "Why is this in the field I just passed?" Wade replied, "I have thrown my peanut hay back on this land for the past three years in addition to strip cropping and cover cropping, and all my residue has been chopped up and left near the top of the ground. The hay has all been taken off of the other field. This is the only reason I can give you."

strips just like he does his peanuts. He says, "If any difference, I put more fertilizer under my strips." He went on to say, "I believe most people on the deep sand wait too late to plant their strips. I plant mine about the time I plant my peanuts so as to get more growth while moisture is available."

He also fertilizes his winter cover crops and inoculates his vetch and winter peas.

For the past sixteen years George's average yield of peanuts on his farm has been 35.5 bushels per acre. On the land he rents adjoining him, the yield has averaged approximately 30 bushels per acre. Both farms have the same type of soil. He attributes the difference in yield to the fact that he has been using winter cover crops on his own land longer, and too, peanut hay has never been returned to his rented land.

The average depth of top soil on this land is from twenty-four inches to thirty inches.

Mr. George has been a cooperator with the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District since July 1942. He has been a great help to the district not only by example, but also by telling the story of conservation to others.

### Army Forbids Keeping Diary

WASHINGTON, April 3 (UP)—The Army has issued a regulation forbidding the military keeping diaries while on foreign service. The regulation applies to everyone, from private to general.

The new regulation is a result of the diary stolen from Major General Robert Grow while he was in Frankfurt, Germany, last July. The diary was photographed and published by the Communists in East Berlin as "proof" of American planning to attack the Soviet Union. General Grow had advocated in his journal a war against Russia. Grow was immediately called home, and an investigation of the incident is now underway.

The Air Force has issued a regulation similar to the Army's but one that applies only to military attaches serving in foreign posts. A spokesman says the Navy is also preparing a rule against keeping a private diary or journal.

### North African Hotbeds Flare

NORTH AFRICA, April 3 (UP)—Nationalist hotbeds in North Africa have brought two new developments this morning.

French and Spanish troops have entered the international city of Tangier to maintain law and order. French and Spanish authorities decided to use troops after Nationalist riots last Sunday killed seven persons.

In Tunisia, the completion of the government's new Pro-French cabinet has been delayed by palace intrigue. The seven-man cabinet was to be announced today, but at the last minute two prospective members were backed out. The new cabinet was expected to restore calm to the troubled French protectorate.

### CIO And Steel Companies Meet

NEW YORK, April 3 (UP)—Representatives of the CIO Steelworkers' Union and the big six steel companies met in bargaining session today at New York, for the first time in three months.

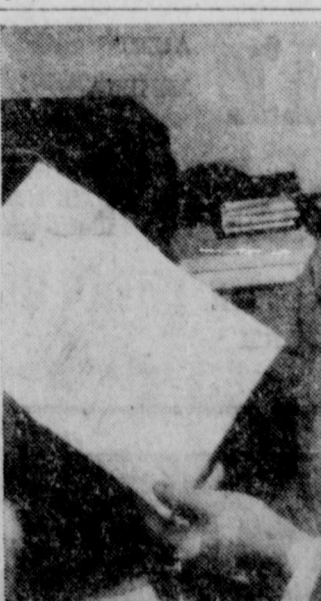
The union plans a strike for April 8th in demand for wage increases recommended by the Wage Stabilization Board. The companies contend they need substantial price boosts to meet wage increases and they are reported to have made some progress in behind doors discussions with price officials in Washington.

Government agencies, meantime have been placed on the alert for any possibility, presumably including seizure of the industry. Company officials indicate they would fight any seizure attempt in the courts.

### Truman Estimate National Deficit Reported To High

WASHINGTON, April 3 (UP)—The Treasury Department says the government won't go as deep into the red as President Truman has predicted.

The President forecast a deficit for the current financial year of more than eighty-billion dollars. But a Treasury official says the actual deficit probably will be between five and six billion. The reason—a lot of money allotted for defense spending has not been spent.

### Former Official Revenue Bureau Will Testify

WASHINGTON, April 3 (UP)—House investigators are scheduled to hear a former top tax official testify this morning.

He is Daniel Bolich, one-time assistant Internal Revenue Commission, who will talk about his "unusual interest" in two big tax cases.

Bolich's name has cropped up in testimony heard by the Ways and Means investigating subcommittee during the last few days.

One witness, former head of the Internal Revenue Bureau's technical staff Aubrey Morris, has testified that early in 1949 Bolich "ordered" him to find some way to lift government liens against a Baltimore liquor dealer in a seven-million dollar tax case.

And other witnesses have testified that Bolich overruled the decision of subordinates to prosecute officials of a New York dress firm for tax evasion in a \$250,000 case.

### Club Boys And Girls Capture Money At Show

Eastland County 4-H Club boys and girls won \$497.40 of the \$1,000 prize money offered at the Eastland County Livestock Show, held in Eastland, March 28-29, stated Assistant County Agent C. V. Whitaker today.

The show was in the fat stock division. All the stock was graded on a Packer Graded basis, and every animal received some prize money, according to its merit. Many of the animals were sold at Tuesday's auction with the grand champion bringing 75c per pound.

Dairy cattle were classified with some prize money going to each animal.

Adults and juniors competed against each other in all divisions other than the Fat Stock which was open only to 4-H Club, and F.F.A. members.

### Truman Must Put House In Order; Stop Feudists

WASHINGTON, April 3 (UP)—President Truman faces the problem of settling a feud within his official family, and he may solve it by firing one or both of the feudists.

Attorney-General J. Howard McGrath and government corruption hunter Newbold Morris are fighting over the Morris cleanup campaign and, specifically, the financial questionnaire Morris has sent to government officials. McGrath has indicated reluctance to answer the questions, and Morris is reported determined that McGrath must go if the cleanup campaign is to be successful.

There is no indication officially of what course the president will choose. But one administration official says that whatever Mr. Truman decides, he will make his decision within two days.

### Phone Service Restored After Norman Walkout

NORMAN, April 3 UP—Telephone service was restored to Norman today at Fort Arthur and all Employees reported back on the job after officials for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, agreed to enlarge the business office staff to relieve the work load. The business employees walked off the job and went into a "continuous meeting" shortly before noon yesterday. They were joined later in the day, by other workers some 250 were off the job.

Supervisory employees handled only emergency long distance calls. Local calls continued over the dial system.

The boys are elated, and have found their profits very high. Many of the calves were re-sold, though Judge Grissom plans to butcher and freeze his buy.

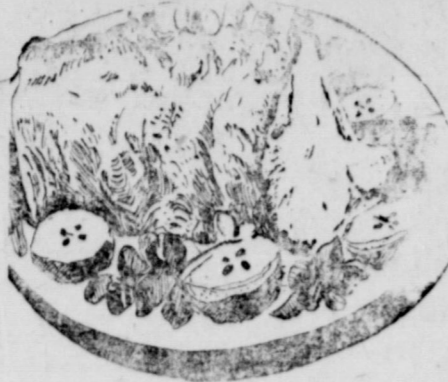

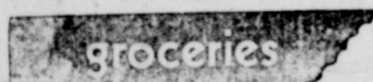

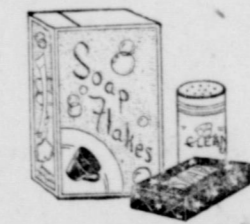
