**O'Dwyers Connection In Crime Told By Writer Reader's Digest**

PLEASANTVILLE, N. Y.—"Is County and Mayor of New York. As I see it," the author concludes, "the story is that of a man who began with good intentions but, by playing the game," became a victim of the "system."

Patrolman O'Dwyer, "an understanding and ambitious fellow with a talent for making friends," worked hard in his off hours, earned a law degree at Fordham University and passed the New York bar examination in 1925.

"From the first," Oursler writes, "crime and politics were never far away." O'Dwyer's early law partner, George Joyce, served as alderman in a district where underworld leader Joe Adonis held despotic power. Adonis, now in prison, then ran a restaurant patronized nightly by "rogues and political adventurers" who sought Adonis' help and money in elections. "Dwyer knew a number of them, and in later years they were hard to disown."

Dwyer's deepening involvements with the underworld of New York. As District Attorney of Kings County, his first move was to choose as his chief James J. Moran, "a man with no legal training for the post." In the District Attorney's office "great outrages against public safety and decency occurred," Oursler states. Not the least of them was the suppression of evidence gathered by special prosecutor John H. Amen in his crusade against Brooklyn's waterfront rackets.

Moran, as O'Dwyer's perennial sidekick and aide, was destined for ever closer identification with his boss, and for increasingly eminent roles in the drama of New York politics, until his ousting by Mayor Impellitteri after the Kefauver hearings. He has since been convicted of perjury, extortion and conspiracy, and sentenced to a maximum of 28 years in prison.

Though O'Dwyer's work against Hurder Inc., achieved "positive accomplishments," none of the top six of the syndicate was prosecuted. Albert Anastasia, "lord high executioner," still remains free, though the 1939 murder of aged Moishe Diamond presented what O'Dwyer himself called a "perfect case" against Anastasia.

The case collapsed when star witness Abe Reles died from falling or jumping from the sixth floor of a Coney Island hotel. The six policemen guarding Reles "all fell asleep at the same time," according to the Captain in charge. It had "never occurred" to O'Dwyer to record the sworn testimony by Reles. No action against Anastasia was taken. The "Wanted" cards of men involved in the Anastasia crimes were removed from police files.

O'Dwyer's visit to Frank Costello, shortly before the former sought nomination for mayor, did not concern his mayoralty ambitions, O'Dwyer insists. But Oursler notes that Michael Kennedy, Tammany boss, was at the meeting, with other Tammany politi-

## Keeping Records Important Part Farming-Ranching

COLLEGE STATION.—Farming and ranching are two of the world's most important enterprises. The home is the hub of the business activities and if the households are not organized much time may be lost looking for mislaid addresses, receipts, deeds and many other items that have been pigeon holed and can't be found.

Gladys Darden, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says many letters, records and other business are neglected for lack of a convenient place to work. The 1951 annual report shows that county Extension agents assisted 22,829 rural families to keep farm and home records and suggested organized places where such records can be filed and "paper work" done.

The location of business centers can be a personal choice. Some people prefer the living room, some the kitchen and some the privacy of the bedroom. Where the farm or ranch enterprise is on a large scale, a separate room may be needed and furnished with standard office equipment.

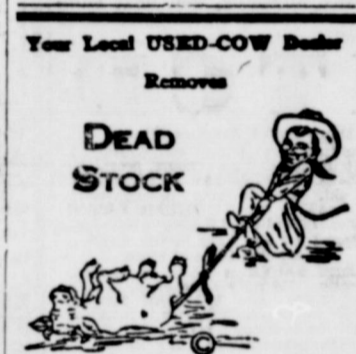
Any family can have a business center. However, Miss Darden says, there are a few essentials necessary for any center. There should be ample and comfortable writing space, a chair with a back support and a good light. Current records and supplies should be in reach with storage for inactive files. Keep accessories to the minimum but have all that are needed such as, account books, blotters, ink, pen, pencils, desk calendar erasers,

stationary postcards, stamps and a waste basket.

If possible, have a filing cabinet and a filing system with headings for current files are: account books, addresses, automobile, bank deposit slip, bank statements, canceled checks, equipment instructions, four records, income tax returns, insurance information, letters tax forms and lists of material kept in a safety deposit box. A key to the files aids in locating material quickly.

Miss Darden says that she has observed that business activities in any household run more smoothly after the organization of business centers.

## Mountain Lions Create Trapping Flurry On Border

AUSTIN.—A flurry of action in the mountain lion zone along the Rio Grande river was reported to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

Seven were trapped on the San Pedro Ranch, south of Eagle Pass, after damaging raids on the deer herds.

Three more were shot on the Ortiz Ranch, about ten miles north east of Laredo, when a cruising state trapper ambushed a female and two cubs. The cubs were almost full grown.

The San Pedro ranch roundup occurred after Foreman Jim Tate reported finding carcasses of newly killed deer. Johnny Hearn of Cotulla, predator control chief for the Commission, assigned Game Warden Jim Pond of Carrizo Springs, and State trapper Ruf Bishop to the job.

They pitched camp in the deer range and struck quickly, trapping four big lions within four days. The other three were caught later.

Warden Supervisor Herbert Ward at Catarina, in whose district most mountain lion depredations occur, said his force had to

be ready to act on short notice. He explained the lions swim the Rio Grande from Mexico and strike swiftly, oftentimes killing deer for sheer sport.

The three animals shot on the Ortiz Ranch were bagged by State Trapper Agapito Flores of Laredo while cruising at night. He saw one of the young cubs at about thirty paces. He shot it, as well as a second cat that stepped into the

car lights as soon as the first fell. About two hours later, the female lion appeared seeking the cubs and was shot.
