Around The Square

With Mack

We have a hunch that it will rain tonight, so when we get off we shall go home and finish planting our garden. With plenty rain we will have enough vegetables to open up a canning factory, for a lot of the stuff we are planting is "new", and will sell like wild-fire. For instance we have some bush peaches. We planted them yesterday, and by the first of July those vines will be six feet tall and loaded with luscious fruit. Cucumbers are the giant type. They grow up in the air and one cucumber will make a bushel of pickles—if they produce. Then we have some beans that are the real stuff. One bean will make a large family two meals. All you have to do is borrow a neighbor's step-ladder, climb up six or eight feet and saw one of the beans off the vine. Once you get it down you take a hatchet and slice it. The bean usually grows to a length of about 36 inches. Delicious, the label says.

Our tomato plants are similar. They grow to a height of about 25 feet, and one plant will produce several bushels of large red fruit. We have put up a couple of telephone poles in the back yard for them to run on. A little later we will make a little lattice work. This will be done by using 2x4s between the phone poles.

We know nothing about farming or gardening, but what we lack in knowledge will be off-set by gall. If we grow vegetables we will grow big ones. The Lord usually looks after babies, fools and amateur gardeners.

The Fat Stock Show has come and gone, and everybody is happy but the two lost calves. We passed around the Castleberry Feed store today and Mr. Castleberry asked us when we were going to get the calves straightened out. Seems he bought one of these high priced calves, and he's the only fellow who knows about it. Sorry, Mr. Castleberry, and we shall endeavor to find out who you bought the calf from. You must have paid for him, for we have no complaints, and these Club boys are not going to lose big fat calves without a murmur. No sir-ee.

We are planning a new sleeping porch. This is done for our personal welfare, for since we started that garden our wife has made it so hot on us that we are burning up. With a sleeping porch we will be able to stay nice and cool, and still watch her slay the weeds in that garden. It isn't everybody that could get by with a deal of this kind, so don't be alarmed if you learn that we failed and are in a hospital, or something.

If we fall at gardening we are going to try beef cattle. Our back yard is about 50 x 60 feet, and at the time it is planted in bermuda, clover, weeds and rubbish. Wonder how many head of cattle we can run on this acreage? We do not wish to overstock it, for feed is very high, and we have no intention of buying any. If you know anything about cattle grazing, let us hear from you. With steak selling at \$1.25 a pound we will ever fill the meat compartment in our refrigerator is to produce the beef ourselves.



Political Fireworks May Be Popping At New Braunfels

There may be some political fireworks popping today at the Texas Democratic Executive Committee meeting at New Braunfels.

Two factions, the so-called "Loyal Democrats" and the opposing Shivers group, are expected to kick the uninstruced delegation question around considerably. Shivers is campaigning for an uninstruced Texas delegation to the National Democratic Nominating Convention in July.

The "Loyal Democrats", working for an instruced delegation, may recommend that the executive committee order county Democratic chairmen to require the loyalty pledge. It is a promise to support all nominees of the party, from the precinct convention level on up.

The governor is expected to ask the executive committee to leave the loyalty pledge question up to county and precinct organizations.

If Shivers program should prevail, it will get its next test at the May 3rd precinct conventions. In that convention, "Loyalists" again are expected to battle the Shivers' group for party control.

Meanwhile, in a letter to the anti-Fair Deal Harris County Democratic Club, Gov. Shivers has reiterated his strong support of an uninstruced delegation.

He said he will not commit himself to support of the Democratic party's national candidates "until I know who they are and what their platform is going to be."

Mrs. W. E. Sneed of Clovis, New Mexico, arrived in Ranger early this morning to join her brother and sister, Charles Ashcraft and Mrs. Sally Rogers on a trip to Sinton, Texas, for the funeral services of another sister, Mrs. Bertha Phillips, Saturday morning April 19.

Mrs. Phillips, the former Bertha Ashcraft, was born April 27, 1890 and grew up in the Salem and Cheaney communities. In 1912 she taught the Mountain rural school, five miles north of Desdemona and the following year, she taught Leon school, southeast of Gorman.

Importance Precinct Convention Often Underestimated By Voters

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of two articles provided by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce as a public service to encourage attendance at party precinct conventions May 3.)

If one is to function effectively in the Precinct Convention, he needs to know something about how such a convention should be conducted.

The Precinct Chairman elected in the party primary last July is charged with the duty of calling the Precinct Convention to order. He is to preside until the Permanent Chairman is elected.

If the Precinct Chairman does not arrive in time to open the convention at the duly designated moment, any qualified voter living in the precinct may be selected to serve as Temporary Chairman and preside until the Permanent Chairman is named.

If one wishes to have an active part in getting his Precinct Convention to follow his political views in its selections and decisions, he should do some preliminary work—at least a week before the convention.

This can best be done by arranging a preliminary caucus among friends and neighbors. There, proposed candidates for Permanent Chairman and Permanent Secretary should be selected, a Floor Leader and assistants should be designated to make motions in the convention on election of the Permanent Secretary, the Committee on Delegates (to the county convention) and the Committee on Resolutions.

Each Precinct is entitled to one delegate in the county convention for every 25 votes cast for governor in the precinct in the last general election. (This figure can be obtained from the County Clerk.)

It is the Resolutions Committee report that will contain such items as whether the precinct's delegates shall vote as a unit in the county convention, and whether the precinct shall favor having the Texas delegation instructed or uninstruced in the National Convention. That is, whether the precinct would rather have Texas national delegation pledged to support one man only as presidential candidate, or whether it would have the delegation free to take advantage of on-the-spot developments in the national convention.

New Manufacturing Plant For Eastland

You - Mr. Citizen - Are Affected

(Editorial)

Should we—those of us having the authority to vote on the bond issue next Tuesday—deny our fellow citizens, community, and ourselves the right to a new and fresh outlook on life?

Nothing has even been more important to two towns than water is to Ranger and Eastland.

Heretofore little or nothing has been done about our plight of being without sufficient water for our daily domestic needs, much less the needs of new industries who would want to come to this area.

Should the peoples of Ranger and Eastland choose to show their foresight and intelligence by voting for the bond issue April 22, it is believed the day would never come when they would regret that move.

This plan of getting water. At a cheap cost. On a pay-for-itself basis could mean the salvation of our community.

Cast out now the idea of the average citizen not being affected by not having water. Local industries are feeling the pinch of inadequate water. A majority of us depend on those businesses for a livelihood. A temporary or permanent shutdown would mean layoffs or discontinuance of jobs. That affects the average man.

No one can deny we do not now have an adequate supply of water for our present needs. Before going to the polls and voting Tuesday—drive by your community water supply and see where you stand in the light of having water for the coming summer.

You can't measure your present water supply in months, when it is so much easier to base your calculations on the number of days supply remaining.

This is a business proposition. Businessmen have spent hours, and thousands of hours working toward this plan. All they ask of you is to have faith in their judgment.

As cautious as the planners of a way for renewed life for our community will be the bond purchasers. They will conduct their own investigation. They will purchase the bonds only if our local businessmen have made a business proposition, and they can see where the Eastland County Water Supply District can meet the standards set for itself.

We believe and firmly advocate you showing your desire to become an important part in a growing community, and proving by your vote, your faith in the men guiding us at the time of dire circumstances, the approval of the bond issue Tuesday, April 22.

Valley Residents Facing Serious Water Shortages

Rio Grande Valley water officials may initiate injunction proceedings to stop depletion of their critical water shortage.

Brownsville residents said that water irrigation districts higher up the Rio Grande River are taking water at the expense of domestic users. The flow of the Rio Grande is at an all-time low. It was measured at Rio Grande City this week at 350 cubic feet per second, the lowest mark ever recorded.

Yesterday, the Brownsville City Commission authorized City Manager E. M. Watts to put water rationing into effect when reserves reach a critical low. Watts said that will be Monday. And John Barron, superintendent of Brownsville schools, said this will mean closing the schools because of the lack of proper sanitary facilities.

Eighty Women Will Be Employed At New Factory In Pullman Bldg. Work Will Begin At Early Date

Another new factory has been secured for Eastland, stated H. J. Tanner, chamber of commerce manager, today. The new plant will manufacture an item of women's clothing and will give employment to another 80 women of this community.

It will be a power sewing machine operation, with some seven sewing machines being installed. Lease agreement is being completed with Mr. Henry Pullman for the plant to be located in the Pullman building on East Main Street near the east city limits.

Remodeling will start immediately on the Pullman building to meet the requirements of the new manufacturing plant. The remodeling work will be pushed to completion so that operation of the new plant can start in the very near future. Tanner stated, that with the addition of this new plant, over one half million dollars of new money will be injected into the economy of Eastland each year, in the manufacturing of women wear, only.

Fortunately, he added the securing of this new industry, with its benefit to our economy, in no way requires the use of water for its manufacture, but that the forward progress of Eastland can only be secured by providing an adequate water supply to care for other industries who do require water, that could be induced to locate here.

Churchill In Confinement Due To Cold

WESTERHAM, England, April 18 (UP)—British Prime Minister Winston Churchill is confined to his Chartwell Country home with a heavy chest cold.

An announcement by Number 10 Downing Street last night said the cold was following a normal course. But parliamentary circles are anxious because of the Prime Minister's advanced age, he is 77.

Churchill is continuing to carry on his duties and receive callers, but the cold forced him and his wife to cancel plans to be weekend guests of Queen Elizabeth at Windsor Castle.

He concluded his remarks to the stockholders with an optimistic picture for the future of the Southwest area.

FARM BUREAU OPPOSES 100% GOVERNMENT PEANUT PARITY

WASHINGTON, April 18 (UP)—President Allan Kline of the American Farm Bureau Federation said a proposal to boost price supports to 100 per cent of parity would "trap" farmers into "complete government control."

In a statement prepared for the Senate Agriculture Committee, Kline said 100 per cent supports would lead to "out-and-out price fixing" by the government, because consumers would insist upon price ceilings at the same figure.

The committee also is scheduled to hear testimony from Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan on various price support measures.

Kline told the committee that "thinking farmers know the proposal of 100 per cent price supports is a trap. It would mean complete government control of farm production, including the matter of who would grow what and how much. It would mean deciding on a political rather than economic basis the production pattern of American Agriculture."

The agriculture committee is holding hearings on three new price support bills. One of them by Sen. Robert Kerr of Oklahoma, would raise maximum supports on most major farm crops except fruits and vegetables to 100 per cent of parity.



12 Year Foreign Outlay Above 25 Years Building

ABIENE—Foreign aid outlays by the United States which totaled \$89,252,000,000 in the last 12 years, are equal to the total value of all residential building construction in this country for the past 25 years.

This comparison was brought out today in a statistical analysis of foreign aid programs prepared by the Washington research office of the Council of State Chambers of Commerce for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and 32 other State and regional Chambers of Commerce.

The study also revealed that the \$48,500,000,000 of foreign aid funds provided in the seven post-war years alone exceeds the total net value of all property, plant and equipment owned by all American manufacturing corporations combined.

The study cited the fact that more than 700,000,000 people in six countries, after accepting 2,962,000,000 in aid since the war, have turned on the United States "menacingly as enemies."

Although the analysis took no position on the matter of future foreign aid, it sounded this note of caution, "Disturbing reactions to our aid programs even among friendly nations may well justify a re-examination of them in the light of our experience."
