Telephones Silent As Workers Strike

ONLY EMERGENCY CALLS TO BE ACCEPTED; SERVICE IN COUNTY REDUCED TO ZERO

Fort Pierre South Dakota 80% Flooded

FORT PIERRE, S. D., April 10 (UP)—Flood waters are sloshing over 80 per cent of Fort Pierre, S. D., this morning, and the flood crest of the Missouri River is still to come.

In the midst of the creeping, muddy tide of water, 40 men are barricaded in the telephone building trying to keep lines open, lines that serve as the city's last source of communication.

Across the Missouri, things are not much better. In Pierre, a 25-foot flood crest is approaching and is expected to strike today.

The rampaging river already has topped its banks, burst through levees, put a 34-block area under water, forced nearly 1600 persons to flee their homes.

Mayor Ralph Henderson of Sioux City urged residents to make every effort to protect themselves and property because of what he calls the "unprecedented threat of floods."

In South Sioux City, Neb., the main dike on the west edge of the city collapsed this morning, a flood crest of about 19 feet. The dike had been holding back Police say some water is pouring into the residential area of town, although an auxiliary dike is expected to hold off some of the flow.

The entire upper Midwest in the states of Minnesota, Nebraska and the Dakotas either is flooded already or is threatened in the river valleys. The total number of homeless approaches the 3000 mark and thousands of acres of farmland are under water.

Telephone service in this area is practically nil. Work stoppage by local and long distance operators of the area telephone exchange in sympathy with the striking CIO Communications Workers, which includes Western Electric employees is the cause.

Skelton crews of supervisory personnel are on duty at the exchanges to accept emergency calls for long distance.

Work stoppage in the county began at 7:00 a.m. this morning. Wire service for newspapers has not been impaired, though general news obtained from various sources, has been reduced to the zero point.

W. H. McAnally of Cisco, group manager of eight exchanges, flagged early today that is not an all out strike, and that only real emergency calls will be accepted. His statement follows:

"There is no dispute of any kind between the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., and the Union representing the employees in Texas, and we have a contract with CWA, CIO, which remains in full force and effect.

"It is the responsibility of the telephone company and its employees to furnish telephone service to the public on a continuous basis. We are doing everything we can to meet our responsibility through the use of every available person to man the switch boards."

In large cities, where the dial system is used, people will not be inconvenienced to any great extent, but in smaller cities and towns and rural areas, telephone service is practically paralyzed, it is thought.

Just how long present conditions will exist can not be said, though it is unlikely that they will improve materially before the strike is finally settled.

All switchboards in this county are idle, it is thought. Long distance calls will be accepted only in cases of extreme emergency.

The telephone strike called yesterday has hampered service in at least 29 Texas and Oklahoma towns, and 5000 non-striking telephone operators and maintenance workers are staying off their jobs in sympathy with striking employees.

Picket lines have been set up by CIO communication workers which includes Western Electric installers and salesmen in Texas and Oklahoma. El Paso is the only city with normal service in Texas where Western Electric employees are on strike. The El Paso exchange, served by Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Co., has Western Electric employees of a different local than the one that is striking. Pickets were withdrawn from the El Paso exchange yesterday.

At Dallas, and other major cities, supervisory personnel has been called on to handle long distance calls. Chester Cole, division commercial superintendent for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., said long distance calls are only curtailed and not on an emergency basis in Dallas.

Some 1800 operators are off their jobs in Dallas, 1800 walked off in San Antonio and 600 at Amarillo.

Norther Here Brings Freeze; Damage Slight

A cold norther is passing over this area today, and weather prognosticators who have been getting ready for the "Easter Snap" are not to be disappointed. The thermometer, early today, stood at 32 degrees—the exact freezing point.

Whether damage has been done to growing gardens, fruit and other crops, remains to be seen, though people who watch results done by late freezes, seem to feel we have nothing to fear. A few tender plants exposed to the elements, may not rally, but plants of the hardier groups appear to be safe.

\$9,250,000 Check Will End Lawsuit

An official of the Ford Motor Co. is ready to write a check for nine and one-quarter million dollars today, marking the end of four years of litigation over a patent infringement suit.

The sum is in settlement of a \$42-million-dollar suit brought by Irish-born tractor inventor Harry Ferguson. It represents royalty payments in Ferguson Tractor patents since 1947 when Ferguson's only partner, broke with the auto pioneer. Ferguson claimed that Ford copied his "Ferguson System" of tractor attachments.

In a consent judgment signed yesterday by Federal Judge Gregory Noonan in New York, both parties agreed to throw 90,000 pages of proceedings and more than one million documents into the trash barrel.

Henry Ford, II, said that in normal times, Ford would have carried the suit to a final conclusion in the courts. "But," Ford added, "these are not normal times."

Ferguson, in England at the present time, issued a statement calling the judgment a "great victory for inventors."

WATER SALES

(Editorial)

Water sales will be emphasized by the Eastland County Water Supply District.

Not only to the two towns presently forming the district, but other towns and for industrial uses. The adequacy of water from the proposed reservoir will make what is now impossible—an abundance of water for any use purchasers may want.

You will be urged to make your town more beautiful. Possibly, the women of your town, active in civic clubs promoting beautification, will be able to carry out their dreams and ideals upon which their clubs are founded.

Industries will be enhanced here by a supply of water on a twelve month per year basis. Numerous articles have appeared in some of the nation's leading magazines and trade publications about towns no larger than ours growing to additional water supplies they have made available to industry.

The more water sold by the Eastland County Water Supply District—the lower the cost will be to the purchasers. The water district is not an organization whose intentions are profit for the district, but is a separate political subdivision that has taken on the responsibility and work of building this area through new water supplies.

The directors of this district have asked for a bond issue of \$1,500,000 to finance this project on the strength of the water sales paying for the dam and its facilities of delivering water to purchasers.

The dam that would create this reservoir is to cost somewhat over six hundred thousand dollars. With the cost of the land being included in that figure. Last cost has been estimated at sixty dollars per acre for farmland, and thirty-five dollars an acre for pasture land.

"A town is no larger than its water supply." Vote for the bond issue April 22.

County Has 16 Car Inspection Stations Now

Eastland County has sixteen state approved Motor Vehicle Inspection stations to take care of the 9,682 registered vehicles in the county before next September. Three-thousand-one-hundred and thirty-two of those vehicles have been inspected. Some of the 3,132 having been inspected may possibly be out-of-county registered.

Cisco has two stations, AG Motor Co. and Nance Motor Co.; Eastland has six, Munirhead Motor, Fullen Motor, Blevins Motor, McGraw Motor, Rushing Motor, and King Motor Co.; Gorman has one, the Smith Bros. Chev. Co.; Ranger has five locations that can inspect cars, they are Clarks Motor, Mission Garage, Crawley Motor Anderson Chevrolet, and Leveille Motor Co.; and Butler Chevrolet, and J. W. Roach Motor Company are the two in Rising Star.

Motorist have been warned to take advantage of this slack period in inspections to get their automobiles ready before September. Beat the rush. Take your car to your choice of inspection station in your town and have it checked now.

No. 1753 Notice is hereby given, to whom concerned, that Eastland County Water Supply District, the post-office address of which is Ranger, Texas, on the 21st day of March, A. D., filed its application in the office of the Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas, in which it applies for a permit to appropriate of the unappropriated waters of the State of Texas, from the Leon River, a tributary of the Little River, which is a tributary of the Brazos River, in Eastland County, Texas, not to exceed 12,000 acre-feet of water per annum, by impounding 28,000 acre-feet of water, for municipal and industrial uses. The proposed dam is to be located at a point which bears North 31 deg. 45 min. East 4167 feet from the southwest corner of McLennan County School Land, Original Survey No. 368, on the south bank of the Leon River, in Eastland County, Texas, and is distant in a southeasterly direction from Eastland, Texas, ten (10) miles.

A hearing on the application of the said Eastland County Water Supply District will be held by the Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas, in the office of the Board at Austin, Texas, on Monday, May 12, 1952, beginning at ten o'clock A. M., at which time and place all parties interested may appear and be heard. Such hearing will be continued from time to time, and from place to place, if necessary, until such determination has been made relative to said application as the said Board of Water Engineers may deem right, equitable and proper.

Few Grasshoppers Forecast For '52

COLLEGE STATION, April—Forecasts based on surveys and actual egg bed counts indicate that grasshoppers will not be a threat to crops and pastures in Texas this year. In only a few spots were enough eggs found to rate the areas as threatening, says Allen C. Gunter, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The areas are small and are found in the upper northwest Panhandle, in the Trinity bottoms of Ellis and Kaufman counties; in Hill, Falls, Milam, Robertson and Washington counties along the Brazos River. In these areas farmers should watch for the early hatches and if the young hoppers show up in large numbers, they should be controlled before they leave the egg bed areas, says Gunter. Other counties in these same general areas may expect light infestations and some damage is possible. Serious damage may develop in the fall if the weather is hot and dry. Gunter advises farmers and

ranchmen that control measures, if needed, should be used before the grasshoppers leave the egg beds and scatter. Wiping out this year's hatches will reduce the chances for major outbreaks next year, points out the specialist, and from this standpoint, the use of control measures is justified. For information on the best insecticides to use, Gunter suggests that farmers contact their local county agents. They can also advise on whether control measures should be used.

COURT RULES PROTECT RIGHTS AND INSURE FAIR TRIALS

Many people regard rules of legal procedure as mere tools of delay, of concern only to lawyers and judges. Far from this, they are instruments of justice, and of real significance to all of us. Procedure is the lubricant which makes the machinery of uniform run smoothly.

The law is composed of two parts—the substantive and adjective law. The substantive law defines rights, duties and remedies; it enforces contracts and rights wrongs; it describes crimes and sets penalties. People can usually see the value of substantive law. Adjective law deals with legal procedure and describes the steps a person must take to invoke the substantive law.

Some of our most important rights are to be found in the body of procedural law. For example, as a person who want justice to prevail, we like to think that every man, rich or poor, shall have

his day in court. This is an important right, for a day in court implies more than merely the right to have your say before a judge and jury.

Your day in court implies that you shall have the right to be properly represented; to have your case presented before an impartial jury and an unbiased judge, and to have a reasonable time to prepare for the trial. It holds that you shall have proper notice of the action against you; that the complaint or indictment shall state a clear cause of action. It means that you shall be confronted by your accusers; that you shall have the right to cross-examine them; that you shall be able to present evidence in your own behalf.

Finally, the law governing procedure tells you how you may appeal your case to higher courts when you feel that you have not had a fair trial or that a prejudicial error has been committed in the trial court.

Much of our procedural law comes down from centuries of experience in the courts of other lands. It was inevitable that though the centuries some of the procedure would become cumbersome, obsolete and difficult. For this reason the history of procedure has been characterized by great periods of reform. In America we have experienced many advantageous changes in our laws governing the procedure of courts and administrative agencies. There is a growing custom in the United States giving the courts the pow-

How to have a winning TELEPHONE PERSONALITY

We're often judged by the way we use telephone service. Good telephone technique and good telephone manners are important to a winning personality... and help you get the most from your telephone service.

A friend of mine who travels a lot tells me she has found a way to improve her telephoning on trips.

"It saves a lot of trouble," she says, "to have a list of the numbers you may want to call with you. I carry mine in a handy little book. Exercise Long Horn Has Ended

By United Press

"Exercise Long Horn" is ending today, 18 hours ahead of schedule. The giant maneuver of the Army and the Air Force covered 18,000 square miles surrounding Fort Hood.

Lt. Gen. William M. Hoge, director of the exercise, called a cease fire at 4 p.m. yesterday after the 1st Armored Division pushed the enemy 82nd Airborne Division across the Colorado River for a premature U. S. victory. And troops and vehicles were bogged in mud as the men were shivering in sub-freezing temperatures.

The maneuver critique, a review of the exercise involving 115,000 men and two Air Forces, will be held at 11 a.m. tomorrow.

The real casualty toll for the maneuver which started March 25 stands at 11 today. The latest deaths are Pfc. Clement Hooper Arizena of Los Angeles who was killed when his parachute failed to open in Monday's jump, and the other is 1st Lt. Robert R. Mayford of Wood River, Ill., also killed Monday, when his fighter plane collided with another plane in the area.

The gigantic maneuver was supposed to determine whether a defending force, flown halfway across the country, could repel an enemy invasion of the United States.

House Charges Allies Falling Down On Job

WASHINGTON, April 10 (UP)—A House Foreign Affairs subcommittee says our Allies must give greater evidence of helping themselves before getting further American aid.

In a report on a European inspection tour conducted by the group late last year, it criticized all the western Allies for not doing enough toward strengthening themselves and building toward unity.

But the House lawmakers particularly scolded Britain. They said the British argument that joining a European union might hurt the Commonwealth "appears to have little merit."

And further American aid, the subcommittee said, must depend on "creation of European unity" to avoid wasting billions of American dollars.

Detective May Testify Today At Barber Trial

FORT WORTH, April 10 (UP)—A Fort Worth detective who was wounded by Robert H. Barber, Jr., is expected to testify today in the murder trial of the 26-year-old ex-convict in Fort Worth.

Detective A. L. Armstrong was wounded in the gun battle at Barber's home last February 7th, the shooting escape in which veteran detective H. E. Cleveland was killed. Yesterday, two Dallas officers, H. C. Holloway and T. O. Pips, admitted on the witness stand that they had no search warrant when they entered Barber's home on the day of the shooting.

However, both policemen told the jury they were invited into the house by Mrs. Barber. Judge Dave McGee, who has ordered day and night sessions, says he expects the trial to end sometime this week end.


Pete Jameson Of Ranger To Attend Meet At Austin
